Oscar Renda seeks final inspection for all areas east of Lee

OK, so what's up with the "north project," where Oscar Renda Contracting has been pushing for November or December "substantial completion," and some had hoped for Thanksgiving as a fitting conclusion?

It's looking more like the end of the year, the contractor says, before pipes on the four remaining streets can be installed and topped with a layer of asphalt. "The four remaining streets in the 55 miles of work are: half of Forrest, half of Benachi, half of Couevas, and Reynoir north of Division," says Jennifer Matranga.

Oscar Renda also is asking the city for a final walk through for all streets east of Lee Street, where all paving is completed, striping has been added and reinstalled signage has been checked. To date, more than 650,000 linear feet of pipe has been laid in the overall north project, and more than 120,000 tons of asphalt has been applied on streets north of the railway.

Biggest challenge these days: Benachi north of the railway. Crews have installed sewer lines as far as 24 feet deep, and are now having to hand dig trenches to connect utilities, which in many cases are at the rear of properties. Hilly terrain means trenches as deep as eight feet are being dug.

"This work, which is too tight for machinery, has slowed us down tremendously," Matranga said, noting 10 six-man crews are working the north contract. "On the overall project, we're making progress everyday, and we will continue to."

Cruisin' into October

Ladies and gentlemen, to the starting line. It's Cruisin' the Coast time.

This year's downtown Block party will have myriad vehicles on Wednesday, Oct. 9, and, for the first time they will be using the new bricktopped Howard Avenue. Look for entertainment stages on Howard as well as in front of Biloxi City Hall on Lameuse. In fact, the party runs an hour later, too, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Meanwhile, on U.S. 90, the ubiquitous traffic cones, part of all major city functions, will be more generously spaced out in the area between I-110 and DeBuys Road to give the large cruisin' vehicles more room to maneuver. As usual, the emergency lane will be in place but not implemented unless needed.

Argumentative? Us? Who says? Biloxi's always gone its own way

It was apparent from the outset, observers say, that this "FoFo" Gilich fella was going to be a stark contrast from his predecessor in personal terms.

Longtime Mayor A.J. Holloway, on one hand, was a slow burn. He'd simmer before boiling over. Could take days, depending on the pressure applied.


Mayor "FoFo" Gilich, on the other hand, provides an immediate and emotional reaction, typically, witnesses say, before the question is completely asked or the issue completely explained. Instead of the stonefaced Holloway, from Gilich you'll get the temporary eye contact, followed by the facial read, followed by the "Wait a minute," at an increasing decibel, followed by Da Look, what he believes is a piercing, intimidating glance that says, "What?"

Truth be told, those contrasting tones are not new to Biloxi. It's right there in "Biloxi's Builders and Visionaries," one of the handsomely crafted videos on display daily at the Biloxi Visitors Center, on the city's YouTube channel, and shown frequently on BTV.

In fact, it's in the opening line: "Once called the Great State of Biloxi because it insisted on going its own way, our little city with its French colonial roots has always been home to dreamers, artists, visionaries and other independent souls."

It surfaces earlier, too, in "Biloxi," the 12-minute video written by researcher Deann Nuwer and narrated by August Taconi in 2013: "The Mississippi Territory became officially part of the new United States in 1798, after a brief revolt of coastal citizens under the Republic of West Florida. Mississippi became a state on Dec. 18, 1817."

"Going its own way" and this idea of "independent souls" were apparent in the DNA of Biloxi from long ago, and certainly carry on to this day.

Look no further than the Slavic Benevolent Association, known affectionately by many as simply "the Slavonian Lodge," where Gilich, the longtime power behind the throne, sums up the membership: "We have 300 members and 600 opinions."

Nowadays, you see this issue of Biloxi being Biloxi when someone mentions "One Coast." The mellow Biloxian will nod politely and smile. Someone mentions "Tidelands money," or "metro government," or "school district consolidation," and eyebrows rise.

Some 20 years ago, the idea of introducing a uniform water and sewer rate throughout the cities of Harrison County came up, and then-Mayor Holloway, against the proposal for fear of the impact on Biloxi's low water and sewer rates, infamously expressed his opposition, a statement that puzzled reporter Blake Kaplan, now executive editor of The Sun Herald. Holloway could have told his colleagues that he thought everyone should pay their own way, or he could have said a uniform rate would be unfair to Biloxi, where water and sewer rates were sure to increase. But instead, the mayor opted to go with "Every cat's gotta lick its own a--."

Today, Mayor Gilich says he might have stated the position differently, but not by much. Said he with a chuckle: "What about dogs?"

But the basic sentiment remains on this notion of Biloxi and its independent thinking. Let us not forget, after all, we're a city with two chambers of commerce.

"I think every city is different," Gilich said. "Every city is unique, and we just happen to be more unique. Our people have opinions, just like everyone else, but ours happen to be a bit more, colorful, or whatever other adjective you want to attach."

As far as Biloxi being Biloxi, the mayor said, "I think, why change something that works well? It's hard to convince me that we'd go in a better direction. Of course," he added with a smile, "some might have the opinion that I'm easily convinced once I've made up my mind."

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'Iberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.

FY 2020 budget: Chockful of improvements

The Biloxi City Council has approved a spending plan for Fiscal Year 2020 that will see new fire stations, new firefighters, new police cars, and a host of improvement projects citywide.

Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich and the group that has final say on city spending, the Biloxi City Council OK'd the budget, which began Oct. 1, after weeks of meetings in August and September.

The spending plan, which proposes beginning the year with an \$8 million fund balance, and expects revenue of \$61.4 million and expenses of \$64.9 million.

"I think it's a good plan," Gilich said. "We're actually enhancing the day-to-day services we provide, especially in the areas of public safety, while continuing to do the things we must do to keep our community safe, grow our economy and improve our quality of life.

"As I've said all along, a budget is a projection, which will be adjusted as needed. The biggest consideration is to do the things you must do, enhance services where you can and do it all without raising anybody's taxes."

City operations are funded by three primary revenue streams, which for FY 2020 are projected to be: gaming taxes (\$18.95 million),

sales taxes (\$12.65 million) and property taxes (\$10.87 million).

Among the big-tickets items in the FY 2020 budget:

- An \$800,000 increase in annual payments to the state employee retirement system.
- Opening of new fire stations at Cedar Lake and Popp's Ferry Road, and on Old Highway 67, east of Cedar Lake Road, which requires the hiring of nine new firefighters and addition of two new fire trucks. The station at Cedar-Popp's also will include an outdoor training tower.
- The budget also includes the purchase of 16 fully-equipped police cruisers as well as vehicles in Parks, Engineering and Public Works to help maintain a dependable fleet of vehicles.

Folded into the spending plan, incidentally, is a \$180 million capital projects budget, funded mainly through federal and state grants, that includes:

- Popp's Ferry extension (\$8.6 million)
- Saenger Theatre exterior repairs (\$2.86 million)
- Keesler gate (inside) (\$2.6 million)
- Woolmarket Road east drainage (\$1.77 million)
- Bellavie Parkway (\$1.5 million)
- Ellzey Place extension (\$1.3 million)
- Citywide street repair (\$1.1 million)
- Woolmarket sidewalks (\$1.1 million)
- Tanglewood infrastructure repair (\$1 million)
- East Biloxi boardwalk (\$1 million)
- West Biloxi boardwalk (\$887,000)

"These are just the big-ticket items," Gilich said. "You're going to see progress on our waterfront initiatives, infrastructure work, and movement on the Keesler gate and the commercial corridor we're creating on Division Street between I-110 and the new gate."



Drainage, paving well underway in city-county project

Paving should begin this month on a 1.6-mile stretch of Jim Byrd Road, a Woolmarket country road where city and county workers have installed new drainage pipes underneath the roadway to help improve drainage.

The work zone in the project runs from Woolmarket Road northward to the city limits.

"The idea is if we're going to pave the roadway, let's use the occasion to improve the drainage before we do the paving so the entire job will have a longer life span, maybe 15 years or better," says Biloxi Public Works Director Billy Ray Allen.

Under the plan, the city purchased drainage pipes, with county assistance in installation. Some ditches also were cleaned and deepened to improve the flow of rainwater. The plan also includes a slight widening of the roadway. Using existing right-ofway, six inches is being added to each side of the paved surface, creating an additional foot of driving space.

Drainage pipe had been installed by mid-September, and paving, which is being funded by

Harrison County, is expected to begin in mid-October and expected to be complete by mid-November.

Back in town: Cruisin' The Coast

It's that time of year again when thousands of antique cars and car aficionados saturate our beachfront highway and adjoining thoroughfares for the fun-filled, week-long event, Cruisin' The Coast.

Car enthusiasts will parade their classic, hot rod and custom vehicles along U.S. 90 and stop at various venues to enjoy entertainment, cruise-ins, sock-hops and more for the twentythird annual event.

So what's new this year?

"Every year we try to change the traffic plan a little bit and learn from the year before, but for the most part the traffic plan you are used to seeing with the cones will be the same," said Biloxi Police Chief John Miller. "We are, however, going to leave a little more distance between the cones so you will see a little less cones."

The spacing will allow for better maneuvering between the cones, especially for the larger, older vehicles that will be in town.

The cones will go from I-110 west to Debuys road and will limit motorist to the right-hand lane only if needed.

"With the growth of the event and a record number of Cruisers expected, we have to be prepared and if traffic gridlocks, we need to make sure we can get police, fire and ambulance vehicles around, "Miller said. "We don't want to diminish the great success of Cruisin' but we just have to be prepared.

"Our infrastructure is really not designed to handle all the traffic that we have during a major event like this. So we want to remind everyone to be patient and give yourself plenty of time to reach your destination. It's more of a party atmosphere during Cruisin', so be patient and enjoy the sights." Cruisin' The Coast Biloxi Block Party Oct. 9, 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Downtown Biloxi Cruisers arrive as early as 6 a.m. and, turn north on Caillavet street to be directed to downtown parking.

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Biloxi cemetery liv

With clear blue skies and just a hint of cool air in the mornings, our fall imaginations immediately turn to the cemetery. Wait, what?! Yes, here in Biloxi and other southern locales, our final resting places seem to attract our attention in the fall of each year.

Taking special care of graves, cleaning the headstones, and

generally improving the appearance of the Old Biloxi Cemetery, located on U.S. 90 midway between the Biloxi Lighthouse and the White House Fountain, is traditionally a fall activity in preparation for All Saints and All Souls days, which occurs annually in early November.

In Biloxi's first cemetery, fall also means special projects to save the historic, older tombs located in the oldest section of the cemetery, the southernmost area nearest Beach Boulevard.

It is in this very section you'll

find the grave of St. Cyr Zamor, (pronounced SANcere). He is the patriarch of every local Seymour family of the Mississippi Gulf Coast. His tale is one full of mystery and intrigue. For instance, how did St. Cyr get the last name of Zamor when his father's was LeBlanc?

His roots are equally fascinating and steeped in the very origins of our area. St. Cyr is the great-great grandson of Jean Baptist Baudreau dit Graveline. Yes, the Graveline who came with d'Iberville on one of his three expeditions to the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Graveline was the first importer of cattle to this area and the owner/discoverer of one of the most beautiful waterways in our corner of paradise, Graveline Bayou. The bayou was and remains one of the finest fishing areas in the three coastal counties.

St. Cyr passed at age 57 in 1845. To put that date into

perspective, it was three years before the Biloxi Lighthouse would grace our shoreline. It is no stretch to say that his 174-year old tomb has begun to deteriorate. Without swift attention, this culturally and historically important burial site could easily fall by the wayside and be lost forever.

Thankfully, the Preserve Biloxi Committee, organizers of the



annual Old Biloxi Cemetery Tour and Preservation In May, have pledged \$2,000 toward the repairs, which are estimated to cost approximately \$6,000. In order to amass the remaining funds needed, a Go Fund Me page has been established.

"If every descendant or Biloxian gave \$20, we could easily repair the tomb of St. Cyr and many others as well," said Bill Raymond, historical administrator for the City of Biloxi and Chairman of Preserve Biloxi. The Preserve Biloxi Committee

emerged organically from a very successful Old Biloxi Committee

rededication event following the devastation from Hurricane Katrina. Since that first successful event, the committee has transformed the Old Biloxi Cemetery Tour into an annual celebration of fascinating local stories.

It is this "lively" side of Biloxi's yesteryear to be explored in the 2019 tour entitled, Biloxi's Colorful Past. This year's stories will highlight the history of gambling, the lack of prohibition and other "questionable behaviors." Look for the tour on Sunday, Oct. 20 from 2 to 4 p.m. and again on Tuesday, Oct. 22 from 5 to 7 p.m.

As usual, event-goers may park at the Biloxi Elk's Lodge, located off U.S. 90. This event is free but donations are appreciated and ensure that the important preservation work continues.

Biloxi school district excels in state accountability results

The Mississippi Department of Education accountability results are in and the Biloxi Public School District remains one of the top achievers in the state.

The district has again achieved an "A" rating, with Biloxi Junior High School being ranked the highest in south Mississippi. A host of other Top 10 and Top 5 rankings were among the scores, which interim Superintendent Dr. Larry Drawdy says is particularly rewarding in Biloxi.

"With a mobile population due to the casino industry and our military community, Biloxi is unique in Mississippi," Drawdy said. "Over 14 languages and cultures are present in our schools, contributing to the rich diversity that we celebrate in our district.

"And now," Drawdy added, "we are proud to show the results of the hard work and dedication put in by our students, staff, parents, guardians and community. We are all one in Biloxi, and we have the results to prove it."

Among the milestones in the state report:

- The Biloxi Public School District is an A-rated District.
- Biloxi Junior High is ranked highest in south Mississippi.
- Biloxi High is No. 1 on the Coast in Algebra I proficiency and third in U.S. History proficiency.
- The district ranked above the state average in all areas.
- Biloxi Public Schools has the highest PreK score on the Coast.
- Biloxi Public Schools is second on the Coast and seventh in the state overall.
- The state's goal of 70 percent proficiency by 2025 has already been achieved in history

and science in Biloxi schools.

- Biloxi Junior High School math and science scores all ranked Top 5 in the state.
- Biloxi High School is No. 4 on the Coast and seventh in the state overall.
- Biloxi High is third on the Coast and sixth in the state for math growth.
- Biloxi High is second on the Coast for Acceleration, which measures the percentage of students taking and passing the assessment associated with accelerated courses, such as college-level courses and credit, and sixth in the state.
- Biloxi's fifth grade math achievements are third on the Coast.
- The district currently has 50 students with an ACT score of 30 or above.

Inside BTV for October: 'New' looks of an old city

So, have you figured out BTV yet? We're still working on it, this twomonth-old municipal TV channel. To be sure, it's a government channel, with a healthy dose of replays of City Council meetings and other public affairs programming, but you'll also see a slant towards Biloxi's history and culture.

And, of course, once we latch onto a program, you'll see it daily – two or three times a day, in fact – for the month. It's our version of "Groundhog Day," but without Bill Murray.

Along those lines, here are the highlights of October's schedule:

Council replays: You'll find replays of City Council meetings typically on BTV and on the city's YouTube channel hours after they occur. Council meetings are typically the first, third, and fourth Tuesday of the month. BTV sets aside three-hour blocks for the replays each day, at 9:30 a.m., 3 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. At least one council meeting is shown, followed by other bonus programming to fill out the three-hour block.

Cemetery, Exhibit A: The Old Biloxi Cemetery gets plenty of smallscreen time this month, with two back-to-back programs. First, is "Old Biloxi Cemetery & its colorful Characters," with Cree Cantrell, as F. Arbeau Caillavet, previewing this year's tour and taking a look at the cemetery and a half-dozen of its best-known characters, including George Ohr, Ed Barq and the Hermit of Deer Island. See the 45-minute production daily at 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Cemetery, Exhibit B: Longtime videographer August Taconi has crafted a look back at the 2018 cemetery tour, which showcased the leaders of seven of Biloxi's places of worship set amidst the stately moss-draped oaks of the Biloxi Cemetery. "Biloxi Praise," is an hour-long program that airs daily at 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

More silver-screen gems: Our fascination with the 1951 documentary "Social Change in a Democracy," which was filmed in Biloxi for audiences in Japan, has helped uncover two travelogues that were tucked in the climate-controlled vault at the Local History and Genealogy Department at the Biloxi Public Library. First up is "America's Riviera," a nine-minute production where Mr. Biloxi, the late Anthony Ragusin, turns a lens on the lure of '50s life in Biloxi. The nine-minute B&W opus airs daily at 7:46 a.m. and 7:46 p.m. Then, at 9:15 every day and night in October, you can see a 1960s-era look at Biloxi and the Gulf Coast, also titled "America's Riviera." The 14-minute, colorful travel piece shows- visitors cavorting at the old Broadwater, the Buena Vista and there's even a trip to the old Eight Flags and Deer Ranch. It's gold.



What time is it?

In the early 1700's when Pierre D'Iberville came to the Coast, he and his crew arrived with limited supplies. Navigation tools were used when sailing and clocks, at the time, were rather large and heavy and hard to travel with. When establishing a new colony and acquiring items from France – a task that could take three months for a shore-to-shore boat delivery – an inventory list was created. An extensive inventory from 1713 shows an interesting array of items

for our Fort Louis construction: bullets, lots of wine, salt, candles, padlocks, panes of glass, clothing, paper, and hourglasses. So, we have proof that hourglasses, in addition to starry skies and sun dials. were the main means of telling time back in those days.

In recent generations, Biloxi has told time by a variety of interesting methods.

Factory whistles: Time to go to work

When Biloxi was the Seafood Capital of the World, steam-powered factory whistles would shout out the message "time to come to work." Each whistle had a powerful, distinct "voice" and sang out its unique tune.


Church bells: Time to pray

Sheltered within the church steeples, metal bells would chime as huge ropes were pulled. Catholic churches would ring their bells at 6 a.m., noon, and 6 p.m. as a reminder of prayer time. Bells would sing a different tune for weddings and funerals.


School bells: The victory bell

When school games were won, a bell would chime proudly emitting news throughout the airwaves. The original Biloxi High School Victory Bell, cast in 1899, is preserved in the courtyard of the Biloxi High School. Today, huge bells no longer make school announcements. Electronic bells tell students what time classes begin and end, and alert entire school populations in coded, electronic messages about schedules, tornadoes, fires, and dangerous situations.

Time to shop: Meet me under the clock on Howard Avenue

We often see old pictures of downtown Biloxi stores with huge clocks hanging on or near their buildings. They always kept track of time for us so we wouldn't miss the next trolley or be late for ice cream with our special friend at Kimbrough and Quint's drug store.

Time to get up: Cock-a-doodle-do

Grandma Polly had lots of chicken and roosters in her yard. She would buy them live from the market. Every morning, when I spent the night at Grandma's, the roosters would crow at dawn telling us it was time to get up and start a new day.

Sirens: Time to be safe

The Biloxi Fire Department has always had special whaling sirens on its fire trucks to alert folks that time is of an essence and everyone should get out of the way to let the fire trucks pass. Presently, the City of Biloxi still has 10 weather alert sirens throughout the city, most near its fire stations. They are tested periodically and can announce warnings for hurricanes, tornadoes, and severe weather situations.

Today, we depend mostly on cell phones, electronic school buzzers, and digital batteryoperated gadgets

operated gadgets to tell us what time it is. I still miss the big school bell, factory whistles and Grandma's barnyard friends. Ahh, those were the days!
