Community & Volunteers

- June 15: Jobbers raising concerns re: boycotts and business implications - Bruce Johnson, GPA, coordinating a tour of preparedness.
- Coordinating meetings to review government entity claims process with local governments (GPA, KPMG liaison, EOC liaison, LCSC attending).
- Community Outreach team is also working on reaching out to civic organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, etc. to let them know that we are here to address any questions that they might have.

Environmental & Wildlife

- Maintained boom in all divisions
- Conducted beach patrols in Pass Christian, Gulfport and Biloxi, minimal pick-up
- Continued clean up on Petit Bois, 2 miles cleaned today, and 2 miles left to complete –should complete next operational period
- Deployed absorbent boom in Pt Aux Chenes Bay and will complete in the next operational period
- Deployed boom in Biloxi Bay (Tier 2), will complete in the next operational period
- Deployed 18” hard boom at Ship Island (Tier 2) and will complete in the next operational period
- Received 5,800 feet of 18” hard boom today

Vessels of Opportunity

- **628** vessels deployed for boom surveillance/debris removal.
- Need to resolve the issue of pleasure boats being called into VOO duty ahead of commercial boats
- Concerns that people who make their living on the Gulf are not given priority in the VOO program.
- There is confusion among many activated VOO vessels without ‘yellow card’ training
- VOO trained workers will: set and tend boom; operate USCG VoSS(skimming system); search and rescue; find tar balls using sonar; safety boats on strike teams; command boats on Strike teams.

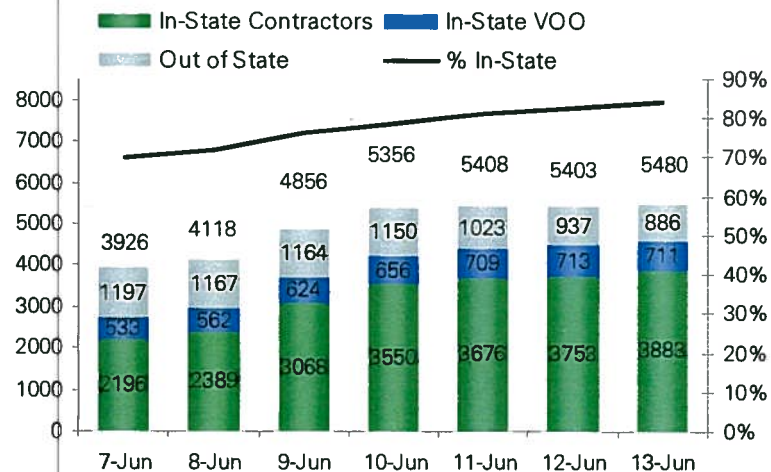
Opportunities:

- Beginning to receive calls asking how BP is disposing of collected oil, with landfills and well water contamination the core concern. Have requested FAQ’s (Marti Powers).
- Continue meeting with local staging areas to help them connect with local businesses.
- Communication between the Command Center and local EOC continues to be an issue. The EOC does receive sufficient information on what has already occurred through the state. Their need is to receive information on what is planned.
- Simplify communications so that the city officials are not overwhelmed with meetings and emails.
- Local offices need to have contact information for contractors and sub-contractors employed by BP to assure local business and officials these contractors are part of the relief effort.

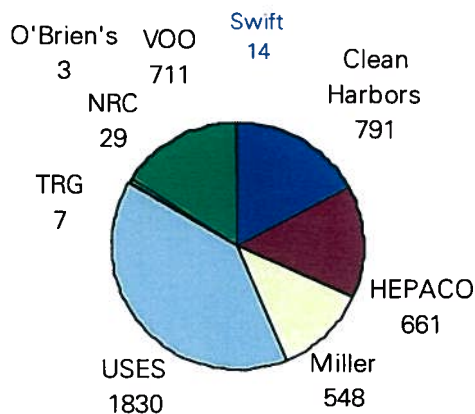
Mississippi Resource Utilisation



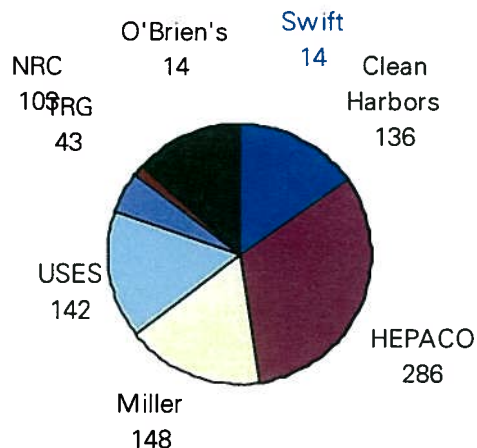
Key Messages

- Will take time, but transition has commenced.

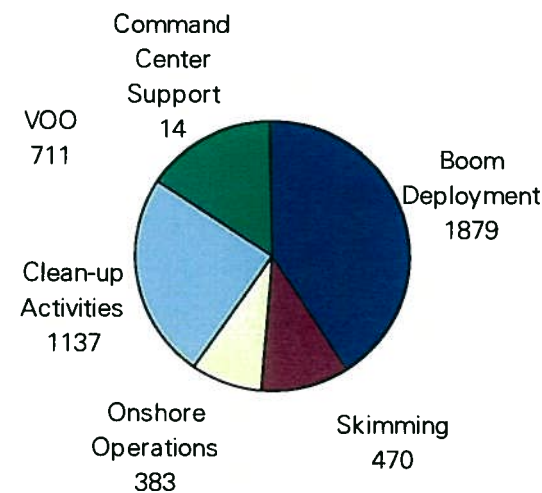
In-State Resources - Contractors (Total 4594)
