The Street Map & Insiders Guide, which was originally published a week before Hurricane Katrina, was one of the most valuable tools for first responders in the days and weeks after the storm. With the pre-Katrina supply now exhausted, the Street Map & Insiders Guide has been updated to reflect the tremendous damage of the storm. For all of the progress that the

community has made in the months after the Aug. 29, 2005 storm, a timeline and detailed rebuilding or repair plans for many amenities are still in the works.

Major roadways and neighborhood streets shown on the street map are accurate - we're getting the street signs up as quickly as we can - but information for the insiders guide section - details on museums, damaged historic sites, etcetera - will be updated in a future publication. 
Meantime, consider this Street Map & Insiders Guide a roadmap for a work in progress.



History

Biloxi is a progressive, cosmopolitan, waterfront community fast becoming one of the nation's premier resort destinations.

Biloxi was established in 1699 as the first French settlement in the Mississippi Valley. Soon after, Biloxi became a cultural melting pot influenced by the French, English, Spanish, and other foreign cultures before becoming the first capital of the Louisiana Territory.

Throughout its history, Biloxi's thriving success has been strongly influenced by its temperate, Gulf Coast location. Quickly emerging as a leader in the seafood industry, Biloxi was recognized as the seafood capital of the world by the late 1800s.

> By the 1920s, Biloxi had become a booming tourist town. Thousands of "snowbirds" from the North and Midwest flocked to Biloxi's warm climate each winter for deep-sea fishing, a round of golf, or simple relaxation on the beautiful Gulf shore.

In 1941, "Keesler Field" was established, and the Air Force base continues to have a significant impact on Biloxi and its economy.

With the arrival of legalized casino gambling in 1992, Biloxi began transforming itself into what today is a world-class resort destination year-round. Residents find appeal in the city's excellent public and private schools, hospitals, police and fire protection, low unemployment rate, and low cost of living overall.

In fact, whether you're looking for a great place to visit or a place to plant your roots, Biloxi has a great deal to offer.



Location

Biloxi is in the center of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, 90 minutes from New Orleans and an hour from Mobile. Biloxi is accessible by car on I-10 and U.S. 90, by plane via the Gulfport-Biloxi International Airport, and by train via Amtrak.

Weather

There are no sharply defined seasons in Biloxi, where tropical sunshine and cool ocean breezes are the norm. Average temperatures range from 56 degrees in the winter to 81 degrees in the summer, making it possible to enjoy outdoor activities year 'round.

Humidity and rainfall are highest in the late summer, due to the proximity to the warm Gulf waters. Most rainfall is intermittent and followed by traditional Gulf Coast sunshine. Biloxi averages about 78 inches of rainfall a year.

Did you know...

- Biloxi (pronounced Buh-luck-see) is an Indian word meaning "First People."
- Explorer Pierre LeMoyne Sieur d'Iberville landed on what is now the Biloxi peninsula on Feb. 13, 1699 to strengthen France's claim to the Mississippi Valley. He named the area in honor of the Indians, the Biloxis, who greeted him.
- Biloxi is the birthplace of Barq's Root Beer, the No. 1 selling root beer in the world.
- Apollo 13 Astronaut Fred Haise was born and raised in Biloxi.
- Keesler Air Force Base is the electronics training headquarters of the Air Force, home of the second largest medical facility in the Air Force, and home of the Hurricane Hunters.
- Mullet, known as "Biloxi Bacon," saved residents from starvation during the Civil War blockades.
- One piece of Biloxi native George Ohr's pottery can sell at auction for more than Ohr earned in his entire life.

The rules of the road

Biloxi and the Mississippi Gulf Coast have seen the number of visitors to our community increase from about a million a year before 1992 to between 10 and 12 million a year today.

The roads can get busy on the 13-square mile Biloxi peninsula and others areas in the overall 50-square miles of the city.

A few tips for the motoring public to keep in mind: • Traffic signals along U.S. 90 have now been numbered from the west end of Gulfport to the east end of Biloxi. This new feature was designed to help in providing directions.

• Speed limits on U.S. 90 in Biloxi range from 30 mph to 45 mph. Slower traffic should use right lanes. Parking on U.S. 90 is allowed only in designated parking bays. No city street has a speed limit higher than 45 mph. In fact, the posted speed limit on most streets is 25 mph.

• Unless otherwise marked, right turns are allowed at red lights, after making a complete stop and vielding to oncoming traffic.



Overview

Biloxi has a seen a great deal of growth and excitement since the area was first settled in 1699, but none more than since 1992. when waterfront casino resorts ignited a economic and cultural renaissance that continues to flourish today.

The city has seen \$6 billion in growth, primarily along the waterfront in east Biloxi, but also including tens of millions of dollars in construction of new homes and new small businesses.

The city has been recognized as a model of success as a result of its orderly management of such massive growth, while at the same time preserving the community's sense of place and enhancing its quality of life.

Education

The Biloxi Public School District, with an enrollment of more than 6,000 students in Grades K to 12, has earned the state's highest rating for academic excellence, and has also captured worldwide attention for its state-of-the-art facilities.

Biloxi is also home to private and parochial prep schools, as well as a community college, and Tulane's University College. Degree-granting courses are also offered at Keesler Air Force Base and at the Gulf Coast campus of the University of Southern

Mississippi in nearby Long Beach.

Government

Biloxi is governed by a strong mayor-council form of government, with the mayor running the city on a day-today basis and council members elected from seven wards throughout the city, serving parttime and helping set policy.


New residents can register to vote at Biloxi City Hall or at the County Courthouse. The nearby County Courthouse also is where you purchase automobile tags or pay city and county property taxes. Mississippi driver's licenses are available from the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol, in the Dr. Eldon Bolton State Office Building on Back Bay.

Public safety

Biloxi is home to one of the best-trained, best-paid, and best-equipped police and fire departments in the Southeast.

The Biloxi Police Department (more than 150 sworn officers) and the Biloxi Fire Department (more than 150 firefighters at nine fire stations) have taken a pro-active approach to public safety. The departments have specialized units focusing on such areas as home security inspections, accident reconstruction, fire prevention,

and hazardous material response. The Lopez-Quave Public Safety Center, which houses police and fire department leaders and the city's Municipal Court, is on Porter Avenue, two blocks north of the Biloxi Lighthouse.




• According to the 2000 Census, Biloxi has 50,644 residents, with a median age of 32.5. • In a 2000 Fodor's survey, the nation's travel agents identified the top three emerging U.S. destinations as Orlando, Las Vegas and Biloxi. • In 2003, the Golf Insider, a golf-travel rating publication. named the Mississippi Gulf Coast the "Best Up-and-Coming Domestic Golf Destination of the Year." • The Biloxi Public School System was recognized in 2003 as being the first public school district in the country to have surveillance cameras in all classrooms. The feat generated a front-page story in USA Today and stories on "ABC's World News Tonight," "Good Morning America," CBS, Fox News, National Public Radio and even the BBC.

Services, utilities

Biloxians enjoy the lowest water, sewer and garbage rates of any city in the area. The city provides residential and commercial water and sewer services, and Biloxi is home to one of the largest wastewater treatment plants of its kind in the nation. Mississippi Power Co. and Coast Electric Power Association provide electrical service in Biloxi; CenterPoint Entex provides gas service; and Cable One offers digital cable TV and online access in Biloxi.
