You just never know what you're going to hear

Notes, quotes and anecdotes:

It's always interesting to see and hear what the voters have to say, and every so often a gem or two rises atop the mass of the great unwashed.

You expect the office seekers and certainly the office holder, at least in some cases, to have the gift of gab, the telekinetic image, quick with a quip, and comfortable in front of the unblinking camera.

But it's the residents, the taxpayers, the voters who sometimes have the most colorful of comments.

Weeks ago, a councilmember was announcing that the city's water bills were dropping slightly – yes, dropping – when a passionate citizen chimed in with a recurring question: "What's with this HCUA line on my bill? And how long am I going to have to pay that?"

The councilmember explained the debt service item, noted that Biloxi has the lowest rates of any city around, and asked rhetorically: "Do you know what they're paying in Ocean Springs?" (For the record, it's about



\$44 in Biloxi vs. about \$67 in Ocean Springs.)
But the resident wasn't having any of it.
Said he: "I don't care what they're paying in
Ocean Springs. I live in Biloxi."

Fewer than 1,700 of the city's 29,000 registered voters turned out for the primary elections the other day. One could find several reasons for the light turn out.

Only four wards were voting: Wards 1, 4, 5 and 6, but the biggest reason for the sparse turnout was the absence of a mayor's race.

A Biloxi mayor's race, a hotly contested mayor's race, generates as much as a half-million dollars in advertising, which generally engages the masses. In other words, people get out to vote.

Largest turnout for a municipal election in recent times goes back to 2001, when 9,966 turned out for Holloway vs. Gilich.

"FoFo" Gilich, as de facto head of the Slavonian Lodge, years ago was explaining to the assembled membership plans to pave for parking a grassy field next to the lodge building on Myrtle Street.

"What about the holes?" a member asked. Said the future mayor: "We'll pave those, too."

And then there was Jerry Morgan, the affable and seasoned director of the Public Works Department during the Holloway era.

"We've got a few street lights burned out on Highway 90," a councilmember observed one day during a meeting.

"Yes," Morgan said, "but only at night."

Memorable quotes:

"Give peace a chance," FoFo Gilich, on the desire, generally, to avoid lawsuits.

"We're healthy, not wealthy," A.J. Holloway, on city finances.

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'Iberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.

Candidates set for June 8 election

The party nominees have been established and balloting for the city's mayor and City Council takes place citywide on June 8 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Contested races are taking place in Wards 1, 2 and 5. Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich and Councilmembers



Dixie Newman of Ward 3, Robert L. Deming III of Ward 4, Kenny Glavan of Ward 6 and Nathan Barrett in Ward 7 appear on the ballot as unopposed.

Gilich, Newman and Barrett also were unopposed in the Republican primary and Deming and Glavan outpolled challengers. Democrats George Lawrence and Felix Gines faces challengers in the upcoming general election.

Polling places changes: Two polling places have changed for the 2021 municipal elections. In Ward 2, those who formerly voted at the Carl M. Ohr Fire Station No. 3 will now vote at the East Biloxi Senior Center, 461 Parker St. In Ward 7, those who formerly voted at the Woolmarket Fire Station No. 8 will now vote at the Woolmarket City Center, 13034 Kayleigh Cove.

Key dates: May 10 is the deadline to register to vote. June 5 is the last day for inperson absentee voting and the municipal clerk's office will be open from 8 a.m. to noon that day. And, of course, the election itself is June 8, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Golf carts get green light in neighborhoods

Low-speed vehicles such as golf carts will be allowed on Biloxi roadways that have a speed limit of 25 mph or less in a new city ordinance, and plans are in the offing to set up an inspection and permitting process in the Biloxi Police Department.

A few things to know up front: The lowspeed vehicles, which must be electric and travel no more than 25 mph, will not be allowed on major thoroughfares, such as U.S. 90, Pass Road or any other street where the speed limit is more than 25 mph.

"The biggest thing for people to know is that these carts must be street legal, inspected, insured and operated by a licensed driver," said Capt. Brian Dykes of the Biloxi Police Department. "You can't just let your kids hop in the cart and drive down the street to a friend's house. In fact, if that were to happen, both the unlicensed driver and their parents are subject to being

ticketed."

The move in April by the City Council

to OK the low-speed vehicles follows statewide enabling legislation to allow their limited use on public thoroughfares.

Although prohibited on busy streets, the carts will be allowed across certain streets with a speed limit higher than 25 mph, solely to cross by means of the shortest distance possible. No carts will be allowed south of U.S. 90.

The carts also must have lights, turn signals, reflectors, a parking brake, a windshield, exterior and rear-view mirrors, a horn, seatbelts and a VIN number.

Once all guidelines are in place, around mid- May, those seeking registration may visit the Lopez-Quave Public Safety Center at 170 Porter Ave., and pay a \$75 registration fee. Operators will receive a map showing legal operating areas, a decal and a registration number for their cart. Registration will be valid for one year.

Shuckers return to MGM Park on May 11

In 1995, Michael Jordan put out arguably the most famous two-word press release in history, simply announcing "I'm Back" in his return to the Chicago Bulls. During his time away from basketball, Jordan had spent the summer playing baseball for the Birmingham Barons, the team the Biloxi Shuckers will face to open up their season on May 4. So in the spirit of "His Airness," the Shuckers would like to make a slight modification for a release of their own:

We're Back.

Back in the ballpark getting ready for Opening Night at MGM Park on May 11. Back to the sights and sounds of the game that we love. And most importantly, back to that sound we all love: the roar of the crowd.

The 2021 season will look a little different than the previous five played in Biloxi. Instead of 140 games culminating on Labor Day, the Shuckers will play 120 games, stretching to September 19. Biloxi no longer plays in the Southern League, but instead the Double-A South. Hang with it for a while, we're pretty sure it's a working title.



The format of the league will be very similar to its predecessor. The Shuckers will play the Pensacola Blue Wahoos, the Mississippi Braves, and the Montgomery Biscuits. A lot, as a matter of fact. Seven of their 10 homestands during the campaign will be against those three teams. But the team will also play the Birmingham Barons, the Tennessee Smokies and yes, the Rocket City Trash Pandas, who will come storming into Biloxi from the Shuckers' old haunts in the Huntsville area.

It's highly likely that the Shuckers parent club, the Milwaukee Brewers, will send their

Brice Turang (2018) should start the season with the team, while former Mississippi State southpaw Ethan Small (2019) will either begin the season in Biloxi or arrive very quickly. And 2020 first-round pick Garrett Mitchell impressed in his debut at Spring Training with the Brewers and appears to be on a fast track through the organization.

The repairs to the ballpark sustained during Hurricane Zeta are nearing completion, and as a bonus for 2021, the right field video board at MGM Park is getting a makeover, with a new high-definition board going onto the structure that towers over the right-field berm.

And finally, the Shuckers are committed to providing a safe, clean and most importantly, fun environment for the 2021 season. Keep your eyes open for single game tickets and promotions, they are coming soon. 

Storm season expected to be an active one

The early prediction is in: The 2021 Atlantic hurricane season is forecast to be more active than usual, according to an outlook by the Colorado State University Tropical Meteorology Project.

The group predicts 17 named storms, eight hurricanes and four major hurricanes. A major hurricane is one that is a Category 3 or higher (115-plus-mph winds) on the Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Wind Scale.

Though the official Atlantic hurricane season runs from June through November, storms can occasionally develop outside those months, as was the case in the previous six seasons and 10 of the past 18

seasons since 2003. In 2020, Tropical storms Arthur and Bertha each formed in mid- to late May.

The CSU outlook is based on roughly 40 years of statistical factors combined with data from seasons exhibiting similar features of sea-level pressure and sea-surface temperatures in the

Atlantic and Eastern Pacific oceans.

Colorado State's forecast is in line with a prediction released in March by AccuWeather, the private forecasting service, which said to expect seven to 10 hurricanes, with three to five reaching major strength.

Early season forecasts have varied in accuracy. Last year Colorado State's April forecast called for eight hurricanes for a season that would produce 13. But the previous year, the April forecast was pretty close, predicting five hurricanes for a season that would produce six. And the year before that, the prediction called for seven hurricanes, and the season produced eight.

Forecasts released closer to the season's start date tend to be the most accurate. Colorado State and other forecasters will be releasing updated outlooks, including ones before the season's peak begins in August.

The 2020 season got off to an early and rapid start with a record nine named storms from May through July. It ended late, with two major hurricanes in November for the first time on record and at a time when the season



is normally winding down. The season was so active that the 21-name rotating list was exhausted and the Greek alphabet was used for only the second time (the first time was in 2005).

A record 11 storms made landfall in the U.S. in 2020, including six hurricanes: Hanna, Isaias, Laura, Sally, Delta and Zeta. That's well above the average of one to two hurricane landfalls each season, according to NOAA's Hurricane Research Division.

"We anticipate an above-average probability for major hurricanes making landfall along the continental United States coastline and in the Caribbean," said Phil Klotzbach of Colorado State. "As is the case with all hurricane seasons, coastal residents are reminded that it only takes one hurricane making landfall to make it an active season for them. They should prepare the same for every season, regardless of how much activity is predicted."

Despite the 2020 season, there isn't necessarily a strong correlation between the number of storms or hurricanes and U.S. landfalls in any given season. One or more of the 17 named storms predicted to develop this season could hit the U.S. or none at all. Some past hurricane seasons have been inactive but included at least one notable landfall.

The 1992 season produced only six named storms and one subtropical storm. However, one of those named storms was Hurricane Andrew, which devastated South Florida as a Category 5 hurricane.

No more Greek names, says naming organization

The World Meteorological Organization's Hurricane Committee, the group that comes up with the annual names of storms, has announced that the Greek alphabet will no longer be used because it creates a distraction from the communication of hazard and storm warnings and is potentially confusing.

The group, which said it would use a supplemental list of names A-Z (excluding Q, U, X, Y and Z), also announced it has retired the names Dorian (2019) and Laura, Eta and lota (2020) from the rotating lists of storm names.

The retired names are part of a list of 93 storm names that have been retired because the storms were so deadly or costly that using the name again would cause confusion. Typically, the list of names repeats every six years.

The 2020 season showed a number of shortcomings with the use of the Greek alphabet. In fact, the committee said, too much attention was focused on the Greek alphabet, detracting from the needed impact and safety messaging. Additionally, some Greek alphabet names caused confusion in translation into other languages, and the pronunciation of several of the Greek letters (Zeta, Eta, Theta) are similar and occur in succession. In 2020, this resulted in storms with similar sounding names occurring simultaneously.

The annual name list has been exhausted on two occasions during the past 15 years, and it is likely that this will occur again in the future.

The NCA will permit volunteers to place flags at gravesites while adhering to guidelines designed to limit exposure to and spread of COVID-19, however, Biloxi National Cemetery staff will host a small wreath-laying



ceremony for invited guests.

I encourage each of you to watch this on the GCVHCS' Facebook page. Other ways our community can become involved in Memorial Day events include visiting the Veterans Legacy Memorial (VLM) page, https://www.vlm.cem. va.gov/.

This wonderful project was launched in 2019 and contains basic information such as dates of birth and death, military branch, rank held, conflicts in which the Veteran served, and highest decoration received. The site also includes headstone/marker photographs and mapped locations for many Veterans' graves, with more being added every day. Only Veterans or Servicemembers interred in a VA national cemetery have a VLM page.

Last year, family, friends, and visitors gained the ability to leave "Tributes" or comments on a Veteran's personal page. This year, visitors to VLM will be able to submit photos and biographical summaries of a Veteran's life, along with historical documents such as award citations, letters, and newspaper clippings. Another feature will allow visitors to follow their Veteran's page and receive email alerts when new content is posted.

If you're again unable to physically visit a VA National Cemetery this Memorial Day due to the pandemic or any other reason, using VLM is a virtual respectful way to honor your Veteran.





Sixth Street South





Water Mains to be installed as of April 15, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Sewer




Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage

Biloxi native snags Grammy

"Behind every Beyonce, Chaka Kahn and Luther Vandross, there was a music teacher," says Dr. Jeffrey Murdock, a Biloxi native and 1999 Biloxi High School graduate, and at this year's Grammy Awards, the Biloxian had his moment to step out front. Murdock, associate professor of Music Education at the U of Arkansas, was named Music Educators Grammy award winner.



Della McCaughan: She uncovered the Keegan's Bayou mullet mystery

Leave it to Errol Bradley, the world-class raconteur, to have a great Della McCaughan memory.

McCaughan, who died Feb. 4 at the age of 92, was a teacher in the Biloxi Public School System for 44 years,

and, according to her obituary, was the first person in the nation to teach marine biology at the high school level. Additionally, she wrote the first textbook to be used for that purpose.

Says Bradley, a former McCaughan
pupil: "There was an issue back in the
day over at Keegan's Bayou, you know,
the bayou right next to the Keegan's Bayou Wastewater
Treatment Plant.

"The local fisherman and residents were concerned about the mullet in the bayou," Bradley recalls. "They were jumping into pilings, jumping on piers. It was not a normal mullet jump. They were very erratic.

"So they did some investigating, and they called in the renowned marine biologist Della McCaughan. She did some study and came to the conclusion that the mullet had toilet paper over their eyes."





The views change, but diamonds are forever

While traveling through Biloxi's highways, waterways, and sidewalks, we often encounter that recurring question: "What used to be on this spot or how did that come about?" Many tourists, residents, and previous Keesler airmen frequent the Local History and Genealogy Department trying to figure out what was where, where was what, and how did that happen Back in the Day.



Batter Up Biloxi

May 4 marks the return of this year's long awaited Shuckers baseball games at the MGM Park. Although previous Shuckers games began a little earlier, the COVID-19 restrictions prompted a little delay in the current season.

It all began back in 2014, when a Minor League Baseball team set its sights on Biloxi,

Miss. Then in November of that same year, a name for Biloxi's minor league baseball team was formally announced at the Saenger Theatre amid much fanfare and celebration. The winner had been selected from six finalists. Shuckers was the winning name!

But, why do we call our team "The Shuckers"? What's a shucker, anyway? Back in the Day, Biloxi's shoreline was once lined with seafood factories where hard-working families provided the labor force for the harvesting, processing, and exportation of our renowned scrumptious seafood.

Abundantly found in waters along our shoreline, oysters provide not only food for our own residents, but produced an industry that was desired worldwide. Fisherman would board their boats such as white-winged schooners, and ply the waters for seafood. Their bounties were sold fresh to locals or taken to canneries which provided an additional method by preservation for our seafood products.

Thus, in 1903, Biloxi was lauded with the title "The Seafood Capital of the World." Factory workers prepared popular seafood which included shrimp, crabs, and oysters. The shuckers were the oyster industry workers who carefully pried open the hard shells of the harvested bivalve mollusks with special knives, a technique which is still used today.

Flourishing hotels

The roaring 20s was a great time for American economy on the Coast. The Tivoli Hotel to the east and the Edgewater Gulf Hotel to its west (all along U.S. 90) were built during that decade, just before the depression and the stock market troubles.

Other thriving hotels during that decade included the Avalez, the White House Hotel, and the Hotel Biloxi. Travelers had several options for transportation: the motor car, the pleasure boat, and the popular train. With Biloxi's nearby train depot, harbor, and improved Beach Boulevard, travelers had easy access to our famous hotel destinations.

Buena Vista

Before the days of downtown Biloxi Baseball, the square block was occupied by a famous hotel: The Buena Vista, Spanish for good view, was a massive hotel designed in 1923 by Biloxi's own Carl Matthes.

Mr. Matthes's original design drawings depicts a grand four-story concrete structure with a basement. (Imagine a basement in south Mississippi!) He even designed a little penthouse on top the roof.

Following the Spanish motif, the original architectural plans show detailed archways for both windows and doorways throughout the hotel. The lot size of the complex was described as 165 feet by 400 feet in depth and included a greenhouse for nurturing its special plants on the north side.

Perfectly matched grained wooden pine

floors were found throughout the hotel along with "easy chairs," cozy fireplaces, and rugs to provide warmth in the winter months. This amazing flooring provided an astounding opportunity for dancing which was accompanied by live orchestras.

The Buena Vista Hotel complex also included residences for workers as well as a covered garage.

Opening day for the Buena Vista Hotel was July 4, 1924 with a budget of \$400,000. Special amenities complimented the tourist's yearn for comfort and pleasure, such as a barber shop, a pool, and a walking pier jutting out from the beachfront just south of the hotel property.

Legend has it that this hotel hosted tremendous opportunities for gambling. Even though laws then didn't permit gambling, folks arrived from miles around to take their chances.

For a short time, iconic Jazz clarinetist Pete Fountain (Pierre Dewey LaFontaine Jr., July 3, 1930 – August 6, 2016), was once an owner of the Buena Vista Hotel.

One famous section of the hotel was the Marine Room, remembered for its cocktail lounge and dancing venue.

The Buena Vista often hosted gatherings for large conventions and competitions. The annual Miss Hospitality beauty contest was held at the hotel, complete with interviews, judging, special luncheons, and parties.

The location of the hotel did not protect it from hurricanes. Pictures back in the day show debris piles lacing the Buena Vista's property. Keeping with Biloxi's resiliency, the forces of nature did not halt prosperity. Instead, after each hurricane, clean-ups and repairs went underway quickly and progress continued.

A closer look at postcards and photos show an added feature to this property: a television antenna. There were no cell towers then, for sure! Years ago, WLOX-TV actually transmitted its signal live from the Buena Vista property.

The life of this fine facility changed over time. It was utilized into the 1980s. In 1991, a mysterious fire destroyed much of the main building. Soon after that, in 1992, gambling was legalized, and the property began a new evolution.

The buildings were torn down in 1993 to make way for ultra-modern gambling and entertainment venues.

Since its opening in 1999 the Beau Rivage Resort and Casino has occupied the area where the south side of the old Buena Vista hotel once thrived; while our MGM Park proudly continues to entertain guests where the original Spanish-style Buena Vista hotel designed by Carl Matthes once stood.

Looking Up

Biloxi has recently added two new overhead pedestrian walkways crossing over Hwy. 90. This feature is not new to the area. As the Buena Vista hotel grew and expanded south of the highway, a similar walkway was added to provide a safer, more picturesque way to walk from the northern to the southern side of its Buena Vista properties.
