

So the mayor and emergency managers knew it was going to be a significant storm. Hurricane-force winds would push a storm surge ashore, inundating streets in low-lying areas and possibly even enter homes on Point Cadet.

Police cars slowly drove streets in East Biloxi neighborhoods and in Eagle Point,

blaring the news: Evacuate now before the winds pick up and the water begins to rise.

"I'm OK," the Point Cadet resident said from his front yard in the light rain. "The Lord will take care of me."

The rainfall persisted for hours. Water began to rise, just as expected, and the mayor dispatched the city's swift water teams to Point Cadet and Eagle Point, north of the Bay. On foot and pulling small skiffs, the crews made their way through the

foot-deep water covering the streets. Winds howled and wind-blown water stung the uncovered face.

They arrived at a home and knocked on the door. "The water's going to continue to rise, and the winds are going to get worse," they pleaded: "Please get in our skiff and let us take you to safety."

"No," the resident said. "Thank you for coming out, but the Lord is going to take care of me."

So they moved on.

Later in the day, before the sun set and before the final push of water came ashore, the mayor dispatched the city helicopter to Point Cadet and Eagle Point, as streets were impassible.

There was the resident, sitting atop his roof, with the home, the entire neighborhood, in three feet of water. Debris floated by.

"Grab the rope ladder," they hollered from the helicopter. "We'll take

"No," the resident said. "I'll be OK, the water will go down and the Lord will take care of me."

Hours later, with water at five feet and winds whipping, the resident climbed into the attic and pushed through a roof top vent. He took refuge on the rooftop. In the gusty winds and rain.

Finally, he looked upward, "Lord, why has thou forsaken me?"

And the reply came: "I've sent a police car, a boat and a helicopter. What are you waiting for?"

It was a story told a time or two years ago. True dat? Not really. The city does not

The Lord will protect you? Remember what they say: God helps those who help themselves. Do your part. Read the advice. Heed the advice. Seize the opportunities.



2021: Biloxi's 'secret' has been discovered

Biloxi's casino industry shattered all gaming records for a single month in April 2021.

Gross gaming revenue is net income on which

casino's pay taxes each month.



Biloxi's eight casinos generated \$111 million in gross gaming revenue according to state records, eclipsing a \$105 million record set in July 2007. In fact, in the 29-year history of legalized gaming in Biloxi, only four times has gross gaming income exceeded \$100 million for a single

month. It was the best April ever - by 30 percent.

I have been monitoring the jumps in monthly gross gaming income from \$71 million in February, to \$92 million in March and now \$111 million for April.

Also, right along with April gross gaming income is a near record sales tax revenue we just received, \$1.222 million. The record for a single month was August 2016, \$1.24 million.

These are astounding numbers, particularly at this time, in these early months of 2021 after everything Biloxi and our Coast battled through in 2020 and considering that our gaming industry was not even at full throttle yet.

Numbers don't lie and everyone needs to reach

their own conclusions. No matter why they came or however they got here, from wherever they came, the fact is... that they got here. The result was great... and we expect them back in the future. We have always proclaimed that if a visitor comes to Biloxi once, our product will sell itself.

I'm not in the prediction business, especially now. In 2019 Biloxi's GGR hit \$903 million, not a record, but pushing it. About a year ago at the State of City address, I exclaimed how good everyone should feel about 2020. We were truly on a roll from the start of fiscal year in October 2019 until March 2020 when the COVID-19 pandemic brought it all to a trickle. At least in my mind, we were on track to have a billion-dollar year.

We carried on through many of the challenges of 2020, you know them all. And now as a result, Biloxi is positioned better than ever before to move into the future and achieve its destiny.

The Innovation Group, a gaming industry consulting company, has been working in Biloxi for three decades. Company President Michael Soll noted that there is more to it than Biloxi's record high revenue mark after the coronavirus closures. Soll said: "The real story in Biloxi is the long-term resilience of the market, which has been proven time and time again. It's the result of its hybrid position as a convenient regional market with destination-caliber offerings and amenities.

No doubt much attention will be forthcoming to the Biloxi offerings in gaming, tourism and its

The party nominees have been established and balloting for the city's mayor and City Council takes place citywide on June 8 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Contested races are taking place in Wards 1, 2 and 5. Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich and Councilmembers Dixie Newman of Ward 3, Robert L. Deming III of Ward 4, Kenny

Glavan of Ward 6 and Nathan Barrett in Ward 7 appear on the ballot as unopposed.

Gilich, Newman and Barrett also were unopposed in the Republican primary and Deming and Glavan outpolled challengers. Democrats George Lawrence and Felix Gines

faces challengers in the upcoming general election.

Polling places changes: Two polling places have changed for the 2021 municipal elections. In Ward 2, those who formerly voted at the Carl M. Ohr Fire Station No. 3 will now vote at the East Biloxi Senior Center, 461 Parker St. In Ward 7, those who formerly voted at the Woolmarket Fire Station No. 8 will now vote at the Woolmarket City Center, 13034 Kayleigh Cove.

Key dates: May 10 was the deadline to register to vote. June 5 is the last day for in-person absentee voting and the municipal clerk's office will be open from 8 a.m. to noon that day. And, of course, the election itself is June 8, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.







It's a matter of prioritizing Veteran Health Care and Safety

Our health care teams at the Gulf Coast Veterans Health Care System in Biloxi, Mobile, Pensacola, Eglin and Panama City Beach

have earned Veterans trust, working on the frontlines to provide care to those most in need. We began implementing safety measures over a year ago to protect Veterans and our staff from getting sick. As part of prioritizing safety, for each appointment we've had to weigh the

options and risks with



our patients. When clinical urgency rose above the risk of COVID-19, we provided in person care. When it did not and the risk of COVID-19 infection took priority, we offered alternatives.

We successfully moved many appointments to video and telephone when appropriate and helped meet the needs of the Veteran. This has even offered unexpected benefits



of convenience for Veterans or additional engagement options for family and caregivers. Unlike with in-person care, virtual options give a Veteran's support network the ability to join visits and engage with VA providers much more easily. We anticipate continuing to offer virtual visits even as we return to more in-person care.

As we move forward, we are welcoming Veterans back in record numbers. We are encouraging Veterans to call first and talk to their health care team about coming in for routine and preventative care. These appointments, from cancer screenings to eye exams, are essential to staying healthy. As our community spread of COVID-19 has decreased over the past few months, many have already resumed their care, while others have begun scheduling appointments for the weeks ahead, either within the VA or when eligible, in the community.

I want you to know that the GCVHCS is

Think ahead on evacuations, storm shelters

One of the toughest decisions that residents may have to make when a storm approaches is whether they should evacuate their property and possessions for either a local shelter or out-of-town accommodations.

Depending on the severity of the storm, that decision can be made for those in lowlying areas: Local authorities may order a mandatory evacuation.

In Harrison County, as many as 10 hurricane shelters can be activated in times of peril. A shelter should be refuge of last resort, but residents need to be aware of several factors if they are considering seeking refuge in a shelter.

The decision to open a shelter is usually based on the intensity of a storm and where it is expected to make landfall. Local Emergency Management leaders make the decision to open shelters in coordination with the American Red Cross, and the public is notified through the media.

The shelter sites can vary from year to year and storm to storm.

"The type of weather event, the direction of a storm and rising tides are just a couple of the factors that go into activating a shelter," says Biloxi Emergency Manager Nicholaus Geiser, a battalion chief in the Biloxi Fire Department. "The number and location of shelters that are needed to be activated during an event, also have to be considered."

If you think you may seek refuge in a shelter, some points to consider:

- · Bring enough food and water for at least the first day.
- · Bring your own blankets and other personal needs. Cots cannot be guaranteed.
- · No pets at typical shelters (check with the local humane society); no firearms, alcohol or tobacco products are allowed.
- Public transit systems buses and taxis will stop operating when sustained winds reach 35 mph.
- · If you have an infant, bring an adequate supply of diapers and formula.
- If you or a member of your family is on a special diet, bring the necessary food.
- If you are on prescription medication, try to have a two-week supply of medication.

If you're thinking about evacuating, be familiar with evacuation routes. Traffic may be delayed by bridges opening to marine traffic. Bridges, by the way, will not open for marine traffic when sustained winds reach 35 mph.

And, finally, if you encounter a flooded roadway - in times of peril or on a typical day, remember the oft-repeated advice:

"Turn around, don't drown."



Names to remember – or forget – in 2021

Who's to say there's not another Camille, Katrina or even Zeta in the group? Which name will gain notoriety this year, or merely be lost to the ages? There's no telling at this point, which is why preparation is the key.

Those points notwithstanding, here's the lineup of storm names for the 2021 Hurricane Season, which runs from June 1 to Nov. 30:

Don't expect to see the names Katrina, Camille, Isidore, Gustav, Nate or a host of others used in the future. The World Meteorological Organization, which creates the list of names, has been known to

repeat a name after seven years, but the aforementioned Katrina and Co. have been deemed so deadly or costly they're retired, to avoid confusion or insensitivity.

And the common denominator among Katrina, Camille, Isidore, Gustav and Nate? They all caused damage in Biloxi.

By the way, if the list of names is exhausted this year, as it was in the record-setting 2020, names will be pulled from a supplemental list, not the Greek alphabet. The Greek alphabet, meteorologists said of the 2020 season, was confusing and a distraction.

What you can expect to see when a storm threatens

This hurricane season, expect to see a regular flow of updates and information, all prepared by a coordinated team. This team includes the National Hurricane Center, the local National Weather Service office, and Emergency Management officials at the state, county, and city level. Here are some planning times to remember, recognizing each storm is unique:

- Up to 5 days in advance The National Hurricane Center regularly issues Tropical Weather Outlooks, indicating any tropical disturbances and their probability of developing over the next 5 days. If a disturbance is forecast in our area, closely monitor the situation and be prepared to adjust normal activities.
- 3 or more days prior (72+ hours before arrival) When a storm has developed or is expected to develop, the National Hurricane Center will issue Tropical Cyclone Advisories every 6 hours. If Biloxi is in the probability cone, expect to receive guidance from local emergency management officials.
- 2 days prior (48 hours before arrival) When storm conditions are expected within 48 hours, the National Hurricane Center will issue a Tropical Storm Watch or a Hurricane Watch. At this point, local governments will usually announce any decisions on closures of government facilities, and could also issue orders for evacuation of one or more evacuation zones. Most local businesses will implement their business continuity plans, adjusting their services or operating hours.
- 1½ days prior (36 hours before arrival) When storm conditions are expected within 36 hours, the National Hurricane Center will issue a Tropical Storm Warning or a Hurricane Warning. At this point, local governments will usually announce any decisions on community shelters, and could also issue orders for a curfew. Many local businesses will close early for the safety of customers and employees. Everyone should complete storm prep activities, and should proceed to a safe location for protection from weather impacts.
- What you can do now Don't wait until a tropical depression or hurricane is in the Gulf to begin preparing. There are steps you can take now. See the list on Page 14.
- Sign up for B-Alert by texting BILOXI to 99411. You'll get advisories via text messages.
- To see evacuation zones and evacuation routes, see map on Page 13.
- Information also will be available via city Bmail (sign up at biloxi.ms.us), and through a recorded message on the City of Biloxi Storm Info Line: 228-435-6300.

It's illegal to sweep lawn clippings into the street

Chances are, you've seen it done or even done it yourself: You cut your lawn, rake up the trimmings and pile them near the curb in front of your home. Or, you'll sweep the trimmings into the street, where you hope they'll be carried away by the wind.

These two scenarios result in one of the biggest causes of flooding in the city – blocked storm drains.

These careless or unthinking actions negate the millions of dollars in improvements that the city is making citywide to drainage systems.

Piling leaves at the curb or sweeping trimmings into the street means that they will eventually find their way into the city's storm drains. Either bag the leaves for pickup or compost them. A stopped-up storm drain or ditch cannot carry run-off water as it is intended to do. When it rains, that water can flood streets, your property or your neighbor's property.

It's actually a violation of city ordinance to dump any material into storm drains, ditches,

culverts, streams or waterways (Sec. 9-1-15, Code of Ordinances, 1992).

Be sure to get a building permit before construction

When you or a licensed contractor make repairs or alterations to your property, those repairs should be in compliance with established building codes. This ensures that

Contractors must have city license

Property owners are warned to beware of transient contractors who typically set up shop in the wake of disasters such as a major hurricane or tornado.

Ask to see the person's City of Biloxi license card, which is required to do business in this city.

Do not pay any money in advance. Do not sign any contracts. And do not pay any money until the work has been inspected and approved by a city inspector.

If you have any questions or concerns, call the Community Development Department at 228-435-6280. work is up to code and will be able to withstand most weather conditions.

To make sure that your plans are within code, a building permit must be obtained from the City of Biloxi Building Division before you build, alter, re-grade or fill on your property. New buildings in the floodplain must be protected from flood damage. Biloxi's building code requires that new buildings must be elevated to the base flood elevation, plus 1 foot.

The code also requires all additions and 'substantial' improvements or repairs from damage to a building be treated as new construction. A substantial improvement or repair is one in which the value of an addition, alteration, repair or reconstruction project exceeds 50 percent of the total value of the existing building.

Registration is easy: Your name, address, phone number and any special needs. You'll get all of the info you need.



Federal agencies encourage residents to use direct deposit

In those critical days after Hurricane Katrina, the U.S. Treasury Department worked with the Social Security Administration to get displaced Social Security and other federal benefit checks to recipients, as quickly as possible.

But those who already were using direct deposit had immediate access to their funds from virtually anywhere, thanks to ATMs and financial institution networks.

That's why the Treasury and the Federal Reserve Banks – through Go Direct – are urging Social Security check recipients who live along the Gulf Coast to switch to direct deposit.

The recommendation, offered in light of devastating hurricanes, is aimed at ensuring citizens receive their federal benefits without disruption.


The National Weather Service monitors hurricane and storm activity, and issues official bulletins to local and regional TV and radio stations. Since television coverage may be interrupted by power outages, you should also have a battery-operated radio to follow emergency advisories. It is vital that you monitor these weather broadcasts, especially as a storm approaches.

Additionally, the City of Biloxi relays vital information on a regular basis. The current temperature, conditions and forecast are displayed 24/7 at the top corner of the city's website at biloxi.ms.us.

What to do and when to do it

Before a hurricane approaches or NOW

Plan an evacuation route.

 Review the evacuation route by clicking on the Evacuation Map link in the Storm and Flood Preparedness section of the city website. Determine the safest evacuation route for you. Be ready to drive 20 to 50 miles inland to locate a safe place.

Prepare a storm kit that includes the following items:

- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Portable, battery-operated radio and extra batteries
- First-aid kit and manual
- Duct tape
- Emergency food and water (at least one gallon of water per person per day for three to seven days; non-perishable packaged or canned food and juices; paper plates and plastic utensils; cooking tools)
- · Non-electric can opener
- Essential medicines
- · Cash and credit cards
- Sturdy shoes

- Fully charged cell phone
- Store important papers in a waterproof container or resealable plastic bag. Among the important documents: insurance, medical records, bank account numbers, Social Security card, etc.

Make arrangements for pets.

 Pets are not allowed in typical emergency shelters for health and space reasons. Contact your local humane society for information on local animal shelters.

Make sure that all family members know how to respond after a hurricane.

- Teach family members how and when to turn off gas, electricity, and water.
- Teach children how and when to call 9-1-1, police, or fire department and which radio station to tune to for emergency information.
- Protect your windows.
- Permanent shutters are the best protection. A lower cost approach is to put up plywood panels. Use 1/2 inch plywood – marine plywood is best – cut to fit

each window. Remember to mark which board fits which window. Pre-drill holes every 18 inches for screws. Do this long before the storm.

Trim back dead or weak branches from trees. Check into flood insurance.

 You can find out about the National Flood Insurance Program through your local insurance agent or emergency management office. There is normally a 30-day waiting period before a new policy becomes effective. Homeowners polices do not cover damage from the flooding that accompanies a hurricane.

Develop an emergency communication plan.

- In case family members are separated from one another during a disaster (a real possibility during the day when adults are at work and children are at school), have a plan for getting back together.
- Ask an out-of-state relative or friend to serve as the "family contact." After a disaster, it's often easier to call long distance. Make sure everyone in the family knows the name, address, and phone number of the contact person.

What to do and when to do it

DURING A HURRICANE WATCH

(A Hurricane Watch is issued when there is a threat of hurricane conditions within 24-36 hours.)

- Listen to a battery-operated radio or television for hurricane progress reports.
- · Check emergency supplies.
- Fuel car.
- Bring in outdoor objects such as lawn furniture, toys, and garden tools and anchor objects that cannot be brought inside.
- Secure buildings by closing and boarding up windows. Remove outside antennas.
- Turn refrigerator and freezer to coldest settings.
 Open only when absolutely necessary and close quickly.
- Store drinking water in clean bathtubs, jugs, bottles, and cooking utensils.
- Store valuables and personal papers in a waterproof container on the highest level of your home.
- Review evacuation plan.
- Moor boat securely or move it to a designated safe place.
- Take pre-storm pictures of house and contents.

DURING A HURRICANE WARNING

(A Hurricane Warning is issued when hurricane conditions – winds of 74 mph or greater, or dangerously high water and rough seas – are expected in 24 hours or less.)

- Listen constantly to a battery-operated radio or television for official instructions.
- If in a mobile home, check tiedowns and evacuate immediately.
- Bring outside pets inside and provide shelter for farm animals.
- · Avoid elevators.
- If at home:
 - Stay inside, away from windows, skylights, and



glass doors.

- Keep a supply of flashlights and extra batteries handy. Avoid open flames, such as candles and kerosene lamps, as a source of light.
- If power is lost, turn off major appliances to reduce power "surge" when electricity is restored.
- If officials indicate evacuation is necessary:
 - Leave as soon as possible. Avoid flooded roads and watch for washed-out bridges.
 - Secure your home by unplugging appliances and turning off electricity and the main water valve.
 - Tell someone outside of the storm area where you are going.
 - If time permits, and you live in an identified surge zone, elevate furniture to protect it from flooding or better yet, move it to a higher floor.
 - Take pre-assembled emergency supplies, warm protective clothing, blankets and sleeping bags to shelter.
 - Lock up home and leave.

AFTER THE STORM

- · Stay tuned to local radio for information.
- · Help injured or trapped persons.
- Give first aid where appropriate.
- Do not move seriously injured persons unless they are in immediate danger of further injury. Call for help.
- Return home only after authorities advise that it is safe to do so.
- · Avoid loose or dangling power lines and report

- them immediately to the power company, police, or fire department.
- Enter your home with caution. Beware of snakes, insects, and animals driven to higher ground by flood water
- Open windows and doors to ventilate and dry your home.
- Check refrigerated foods for spoilage; if electricity is off, keep refrigerator and freezer closed as much as possible.
- Take pictures of the damage, both of the house and its contents for insurance claims.
- Drive only if absolutely necessary and avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges. Refrain from sightseeing.
- · Use telephone only for emergency calls.
- Inspecting utilities in a damaged home:
 - Check for gas leaks. If you smell gas or hear blowing or hissing noise, open a window and quickly leave the building. Turn off the gas at the outside main valve if you can and call the gas company from a neighbor's home. If you turn off the gas for any reason, it must be turned back on by a professional.
 - Look for electrical system damage. If you see sparks or broken or frayed wires, or if you smell hot insulation, turn off the electricity at the main fuse box or circuit breaker. If you have to step in water to get to the fuse box or circuit breaker, call an electrician first for advice.
 - Check for sewage and water lines damage. If you suspect sewage lines are damaged avoid using the toilets and call a plumber. If water pipes are damaged, contact the water company and avoid the water from the tap. You can obtain safe water by melting ice cubes.
- Generally, utility companies restore services lost during major storm events first to public service providers, such as hospitals, water systems and public safety agencies.



A few words about this map

Much has been made and said about the federal government's current flood elevations, which went into effect in Biloxi in May 2009.

While much of the focus has been on the height of construction, this maps shows the significant increase in the size of the flood zone. For instance, nearly all of Point Cadet, the eastern tip of the Biloxi peninsula, is now in a flood zone, as is Eagle Point in north Biloxi.

Completed elevation certificates are available from the city's Community Development Department or on the city's website, biloxi.ms.us.

Where to turn for help

The Community Development Department is here to help minimize the risk you face from storms and flooding. If you are having flooding problems, advice is available to help you resolve your flooding issues. To make an appointment, contact Floodplain Manager Rick Stickler at 228-435-6270 or rstickler@biloxi.ms.us.



Sixth Street South

Lane Construction in October 2019 began a \$10.5 million, 550-day project to install new water, sewer and drainage lines in a Point Cadet area south of the CSX railway. It involves three miles of roads, from the tip of the peninsula at Michael Boulevard, south to Third Street and west to Hoxie. Deadline: April 16, 2021 August, 14, 2021. Extension primarily because of inclement weather.










St. Michael 1 & 2


Necaise Brothers Construction Water

Water Mains to be installed as of May 21, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Sewer

Sewer Mains to be installed as of May 21, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage

Drainage Mains to be installed as of May 21, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Pavement Roads to be paved as of May 21, 2021



- 1/3 cup of kosher salt
- 1/3 cup of coarse black pepper
- 1 tbsp. of granulated garlic
- 1 tbsp. of granulated onion
- 1 tbsp of fancy paprika
- 1/2 tbsp. of dark chili powder



Instructions:

Mix ingredients together. Next, rub onto your meat, use your hands to rub it all over every surface of the brisket. You can do this right before you cook the meat, or let the rub sit on the meat for up to 24 hours.



Biloxi's BROADWATER Memories

One of the most popular tourist spots along our Biloxi shoreline was the Broadwater

In fact, in the old days, its address was not in Biloxi. The property actually sat between the then city limits of Biloxi and Gulfport. In 1940,

Biloxi.

ads guided hotel visitors to four miles west of Biloxi and seven miles east of Gulfport. It wasn't until the 1960s annexation that the Broadwater was christened with an official Biloxi address. The exact location of this resort can be imaged to be between the Southern Memorial Park Cemetery and the Beauvoir properties.

The Broadwater was built in the late 1930s by Pete Martin Sr., a well-known gambler of the time. He opened the \$250,000, Art Deco style hotel in August 1939 and called it the Sea View. Soon after its opening law enforcement officials hauled off illegal casino gambling tables.

Back in those days, the fast-speed interstate highway system had not yet been built, and tourists would travel to and from the Broadwater via U.S. Hwy. 90 and passenger train. U.S. 90, then, was a simple two-lane highway. Later in 1962, the Broadwater offered free transportation within its 33-acre property via an eight-car circus train.

The original property had 66 rooms with a few cottages on the grounds. There was also a 600-foot fishing pier with a dancing pavilion, barber and beauty shops and a snack bar.

In 1958, the Broadwater Beach Hotel was sold for \$100,000 at a public auction to Joe

W. Brown, a native of Texas whose fortune was acquired from racehorses, gambling, and oil.


At that time, the Broadwater Beach occupied a tract of 27 ½ acres and had about only 25 rooms with 25 additional motel apartments adjacent to the hotel. In 1958, the Broadwater was a three-story structure and had a modern restaurant and lounge, which was originally constructed in 1939.

Mr. Brown passed away a year after the purchase and his widow, Dorothy Brown, spent millions on property renovation, \$3 million on the marina alone. In fact, its first vessel, The Broadwater, slid into its berth in August 1964.


The main building was expanded, riding stables and tennis courts where added and later came a swimming pool and golf course.

The Broadwater's golf course was first known as the Great Southern, the same name as the famous Gulfport course. So, Mrs. Brown retitled it the "Sea Course."

The grand resort with its playground atmosphere remained a popular destination until the late 1980s. After nearly a decade of decline, the property was sold to John. E.







Connelly of Pittsburg and his company, the President Casino Corporation in 1992. The President Casino Broadwater Resort was then opened aboard a riverboat docked at the Broadwater Resort Marina in August 1992.

Special delivery

At 6:55 p.m. on Wednesday, July 27, 1966 elected officials along with Broadwater managers and personnel greeted a long-awaited delivery truck from Jackson, Miss. According to a Louisiana newspaper, Broadwater manager T. M. Dorsett eagerly

sampled the first serving of legal liquor: scotch over ice fizzed in with a little soda. For 58

years, since 1908, that

liquor had been illegal in this state. The official ribbon cutting for this special event was assisted by Biloxi Mayor Daniel Guice and County Supervisor Laz Quave.

The special delivery truck was escorted by a sheriff's car with flashing lights. Initially only two cases of the special liquid were unloaded at the front door. The remaining boxes traveled in the truck to the rear of the facility.

Soon followed, was the long lines for applications for retail sales licensing via the State of Mississippi. There was a warning out that anyone dodging the State's official licensing process would automatically be ineligible for legalized approval!

Broadcasting live

Back in the day, there were no flat-screen TVs or digital music and videos. Radio was the outlet for news and entertainment.

In 1950, radio station WVMI became affiliated with the Progressive Broadcasting System and began broadcasting at its new studio located at the Broadwater.

On Sunday, November 26, 1950 WVMI broadcast its inaugural program which included such stars as Bob Hope, Peggy Lee, and Eddie Cantor. A typical Sunday WVMI programming schedule in the 1950s from the Broadwater Hotel would feature several religious events, including an African American Baptist Choir, and a mass from St. Michael's Church on Point Cadet. Later in the day, the Sammy Kay Orchestra, Wayne King, and The Guy Lombardo Orchestra could be heard over its airwayes.

In 1953, WVMI radio station was touted to be the Mississippi Gulf Coast's Most Powerful Radio Station.

Movie time

In 2014, a joint project by WYES-TV and the Joe W. and Dorothy Dorsett Brown Foundation compiled a popular unique documentary, "Biloxi Memories and the Broadwater Beach Hotel" which aired as a TV documentary. It not only featured the famous Broadwater Beach Hotel, but it also included interviews, pictures, maps, and the unique history of Biloxi.

This documentary was so impressive that the producer/director/writer of this film, Barbara Sillery, was inspired to write an amazing book: "Biloxi Memories" featuring popular topics in

Biloxi's history, such as George E. Ohr, Queen Ixolib, Biloxi's Hermit, and even Gus, Elvis, and Jayne.

A monster visitor

In spite of its durable buildings and adjacent sturdy President Casino barge, Hurricane

Katrina did not spare this memorable icon. Not only was the famous marina and hotel destroyed, but this monstrous,



unwelcomed "lady" also carried the giant President Casino gambling boat to a new location, three-fourths of a mile northwest of its original spot. Imagine that!

A new life

Recently, the City of Biloxi received great news of plans to revitalize the old Broadwater location. This \$1.5 billion music-themed project is expected to feature a plethora of music, a hotel, golfing, spa, and other added amenities.

Mayor FoFo Gilich was quoted as saying: "Music and entertainment has always been a part of Biloxi's DNA."

This new project with its amazing location and ultra-modern features will be perfectly themed to continue Biloxi's tradition of its successful entertainment and gambling past.
