Park, boardwalk now open to public; another fire station on way north of Bay

Two high-profile waterfront projects – the Popp's Ferry Causeway Park and the West Biloxi Boardwalk - are officially opening to the public in time for the Labor Day weekend, and the city is also kicking off construction of another fire station north of the Bay.

The Popp's Ferry Causeway Park project,

whose planning goes back to the mid-1980s, will be open to the public Labor Day weekend.

Hours for the bait shop and kavak rentals are still being finalized, but operators plan to be open daily during daylight hours initially.



Meantime, the West Biloxi Boardwalk, a project of the City of Biloxi and Harrison County, is also now open to the public.

The 10-foot boardwalk runs along the north edge of the beach, from the Coast Transit Comfort Station near Rodenberg to Veterans Avenue.

The boardwalk, elevated as much as three feet in some places, has benches along its route and is lighted for nighttime beachcombers.

"This new boardwalk gives people an idea of what we're trying to do along the waterfront," says Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich. "We're creating a synergy and giving people a new waterfront experience."

The new fire station, which will be on Old Highway 67 east of Cedar Lake Road, will actually be completed before the battalionsize station, Station 7.

The city recently broke ground for the construction of the new station near Cedar-Popp's.

Fire station No. 10, which has a price tag of more than \$2 million, will be similar in appearance to Station 9 in Eagle Point and Station 2 at East End.

Construction is scheduled to begin this month and set to be complete in nine months.

MDOT plans paving, repairs for U.S. 90 in Biloxi

Sharp-eyed motorists on U.S. 90 in Biloxi may have noticed markings on the asphalt near storm drains, the first signal that MDOT is nearly ready to begin a major paving and repair project on the nine miles of highway between DeBuys Road and the Biloxi Bay Bridge.

Contractors are currently inspecting and videoing existing drain pipes and will begin curb and sidewalk repairs, with paving to follow.

The \$6.5 million project, which was awarded to Warren Paving and will include drainage work and new asphalt, is expected to be completed in May 2019.

And, yes, the Mississippi Department of Transportation is aware that more than 40,000 vehicles travel some sections of U.S. 90 on an average day and thousands of additional vehicles will be in town the first week in October for Cruisin' the Coast.

MDOT savs crews hope to limit lane closures to nighttime, Sunday through Thursday, between 7 p.m. and 6 a.m.

District Engineer Kelly Castleberry told The Biloxi-D'Iberville Press that although pavement may be uneven in some areas when Cruisin' traffic arrives, "we will have the contractor get off the highway, and then be right back on the highway once Cruisin' the Coast is finished."

MDOT Public Information Officer Jas N Smith said paving will likely begin at the western end of the project, at DeBuys Road, and move eastward, but "there is the possibility that two paving crews will be mobilized from both ends of the project."



New walkway in the works north of harbor

The new pedestrian bridge at U.S. 90 and Caillavet Street - linking the Beau Rivage employee parking garage and the Beau Rivage itself - will begin taking shape over the highway in a few months, and about that time, the City of Biloxi will begin work on a second U.S. 90 pedestrian overpass, west of Main Street. The project will connect the two new hotels under construction north of the busy roadway with the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor and the nearby Hard Rock Hotel and Casino.

In August, the city was expected to award a \$2.5 million contract for the new walkway, which will be built near the new Watermark and Hilton Garden Inn hotels

on the north side and just west of Guice Park on the south side of the highway. The new bridge is expected to be complete as soon as July 2019. The walkway at Caillavet, by the way, is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

Each of the walkways was designed by Leigh Jaunsen of the firm Dale Parters, and each has stairs and elevators at both ends.

The Caillavet Street walkway, part of the MGM Park contract, is being funded by the state, and the harbor walkway is being overseen by the city and funded through money collected through a countywide port bond.

Howard Avenue work, despite surprises, on schedule

Those working on the nearly \$2 million reconstruction of downtown Howard Avenue report work is on schedule for an October completion, but the project has not been without its surprises.

Most of the work over the past four months has been below-ground construction, such as storm drains and water mains, says Andy Phelan

of Pickering Firm engineering, but with that work complete, "it's beginning to look like a real roadway project, with the stone road base being installed, along with the curb and gutter."

The downtown work, not unlike other road projects

underway in Biloxi, has had its share of surprises. Workers were aware of an existing 12-inch water main to be removed, but they also unearthed an additional

12-inch main abandoned in place, along with an abandoned six-inch main next to it.

And then there were the underground remnants of the old Vieux March canopies. Said Phelan: "All told there was about three

times as much buried pipe as was planned for and a lot more concrete that had to come out of the ground than

After completion of the sidewalks, Phelan continued, "the road will be ready for its surface."

News

- Howard Avenue: Hemphill Construction reports Howard Avenue at Querens and Benachi will remain closed at least another month. Workers are installing sewer lines 25 feet below ground, the deepest part of the entire Hemphill work. Expect Benachi closures soon. Notifications are pending.
- Keesler gate: Necaise Brothers has cleared properties on Forrest Avenue that the city acquired for the new **Division Street** Keesler entrance. Inside-the-gate construction has begun and a security fence has been erected to allow heavy construction equipment into Keesler. Engineers are finalizing design and offers are in the works for property to help transform Division into a boulevard between I-110 and Forrest.
- · Pine Street: The expansion of Pine Street from Back Bay Boulevard to U.S. 90 remains a priority of Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich, but the project remains tied to financing for the proposed Biloxi Pointe casino resort. The mayor also has suggested that the city might use the announced Margaritaville expansion as a catalyst to reignite the Pine Street project. Talks continue with the Mississippi Development Authority, which has pledged \$5 million toward the \$19 million road project.

Here's the latest on the work north of the CSX railway

Back in August 2014, when Oscar Renda Contracting began the \$116.5 million project to rebuild infrastructure on 55 miles of streets in east Biloxi, the city noted it was the largest public works contract in the history of the city.

But nobody envisioned - and the contract could not prevent - how the project would mushroom and disrupt east Biloxi streets and neighborhoods, especially after all 55 miles of roads were reduced to dirt as contractors installed a new water system. And nobody envisioned that the roads would remain dirt for dozens of months in some cases.

Now, 68 charge orders and an additional 511 days later, as the now-\$128.3 million project moves toward its contracted Dec. 21, 2018 deadline, residents see a diminishing amount of dirt roads, more detours, and more workers than ever on the project. Monthslong delays caused by design disputes and relocations of gas and phone lines are nearly a thing of the past.

And finances are in order.

In fact, when Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich took office a year into the Oscar Renda contract, and as a deadline also loomed to open MGM Park, he had two major concerns: a snag in funding for the project and complaints about dirt roads throughout east Biloxi.


Gilich had the city bring in a contractor to temporarily pave a dozen major thoroughfares, but finances were a more difficult issue.

The city, which was owed some \$17 million in reimbursements from FEMA, was unable to continue to draw from its revenues to pay contractors, with some bills more than 145 days past due.

Gilich - who's fond of saying "if you can measure it you can manage it" - has reduced the backlog to \$5 million, brought contractors current on payments, and instituted bi-weekly accountability and progress meetings with state and federal partners

The city is now able to project funding requests a month ahead of time to reduce pressure on local resources.






Highlights of the current status

- Oscar Renda, as vowed months ago, will have asphalt on all
 of Division Street, from end to end, by the end of October.
 Crews are installing storm drains now, following with road
 base and paving.
- Lameuse Street north of Division will be paved no later than the beginning of October. Crews are installing sewer lines now, followed by drainage.
- Paving will also be done shortly on Desoto, Rosado, Bradford and Graham.
- Sidewalks and driveways are in the works for Columbus, Frank P. Corso, North Park and Balboa.
- A gas main conflict has been resolved on Benachi, and crews are now wrapping up sewer work, with storm drains to follow.



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MDOT green lights design for Popp's Ferry extension

The Mississippi Department of Transportation has reviewed the city's plans for the extension of Popp's Ferry Road to U.S. 90, and MDOT has authorized the city to move forward with acquiring property for the four-lane roadway that will cover eight-tenths of a mile

Make no mistake, the project is still years away, but work is progressing.

"Some people will disagree with me on this," says Biloxi Chief Administrative Officer Mike Leonard, "but the extension of Popp's Ferry Road to U.S. 90 is the most important economic development project we're working on right now.

"I realize that we have major work in east Biloxi right now and that we have almost a half a billion in public projects in the works, but the businesses in west Biloxi have heard about this Popp's Ferry extension for years now, and they need to know we are working on it."

Here's the latest from engineers at Neel-Schaffer, the firm that is performing the design and pre-construction work on the project:

The city has talked for years about this extension. What's the status?

Yes, the city has indeed spoken about this project for years, and, frankly, the work necessary for pre-construction - the public hearings and state and federal approvals has been underway for years.

The plans have been through the initial review by MDOT and final design is

Current work being completed includes preparation of the right-of-way and collection of soil samples for design of the proposed roadway.

The proposed roadway will be four lanes with a raised median and turning lanes. It will also include a 10-foot multi-use path on one side and a five-walk sidewalk on the opposite side.

Yes, there will be a tunnel. It's a pedestrian tunnel and a separate vehicular tunnel at the Coliseum to connect the convention center to the overflow parking lot west of the proposed roadwav.

How is this work being funded and when can people drive on the extension?

This project - currently estimated at \$9.6 million - is being funded through a Gulf Regional Planning Commission grant that will cover 80 percent of construction and ROW costs. The remaining 20 percent will be a match from the City of Biloxi.

The right-of-way for the project still needs to be acquired, which is anticipated to be completed in 2020. In addition, CSX Railroad will need to construct a new crossing for the proposed roadway, which could take up to two years. Both of these activities will need to be completed before construction of the roadway, which will take about one year.

What about the residents and business owners who live or work near the route?

Public meetings were held during the environmental and route selection phases. Additional information will be provided to all interested parties before any construction begins. In addition, the city and local news will report any construction activities. This project is expected to have minimal impact on existing routes because the proposed roadway is on a new alignment.

Residents will begin to hear from the city later this year as the row-of-way process continues.

New bridge for Popp's Ferry still years away

The Popp's Ferry bridge doesn't open a dozen or so times a day as it did years ago for coal barges, but the 20,000 motorists who travel the bridge on an average day will tell you they cross their fingers each time the span opens.

That's because the two-lane, low-level bridge, now 39 years old and also a vital hurricane evacuation route, requires increasing repairs to keep it operating dependably.

As a result of those issues, the City of Biloxi years ago began seeking funding to launch the process to replace the aging bridge with a taller, fixed span bridge able to accommodate four lanes of traffic and

a walking path. In fact, the new bridge would resemble the Biloxi Bay Bridge.

Here's an update from Benjamin Smith, an

engineer with Brown, Mitchell & Associates, the firm that has been working on the project. What's the status of this project?

We are working with MDOT to complete the environmental study, which looks at the potential impacts the project would have on the area: water resources and the neighborhood surrounding the bridge, among other factors. Once MDOT accepts the environmental study, the city will continue to pursue project funding.

How is this work being funded and when can motorists expect to drive on it?


The current work is being funded by the city and MDOT. The entire project is estimated at \$120 million, which includes capacity improvements from Pass Road north, including the bridge, to the Margaret Sherry Library. Since the project is not completely funded, it will be a number of years before the bridge is in place.

What about the residents and business owners who live or work north or south of the bridge?

We have identified the properties that will be impacted. We have held public meetings and workshops to inform impacted residents and property owners. As funding becomes available to buy right-of-way, the city would be contacting residents with specific details.

What's next in the process?

The next step is finalize the environmental review and complete coordination with resource agencies. Once that is complete and once more funding is secured, property acquisition can begin.









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
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City now has the big picture on road maintenance

Major roadwork in Biloxi - whether it's infrastructure work in east Biloxi, or detours on any number of streets in city - capture most of the attention these days, but the city now has a road map for repairs and maintenance of roads throughout the city.

Southern Mississippi Planning and Development District has graded 232 miles of the 304 miles of city-maintained thoroughfares - infrastructure areas and state roadways were omitted - and has compiled a guide to help plan future maintenance.

"I don't know that there has ever been a wholesale grading of streets throughout Biloxi," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich said. "I have always been a firm believer of 'if you can measure it, you can manage it.'

"And now, SMPDD has given us the 'Road Maintenance and Improvement Plan' to get a better understanding of our complete road network, so that we can prioritize and take a proactive approach to road maintenance.

"We're also fortunate that Harrison County Supervisors (Beverly) Martin and (Connie) Rockco have worked with us in the past on these type collaborative efforts, since a large part of Biloxi is in their districts. We appreciate their support and vision."

The plan involved inspecting and evaluating the conditions of the roads and rating their conditions. Each street or roadway section was rated from very good to very poor. They were also categorized by asphalt, concrete or gravel. Of the 232 miles of roads surveyed, 206 miles are asphalt roads, 19 miles are concrete and seven miles are brick and gravel roads.

Recommendations were given ranging from routine maintenance, major or minor rehabilitation to complete reconstruction. Additionally, the plan identifies various pavement treatment options. Color-coded maps were also included showing roadway conditions throughout

The city will use the plan and its recommendations to schedule roadway repairs. The plan also provides an estimated cost per mile that will help in raising funding and budgeting for roadway maintenance and improvements.



Biloxi's first roadways

Can you guess which of Biloxi's streets is the oldest? You might be surprised. When the first settlers made landfall on the southernmost shores of this city's peninsula,



they did not encounter a readymade path to travel east and west.

Indeed, the first documented byway appearing on maps through Biloxi is drawn as a narrow line near the future site of the railroad. Laden with thick trees. this thin path would have been lonely and dirt-based. It was on this original passageway that

the early Native Americans traveled. Probably chosen for its highest altitude and away from ponds and streams, the early inhabitants traveled along this wiggly line, safe from the erosion and waves of recurring storms. Thus, the first official street of Biloxi was actually today's Howard Avenue and Pass Road.

We have no idea what the early Native Americans called this path, but we can research various names for this street through recent times. Originally, the road was called "Pass Christian Road" because it was the path that folks used to travel from Point Cadet ("Pointe Caddie") to Christian Ladner's property on the western end of Harrison County. As times changed, so did



the roadway names. More than a century ago, in appreciation for the donations from the Howard Family, Biloxi renamed its easternmost section of Pass Road as "Howard Avenue." Interestingly, there are various names for this original road: West Howard, East Howard, the Pass road, Pass Christian Road, and, now, Pass Road.

Even the roadway itself has changed, from dirt roads, shell roads, brick pathway, and now asphalt. Traveling through time in history books and photos, one can imagine journeying by barefoot, moccasin, horseback, buggy, streetcars, and automobile. Once upon a time, Pass Christian Road

even traveled through the middle of the present-day Keesler Air Force Base. Did you know that the western segment of Biloxi's Pass Road was occupied by both a busy speedway racetrack and a popular drive-in movie theater?

Popp and his ferry: With the new Popp's Ferry Causeway Park about to open, it's a good time to reminisce about the old Popp's Ferry Road, named after John Popp, who operated a ferry service near the present bridge. Beginning as a simple dirt road, history records that, in 1914, this popular passageway was upgraded to a safer shell road to accommodate increased traffic.
