Tick, tick, tick. Asphalt arrives as clock moves forward

Contractors working north and south of the CSX railway are continuing to make progress as the calendar continues to advance.

Oscar Renda Contracting, whose deadline for work north of the railway was January, is focusing on the handful of streets still needing asphalt while Hemphill Construction, working south of the railway with a March 2020 deadline, has re-opened White Avenue to

traffic and is advancing on Father Ryan Avenue and connecting neighborhood streets.

"We're pushing every day for more and more progress," says Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich. "You can see it, certainly, especially when you look at the detailed progress maps, but it's never enough until it's finished."

To put it simply, it appeared to be paradise, this magnificent Edgewater Gulf Hotel, which opened its doors to 1,100 guests on Jan. 10, 1927. The palatial grounds included a 400-room hotel, an Olympic-size swimming pool, a golf course (see the links in the upper left of the photo), horseback riding, convention space and, of course, the magnificent beachfront.

The hotel, incidentally, faced northward, owing to the numbers of visitors arriving by train. (That's the L&N railway traversing left to right through the greenery in the image.)

It all gave way in
August 1971 to
make space for a
new Sears that was
part of the growing Edgewater Plaza
Shopping Center. Today, Sears has been replaced by
the mall's eight-screen digital movie theater. And the
Edgewater Gulf? The proud hotel did not go without
a fight. Demolition crews took three attempts and

e L&N railway traversing left to right through the exhausted 850 pounds of explosives to take down the multi-story complex back in '71.

Numbers don't lie; they say what you want them to say

Perhaps it was Ronald S. Cochran, the former city attorney, who related the story. The city is looking to hire a lawyer, and it all boiled down to a one-question interview for the three candidates.

Mayor: "OK, Lawyer No. 1, what's 1 plus 1?" Lawyer No. 1: "Why, 1 plus 1 equals 2." Mayor: "Lawyer No. 2, what's 1 plus 1?" Lawyer No. 2: "Well, 1 plus 1 can be 2, or it can be 11."

Mayor: "And, finally, Lawyer No. 3, what's 1 plus 1?"

Lawyer No. 3: "What do you want it to be?" So, who got the job? More on that later.

This discussion is more about numbers - how they can be sliced and diced in a manner that lends itself to myriad interpretations, lawyerly advice notwithstanding.

Jim Borsig, whose experience in state and local government and the worlds of academia and lobbying perhaps made him the city's most-learned CAO over the years, put it simply: "There are three kinds of lies," he'd say with a smile: "Lies, damn lies, and statistics."

And now comes some new sets of statistics, which, of course, lend themselves to myriad interpretations.

The latest report is in on gross gaming revenue for the Biloxi casinos -- that amount taken in by the eight casinos operating in Biloxi after wagers are settled. With the September figures now in hand, comparisons to previous fiscal years (Oct. 1 to Sept. 30 each year) can be easily made.

On the surface, it appears to be great news. Outstanding, in fact.



So there's the age-old question: Where does the gaming revenue go? See the state report at biloxi.ms.us/resources/gaming-revenues.

Biloxi's gross gaming revenue was \$883.5 million for FY 2019. That's a 16 percent increase over the FY 2018, but, more significantly, it represents the highest gross gaming revenue figure in the last decade.

You'd have to go all the way back to FY 2008 to find a higher number, \$981 million, which was in the wake of the \$1.0 billion year in gross gaming revenue in FY 2007. Go figure, a year after Katrina, the highest gross gaming revenue in history. But that's a story for another day.

"True numbers are your friend," says Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich. "True numbers do not lie."

However, with multi-columned budgets, reams of spreadsheets of various color-coded columns, and unlimited terabytes of numberslaced data, there's any number of ways to fit round numbers into square pegs.

Everything, the mayor likes to say, is not

always what it appears to be.

To be sure, he adds, the Biloxi gross-gamingrevenue numbers are even more significant, considering the challenges.

"We knew that a couple of years ago, when Scarlet Pearl opened in D'Iberville, we were going to take a hit, and we did," Gilich says. "We took a million-dollar punch, a million-dollar drop in revenue that year, but these numbers show we've overcome that.

"Some will point out the increase coincides with the arrival of legal sports books in the past year. Some also will point out that the increase in revenue is despite the negative publicity involving three months of beach closures this past summer.

"But here's something else to consider when it comes to numbers:


"Biloxi and the Gulf Coast are the No. 8 market in the country as far as gross gaming revenue. Of the three dozen gaming markets in the country, we're No. 8. What's telling about that is this: Draw a 100-mile circle around Biloxi and draw a hundred-mile circle around any of the Top 7, whether it's Las Vegas or Atlantic City or wherever. How many people do you see in that Biloxi circle and how many do you see in the other one? We're a much smaller market, per capita, but we're No. 8 in the country. Who's doing a better job? I say we are."

And who are we to argue?

Finally, you ask, who got the job? Lawyer 1, Lawyer 2 or Lawyer No. 3?

C'mon. The numbers don't lie. They say what you want them to say.

Governor awards \$5.9 million for Back Bay, East Beach boardwalk projects

Governor Phil Bryant has directed \$5.9 million of Mississippi oil and gas royalties to the City of Biloxi to fund ambitious waterfront enhancement projects on East Beach and Back Bay.

Biloxi's two grants are part of Bryant's 2019 GOMESA projects funded by the state portion of leases for energy exploration in the Gulf of Mexico. The governor was in Biloxi, at the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources headquarters on Back Bay, to announce a total of \$20 million in grants for waterfront projects Coastwide.

"We have worked closely for a couple years with Gov. Bryant and Joe Spraggins at the DMR to develop dynamic waterfront experiences for our residents and visitors," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich said.

"We appreciate their support of these two new projects that will help facilitate greater enjoyment of, and protections for, our waterfronts."

The \$3 million East Beach project involves a new mile-long, 10-foot wide boardwalk from Oak Street to



the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor. Placed on top of the boardwalk will be a 36-inch high knee wall suggested by Gilich and designed to help trap blowing sand from reaching U.S. 90. One-third of the funding on East Beach involves changing to a heavier, less-powdery sand, as Gilich suggested to the state.

A future addition to the same area will include an expansion of the popular Kuhn Street Boat Launch and parking bays.

"This project on the East Beach is a multi-faceted effort to provide a model area for beach enjoyment and sustainability," Gilich added. "Gov. Bryant started the process with his first three Wave-designed

upgrades and reduction of outfalls along that beachfront.

"The boardwalk will provide more accessibility for pedestrians, joggers and cyclists, while the knee wall and heavier sand will help address the continuing problem of blowing sands on Highway 90."

On Biloxi's historic Back Bay, a 10-foot wide boardwalk constructed between Bayview Avenue and the shoreline will enrich that waterfront experience with a new recreational opportunity.

Future enhancements could include a joint living shoreline project with Mississippi State University and an ecotourism development involving Keegan's Bayou.

 90, where CSX has signed off on a new crossing and property acquisition continues. Three other major projects are in the offing in West Biloxi: Drainage improvements on Pine Grove and Churchill, and \$1 million in water, sewer and drainage improvements in the Tanglewood area.
- Last call for Camille at 50: The end of the hurricane season, Nov. 30, also marks the end of the multi-media Camille exhibition at the Maritime & Seafood Industry Museum on Point Cadet.
- B-Alert: More than 8500 people receive text alerts about emergency bridge and road closures. To sign up, text BILOXI to 888777.
- Woolmarket City Center: Steel should be erected soon for the expansion of the Woolmarket City Center, the library and community center on Kayleigh Cove Drive. It's a joint city-county project, where a library has been operating since July 2018.

Biloxi welcomes new firefighters

The City of Biloxi has added 15 firefighters to its battalion at the fire department.



In case you missed The Reunion at the Union a few months ago, HOWARD AVENUE IS BACK! Last November we published an article in this space outlining the vision and master plan for The District on Howard. Here we are one year later and we'd like to let everyone know what we have been up to.

Before diving into our progress, we'd like to give a big thank you to the City of Biloxi for setting the stage for the rebirth of downtown. The brick-paved street between Reynoir and Main and the new sidewalks and street lights along Howard Avenue are a point of pride for all Biloxians.

The most important update is all of the relationships we have been building within the community. Reaching out to community leaders and business owners, tourists and locals, we've received a lot of support, encouragement, and feedback. We have spent a lot of time taking an active part in the community. The

District on Howard is now a proud member of both the Biloxi Bay Area and Mississippi Gulf Coast chambers of commerce, the Gulf Coast Business Council, and the Main Street Association. Through our relationship with Main Street, we are supporting the Biloxi Public Art project and planning is already underway for a mural of our own.

Another big piece of news is the hiring of Bobby Gillon as our director of Marketing & Leasing. Bobby joins our team after a decade of commercial real estate brokerage and development experience in the Northeast. He will be spearheading our leasing and community involvement efforts. Recently, Bobby was named to the Main Street Association Executive Board and will serve as this year's Economic Vitality Chairman.

Pre-leasing and space planning are underway with multiple retail, restaurant, and entertainment tenants for the Barq's Building. With over 30,000 square feet of space on the first floor to be renovated, brought up to code, and wired with today's technology, this is a process that requires a great deal of planning and staging.

We are exploring ways to configure storefronts along Howard to provide covered, outdoor dining set back off the sidewalk. The second floor of the Barq's Building poses a very different challenge. Originally home to many familiar Biloxi names like Pitalo, Pavlov, Hengen, Sekul, and Collins, much of the infrastructure and detail remains intact. Having been unoccupied for decades, the condition of the offices is being carefully assessed, with an eye on retaining and restoring as much of the original character as possible.

Next door, work has been underway all summer in the Kress building to clean up the interior, seal the roof, repair broken windows and frames, and get all of the building systems back online. While we market the property for a single tenant to operate a live music and entertainment

venue, we are exploring ways to bring the building back to life as a community asset.

Two of the main concerns we have heard about the Howard Avenue area are the cleanliness and safety. To that end we have made daily efforts to clean up and maintain the streets, the alleys, and the parking areas all along and around Howard Avenue. By reaching out to the local community, the shelters, the Biloxi Police Department, and working with some of the homeless population nearby, we have been cleaning and maintaining our public spaces. Plans are in the works for additional security measures and lighting in strategic areas to improve the quality of your experience visiting downtown.

There is a lot of activity on Howard Avenue and we are excited to be a part of it.



New Mardi Gras museum set to open

Everybody knows about Mardi Gras on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, right? Not so, says Andi Oustalet, who's leading efforts to see the new Coastal Mississippi Mardi Gras Museum open in mid-November at its new location on the "new" Howard Avenue in downtown Biloxi.

"We opened our doors for one day in October when Biloxi had its downtown Cruisin' The Coast block party, and 70 percent of the cruisers who came through the door had no idea that Mississippi had its own Mardi Gras," Oustalet declared. "They thought everything in the museum was from New Orleans or Mobile. They were stunned to find out that Mississippi has its own Mardi Gras."

And beginning on Nov. 14 with a gala fund-raiser before doors are opened to the general public later in the month, the story of Mardi Gras will be told each Tuesday through Saturday at the new location midway between Reynoir and Lameuse streets, on Howard Avenue.

The building itself, at 792A Howard Ave.,

has as much history as Mardi Gras. It was dedicated in 1871, according to a marker, decades before the first official parade rolled near the turn of the century.

"I don't think there could be a better location," Oustalet said of the 3,500-square-foot museum. "We've taken an historical building in downtown Biloxi and transformed it into a beautiful museum that represents the history of one of our most cherished celebrations, Mardi Gras. It's centrally located, and it's going to be a big part of the resurgence of Howard Avenue and downtown Biloxi."

The new museum actually has been 15 years in the making. The odyssey began in 2004, when the decision was made to relocate and expand the museum from the Magnolia Hotel near Mary Mahoney's to the Dantzler House, which was on the front beach at the current site of the Biloxi Visitors Center.

"There was a lot of excitement about that move at the time," said city Historical Administrator Bill Raymond. "We would have been in a high-profile location, just north of the Biloxi Lighthouse, the Dantzler House at two stories was a formidable presence, and, as a result, we saw the excitement, which also was translating into community financial support."

And then Hurricane Katrina came along in August 2005, leveling the Dantzler House and also claiming many of the costumes that had been stored there. Reestablishing the Mardi Gras Museum was not at the top of the list of post-Katrina things to do, but the city and the museum board of directors saw an opportunity with the re-construction of Howard Avenue and all the renewed interest in the area. The museum board leased space in a historic building right in the heart of downtown.

After six months of planning and construction, the museum is scheduled to open to great fanfare on Nov. 14 with a gala celebration and fundraiser honoring supporters who have made significant contributions to see the dream of a new museum come to life. The museum will

open to the general public on Tuesday, Nov. 19.

With 600 boxes of costumes, memorabilia, doubloons, scepters, crowns and costumes, it's going to be hundreds of stories. Visitors will see how costumes have evolved over the years, how Carnival has grown, and, most importantly, the religious significance behind the celebration.

Said Oustalet: "It's not about the Gulf Coast Carnival Association, although there certainly is a great deal of colorful history there. It's about Gulf Coast Mardi Gras in general. We want something from every Carnival krewe in this museum. It's about everybody.

"We have lots of old doubloon collections, and scepters and crowns and gifts that were given through the years and through the decades, many that were unusual or outstanding, and these are things that people are going to want to see."

Ever been confronted by a panhandler on the street or sidewalk? Salvation Army Majors Bradley and Anita Caldwell have helpful advice in a BTV special



airing daily in November: Give the person a Help Card, a pocket-size card that has information on free meals, showers, temporary housing and more. BTV airs the 14-minute story of the Help Card each day in November at 7:25 a.m., 7:25 p.m. and 2:10 p.m. Meantime, you can pick up free Help Cards, printed courtesy of Knight-Abbey Printing and Direct Mail, at the Kroc Center, the Biloxi Visitors Center, the Donall M. Snyder Sr. Community Center or at a growing number of local businesses.

Kroc Center: It's a multi-million-dollar, fully-equipped recreation and fitness facility, with lap and children's pools, music lessons, basketball, weights, Zumba and much more. It's the Salvation Army Kroc Center in East Biloxi, and it's open to everyone. Take an eight-minute tour of the facility on BTV each day in November, at 7:15 a.m., 7:15 p.m. and 2 p.m.

Specials: Of course, the featured specials on BTV this month are a tour of the new Mardi Gras Museum, which opens Tuesday, Nov. 19 in downtown Biloxi, and the story of Edgewater Mall, which is preparing for Christmas shoppers and Santa Claus. See the Mardi Gras Museum segment each day at 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., and see the mall history each day at 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The Gov: Gov. Phil Bryant was in town the other day, with money. See the press conference where the governor announced \$20 million in grants for the Gulf Coast, including \$5.9 million for Biloxi, each at 12:30 p.m. on BTV, throughout November.

Still playing: The two vintage travelogue videos about Biloxi and the Mississippi Gulf Coast - one from the '50s in black and white and one from the '60s in vibrant color – remain on the BTV schedule for November. Why? The '60s clip, with its views of pre-Camille Biloxi and Gulf Coast, captured more than 6,500 views on the city's YouTube channel in its first couple of weeks online. Whether it's "Meet Me on the Mall" or "Meet Me at the Mall,"
Edgewater has a long and colorful history — and not-so-humble beginnings — in the journey to becoming a retail engine and entertainment mecca.

Edgewater Mall has always been the ideal place to visit. Situated along a major highway with full views of our magnificent sand beach, the large enclosed shopping mall opened in 1963 as a single story business with only 11 stores.

Back in the Day

A lot has changed through time.

Throughout its more than 50 decades and counting of establishment, the mall has seen many changes to its building and surrounding areas.

In fact, the busy highway south of the mall was once a single-lane dirt road, traveled by horses, buggies, trolley cars, and, later.

automobiles and trucks. Until the mid-1960s, long before annexation, the mall's location was referred to as "between Biloxi and Gulfport." Now. it's West Biloxi.

Way back, before the Mall

Developers Back-in-the Day were visionaries who recognized that the land where our present Edgewater Mall now stands was a prime location for development.

In the 1920's, an amazing iconic hotel was built. The landmark Edgewater Gulf Hotel celebrated its opening in 1927, offering tennis courts, a children's playground, horseback riding, a swimming pool, shopping, and an 18-hole golf course. Each of its 400 rooms faced the Gulf of Mexico.

Its grand opening was accompanied with an elaborate celebration of music, food, and networking for the crowd of distinguished

visitors from throughout the United States.

'Meet Me on the Mall'

Our mall was born in September 1963, with its slogan "Meet Me on the Mall." In its early days its signage read "Edgewater Plaza" and was proudly advertised as an air-conditioned shopping city.

Stores stayed open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. It was described as "on the beach, between Biloxi and Gulfport." A few years after its opening, the boundaries of these cities were expanded to the common border at DeBuys Road.

The premiere tenants included a bank, grocery store, drug store, jeweler, shoe and clothing stores, service station, photographer, fabric store, music store, barber, restaurant, and pet store. Even a movie theater was added! This was a one-stop shopping venue for everyone. Who could ask for anything more?

Searching for Santa

Santa has been arriving at Edgewater Mall annually since its 1963 opening. Biloxi's 'Twas the month before Christmas when we were very small, All we could think about was Santa at the Mall. mall has always been synonymous with jolly old St. Nick. In fact, stored in Grandma's attic treasures are specially-preserved images of young ones visiting Santa.

Late 1960s

Each November this jolly fellow travels all the way from his North Pole home to our very own Edgewater Mall to listen to special wishes.

Back-in-the-day, as in November 1963, Santa arrived in a 40-foot wheeled rocket ship, which towered 12 feet high and 8 feet wide and rolled on 10 wheels! Once Santa found his special red velvet chair in the gorgeous holiday-decorated mall, kids were offered the opportunity to take rides in Santa's special transportation device.

Camille's visit to our mall

In spite of the wrath of Hurricane Camille in 1969, Edgewater Plaza Shopping Center suffered minimal damage and had its power and air-conditioning restored a few days after the powerful storm. Anyone needing fresh drinking water, groceries, and cleaning supplies could go to the mall for help. Mall management even offered free use of washing machines and dryers.

The interior of the mall was closed for a while longer, though, because of the debris and broken glass that littered the mall's interior walkways. Indeed we can truly declare that

Edgewater Mall was both a survivor as well as a first responder of historic Hurricane Camille.

Did you know?

Years ago there was a train depot located just north of the mall. It was constructed for \$60,000 and opened in August 1927. Passengers could travel via the L&N railroad from Mobile or New Orleans and arrive on schedule to "pass a good time" at the Edgewater Gulf Hotel.

Several commuter trains serviced the Biloxi area at that time, including the memorable Hummingbird and the Gulf Coast Limited. Remnants of the old train station's structure could be spotted behind the mall long after the depot closed.

In the early 1970s, when the White Pillars restaurant was undergoing modernization, timber from that old station was recycled for use as ceiling beams for that iconic restaurant.

Mysteries of the Edgewater

In 1971, during the demolition of the old Edgewater Gulf Hotel, a secret room was discovered behind a bookcase. Inside the room was a plethora of maps, plats, and even an antique filing cabinet. No one could explain why this room had been hidden all those years and why no one removed any of its contents. If only those walls could have talked!

Then, in 1995, during a renovation project, a secret tunnel was spotted on the south side of the Mall. The operations manager at the mall discovered that, in about 1980, someone had crawled 34 feet through a 36 inch wide drainage pipe, and dug through 10 feet of dirt, perhaps with the intention of robbing a nearby bank. Biloxi Police were called in, and it was determined that a potential thief, was, indeed, unsuccessful in his attempt, and left his tools behind to rust away.
