Infrastructure work headed to Howard, Point Cadet

As infrastructure work continues to wind down on the remaining segments north of the CSX railway only Forrest and a few streets remain unpaved in the nearly 55 miles of impacted roadways -- other city contractors are ramping up for major work south of

Hemphill Construction, the firm working on eight miles of streets south of the railway, in early

December will begin replacing a 15-inch sewer line and the seven manholes on Howard Avenue between Benachi Avenue and

Hopkins Boulevard.

The sewer work is in the eastbound lane of Howard Avenue, and the work is expected to be completed before Mardi Gras parades roll in February, according to Walt Rode, who is overseeing the city's infrastructure work.

Meanwhile on Point Cadet, Lane Construction has begun a \$10.5 million, 550-day project that will

see new water, sewer and drainage lines on the eastern tip of the peninsula, south of the railway and north of Howard Avenue.

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Oh, happy day! Infrastructure work, with all its challenges, expands to Point

It must have been a happy day for those in the Slavonian Lodge when a dozen imposing concrete structures and stacks of large lime green pipes showed up on the street in front of their meeting place on Maple Street in East Biloxi.

The infrastructure project – which lodge members and everyone else in Biloxi has seen decimate streets north and south of the CSX railway over the past five years – is moving to Point Cadet.

Brace yourselves.

There is good news, however, for those who wonder about the state of their city and its massive roadwork.

There's no denying that the North contract – which faced delays even before construction began – has been a dumpster fire. Miles and miles of streets torn up for months and months and months. Let's not forget the impact of torrential rain on dirt roads in low-lying areas that are so prevalent on the Biloxi peninsula.

And now, there's no denying this immutable fact: The North contract is nearly complete. Sure, it's a year behind the last deadline, but the pavement is down. You actually have to look for an unpaved street in East Biloxi. Alas, you still find 'em.


But stop for a moment, if you will, and consider the context.

When Biloxi was flush with cash in the decade after gaming, the city averaged spending \$16 million a year in what is known as capital outlay. That would include major street work, whether it was four-laning Popp's Ferry or Cedar Lake roads or building Bayview Avenue or a new Caillavet Street, Crawford and so on, or constructing the Lopez-Quave Public Safety Center or Snyder center, or buying new police cars and fire trucks. It all came to an average of \$16 million a year, mostly all locally financed. As Public Works Director Jerry Morgan, a contractor, used to say at the time: "A.J., a contractor would die for this kind of work."

Those were heady days for Biloxi, but

today, right now, the city has \$163 million in construction under contract on infrastructure work alone: \$130 million on the North contact, \$25 million on the Hemphill work, and now \$10.5 million on Point Cadet. That's 10 times the amount of work than has ever been done by the city in a given year.

To that work add another \$35 million in other construction now underway: the Keesler gate at Division Street, boardwalks on Point Cadet, two fire stations north of the Bay, improvements to the Saenger and Woolmarket City Center.

Fact is, between infrastructure and other public works, there's a total of about \$200 million in city construction underway at the moment. Toss in other major projects pending, such as the Popp's Ferry extension and new roads at Ellzey Place and Belle La Vie, and you're looking at a quarter billion.

But it's not so much the amount of work or the milestone of monetary scale (thank you, federal government), but it's the resulting improvements,

many of which will have Biloxi better prepared next time a Katrina comes along. Mayor Gilich likes to point out that the infrastructure work now underway – the wholesale replacing of water, sewer and drainage lines far below the ground – is replacing a system that was built in the late '50s with a 25-year life span.

Biloxi, in a matter of years (let's say in 2024), will have a brand-new, gravity-driven system that will be more efficient and easier to maintain. For instance, you won't hear about "lift stations." These are the pumping stations that pump wastewater from East Biloxi to the Keegan Bayou Treatment Plant and in West Biloxi to the West Biloxi Treatment Plant, off Atkinson Road.

You don't think about where the water goes when you flush the toilet, but "lift stations" play a vital role in public health and welfare. When Katrina struck, Biloxi had 117 of these stations, and virtually all of them were offline, which meant the city's sewer system was not operating. You couldn't flush your toilet for days, until the system was Band-Aided together. Some Band-Aids still remain in place today, in fact.

But this new system, this \$355 million investment, eliminates more than two dozen lift stations and as a result employs larger and deeper pipes, which means far less to maintain and far less to remove, replace or repair in times of a catastrophic storm.

But we're getting ahead of ourselves. We're still a few years away from saying "mission accomplished." Meantime, we're counting on the fellows of the lodge to keep their fellow member, the honorable mayor, abreast of their feelings, as animated as they may be, on the infrastructure work on Point Cadet. Just as so many others have done in East Biloxi.

Oh, happy day for him.

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Mayor outlines process for Popp's Ferry bridge, corridor

Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich spoke about the city's efforts to see a new Popp's Ferry bridge during a chamber gathering the other day, and, like clockwork, hours later phones began ringing in the city's Engineering Department, a clearinghouse for all public and private construction undertakings in the city.

"People who live on Popp's Ferry Road, especially those north of the bridge, are understandably concerned about the impact the new bridge and wider approaches will have on their homes and property," said City Engineer Christy LeBatard. "They let us know every time this issue comes up. But the truth is, there's not much more we can say at this point, other than the city wants to build a new bridge and here are the general plans."


During his chamber presentation, Gilich showed maps of progress on East Biloxi infrastructure work and discussed the plans for the Popp's Ferry corridor, which would be part of an overall plan known as the "Biloxi Beach Connector." The plan includes a four-lane roadway that connects from U.S. 90 at the new Popp's Ferry extension, includes a new, higher Popp's Ferry bridge, and connects to I-10 at Shriners Boulevard, which, of course, also provides access to Miss. 67.

Gilich acknowledged such an unfunded project, pegged at \$250 million today, could take 20 years with the necessary state and federal permitting processes and property acquisitions. Actual construction on the southernmost phase, extending Popp's Ferry Road to U.S. 90 west of the Coast Coliseum, should begin by the end of 2020.

It's the bridge, however, that frustrates the 20,000 motorists who travel the major north-south route, which, Gilich noted, is vital in times of an evacuation but has to open dozens of times to allow boats access to safe anchorage upriver. Over the past several weeks, the bridge, which was built in 1978 and was transferred by Harrison County to the city some 20 years later, has caused traffic detours and delays because of malfunctions with the raising and lowering of its draw.

The proposed new bridge, which would not have a draw, would tower at least 90 feet above the water, compared to the 32-foot height of the current bridge's draw. The new bridge would be four lanes, with fourlane approaches at its northern and southern ends. The southern end of the bridge would not touch land until near the intersection of Popp's Ferry and Atkinson roads because of the bridge's height.

However, plans and timelines can't be advanced further because state and federal approvals are pending for a document known as an "environmental assessment," which is a detailed and concise examination outlining impacts of the route and also rules out other potential routes.



Said LeBatard, the city engineer: "Until we have the environmental assessment document approved for that area between Pass Road and all the way to Riverview, we won't have final design plans complete, and we won't be able to tell residents exactly what the impacts will be to their properties.

"MDOT and the Federal Highway Administration still have the ability to make changes to the route, but with the public hearings we've had over the years, and with input that we've had, we don't expect that will happen. As soon as we receive state and federal approval, which we are hoping will be by the end of the year, we'll be able to finalize the actual footprint of this project and be able to relay that information to the residents."

First step after approval would be for city representatives to contact property owners to discuss impacts and surveys of land would be done, followed by appraisals.

South of Pass Road, meantime, where the city plans to extend Popp's Ferry to U.S. 90 west of the Coast Coliseum, the route has been chosen, the environmental assessment has been completed and approved, and the city has acquired nine of the 33 required parcels of property in the path of the new roadway.

The city hopes to have the 18-month project – expected cost, \$9 million – under construction by the end of 2020.

News & notes

- Grants: Gov. Phil Bryant has been dropping off millions in Biloxi. In November, the Gov. announced \$3 million towards the city's proposed \$18 million upgrade of Point Cadet Marina. In October, he announced \$2.9 million for a Bayview Avenue boardwalk west of Forrest Avenue, and \$3 million for a new East Biloxi boardwalk and sand beach retention project between Oak Street and the Small Craft Harbor.
- Gold Star: Guice Park, the city park immediately north of the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor, has a new war memorial: The Gold Star Families Memorial, which salutes families who have lost members in military service. The new memorial, funded by Keesler Federal Credit Union, joins the Purple Heart Memorial, the USS Biloxi mast, and the World War I memorial.
- Fire stations: One of the city's two new fire stations has officially opened.
 Station 10, on old Highway 67, opened on Nov. 22.
 Fire Chief Joe Boney says Station 7, on Popp's Ferry Road east of Cedar Lake, is expected to go in service by the first of the year.
- Main Street ornament:
 The 2019 Biloxi Main Street Christmas ornament, now on sale at the Biloxi Visitors Center and the Bond Grant House (\$20), salutes the historic Saenger Theatre.
- Garbage rates: In case you missed it, monthly garbage rates in Biloxi increased by 47 cents Oct. 1. The \$14.80 rate is based on the city's bill from the Harrison County Utility Authority. Water and sewer rates remained the same for those who use less than 5,000 gallons of water a month, but high-end users saw a slight rate increase effective Oct. 1. TRADITION, tradition! The open refrain from that old Broadway hit musical "Fiddler on the Roof" seems to perfectly fit the Biloxi holiday schedule of events.

Christmas in Biloxi is slap-full of tradition, both recent and ancient. Some traditions were carried to us from across the ocean with those who came at the turn of the 20th Century; and some traditions were created more recently by longtime Biloxians who definitely knew that nothing was more "Biloxi" than an event featuring the Gulf of Mexico and our innate love of the water.

Here's the background and your guide to some of the most popular Biloxi Christmas traditions:

The Lighting of the Biloxi Lighthouse, a relative newcomer to the Biloxi holiday event line-up, takes place on Thursday, Dec. 5 at 5:30 p.m. This unique Christmas tradition includes a visit from Santa Claus and Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich who'll, in unison, light up the Lighthouse. It is only fitting that Biloxians begin the season at the city's signature landmark, which has kept watch over every Christmas since 1848.

The fun continues on Friday, Dec. 6, with the **Christmas on the Water Children's Parade**. Beginning on Howard Avenue at 6 p.m. and ending at the Biloxi Town Green with cookies and hot chocolate with Santa, the event is open to children in kindergarten through fourth

grade. Children ride hay wagons and throw candy canes to people along the route.

In the grand scheme of things, **Christmas** on the Water is one of those more recent Biloxi traditions; but 34 years of success is nothing to sneeze at. Saturday, Dec. 7, will mark three decades plus four years of the beautiful, nay... majestic Biloxi Christmas tradition. Biloxians never shy away from a raucous celebration, but Christmas on the Water, while fun, also possesses a serenity, a wonder-filled calm.

As a spectator watching the lit, elaborately decorated boat procession, while sipping hot chocolate or hot cider, one is filled with a peace that truly is the heart of what Christmas is all about, Charlie Brown (yes, that's a quote from Linus).

Christmas on the Water was born from a discussion in 1984 between Mary Mahoney, legendary restaurateur and Biloxi businesswoman; Rusty David, longtime event chair; and others while dining at the Old French House Restaurant. It was Mahoney's idea to produce a Christmas event and David's to do something involving boats, neither knew what, exactly; but thus, the beloved Christmas boat parade was born.

It would be 1986, after Mary Mahoney's death, before the inaugural event sailed. The annual event is always held on the first Saturday in December, from 6 to 9 p.m. and is free to the public. Optimal viewing locations

are any beachfront area between the Biloxi Lighthouse eastward toward Deer Island. The nighttime spectacular culminates with festive fireworks. For more information on registering your boat or the event, call 228-617-3112.

The **pusharata**, now there's an old Biloxi Christmas tradition. What's a pusharata you ask? Well, even the descriptions vary (along with the recipes) but suffice it to say it is a delectable morsel that is of the fried-confection variety (the donut hole is a poor cousin to the sophisticated pusharata). Brought to Biloxi by Slavonian (now Croatian) arrivals in the late 1800s, the sweet treat is synonymous with Christmastime and other special Biloxi occasions.

The Slavonian Ladies Auxiliary sell the yummy pastries during Christmas in the City, Biloxi Main Street's annual Christmas festival, also held on the first Saturday in December. Now in its 15th year, Christmas in the City offers daylong entertainment by local church choirs, dance studios and musicians. With hourly cash giveaways and over 100 arts and crafts vendors, the day is a great way to enjoy the holidays on picturesque Rue Magnolia and Water Street in historic downtown. A word to the wise, if you want the pusharatas, come early, festival hours are 10 a.m. till 4 p.m. and the fruity-nutty glazed balls won't last till the end. Repairs begin at Saenger

Renovations to the exterior of Saenger Theatre has officially begun but the visual process may take some time to see.

Last week, Blackline Corporation, who was awarded the bid in August, began their initial walk through of the nearly century old building in preparation for the 300-day, \$2 million project.

"It will probably take a couple weeks before anyone actually sees any demolition," said City Engineering Director Christy LeBatard. "The contractors have to inspect, prepare and set up before demolition will take place."

The current phase of work includes demo and replacement of the top portion of the fly tower - the elevated brick structure atop the rear of the theatre's roof - to the roof line, replacement of some of the structural beams and installation of a new roof and HVAC.

"The structure of the flyer tower was a main safety concern and initial reason for closing the theatre in March 2018. LeBatard said. "We know this has been a long process but for a building this old, research and analysis had to be done as well as relocation of some of the exterior utilities that support the neighboring buildings before the actual work could take place."

Back in July, councilmembers tabled the

repair contract for 60 days and tasked the administration to look for other ways to fund the costly repairs.


So the Gilich administration received proposals from the private sector as an option to lease or manage the theatre.

"We know that there are people interested in saving this theatre. I am one of them," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich declared. "Now we are reviewing the proposals, continuing to actively look for other funding, and are excited to see what the future holds for the Saenger."

Once this phase of work is complete - an estimated timeline of August, weather and anomaly permitting - the city will assess the building as to its re-opening or, if funding becomes available, moving into another phase of work.

The historic theatre, located in the downtown district, is a 975-seat venue that has been host to numerous performing arts, groups and city events. The Saenger was constructed in 1928 and opened in 1929 with the showing of Paramount's first all-talking movie, "Interference." The theater became a city building in 1975 and has since undergone several renovations.

A timeline has not yet been set for the Saenger Theatre's re-opening.



City seeks to save oak in Azalea neighborhood

The city is hoping to save a decades-old live oak that residents had wanted removed while infrastructure workers were in the area.

Over the years, the tree on Azalea Drive just south of Irish Hill had begun to encroach on Azalea Drive and limited the line of sight at the intersection. In fact, the issue with the threefoot trunk and expanding root system became more evident as Hemphill Construction workers began installing a new curb on Azalea, part of the city's infrastructure work in the neighborhoods between U.S. 90 and Irish Hill.

"Many of these streets are narrow and over the years as these trees grow their root system takes up more and more room, which is an issue when they are near roadways," said Biloxi Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich. "In many cases, these trees are part of the character of these neighborhoods, and when we can we try to work around them."

Azalea, like Gill, and so many of the other streets that connect the two-tenths of a mile between U.S. 90 and Irish Hill, is home to about two dozen homes and is a narrow two-lane street with a traffic volume typically limited to residents.

Some of the residents from the neighborhood had complained to the city that the tree had begun to encroach into the road so much that the street is essentially one lane




when it meets Irish Hill. One neighbor even asked for the tree to be cut down and hauled away.

After input from the Tree Committee and City Arborist Eric Nolan - who said the tree was healthy - Gilich stepped in.

"I would like to give this tree a chance to survive." said the mayor, who met with Tree Committee members at the site. "Some root

trimming is necessary for the sake of public safety, as the tree roots are blocking one travel lane of the street. We will trim the roots and install a concrete curb and fertilize the tree to help it recover from the trimming."

The city plans to re-establish the 18-foot roadway - two nine-foot lanes - after the city's arborist performs tree root trimming.

The Biloxi Fire Department has added a new four-legged member to the team.

Jack, a one-year old Dalmatian, was called to duty in November and will serve as an ambassador for the department.

"He is a great addition," Biloxi Fire Chief Joe Boney said. "We are getting him ready for his service and when we feel Jack has met all the requirements that we want him to meet, he will be issued a badge just like every other firefighter in the department."

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Infrastructure work expands to area of Point Cadet


The city's massive infrastructure project, which is in the final phases on the \$130 million North contract and midway through \$25 million worth of infrastructure work in neighborhoods south of the railway just west of downtown, is expanding to the east end of Biloxi's peninsula.

A \$10.5 million, 550-day contract has been awarded to Lane Construction to install new water, sewer and drainage lines in the area south of the CSX railway, involving three miles of roads from the tip of the peninsula at Michael Boulevard, south to Third Street and west to Hoxie. Among the streets that will be impacted, all south of the railway: Oak, Maple, Wisteria, Tchula, Fourth, Fifth, and sections of Howard and Third.

Work has begun along Maple and Pine streets, and rows of four-foot wide pipes and large drainage boxes along the roadside signal the work to come.

In some areas, contractors will have to install 42-inch sewer pipes 23 feet below ground, which is part of the reason this segment of Point Cadet is being done first. The work actually began Oct. 14 and has a deadline of April 16, 2021.

"From a sequencing standpoint, we had to start here because it requires the deepest work south of the tracks," said Walt A. Rode, the




city's infrastructure manager. "All the sewer lines tie in at the Sixth Street pumping station and you work from the deepest to the most shallow."

With the awarding of the \$10.5 million Lane contract, the city now has more than \$163 million in infrastructure construction underway. Additionally, another \$58.5 million in construction - covering areas north of the


Bay, west of Keesler, and in Eagle Point - is complete.


Still to be awarded is another \$88.6 million in work, which would see the installation of water, sewer and drainage lines just north of U.S. 90, from the current work at Chalmers Drive, all the way to the city's western boundary at Debuys Road, along with extensive work near the city's major casinos.






The program – which ends with a preview of 10 Christmas events in Biloxi – airs at 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. each day in December.

You'll see vintage footage of downtown Biloxi and a look as it appears today.

Honoring Biloxi firefighters: Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich, Biloxi Fire Chief Joe Boney and Assistant Fire Chief Mark Dronet Sr. honored a host of Biloxi firefighters the other day for their heroic efforts in the past year.

In fact, during the hour-long replay of the recent Biloxi Fire Department's annual awards ceremony, you'll see more than 100 presentations that recount acts of bravery and service in 2019.

See the program daily at 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on BTV.


The standards: You'll also find the monthly updates of infrastructure work (6:25 a.m. and 6:25 p.m.) and Biloxi Public Schools (6:30 a.m. and 6:30 p.m.) throughout December, along with our lineup of All Things Biloxi. The holiday season brings families together. The smell of cookies cooking and turkey baking evokes memories of Christmas Past.

Celebrations and gatherings have evolved over time and the means to get there has too.



Back in 1699, when Monsieur d'Iberville and his crew voyaged to our shore, food, shelter, safety, and doing their jobs for the King of France was their main focus. There were no elaborate Christmas decorations or large feasts for the explorers.

Monsieur would document their explorations. He was a great author of journals. Jolly Old St. Nick had not been "invented" yet, but if Monsieur could have wished for a special gift in his stocking, it would probably have been a new goose quill pen, a bottle of ink, and fresh paper for his journal writing.

Throughout history, we have read and seen how Christmas family traditions have grown in Biloxi. The ways to get to Grandma's house to celebrate has changed throughout the decades.

Traveling by foot

As establishments grew, so did families. Back in the day, families lived in close proximity to one another, and walking from house to house was a common mode of transportation.

Certainly, the Native Americans were experts at traveling safely and quickly on foot paths, with Biloxi's Pass Road being one of their historic walking trails.

By horse and buggy

In the early 1900s, folks would travel by a horse and buggy. This was common along the narrow Beach Road, then called Front Road.

By boat

Living along the Coast, boats have always been a popular method of transportation. My Uncle Edmond always had lots of boats. He fished, crabbed, tonged for oysters, and even sailed for fun. On Christmas Day, if he had a little extra time, he would give us a ride on one of his boats

I can still remember drifting along the shoreline, smelling that whiff of the waters of the Mississippi Sound, and feeling the cool breezes along the way. Rain or shine, warm or cold, our ride to Grandma's on one of his boats was one of the best Christmas memories ever!

As large tour cars, or buses emerged, traveling across a larger area became simple and easier for families to get together during the holidays.

I remember traveling by Greyhound bus one holiday season. I remember it well, because there was always a picture of a fast running dog painted on the sides.

Grandma Polly once told me that she remembered going to a greyhound racing track on the Pass Road in West Biloxi. She told me she would try to figure out the winner and, if she won, she would get a few dollars. Perhaps she would use that to buy a few Christmas gifts.

By trolley rides

With the recent renovation of downtown Howard Avenue, we all can reminisce about the popular trolley cars that appeared not only on Howard Avenue, but all through town as well as along railroad tracks adjacent to Biloxi's Front Road or today, U.S. 90.

By trains

In the 1940s and 50s, the Hummingbird locomotive traveled the rails from New Orleans to Mobile on a regular schedule. Grandma loved to talk about her young days when she traveled by way of the L&N Railroad from the depot in Biloxi to the one in Pass Christian to visit family.

Ferry Service

At one time, the best way to travel across Biloxi's Bay was by ferry boat. Two distinguished ones could be taken from one side of the Biloxi peninsula to the other.

One was the Popp's Ferry Boat which traveled near the route of our present Popp's Ferry Bridge. The other was Siglet's Ferry which serviced the Coalville Woolmarket area.

Both of these areas have since been annexed into the corporate limits of the City of Biloxi. The flat ferry boats could transport timber, animals, horse and buggies and people, across our calm waterways and could be guided simply by pulley rope and oar. No fancy motors were in service then.

Ferry used to travel Back Bay.



There were no fancy fast-traveling cars and interstate highways back in the day. Today, travelling to Grandma's house only takes a few minutes, especially with our fancy superhighways in place. What would Grandma think of today's high-efficiency, hybrid, and all-electric vehicles travelling

super-fast, with the luxuries of climate-controlled, plush interiors and equipped with radios, televisions, and wireless telephone service? And Grandpa, I wish he was alive today to see how much automobiles have changed since he was a mechanic working on those old Model-Ts!
