Preservation in May: Virtual Voices from Our Past

History takes center stage each May with the city's annual Preservation in May series, and this year there's a bonus: the introduction of a virtual tour of the Biloxi City Cemetery.

After producing a highly successful annual cemetery tour for 14 years, the City of Biloxi has created Voices From Our Past Cemetery Tour.

The tour - a self-guided, digital tour of the Old Biloxi Cemetery - consists of 12 of the over 80 stories and histories collected through pictures and text as well as videos from our annual October tours. The tour can be followed by a brochure or from any web-enabled device. This project was made possible by a grant from the Mississippi Gulf Coast National Heritage Area.

Additionally, the grant funding was used to digitize the cemetery records and map the oldest portion of the cemetery, which includes burials back to 1811. With the information collected, a web portal was created. Through this portal, researchers will be able to locate individual and family burial plots throughout the



entire cemetery. Access to the portal is available to anyone through the city website by following the cemetery link.

"With the phenomenal success of the annual cemetery tour, we know that the Old Biloxi Cemetery is a historical resource that more people wanted to learn about," Biloxi Historical Administrator Bill Raymond said.

"With this online tour, everyone will have a chance to learn more about our city, on their schedule anytime of the year."

Building on the work begun with the funding from the Mississippi Gulf Coast National Heritage Area, the city received a Certified Local Government Grant for the Mississippi Department of Archives and History to continue mapping more of the cemetery and digitizing the records. When complete, all grave locations as well as gravestone and tomb information will be available online.

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Executive humor: Self-effacing and disarming

"When I was on the City Council, I thought I knew a little about being mayor," A.J. Holloway once quipped. "And then I became mayor and found out I was right. I knew a little bit about being mayor."

And so begins this month's musings: Modern-day executive humor in the mayor's office, which, at its best, is self-effacing.

"I'm smarter than I look," "FoFo" Gilich said in a TV spot in his run up to being elected mayor, which, as he says today, was "47 months ago, but who's counting?"



Those first few weeks, dealing with a dumpster fire of a runaway infrastructure project and the prospect of tens of thousands of dollars

in penalties if MGM Park didn't open in time for the Shuckers season, Gilich opined on the challenges of early day-to-day life in the mayor's office: "It's like taking a drink of water from a fire hose."

It was in those early days, while surveying the

city's existing program of work, Gilich issued an edict to senior staff: "If it's stupid, we're not going to do it."

Biloxi's mayor-council form of government, to be sure, establishes a checks and balances between the branches of Executive and Legislative, leading to an occasional dust up between the mayor and council.

"So you have to get the approval of seven members of the City Council?" a student once asked Holloway in an Elks Youth in Government Day. "No," the mayor deadpanned. "I need four."

Gilich, who has not yet employed the veto pen, has his own view of mayor-council relations: "My training was at the Slavonian Lodge," he's said. "That's where we had 300 members and 600 opinions, so working with the seven-member City Council will not be a problem."

But for all of the colorful pontificating at 140 Lameuse St. our favorite story comes from New Orleans, land of the ever-colorful politician. Vic Schiro, a councilman-atlarge, became the "accidental mayor" when President John F. Kennedy in 1961 tapped then-Mayor deLesseps Story Morrison as U.S. ambassador to

the Organization of American States.

Schiro (say SKEE-row), who was elected to two full terms as New Orleans's chief executive, in '62 and '65, was at the helm when Hurricane Betsy was on the way to flooding the Lower Ninth Ward and the majority of New Orleans East in '65.

As the threat intensified, the story goes, Schiro took to local television, cautioning New Orleanians of the pending winds and water, but also seeking to be a calming influence. There are a lot of rumors and half-truths spreading about the storm, Schiro warned, adding: "Don't believe any false rumors, unless you hear them from me."

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'Iberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.

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The latest word on the infrastructure work


The infrastructure projects in East Biloxi continue to make progress. Here are reports from each of the contractors.

From Jennifer Matranga of Oscar Renda Contracting, the firm working on the infrastructure project north of the CSX railway:

- The amount of roads without asphalt is down to a minimum.
- We have begun working on the sewer system on Forrest Avenue and have encountered a host of unmarked utilities making the job extremely difficult and slow.
- Before May 1, we will have the base course of asphalt on all of Main Street and Esters Boulevard from Keller to Nichols, including the southernmost parts of Lee Street and Keller. We also will have final course of asphalt on Division from Oak Street to Lee Street, and on Fountain, Dorries and Holley, south of Division.
- Sarah Harris with the city's Engineering Department has been working diligently with Oscar Renda to expedite final inspections on roadways so we can apply the final layer of asphalt in remaining areas. Sarah and the team have done a wonderful job in coordinating everything on that

From Jack Gratwick, assistant project manager, Hemphill Construction Co., the firm working on the infrastructure project south of the CSX railway:

"The status of our project is steady right now, and with the summer months and good weather ahead, we look to keep up our progress on this job. We have crews in multiple areas of the project working hard every day to finish the task at hand. With that being said, we would like to remind the public to keep our employees' safety in mind, and please drive slowly and safely around the construction zones."






Hemphill Sewer as of April 17, 2019



May Memories: Traveling through Biloxi Down Memory Lane

With spring already in the air and the approach of summer just around the corner, Biloxians are beginning to reminisce about their favorite memories of yesteryear.

Biloxi High School Memoirs

Graduation has always been equated with May events.



Although the old Central High School is no longer standing, we can still revisit the past through images and stories. In 1913 Biloxi Public Schools celebrated the opening of this three-story brick high school at the corner of Howard Avenue and Bellman Street. Central, as it was called, was located in

the center of the city's peninsula, between Biloxi's historic lighthouse and Point Cadet. Enrollment then was just over 300 students.

The school's first commencement ceremony was held on Friday, May 29, 1914 in the large 600-seat auditorium. The graduation class consisted of 19 students: nine girls and 10 boys. Even before the days of computers and elaborate research facilities, each senior was required to research and prepare a thesis. Ruby Randle, the class valedictorian, wrote about "Education in the Philippines." "Oysters" was the title of Laura Ott's paper, probably

focusing on the heritage of her family's legacy in Biloxi's Seafood Industry on Point Cadet. Because of the wrath of Hurricane Katrina, Central is no longer standing. On the footprint of that historic school now stands the amazing modern Biloxi Civic Center and Public Library, which opened in 2008.

A Taste of the Past

Before the days of traditional fast food establishments, Howard Avenue hosted its own go-to for American cuisine. Do you remember Jiffy Jac (without the letter "k")? It was located on the south side of Howard between Nixon and Bellman. The scent of its mouth-watering hamburgers was a luring advertisement in itself. Under the ownership of Bill and Mary Meyer, the menu was tantalizingly simple and included hamburgers, cheeseburgers, chili, and po-boys. Indeed it was advertised as a "drive-in" restaurant, but not like the traditional drive-in movie theater. One would drive to it, order their favorite meal, and then perhaps eat outside at one

cannons. Its location was the northeast corner of U.S. 90 and Maycock Street. In 1969 Hurricane Camille destroyed this memory-laden facility.

housed the famous

of the restaurant's picnic tables or simply walk down to the nearby beach and sit on the seawall while watching the shrimping boats. Ahhh, those were the days! We can still remember the aroma of their kitchen, as it travelled through the neighborhood.

You can still access the Jiffy Jac's Chili recipe in a recently published local cookbook: "OLD BILOXI RECIPES 2," by Sonya Fountain Miller.

Music Memories

Just around the corner from Jiffy Jac and Central High School was the Biloxi Community House, located on U.S 90 (then called East Beach Boulevard) between Nixon and Maycock streets.

The local music venue even housed several Elvis Presley performances in November 1955. Each were followed by a dance. "Fun, Music, and Jokes" were advertised for Elvis's Biloxi performances. Tickets could be purchased on Howard Avenue at Grant's and Kimbrough and Quint's Drug Stores.

Three-story brick structure provided education as a high school from 1913 until 1961 when a new school was built on Father Ryan Avenue. Today's Biloxi High School students attend classes in a new state-of the-art facility just off Popp's Ferry Road north of Biloxi's peninsula.
