Infrastructure work continues chugging along

Oscar Renda Contracting, under the watchful eye of the city, continues to lay final coats of asphalt on streets north of the CSX railway in East Biloxi, and Hemphill Construction, working on streets south of the railway, has seen its contract extended by three months, until June 2020.

Meanwhile, down on Point Cadet north of Howard Avenue, Lane Construction is in the early phases of installing new water, sewer and drainage. It's the latest on the city's \$355 million infrastructure project.

"The good news is that Hemphill had Howard Avenue paved and open for Mardi Gras, and, of course for the businesses on Howard," said

Walt Rode, who is overseeing the infrastructure work for the city.

Hemphill, whose \$22.9 million contract had an original deadline of this month, has faced a number of issues, including the still-unresolved issue of human remains found near the Biloxi City Cemetery three years ago in April.

Said Rode: "We continue to push contractors to keep things moving."

Encouraging news it was the other day to hear the mayor note that the amount of money won by casinos in Biloxi climbed by \$50 million in 2019 after 2018 saw a \$30 million increase over 2017.

The Biloxi casino-resort market, he proclaimed in the State of the City, was attracting new interest from developers, which is typically what occurs in waves of success. This heartening news of such growth is even more substantial considering it comes after the industry weathered the shiny new competition from Island View in Gulfport and the Scarlet Pearl in D'Iberville. And, lest we forget, the disastrous impact of the prolonged opening of the Bonnet Carre spillway.

Truth be told, as the mayor has said on more than one occasion, of the 40 gaming jurisdictions across the country, Biloxi, with a population far less than the gaming capitals, is the No. 8 market in the country. That says something.

Back in 2002, on the 10th anniversary of gaming in Mississippi, the story was referred to as "the Mississippi Miracle." Here was a state known for dirt roads, bare feet and rebel flags now being recognized as a state that fostered a free-market, multi-billion dollar industry that employed 30,000 with almost three dozen locations across the state. Biloxi, in one report, was called a burgeoning destination, behind Las Vegas and Orlando. Heady company. Mississippi had done it right.

Remarkably, some operators - legal operators - had tapped into that interest years

earlier, far before it was legal in Mississippi.

It was pretty cool back in the day, we thought, that the phone book for Biloxi had a listing that read

GOLDEN NUGGET HOTEL, Located in Las Vegas, Nevada

and it had a local address on Jackson Street, with a local phone number, a 374- prefix in

"That was the Golden Nugget in Las Vegas," says Emile Fallo, the longtime Biloxi businessman who had a data-processing firm in Biloxi, on Jackson Street, in fact. Fallo may be best known as one of the original commissioners on what was then the Gulfport-Biloxi Regional Airport, whose small terminal had three gates, which looked suspiciously like

Door No. 1, Door No. 2 and Door No. 3. The quaintness of the airport at the time, however, belied its relevance.

For more than a decade, Fallo organized junkets from Biloxi to Las Vegas, usually three a month, with a hundred or so travelers, "depending on the size of the plane."

Says Fallo, who turned 87 on Feb. 13: "We had that phone number in the book and the junkets because the people in Las Vegas knew it was a big deal here."

He remembered that first junket was actually delayed in getting off the ground, albeit momentarily. "I remember," Fallo said, "the mayor of Gulfport actually stood in front of the plane and said we were breaking the law."

These times, you must remember, were in the pre-legal days of gaming, long before Gerald Blessey, Michael Cavanaugh and Biloxi city attorneys convinced Circuit Court Judge James Thomas that the cruises to nowhere aboard the Point Cadet-based, slot machineladen Europa Star were indeed legal since the vessel was foreign-flagged and operating in international waters.

That, friends, was the break in the dam that later spawned the dockside legislation that opened the door to a local vote on the issue. With the support of the local business community at the time, the vote was affirmative and so began the trickle that turned into the industry we have today.

Emile Fallo and the Golden Nugget leadership in Las Vegas were booking on it years ago. You could look it up.

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'Iberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.

OK, Biloxi, it's almost time for Census 2020

Officially, Census Day is April 1, but the roll call of the country actually begins this month, and Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich is asking Biloxians to stand up and be counted.

Between March 12 and March 20, households in Biloxi and throughout the country will begin receiving

mail outs with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census – online, by phone or mail.

Then on March 30 through April 1, representatives with the Census

Bureau will visit shelters and soup kitchens as well as walk around the streets and tent encampments in Biloxi to count people who are experiencing homelessness.

By April 1, every home in Biloxi and throughout the nation will have received an invitation to participate in the census.

The mayor, in his State of the City address, said he believes that Biloxi's population, now at 45,908 according to the Census, was not fully counted in the last Census and should be about 55,000 residents today.

Said Gilich: "It is vital that you take part in this process. It will determine your representation in federal,

state and local governments. The information compiled guides the distribution of federal funds, grants and other support to communities. For the first time, this census can

be accomplished online, by phone or by mail. Please encourage everyone to step up, complete the surveys, help your city and your nation."

Throughout the month of April, May, June and July, representatives will visit homes, schools and other locations in an effort to make sure everyone is counted.



The Blake at Biloxi, an upscale senior living and assisted living community that will feature 118 units and amenities you would typically find at a premier resort, continues to take shape on Popp's Ferry Road, east of Cedar Lake. The facility, which developers say will be a \$25 million investment, is looking to open in the Fall. Among the planned amenities: concierge service and transportation, fine dining, a coffee and ice cream shop, a theater, a library, piano lounge, a spa and salon, landscaped courtyards, an outdoor fire pavilion, and, of course, 24-hour nurse staff. Pricing will be based on service needs and apartment selection; however, the high-end community will be affordable and competitive with other options in the area, Blake leaders said.

City shuts door on unlicensed short-term rentals

The city in February took 11 operators of unlicensed short-term rentals to court and saw several of the operators fined and shut down.

Operators of four unlicensed short-term rentals were fined a total of \$200 in Biloxi Community Court and ordered to cease operations. Four other cases were resolved before court proceedings began, and three other cases face court dates.

"The city took assertive steps to ensure that operators of short-term rental units are complying with city ordinances," said Community Development Director Jerry Creel, whose department is responsible for enforcing city ordinances involving land use and zoning.

Operating a short-term rental without a proper license can result in fines of up to \$500 per day.

Owners of four properties – 256 Lameuse St., 6268 Kimbrough Blvd., 1984 Todd Cove and 4071 Lickskillet Road – pleaded guilty, paid \$50 fines each and were ordered to cease operations.

Owners of two other properties – 168 St. Paul and 214 Gill Ave. – had their cases dismissed but agreed to cease operations and stop advertising as a short-term rental.

The owner of the property at 1880 Southern Ave. agreed to stop advertising as a short-term rental and will apply to the city for proper permits, and the owner of 126 Briarfield was issued a short-term rental permit.

City Prosecutor Robert Harenski will pursue cases against three other locations where owners failed to show up for court: 187 Bilmarson Drive, 975 Howard Ave. and 170 Iberville Drive.

Said Creel: "Operators of short-term rentals who have questions concerning the regulations or anyone who believes an unlicensed short-term rental may be operating in their neighborhood should contact the city's Community Development Department at 435-6280."

There are currently 297 licensed short-term rentals operating within the city.



St. Paddy's parade, Grillin' on the Green usher in Spring

"Spring! Nature's way of saving 'Let's Party!"

The late, great (and somewhat Irish) Robin Williams may have been visiting here when he came up with that one because Biloxians herald in springtime each year with a great Green party in a great green location, Biloxi's Town Green.

For 41 years, the Hibernia Marching Society has put the Blarney in Biloxi during its beloved St. Patrick's Day Parade. Southern barbecue and music ioined the festivities in 2006 when Grillin' on the Green became an essential player in the daylong celebration. The whole shebang kicks-off with the Gulf Coast Running Club's Irish Derby 5K run. This year's revelry takes place on Saturday, March 14: 5K run begins at 9 a.m., festival hours 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. with parade at 2 p.m.

When delving into the long, storied history of the Hibernia Marching Society, the name of Dr. John O'Keefe emerges.

In 1978, through a Sun Herald article, Dr. O'Keefe extended an invitation to the first HMS planning meeting to all who were Irish or "wanted to be Irish." how magnanimous!

Before this first official meeting, several "unofficial" meetings took place at Mary Mahoney's Old French House Restaurant, where plans for a society and a parade were volleyed about. In '78, the crux of this organization was clarified: "the purpose of the Society is to promote interest in Irish Heritage and to develop a great appreciation for Irish Culture. Allied with these objectives is the desire to experience good fun and good fellowship among members of the Society who are Irish by birth, marriage

This year's parade captain, Jacob O'Keefe, assumes the duty for getting this 30-plus unit show on the road, literally. The parade lines up and begins at the Biloxi Yacht Club, meanders through downtown Biloxi, traveling northward on Lameuse Street to Biloxi City Hall, ultimately reaching Esters

Boulevard where it disbands.

This year's Grand Marshal, Chuck Kelly, and Colleen, Susan Cain Hinson, will fulfill their roles as official Hibernia Marching Society ambassadors when the streets of Biloxi once again turn green in celebration of Irish heritage. 
> prepared me for this next step in my career.



We're going to create a new landmark to honor the most famous Biloxian in our history, and we need your help.

April will mark the 50th anniversary of Apollo 13, a mission that has been called NASA's most successful failure and a mission that united the world in hope, prayer and problem solving as this troubled spacecraft made its way back to Earth.

Our own Fred Haise, a Biloxi native who grew up on Back Bay, brought tremendous pride to this city, to this nation and the entire world, as the Apollo 13 lunar

Fred is one of only 24 people to have flown to the moon and back. He has been a tremendous asset to Biloxi and the Mississippi Gulf Coast, inspiring students in Biloxi Public Schools, and being the driving force in creating the Infinity Space Center near the Stennis Space Center.

We have a statue dedicated to the old world explorer Pierre LeMoyne D'Iberville down at the Biloxi Visitors Center, and I want to see a statue, a new community landmark that pays homage to our new world explorer

Virtual Reality training strengthens Keesler **Community Ties**

In an effort to draw awareness to Keesler's flying training mission, local city development managers and civic leaders used virtual reality and watched live aerial demonstrations.

The 403rd Reserve Wing and 81st Training Group held briefings, workshops, and demonstrations in January to illustrate how development decisions made in the local community could potentially compromise Keesler's flying mission.

"We wanted to give the civic leaders an idea of what we look at as airfield operations professionals," said Tech Sgt. Andrew Meyer, 334th Training Squadron instructor supervisor. "We wanted to explain exactly how we serve the Air Force mission in our flying community and exactly what that means for partnerships with the local area."

The 334th Training Squadron offered civic leaders a chance to use virtual reality to demonstrate why and how certain developments could harm Keesler's air traffic.

The 334th TRS prepared diagrams and graphics to illustrate how to take preventative action to reduce negative impact to the C-130J

Super Hercules flyer mission. The virtual reality helped explain the diagrams through imaginary surfaces, and mock ups of Keesler's airspace.

"Imaginary surfaces are an extremely difficult concept," said Meyer. "I can give you examples and references but it doesn't really resonate until I put you in an environment where you actually get to see it. The virtual reality system is key when trying to convey something that

cannot be seen in a visual context."

Meyer believes his workshop demonstrates the excellent partnership that Keesler has with the surrounding community.

"We want our community to grow while still supporting military operations," said Meyer. "We're making sure our operations can coexist and still allow for maximum development on the Gulf Coast."

Baseball is closer than you think in Biloxi

Mardi Gras has come and gone and that means Spring is officially on the doorstep. With that, baseball season begins anew. For the last five years, the Biloxi Shuckers have ushered in the start of baseball season on the Coast in early April as they kick off their Double-A campaign.

But in 2020, MGM Park will open its gates for the first time in early March with the Hancock Whitney Classic. Over two days,

the Gulf Coast will host two of the premier programs in college baseball as the Mississippi State Bulldogs matchup against the Texas Tech Red Raiders on March 10 and 11. Both teams are coming off back-to-back trips to

Omaha and enter 2020 ranked in the Top 10 of the D1Baseball.com poll.

This could be a game at the College World Series in June and it's happening right here on the Coast in March! Tickets are already on sale for both games - just don't forget to bring your cowbell!

As for the Biloxi Shuckers, their season

kicks off on April 9 at home against the Montgomery Biscuits. The Shuckers will look to sustain their success on the field after winning a franchise-record 82 games in 2019, topping their franchise-record 81 wins in 2018.

Some of the top prospects in the Milwaukee Brewers system, such as Brice Turang (#1 in the Brewers system), Tristen Lutz (#2), Aaron Ashby (#7) and Mario Feliciano (#8), should all come through Biloxi at some point in the

> season. Plus, 2019 SEC Pitcher of the Year and former Mississippi State lefty Ethan Small could very well be in Biloxi pitching at some point in 2020.

> But more exciting than the play on the field is the promotional schedule that the Shuckers have lined up for 2020. The

Shuckers will yet again have 'Barks & Brews Monday' where dogs are welcome at the park every Monday night, 'Double Play Thursday' with \$2 Yuengling's, \$2 hot dogs and \$3 draft beer specials on Thursday, and 'Fireworks Friday' with 10 fireworks shows throughout the season.

2020 will also see the return of 'T-Shirt Tuesday,' where the first 250 fans receive a Shuckers-themed t-shirt as they come through the gates on Tuesday nights. Some of the t-shirts for this year include Seinfeld, Top Gun and Harry Potter.

New for this year, Wednesdays will be 'Military Wednesdays,' and Sundays will be 'Family Fun Days.' But some of the biggest nights for the Shuckers come on Shuck Yeah Saturday, including April 11 with Apollo 13 Night.

- A visit to the recent Mississippi Gulf Coast Historical and Cultural Expo
- Biloxi's Tet celebration, a look at the Vietnamese New Year's custom.

Buildings on Move


The construction and location of homes in Biloxi have evolved over the years, especially since Monsieur's d'Iberville and his crew constructed simple houses when they arrived in Biloxi.


In this early drawing from 1721, one can see hard-working folks cutting down trees, sawing,

and preparing all sorts of structures to be occupied. This famous sketch shows what went on along the Biloxi shore in our early days.

Back in those days, houses were not moved unless hurricanes blew them to another place.

Some of the structures you now see in Biloxi or may have visited years ago before they were destroyed by hurricanes weren't always in their original locations. Not only were the buildings





The Pleasant Reed House was constructed

in about 1887 and was owned and occupied by members of the Reed Family who



were iconic to the representation of hard working African-American families in Biloxi. It was located at 928 Elmer St.

Back in the Day

In 1976, it was nominated as a historical home for its historical significance and added to the National Register of Historic Places

Prior to Hurricane Katrina, the home was renovated and moved from Elmer St. to the Ohr-O'Keefe museum complex.

The home was then destroyed by Katrina but has since been

rebuilt. It now houses an interpretive center dedicated to the African-American community.

The Bond Grant House

The Bond-Grant House was built in 1904 by William Dukate and located on the south side of Howard Avenue. William gave the house to his daughter, Vera, as a wedding gift when she married Mr. B. A. Bond. She later married R. Hart Chinn, who served as mayor of Biloxi from 1933 to 1935 and from 1951 to 1953. Vera Dukate Bond Chinn lived in the house until 1921 when it was purchased by W. J. Grant



and family.

The Queen Anne style house with neo-

classical character was added to the historical register in 1984.

In 2006, the Beau Rivage Casino, who had bought the

property sometime before Hurricane Katrina, donated the structure to Biloxi Main Street.

The house was then moved across the street to its current location, 932 Howard Ave., and in March 2006 a restoration project began.

The newly-renovated structure reopened in May 2008 and is currently the home of the City of Biloxi's Downtown Services Division and Biloxi Main Street offices.

The Magnolia Hotel

The Magnolia Hotel was constructed in 1847 for John Hohn, an immigrant from Germany, at a cost of \$2,800. After his death, the tavern and coffee house was managed by his wife and operated as a hotel by many generations of Hohn women.

The house closed during World War II and did not reopen. Instead, it became the home of some of Mr. and Mrs. Hohn's granddaughters.

In 1972, after the wrath of Hurricane Camille, the structure was moved north 150 vards from its original spot to 119 Rue Magnolia and

where it was revitalized. In 1973,

the Magnolia Hotel was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Even though

Hurricane Katrina inflicted severe damage, the City of Biloxi had the structure repaired and transformed it into a Mardi Gras museum.

The building was leased in 2019 as a site for a restaurant and now named the Coastal Mississippi Mardi Gras Museum, has been relocated to the newly-renovated district on Howard.

The Gillis-Vance House

The 1830's home once occupied a lot on U.S. 90 just east of Hopkins Boulevard. It was purchased by

Mrs. Gilbert Vance in 1838. After Mrs. Vance's death, the property



changed hands several times before it was inherited by Mrs. L. V. Gillis in 1927.

In 1973, the home was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Several years later, construction of the Interstate I110 passed directly over the house site and the highway department donated the home to the City of Biloxi.

The home was then moved eastwardly down the street on U.S. 90 to the empty lot where the Charles T. Howard House once stood between the Church of the Redeemer and the Hermann House.

It was renovated and subsequently utilized as the parsonage until Hurricane Katrina knocked it down.

Brielmaier and Foretich Houses

The Brielmaier House was built in 1895 for Mrs. Henry Graves who later sold the house to her brother, Paul W. Brielmaier. It was originally located at 436 Main St.

The Foretich House was a late 19th century

style home that once sat at 134 Delauney St. The house was



the last family to live in it. The Foretich family lived in the home for five decades.

The combination of the two historic homes was located on Biloxi's Town Green and served as the old Biloxi Visitors Center.

This locale is historically remembered as the former location of the Montross Hotel back in

Hurricane Katrina destroyed the two homes.

The Creole Cottage

This structure deserves the award as "The Most Moving House" in Biloxi's recent history.

The Creole Cottage, circa 1890, traveled around the heart of Biloxi's downtown several times. The first location was 127 Lameuse St.,

then it moved to Water Street directly behind the present day Le Café Beignet restaurant. In 1977

it was returned to Lameuse Street as the former Biloxi Library and Cultural Center which was situated across from Biloxi City Hall.

After Hurricane Katrina, it was once again moved. This time to 132 Rue Magnolia where it still stands today.

The Creel House

Once located at 439 Reynoir St., the 1895 home was the longtime home of former Biloxi City Commissioner J.A. "Tony" Creel and his family.

The home received extensive Hurricane Katrina damage and was donated to the Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of

Art. It was moved in 2006 and restored.

It is a great example of a Biloxi Cottage and is currently located behind the museum at 370 Meaut St.

Today, it is the official home of the Dusti Bonge Art Foundation and is open to the public.

The Henriques-Slav House

The Henriques-Slav House was built in the 1890s and located at 132 Reynoir St. The New Orleans-type cottage was named for two of its previous owners.

Dr. Henriques owned the house at one time and operated a doctor's office and pharmacy out of the house, Grav




Slay also owned the house at one time.

Years later, Al Copeland purchased the home. After his death, Copeland's estate donated the house to the City of Biloxi. Considering its architectural significance, the city accepted the donation.

In 2010, the city salvaged and renovated the old home. The city had it moved to a vacant lot two blocks east of its original site and nested it into the Rue Magnolia, a neighborhood of historic buildings.

Gingerbread

The carved wood decoration found on porches and eaves of older homes.

Transoms

Extra windows that open above doorways to promote better circulation, taking the hot air off the ceilings.

Shotgun house

A house with all the rooms straight in a row. Allegedly, a bullet from a shotgun could theoretically travel in the front door and out the back

Window fan

A large fan bolted to a window (usually on the inside and usually in the back of the house) to draw air into and out of the home. These preceded the era of air-conditioning.

Cisterns

These structures

were located in the yard, outside a house to collect rain water. Screens were usually installed above the wooden tank to keep out bugs, animals, and debris.



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
