Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The Strategic Plan portion of the City of Biloxi's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan for the CDBG Entitlement Program identifies six goals to be addressed during the five-year period of the plan. During Program Year (PY) 2019, the City continued to make progress toward addressing three of the goals: improving public safety and welfare, especially in low- to moderate-income areas; expanding recreational opportunities, especially in low- to moderate-income areas; and supporting public service activities that address high-priority, unmet needs of the community.

The City received a CDBG-CARES Act allocation of \$272,001 in the late spring of 2020 to help it prepare for, prevent, and respond to COVID-19. Subsequently, it substantially amended its 2019 Action Plan, again, to add a new public service activity to address and prevent increased homelessness in Biloxi caused by COVID-19. The City then entered into a subrecipient agreement with Open Doors Homeless Coalition to invest 100% of these funds to provide rent and utility assistance to Biloxi residents who had become homeless due to COVID-19 or who were at risk of becoming homeless because of COVID-19.

The City successfully administered the following 2019 CDBG projects and activities; progress was made for all PY2019 funded projects.

- The East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project Phase I - the City bid, executed and administered a contract with Gulf Breeze Construction, Inc. to construct a two-lane road to provide access and support quick emergency vehicle response times to a low/mod income neighborhood, improving the public safety and welfare of area residents. Once completed, this project is anticipated to benefit 3,845 residents, of whom 54.88% are low- to moderate-income;
- PY2019 public service activities:
 - Open Doors Homeless Coalition – support for program to prevent and address homelessness through short-term rental and utility assistance;
 - Moore Community House - assist in funding an affordable, high quality early childcare program for eligible families;

- Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence – support for an early childhood education program for those who have experienced domestic violence;
- New Bethel/Believe Program – assist in funding an affordable educational summer program for at-risk youth in a low/mod income area of East Biloxi; and
- CDBG-CV public services activity funded through the CARES Act – support for the Open Doors Homeless Coalition to address and prevent an increase of homelessness caused by COVID-19 in Biloxi through rental and utility assistance for eligible residents. None of the CARES Act allocation was expended in PY2019.

During PY2019, the City continued working with the Mississippi Home Corporation and the Biloxi Housing Authority to complete development of its 2019 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice, which was adopted in November 2019. Concurrently, the City continued to collaborate with the Mississippi Center for Justice, Biloxi Housing Authority and other South Mississippi cities and agencies to comprehensively address impediments to fair housing and to expand access to affordable housing, as identified in its strategic plan and 2019 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice.

Assess how the jurisdiction’s use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

As shown in Table 1, investment of the City’s PY2019 CDBG resources resulted in a higher level of accomplishment than expected. Guidance from the HUD Field Office and collaborative working relationships with the Biloxi Housing Authority and local public service agencies supported efforts of the City of Biloxi to implement its CDBG-funded projects/activities expeditiously, providing direct benefit to Biloxi residents through quality of life and public safety and welfare improvements and expansion of recreational opportunities in low- to moderate-income areas.

During development of each CDBG Annual Action Plan, the City reviews the high priority community needs and goals identified in its Five-Year Consolidated Plan. It then takes into consideration on-going input provided by residents and other stakeholders, especially input offered during development of the new Action Plan; the City also attempts to anticipate challenges the City may face in terms of quality of life and public safety issues and other factors, to identify eligible projects that will address high priority community needs for the maximum benefit. During PY2019, the City’s CDBG resources were expended in compliance with HUD requirements and project/activity goals were achieved.

NOTE: During PY2019, the John Henry Beck Park Project was bid, contract executed and construction completed; the environmental review and in-house design of the project were completed during PY2018 following a PY2018 substantial amendment that reallocated CDBG funds in the amount of \$171,454 from the East Biloxi Clean Up Project to this project. This neighborhood park is located in a low/mod income area in which 2,225 residents live, of whom 1,470 (66%) are low- to moderate income. **IDIS did not allow prepopulated data in Tables 1 or 2 to be adjusted to reflect actual funding or expected and actual beneficiaries for this project.**

Narrative

Table 2 identifies that a total of 2,419 low- to moderate-income persons or families benefitted from CDBG-assisted public services activities during PY2019. Of the total served, 362 were White, 1901 were Black/African American, 91 were Asian, 22 were American Indians/American Natives and 44 were Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander or Hispanics.

The Early Childhood Development Program at the Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence served 77 people, of whom 42 were White and 35 were Black or African American. Moore Community House's Affordable Early Childhood Development Program assisted a total of 94 people, of whom 100% were Black/African American. New Bethel was not able to implement its educational summer camp for at risk youth due to state social distancing requirements to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Open Doors Homeless Coalition served a total of 23 households with its CDBG-assisted activity that provided rent and utility assistance to prevent and address homelessness in Biloxi. Of these, 19 households were White, three were Black/African American and one was Asian. Eight of the households were headed by a female.

During PY2019, the John Henry Beck Restroom Project, funded with PY2018 CDBG funds, was completed, benefiting 2,225 people of whom

1,470 (66%) are low- to moderate-income.

Also, during PY2019, construction of the multiyear East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project Phase I began but the project is not expected to provide public safety and welfare benefits for Biloxi residents until work is completed in PY2020. Upon completion, it is expected that 3,845 residents will benefit from the project, of whom 54.88% are low- to moderate-income.

Narrative

During PY2019, the City was awarded an allocation of \$272,001 from the CARES Act that was budgeted in the 2019 Action Plan through a substantial amendment; these funds will be used by the City to prevent or address increased homelessness in Biloxi caused by COVID-19.

The City of Biloxi did not receive HOME, HOPWA, ESG or related HUD funds during PY2019.

The City contributed rights-of-way in support of the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project Phase 1.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City of Biloxi does not receive HOME or ESG funds and it did not identify goals to produce affordable housing units from rent or ownership to homeless, nonhomeless or special needs households. The City budgeted \$20,000 in CDBG funds to support Open Doors Homeless Coalition’s program to address and prevent homelessness through rent and utility assistance with the expectation of benefiting 15 households. The investment of CDBG funds helped Open Doors exceed that goal by serving 23 Biloxi homeless or about-to-be-homeless households.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

Several years of successfully reducing the number of homeless individuals and families in Biloxi through Open Doors’ comprehensive approach to addressing and preventing homelessness likely means that the City will continue to budget funds to support this activity. Biloxi has a return to homelessness rate of only 4.97% but the City is impacted by a nearly constant influx of homeless people.

Narrative Information

Table 13 identifies that all 23 households served during PY2019 through Open Doors’ public services activity to prevent and address homelessness in Biloxi through rent and utility assistance qualified as extremely low-income households. With City CDBG public services funding

support, Open Doors provides services to prevent and address homelessness on a citywide basis without targeting or focusing on specific types of households. This assistance is available to households with special needs and to those with qualifying household incomes.

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through: Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Biloxi continued to work with the Open Doors Homeless Coalition Continuum of Care and other local nonprofit agencies to achieve its goal of ending homelessness in Biloxi; in 2019, this combined effort prevented homelessness for 58 extremely low-income families. As a result of targeted efforts to end homelessness, Biloxi has a 4.97% return to homelessness rate. Single adults continue to make up the majority of persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness in Biloxi but the number of unsheltered single adults has been reduced by 29% between 2019 and 2020.

The City again budgeted funds in PY2019 to support Open Doors Homeless Coalition's program to address and prevent homelessness through rent and utility assistance. Through a substantial amendment to its 2019 Action Plan, Biloxi budgeted 100% of its first CARES Act allocation to fund a new public service activity to prevent an increase in homelessness caused by COVID-19 through provision of rent and utility assistance. Administered by Open Doors, the new activity provides an additional \$272,001 for rent and utility assistance to address homelessness in Biloxi that is directly caused by COVID-19.

The City participated in the Open Doors Homeless Coalition's 2019 point in time count of homeless individuals as part of the community's effort to reach out to and assess individual needs of homeless persons. Sheltered and unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness were counted in soup kitchens, day centers, shelters, camps and other places frequented by homeless persons. Each person was assessed using the nationally recognized Vulnerability Index - Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT). The VI-SPDATs were entered into a coordinated entry portal in HMIS and used to create a prioritized list of homeless veterans, chronically homeless persons and other persons experiencing homelessness in Biloxi.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

There are no emergency shelter or transitional housing beds for homeless persons in the City of Biloxi, other than those for persons fleeing domestic violence. Several Biloxi churches operate emergency shelter operations on a day-to-day basis in extremely cold weather. Discussions among the City of Biloxi, Open Doors Homeless Coalition and other nonprofit agencies continued during 2019 to identify sources of funding to address the needs of homeless persons for local emergency shelter and transitional housing, especially noncongregate shelters.

When veterans or homeless families with children seek shelter in Biloxi through a Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF) or Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) Program provider, hotel rooms may be provided in limited circumstances until permanent housing solutions are available.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City's CDBG-funded public service activity that supported Open Door's on-going program to prevent and address homelessness in Biloxi through rent and utility assistance served 17 households in PY2017; 22 in PY2018; and 23 in PY2019. Unfortunately for extremely low-income individuals and families in Biloxi who fall behind in rent, there are not enough homelessness prevention funds available to meet the need, although the need was decreasing prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Back Bay Mission, Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence and Open Doors Homeless Coalition operate ESG-funded homelessness prevention programs in the City of Biloxi. Extremely low-income individuals and families who are facing eviction can be linked to financial services and supportive services and persons who are literally homeless can be linked to housing through rapid rehousing assistance. Back Bay Mission also manages emergency assistance programs for veterans and nonveterans.

Veterans and their families are eligible for homeless prevention services through the Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF through the Veterans Administration) managed by Oak Arbor in Hattiesburg and Soldier On in Jackson, both of which include Biloxi in their service area.

When homeless persons are discharged from mental health facilities, they are linked to housing and supportive services through Olmstead-driven programs. When homeless persons are discharged from the VA Medical Center, they are linked with VASH vouchers or SSVF services. When someone is released from prison or jail and is homeless, there are few resources available in Biloxi to assist them; re-entry

services continue to be greatly needed. When youth "age out" of foster care, the Harrison County Department of Human Services is responsible for ensuring their smooth transition to self-sufficiency. The Gulf Coast Mental Health Association links disabled persons to SSI benefits for which they are eligible through the SOAR program.

There continue to be gaps in housing and service opportunities for people who entered any of the publicly funded institutions as homeless. As they transition to a permanent solution in the community, the responsibility for discharge planning lies with the institution. In Biloxi, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition takes the lead, when needed, to address discharges appropriately and to ensure that individuals and families are linked to mainstream resources. The Open Doors Homeless Coalition and its members also link clients to food stamps, primary health care services from Coastal Family Health, employment through the WIN Job Center, and other benefits, as appropriate.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Using a centralized coordinated entry approach, people who become homeless in Biloxi can contact an agency and be assessed for housing and services. During PY2019, targeted outreach efforts organized and led by the Open Doors Homeless Coalition identified and assessed persons experiencing homelessness in "camps" who may have been disconnected from other services. As part of the annual Point in Time event each January, every person experiencing literal homelessness in the City of Biloxi is sought out to be counted, assessed with the VI-SPDAT and prioritized for housing opportunities.

Families with children who may be literally homeless are linked to appropriate programs as quickly as possible to reduce the trauma that homelessness poses for children. When the Biloxi Public School District identifies families that may be experiencing homelessness, it contacts the Open Doors Homeless Coalition or a member agency to link that family to a shelter, transitional program or rapid re-housing.

Biloxi prioritizes housing and services for chronically homeless persons; 72% of the permanent supportive housing units in Biloxi funded through the HUD Continuum of Care are reserved for chronically homeless individuals and families.

In Biloxi, Open Doors Homeless Coalition:

- manages the by-name list of chronically homeless persons and families; establishes coordination among service providers; targets outreach to chronically homeless persons in the day care centers and camps; establishes additional funding sources; strengthens relationships with landlords; works to appropriately house chronically homeless persons; and implements critical time intervention case management strategies.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City of Biloxi has a cooperative working relationship with the Biloxi Housing Authority, which currently serves 1,743 families through its allocation of: Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD); Tenant Based Housing Choice Vouchers (TBV); Project Based Housing Choice Vouchers (PBV); Veteran’s Affairs Supportive Housing Vouchers (VASH); Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC); and Market Rate units.

BHA owns and manages 11 affordable housing complexes in the City, which have a combined total of 908 RAD units. According to BHA, it usually has a 97% occupancy rate and units generally are filled within five days of availability, allowing time for repairs, cleaning and installation of improvements in between occupancy of different tenants. In 2019, approximately 2,073 eligible families were on BHA’s waiting list for RAD units, which includes 1,777 female-headed households and 81 elderly households.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

Each of the Biloxi Housing Authority’s developments has its own Resident Council that meets monthly with BHA personnel to discuss issues and concerns related to their tenancy. There also is a Citywide Resident Council that represents all of the properties of the Biloxi Housing Authority. All residents of BHA developments are encouraged and invited to comment on development of BHA’s 5-Year and Annual Plans and all are eligible to participate in the Resident Council process.

All residents also are offered Resident Services through BHA’s Management Services staff, which assists residents with accessing numerous programs and referrals that improve their quality of life and offer education and training in numerous occupations.

BHA does not have any homeownership units currently available for sale, but all residents wishing to explore homeownership opportunities are

referred for homeownership counseling offered by Mercy Housing, Renaissance Community Loan Fund and other local counseling agencies.

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

Biloxi's Federal Programs staff actively worked with the Mississippi HOME Corporation, the Biloxi Housing Authority, other public housing authorities and CDBG entitlement cities during 2019 to develop a statewide plan to affirmatively further fair housing. Staff continued to take advantage of educational opportunities such as webinars and workshops to stay current about affordable housing related issues and programs and also participated with the Mississippi HOME Corporation in numerous conference calls and meetings to assist with organizing and conducting public input meetings as part of the statewide AI development process. To support fair housing within the City of Biloxi, the City and Biloxi Housing Authority developed a joint AI, which was approved by the governing bodies of both entities in November 2019.

On-going discussions continued in 2019 between the City's Federal Programs staff and Planning Division staff regarding Biloxi Land Development Ordinance amendments to add up-to-date definitions and text to support compliance with Fair Housing and Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and policies. Subdivision regulations were updated in previous years, allowing a variety of lot sizes and residential densities in support of affordable housing construction and group living arrangements throughout the City.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Biloxi's subdivision regulations have been updated to allow a variety of lot sizes and residential densities throughout the City in support of affordable housing construction, group home and other living arrangements to meet underserved populations. The City is considering other revisions to its ordinances. The City continued ongoing discussions with the Mississippi Center for Justice during 2019 to actively serve those

whose rights are protected through the Fair Housing and Americans with Disabilities Acts.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continued its efforts to educate the public about lead-based paint hazards in PY2019, which included providing educational brochures about lead-based paint hazards, testing and abatement, available to the public at no charge in various City buildings frequented by the general public.

The City's code enforcement regulations require that housing structures that are being substantially rehabilitated or repaired are upgraded to meet code standards, which is reducing the likelihood of lead-based paint exposure in Biloxi residences. The Biloxi Housing Authority also requires abatement of lead-based hazards prior to public housing rehabilitation or renovation.

The Mississippi Regional Housing Authority No. VIII continued during PY2019 to require owners of housing units inspected for Section 8 eligibility to scrape and repaint any surface areas where paint was chipping or peeling; this was enforced through their on-going inspection program. Region VIII also continued its lead-based paint hazard education program, providing informational literature to Section 8 families with children less than six years of age.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continues to work with public and private agencies, including private housing developers, to identify and access resources to support private development of workforce housing in East Biloxi, to support major employers that include several resort hotels and casinos and Merit Hospital, to reduce housing and transportation costs for poverty-level families. High construction and insurance costs in this area, resulting from the area's low elevation and more stringent federal and local building codes, create a significant challenge to expanding workforce housing to move toward ending the cycle of poverty.

The City of Biloxi has an active economic and community development agenda to support existing businesses and attract new businesses to Biloxi. In addition to a local tax rebate program established to incentivize business and employment expansions, the City has three census tracts newly designated as Opportunity Zones. Originally introduced in the Investing in Opportunity Act (IIOA), and enacted in 2017 as part of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, the federal program offers special treatment on capital gains in a way that's designed to drive long-term investment in a diverse range of low-income communities throughout the nation. Various tax incentives are provided to encourage investment through privately

or publicly managed Opportunity Funds.

The Opportunity Zones tax benefit was designed to capture a portion of those passive holdings and redirect that capital into distressed communities, such as East Biloxi, through equity investments in businesses and real property. Effectively it aims to activate capital currently sitting on the sidelines to boost lagging local economies while providing no upfront subsidy to investors. The design encourages long-term deployment of capital in distressed communities, and hence the tiered benefit structure ties to the duration of the investment in the Opportunity Fund.

To promote the hiring of local residents to fill newly created jobs from the Opportunity Zone Program and applicable federally funded projects, the City complies with Section 3 requirements. The City also supports affordable educational programs offered through two chambers of commerce and Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College that address a wide variety of topics to assist start-up and other small businesses in succeeding. The City also will continue to support participation of the Biloxi Housing Authority in the HUD/HCV/Family Self Sufficiency Program to help reduce the number of poverty-level families.

The City of Biloxi has one of the lowest costs of living in South Mississippi, with affordable public transportation services, no property tax rate increase in many years and one of the lowest water/sewer rates in the region to assist low-income families in stretching their limited resources further.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

In PY2019, the City of Biloxi continued to work with the Biloxi Housing Authority, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition Continuum of Care, and other service agencies and educational institutions to improve the quality of life of its residents and to address unmet community needs, especially for low-income families and individuals. City staff worked with Open Doors, Moore Community House and the Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence to continue providing three high priority public service activities that were partially funded with CDBG resources. The City also worked with New Bethel CDC's Believe Program in 2019 to ensure support its new educational summer camp for at risk youth but concerns about the spread of COVID-19 resulted in cancellation of the camp; no CDBG funds were expended on the new activity. The City plans to continue working with local nonprofit agencies to address the need for affordable after school and summer educational programs in addition to affordable, early childhood educational programs.

The City of Biloxi continued its outreach efforts to encourage compliance with Fair Housing and Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and

policies. Working with the Mississippi HOME Corporation and Biloxi Housing Authority, the City completed a joint City-BHA Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice as part of the effort to develop a statewide A.I.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Biloxi continued to support coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies as an active partner with Open Doors Homeless Coalition and through public service activities supported with CDBG funding in PY2019. In PY2019, the City continued to support applications of local social service agencies to access state and federal resources. By participating in the regular meetings of Open Doors, engaging in almost weekly communications with the Biloxi Housing Authority and establishing an on-going working relationship with the Mississippi Center for Justice and Mississippi HOME Corporation to affirmatively further fair housing, Biloxi Federal Programs staff enhanced collaborative among organizations working to address unmet needs in Biloxi.

The City staff complies with the intent and requirements of its Citizens Participation Plan to improve public outreach and education by publishing, emailing and posting notices of CDBG public hearings. All known local and regional social service agencies are invited and encouraged to attend CDBG hearings and workshops and oral and written input sought. In addition to posting documents on its website, hard copies of HUD-required documents are made available for public review at the Biloxi Housing Authority, in the four branches of Biloxi's library and in various City buildings.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The City of Biloxi coordinated with the Biloxi Housing Authority to update its Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice during 2019, which included a review of local land use controls such as zoning, ad valorem tax policies, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations and policies affecting return on residential investment. During PY2020 it will continue to work with BHA and the Mississippi Center for Justice to organize and host a public educational outreach workshop to share information about fair housing rights and issues.

The City has adopted the latest version of the International Building Code, which requires compliance with Americans With Disabilities Act and Fair Housing Act provisions. There are no specific growth limitations or other public policies in place that would affect return on residential investment. Unlike construction costs and insurance premiums, property taxes in Biloxi have not increased during the past 20 years.

Biloxi's official zoning district map allows for a mixture of single- and multi-family residential units on varying lot sizes throughout the City as well

as group homes in a variety of areas. Other land use regulations support sustainability measures and provide for density bonuses when combined with natural resource preservation and/or other public benefits. Mixed use zoning is permitted in the central business area.

CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The City of Biloxi regularly monitors its performance in spending CDBG funds and meeting program goals through timely expenditure of these funds. The City more formally assesses its performance at least once annually and conducts an annual public hearing to inform the public of its progress in implementing and completing CDBG-funded activities each program year.

Expenditures are monitored on an on-going basis throughout implementation of each activity to ensure timeliness of expenditures and compliance with project budgets as well as eliminate opportunity for mismanagement, fraud or waste.

The City utilizes existing policies and procedures to monitor program administration and regulatory compliance. To ensure compliance, the staff monitors specific areas as follows: program performance review; financial management practices; record keeping and reporting practices; general management practices; compliance with EEO, Fair Housing, ADA, anti-discrimination and others.

To document compliance with applicable regulations, policies and procedures, the City will continue to monitor its subrecipients on an on-going basis analyzing actual performance against subrecipient agreement requirements and conditions. Provided to each subrecipient at the annual subrecipient workshop conducted at the start of each CDBG program year, Biloxi's CDBG Standard Operating Procedures identify how each subrecipient will set up and implement a CDBG activity and provides the forms necessary to document projected versus actual outcomes; beneficiary eligibility; and compliance with procurement and other regulations. Throughout each program year, the City reviews subrecipients' monthly and quarterly reports, as well as other required forms, and conducts on-site monitoring of each subrecipient to monitor compliance and timely implementation of each activity. The City takes corrective action as soon as an issue becomes apparent to minimize compliance issues and opportunities for misuse of funds.

To ensure compliance with CDBG program requirements, including minority business outreach, timeliness of expenditures and comprehensive planning requirements, City staff attends HUD-sponsored workshops and training on an on-going basis, participates in applicable webinars and incorporates HUD guidance into its programs and operating procedures. The staff also regularly communicates with HUD Field Office staff and reviews the HUD website for program compliance updates.

City compliance is specifically discussed at each CDBG public hearing, including comprehensive planning and timeliness of expenditures. Compliance with minority business outreach requirements is ensured through ongoing implementation of the City's procedure requiring all HUD-funded Requests for Proposals and Requests for Qualifications be provided in a timely manner to the Mississippi Contract Procurement Center and mailed, return receipt requested, to known minority and female-owned firms.

The City's outreach to minorities and women includes posting information in English, Spanish and Vietnamese on the City's website and in public buildings located throughout the City, including the Biloxi Housing Authority. Written flyers are distributed in English, Spanish and Vietnamese to known local nonprofits that serve and/or represent minorities, low-income residents, and nonEnglish-speaking residents.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City complies with the intent and literal requirements of its Citizen Participation Plan by making every effort to encourage broad public input into development of activities and programs assisted with CDBG Entitlement Program resources.

In an effort to provide citizens with reasonable notice and opportunity to comment on performance reports and other HUD-required plans and reports, the City of Biloxi not only publishes and posts notices, but delivers flyers in English, Spanish and Vietnamese to known nonprofits that primarily serve nonEnglish-speaking residents, low-income residents, minorities and persons with disabilities. The flyers and notices invite and encourage the participation of all residents into the CDBG process through submission of oral and written comments.

The City of Biloxi makes its Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) available to the public for examination and comment for a period of at least 15 days and publishes two notices to advertise the report's availability for review. In addition to posting each annual performance report on the City's website for public review, hard copies are distributed for public review to the four branches of the Biloxi Public Library, the Biloxi Housing Authority, the Mayor's Office, City Hall, the Community Development Department and the Public Works/Engineering Building. The published notices indicate where the public review copies are located.

A public hearing for the PY2019 CAPER was held on December 8, 2020, after being advertised twice in a local newspaper and posted as described above. All notices included information about the availability of the Public Review Draft of the 2019 CAPER and encouraged attendance at the public hearing. Compliance with the Biloxi Citizen Participation Plan for the 2019 CAPER is documented in an attachment at screen CR-00 Administration; no oral or written comments were formally submitted to the City for consideration during the citizen participation process.

CR-45 - CDBG 91.520(c)

Specify the nature of, and reasons for, any changes in the jurisdiction's program objectives and indications of how the jurisdiction would change its programs as a result of its experiences.

At this time, the City does not plan to change its program objectives other than to adapt its CDBG Entitlement Program as directed by HUD to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result of successful implementation of past activities and programs, the City plans to continue developing its Annual Action Plan with considerable input from citizens and funding activities to address high-priority, unmet needs identified in its Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

The City will continue to seek input from local and regional housing and social service agencies, including the regional Continuum of Care and Biloxi Housing Authority, as well as from the general public, to maximize investment of limited CDBG resources. The City will continue to work to maximize efficient use of limited federal, state and local resources to improve all residents' quality of life.

PUBLIC HEARING MINUTES
5:30 p.m. December 8, 2020**

On Tuesday, December 8, 2020, the City of Biloxi conducted a public hearing regarding the administration, performance and evaluation of its Program Year 2019 CDBG Entitlement Program in the auditorium of the Community Development Department, located at 676 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard in Biloxi. The CDBG Entitlement Program is funded through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The purpose of the public hearing was to present a public review draft of the 2019 Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) for the 2019 CDBG Program Year and to provide an opportunity for the public to ask questions and present oral comments regarding the City's program performance and draft report. Those present were Susan Pickich, Federal Programs Manager; Helen Werby, Executive Director/Biloxi Housing Authority; Kay Horn, New Bethel CDC/Believe Program; John Jopling, Mississippi Center for Justice; Andrew Hiyama, Mississippi Center for Justice; Mary Simons, Executive Director/Open Doors Homeless Coalition CoC; and Grace Aaron, consultant.

At 5:40 p.m., Ms. Pickich opened the hearing and welcomed those present. She and Ms. Aaron, consultant for the City, reviewed items on the agenda and the budget summary sheet (copies are attached) and then presented an overview of Program Year 2019 CDBG activities and actual use of funds.

Following the overview, Ms Pickich asked if there were any questions. John Joplin, MCJ, asked where he could find out about the state's CARES Act allocations for the ESG Program and Ms Pickich suggested he contact the MS HOME Corporation. Mrs. Simons provided him with a phone number and website.

A discussion ensued about CARES Act allocations made to the City's CDBG Entitlement Program that are limited to preparing for, preventing and responding to COVID-19 and the local impacts of the delay in providing rental assistance in arrears pending guidance from the HUD Field Office. Ms Pickich explained that the first allocation of \$272,001 was budgeted to prevent an increase in homelessness in Biloxi as a result of the pandemic through rent and utility assistance and that other states were using their CARES Act allocations for similar rental assistance programs. Mary Simons said the transcript and powerpoint presentation from HUD's November 3, 2020 webinar had been posted online and both clearly identify paying for rent in arrears incurred after January 21, 2020 is an eligible use of the CDBG-CV funds. Concern was expressed by those present about the projected increase in local evictions that will occur after December 31 with the expiration of the rental housing eviction moratorium.

Mrs. Horn asked about the status of the 2020 subrecipient agreements for the City's public service activities and Ms Pickich apologized for the delay, indicating that they were still waiting for the PY2020 Grant Agreement from HUD, which had to be corrected

to adjust the allocation amount. She said the City hoped to receive the Grant Agreement in the next week so she can place the subrecipient agreements on an early January 2021 agenda for Council consideration.


Mr. Joplin then asked if actual City casino revenue sales tax collections were as high as projected for PY2019 or if COVID-19 had a negative impact on program income. Ms Pickich said that collections were back on track and that COVID-19's impact in that regard was not as bad as feared since the casinos were not closed as many days during the past ten months as some other local businesses.

Ms Pickich reminded those present that on-going information about the City's CDBG program is available on its website and invited everyone to check the CDBG Entitlement Program page for ongoing updates about CDBG-funded activities throughout each program year.

She also said that the City was working with the Mississippi Center for Justice and Biloxi Housing Authority to conduct a virtual fair housing workshop in January 2021 that also may include the option of a live public presentation, depending on COVID-19 at that time. Currently, state restrictions limit indoor meetings/gatherings to ten people.


There being no additional comments or questions, Ms. Pickich closed the hearing at 6:15 p.m.

NOTES:

Social Services:

These activities were to address high priority, unmet community needs identified during development of the 5-Year Consolidated Plan and 2019 Action Plan. Funds were budgeted to support four local social service agencies to prevent/address homelessness (Open Doors) and expand access to affordable, quality childcare services and youth education (Moore Community House, Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence children's education program; New Bethel/Believe Summer Youth Education Camp). Due to state requirements to prevent the spread of COVID19, one agency was not able to implement its CDBG-assisted program and others had to temporarily close or scale back services at various times during the program year.

Federal Capital Projects:

East BX E/W Neighborhood Access Road Project PHI - This Project will construct a continuous roadway, approximately 24 feet wide, on the north side of CSX Railroad from Dorries to Crawford Street. It will provide connections between neighborhoods to improve emergency response times. This will be a multi-year project. The project was bid out and construction began in May 2020 and is scheduled for completion in early spring 2021.

East Biloxi Façade Program- This program was designed to assist East Biloxi Businesses affected by the ongoing FEMA infrastructure road project in East Biloxi. After multiple outreach meetings and advertisements, no one applied for any grants through this program as of the end of the 2019 program year. The program is being discontinued and the unexpended funds will be reprogrammed during a PY20 Action Plan budget amendment.

John Henry Beck Park Restroom Project - This project constructed a much-needed restroom facility in a low- to moderate income neighborhood. This is a high usage park used daily by area residents and accommodates larger gatherings for holiday parades and special events. This project was completed in the summer of 2020.

Homeowner's Rehabilitation Program:

The City contributed \$25,000.00 in **General Funds** to Back Bay Mission to support renovation of three homes. The funds were used to purchase materials to bring the homes into compliance with electrical and plumbing codes; labor was provided by volunteers.

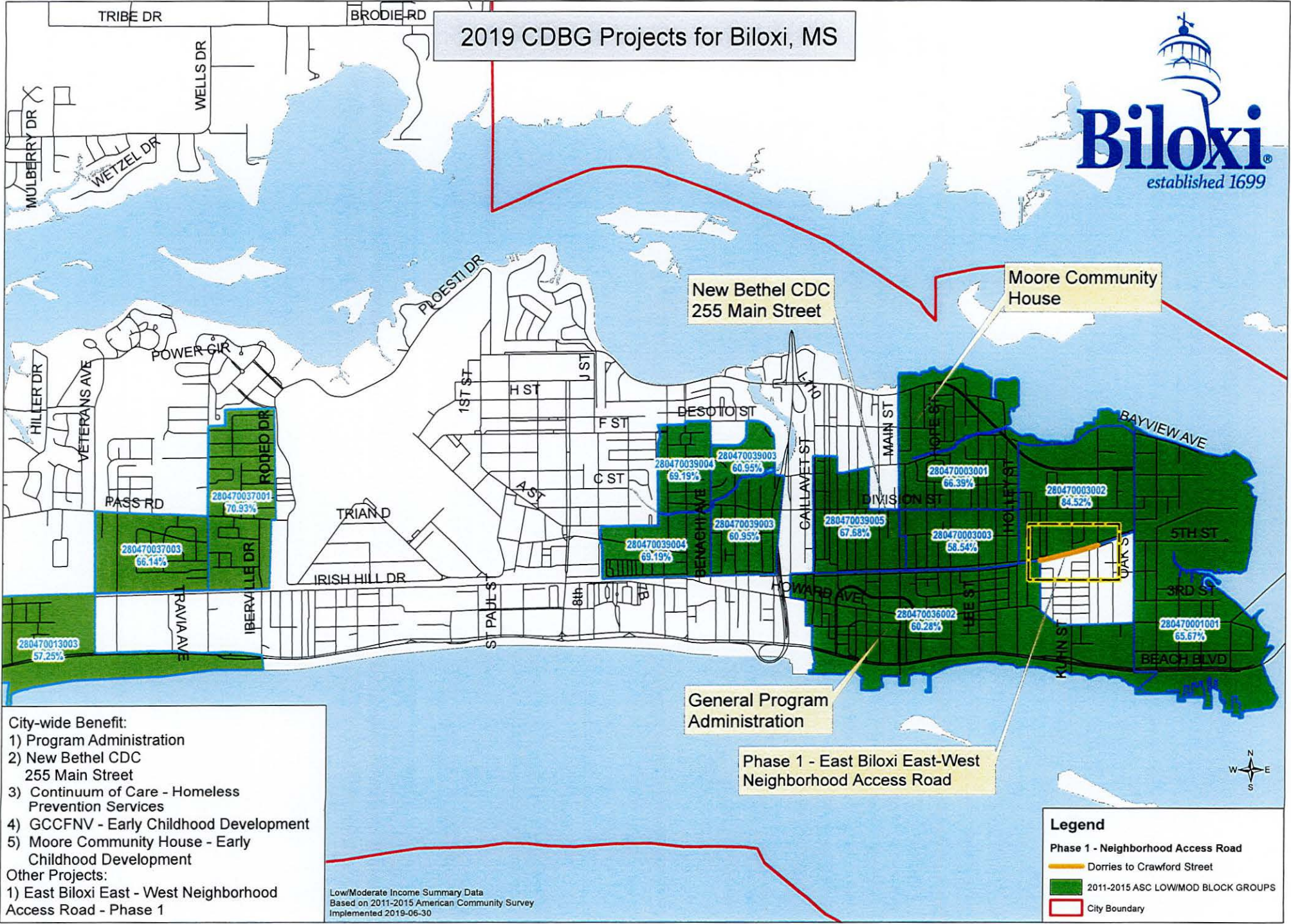
