COVID-19: Where we are and how we got here

For us, it goes back to St. Patrick's Day and Grillin' on the Green, back in mid-March, the first casualties of the Pandemic of 2020.

In the ensuing nine months since the Ides of March, we've endured shutdowns, slowdowns, an unsettling hurricane season, and a host of challenges unique to 2020. For sure, it's been a rollercoaster ride - mentally, physically, financially, politically, and just about every "ly" you can think of.

It's a public health issue that

So where are we today?

By mid-November, Harrison County continues to hover around 50 new cases of the coronavirus each day.

A mask mandate remains in effect. Masks should be worn by all, in all public places. Restaurants and

bars must give last call no later than 11 p.m.



North Contract paving: This is the end

Throughout 2020, with its layers of uncertainty, there was a constant: infrastructure work in Biloxi.

The big news today from Infrastructure Program Manager Walt Rode is that all 55 miles of roads in the North Contract should have their final paving by the end of 2020.

Rode's report on infrastructure work status:

In the North Contract project, the city used Warren Paving to place the final layer of asphalt on roads that have now passed all testing and video review of the new underground utilities.

The city anticipates all roads in the North Contract will be paved with the last layer of asphalt by the end of 2020. As additional roads are approved throughout the next few weeks, Warren Paving will be returning

to the project to complete the asphalt pavement. Striping of

the new roads will begin after Thanksgiving.

On Point Cadet, Lane Construction continues work installing massive 42-inch sanitary sewer pipe on Maple Street. This work is currently just south of Third Street, in front of the Slavonian Lodge and is approaching Howard Avenue. The 42-inch sewer pipe, when completed with an adjacent project, will allow the city to close the Pine Street pumping station, streamlining the city's sewer system.

Also on Point Cadet, Necaise Brothers Construction is scheduled to begin work on Jan. 4, 2021. The first order of business for this \$41.5-million project: installation of a new sanitary sewer on Howard, from Maple to Cadet, while maintaining access to the Palace Casino throughout construction.

The Necaise work is scheduled to take 900 days.




Coronavirus by the numbers

COVID GUIDELINES/ REMINDERS

Masks should be worn in public.

Restaurants and bars should give last call no later than 11 nightly.

Restaurants and bars should encourage outdoor dining; limit customers to those who can be distanced six feet; and limit tables to six guests.

Retail should limit the number of individuals in store; customers should be encouraged to use hand sanitizer when entering; and non-cash payments recommended.

Barber shops, hair and nail salons should have stations separated by six feet; disposable capes are recommended; barbers, stylists and technicians must wear gloves; and there should be no waiting areas.


Churches, gyms, fitness facilities, and hotels should have sign at entrance: No one with symptoms allowed; sanitizing of hands when entering; and common areas, rooms and equipment cleaned and sanitized frequently.

Medical, dental and health care should educate and train staff on appropriate use and disposal of PPE; waiting rooms limited to one healthy, symptom-free person per patient; office cleaned and disinfected after each appointment; patient chairs sterilized after each patient; and telemedicine encouraged.

Close-contact services such as tattoo, massage, etc. facilities use disposable material and supplies and dispose accordingly; conduct services by appointment only; there should be no waiting area and sign at entrance: No one with symptoms allowed.

Each facility should follow recommended capacity guidelines, have staff wear face coverings and screen staff for symptoms.

Storm debris removal: Questions and answers

When will the debris crews get to my street?

As quickly as they can.


Crews are working on a "first pass" around the entire city. The areas south of I-10 have been the focus of the contractor because that's where the most debris is, and because a temporary debris staging site in West Biloxi helps contractors move more debris more effectively and more quickly. However, the entire "first pass" of the entire city is expected to be finished in mid-December.

I saw a map that showed trucks all over the city, but I have not seen a truck. What's up with that?

At the outset, the city planned to have debris trucks work in each of the city's seven wards. However, with the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality approval of the staging site in West Biloxi, the crews shifted gears to be more effective and maximize debris removal. The result has led to huge amounts of debris being moved.

Make no mistake: Debris trucks are in all seven wards of the city.

In fact, the contractor is working



to get a second staging site in Woolmarket to improve the efficiency of debris pickup north of the bay.

I bagged my debris, and the debris truck passed it up. Why? And when will it be picked up?

The bagged debris is an issue for the storm-removal contract. The City of Biloxi suggests, with good reason, that residents bag leaves and tree trimmings when they place them by the curb. This prevents them from blowing into the road and compromising the city's drainage systems.

However, under FEMA guidelines, the debris contractor can pick up only storm debris, and since crews can't see what's in the bag, they skip it. The bags will be picked up by Pelican, which handles normal weekly service. Because of the capacity, it will take time.

They came to my house and now I have put more debris out. Are they coming back, and when?

Yes they are coming back. The first pass is expected to be completed in mid-December. After that, the second pass will begin.

And, finally, how long will the debris removal take?

It's estimated that the debris effort will take 60 to 90 days, from when it began on Nov. 5.

ZETA RECOVERY

Signals: Of the city's 64 signalized intersections, only a handful still lack working traffic signals at mid-November: Two intersections on Eisenhower Drive in West Biloxi, and three on Howard Avenue in East Biloxi. Please drive carefully.

Haulin' it: The trucks working in Biloxi's debris blitz made 1,884 pickups in their first 13 days, Nov.

3-17. During that time, they hauled more

than 83,000 cubic yards of the estimated 200,000 cy of debris left in Zeta's wake. See the map at https://arcg.is/1jumrf.

Dockside sales: The 50 shrimp boats that had been in the commercial harbor, south of the Hard Rock parking garage, are now back in the harbor, although not necessarily in the same slips. Look for dockside sales to resume.

The power: One of the huge concrete sections of the Point Cadet fishing bridge shifted four inches as a result of the Zeta storm surge, which covered the bridge.

The hours: Debris crews are working from sunrise to sunset seven days of the week. On the front of their trucks it says: "Do not delay."

Parks: All of the city's public parks, except for Miramar in West Biloxi, are open, but residents

In the holiday rush, don't forget fire safety

Holiday season usually means lots of cooking and home-heating. It can also mean more fires.

In fact, the National Fire Prevention Association says cooking is the most common cause of home fire. Also, the Biloxi Fire Department says that this time of year usually means a spike in calls when residents are using fireplaces, heaters and other heating devices that have been dormant for months. As a result, the department wants to remind residents of steps to take to help avoid a fire.

"Have your fireplaces checked to make sure that they are working properly," Biloxi Fire Chief Joe Boney says. "Also, do not use cooking appliances for heating, only for cooking."

Those using space heaters should not use the device with an extension cord, as the cord may overheat. Plug space heaters directly into a wall outlet.

"When cooking, practice safe cooking behavior," Boney says. "Exercising caution at all times in the kitchen can help reduce the risk of a kitchen fire."

People get busy, get interrupted while in the kitchen and they just walk away, many times for some small distraction that turns into a major problem. So never leave a stove unattended."

Keep an eye on what you fry. If you see any smoke or that the grease starts to boil, turn the burner off. Keep a pan lid or baking sheet nearby and use it to cover the pan if it catches on fire.

Also, remember to keep the cooking area clean and free of anything that may catch on fire such as oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packing and towels.

And always have a working smoke alarm and fire extinguisher nearby.

Green is the new red with it comes to fire trucks

Biloxi's "green" fire trucks have arrived!

"These are the first green trucks in the state of Mississippi," Biloxi Fire Chief Joe Boney says. "They are designed specifically to protect our firefighters, before during and after a fire."

They are custom-built trucks, built to Biloxi Fire Department specifications, says Boney. "They are 30 feet long instead of 34, they are lower to the ground for ergonomics, to allow firefighters to access equipment without having to climb onto the truck. It cuts out about 80 percent of their carcinogenic exposure by having these trucks designed and built the way they're built."

The two trucks are in service at Central Fire Station on Porter Avenue and Bay Vista Fire Station on Pass Road.



Thank you all for the continued support you provide us in serving those who have served.



BTV: Biloxi Television, the city's municipal TV channel, has a decided holiday feel in December, with a look back at the city's festive celebrations.



Let's branch out this Christmas

With the passing and recovery of Hurricane Zeta, Biloxi trees have been on everyone's mind. But now, we can begin to focus on the Christmas Tree. Let's take a look back at some coastal traditions as well as some holiday traditions associated with trees.

First, let's take a look at some coast tree history and a dozen or so memorial trees.

Practical use

Back in the Day

Hundreds of years ago when Monsieur Lemoyne D'Iberville landed on our shore, he was astounded by the huge array of trees that he encountered. The early French settlers documented our amazing tree assortment which included cedar, cypress, pine, magnolia, sassafras, oak, and sweetgum.

Upon arrival, the Colonists went right to work constructing houses, small buildings, boats, and much-needed household furnishings for their new homesteads. The plethora of trees also provided food such as nuts and fruit for the new population as well as for the animals. Amazingly, our mulberry trees were also cultivated for the production of fine silk.

The leisurely palm

Even though our early settlers weren't likely to encounter the non-indigenous palm tree, this tree has been adopted as an unofficial symbol of leisure and vacation along the Coast.

Looking back at photos of popular Biloxi landscapes, we can see where palm trees were added to popular properties. Palm trees grow well on our Biloxi peninsula and can endure our stormy weather.

Places like the old Broadwater Hotel, Baricev's Restaurant, and the median along U.S. 90 near the present I-110 loop all had palm trees. And, palm trees are still everywhere and still standing even along U.S. 90!

The Twelve Palms Memorial

A dozen palm trees were displayed in the early 1900s at City Park located at Reynoir Street and Esters Boulevard, just south of the CSX Railway, where

a Mississippi Power Co. office is now located. The park, also called the Twelve Palms Memorial, with its "Biloxi" sign, had served as a welcoming point for rail passengers visiting Biloxi

The palms honor Biloxi's World War I casualties and the original project was completed by the Cleophan

Club of Biloxi, believed to be the oldest women's club in Mississippi, with its first recorded meeting taking place Sept. 30, 1901.

On Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 2013, Biloxi rededicated the twelve palms, now located at the Biloxi Businessmen's Park, at Forrest Avenue and Bayview Avenue, on Back Bay, in a ceremony held by the Biloxi Bay Area Chamber of Commerce.

A tree city

For more than three decades Biloxi has been recognized as a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation for its continued tree planting and preservation.

Each February, the City of Biloxi celebrates Arbor Day, complete with a 5K and 1-mile run, tree plantings and giveaways. Why celebrate in February? Well, that time in late winter is the best time to plant new seedling trees. By the way arbor in Latin means tree.

Now, let's look at some Christmas Tree traditions.

With the threat of this year's coronavirus pandemic, more families will participate in at-home decorating projects. The arrival of cooler weather brings along the excitement of holiday preparations. Tree decorating adds to the festive

spirit of the season.

Years ago, before Hurricane Katrina, trees were decorated and displayed at the historic Tullis-Toledano Manor on Biloxi's East Beach Boulevard also known as U.S. 90.

At least ten cultural groups sponsored and contributed trees, including the Yugoslavs, French, English, Hispanics, Scots, Germans, African-Americans, Vietnamese, Irish, and Italians.

The old 1800s structure provided an amazing holiday extravaganza. Sadly, in 2005, Hurricane Katrina ended the cultural learning opportunity when its monstrous waters forced a huge barge to land on top of the Manor.

Netted Christmas Trees

Other festive trees could be seen throughout downtown Biloxi. Across from City Hall on the old Biloxi Library property, a

fisherman's netted tree, one designed out of fishing nets, was often constructed recognizing the strong influence of seafood workers in our community.

The Peoples Bank building on Howard Avenue also exhibited a netted tree visible from the sidewalk through its window.

Holiday ornaments

Since 1997 Biloxi Main Street has offered an assortment of tree ornaments depicting historic Biloxi structures from both the past and the present. These shiny artistic renderings have included popular Biloxi structural icons such as the Barq's Root Beer Factory, the old Biloxi Library, the Saenger Theatre, and our present City Hall.

Weather Vane

This year's ornament is the curious Weather Witch weathervane which is still perched atop Ellzey's Hardware store on Howard Avenue. This unusual architectural ornament has endured decades of hurricanes and is still hanging on.

The Biloxi Visitors Center also offered a Christmas ornament dating back to 2013. The ornament was a series and featured the Biloxi Lighthouse and the Visitors Center.

The series highlighted the city's oldest landmark and one of the city's most symbolic buildings representing Biloxi's resolve. The center did not introduce a new ornament this year.

Floating trees

For 35 years now, the official opening of the holiday season for the Mississippi Gulf Coast has been marked by the Christmas on the Water celebration which usually includes a parade both on land and on water.

Many boat owners elaborately decorate their vessels with holiday garb and lights, and parade in organized formation along the shoreline of the Mississippi Sound from west to east.

The boats are clearly visible by way of their holiday lights. Many include Christmas trees as part of their display. Many boats are even accompanied by festive holiday music, as well.

This year's event will only involve a parade on water which is scheduled for Saturday evening on December 5 and will be followed by a fireworks display.

Family trees

During this year's holiday, before visiting with family members either in person or via popular technology, it's a good idea to sharpen those genealogy skills by adding details to the Family Tree.
