

Public pier courting yet another legal battle

It looks like the public's enjoyment of a new handicapped-accessible, concrete pier in West Biloxi may be delayed by a protracted legal battle, one that will determine whether cities and counties have the right to construct piers, wharves, harbors and marinas, something they've been doing for well over a hundred years, and authorized by the state Legislature.

It all boils down to control: The Mississippi



Secretary of State, Jacksonbased Michael Watson, has asserted in three local courts that

cities and counties cannot develop their waterfront without permission from him, and based on terms and conditions that are authorized by him.

None of the courts bought this argument, and now Watson plans to pursue the issue to the Mississippi Supreme Court.

The first-term Secretary of State is seeking to halt projects in Long Beach and Biloxi, and he even claimed he calls the shots on the sand beach, which Harrison County has maintained and poured millions into over decades.

Can we get a harrumph?

The City of Biloxi and Harrison County, pointing to decades of public waterfront



amenities constructed, have argued that the Secretary of State's authority is not exclusive. In fact, the framework for Biloxi's Port Commission, as well as other counties and cities on the Gulf Coast with waterfront operations, was created by the Legislature over six decades ago.

The current legal battle in West Biloxi -- funded on the state's end by Tidelands money generated here and funded locally by your tax dollars -- is reminiscent of many years ago.

It was back in December 1987, when the state threatened to seize gaming devices on the Europa Star, the vessel that was operating cruises to nowhere from Point Cadet. These cruises to nowhere were the real beginning of what became dockside gaming.

At the time, the city and the owner of the vessel obtained a temporary restraining order preventing the state's action. The Supreme Court declined to step in, and the TRO stayed in place until the Legislature met and began developing legislation that ultimately led to dockside gaming, which, of course, led to the industry that just saw a billion dollars worth of gaming in Biloxi in the past 12 months.

My, it's amazing what public good can occur when government gets out of the way. Can we get a harrumph?

MAKING HISTORY JACKPOT Biloxi casinos mark biggest year ever The city's Fiscal Year numbers are in, and

Biloxi casinos, with \$100 million months in April and July, have posted a record-breaking year, with \$1.02 billion in gross gaming revenue.

Gross-gaming revenue, the amount the house won from players, is the amount of money on which casinos pay gaming taxes.

Biloxi's eight casinos generated \$1.02 billion in FY 2021, which runs from Oct. 1, 2020 to Sept. 30, 2021. It was the largest figure in the 29-year history of legalized gaming in Biloxi. The previous record was \$1.006 billion in FY 2007.

Highlight of the FY 2021 was April, when the city reported a record-shattering gross gaming revenue figure of \$111.2 million for one month.

Talking Trash

What you need to know about garbage, trash, recycling

OK, with all the talk of cleaning up Biloxi, it's time for a refresher course on how to make sure your garbage, recycling and yard waste are picked up in a timely manner.

Pickup is a contracted service through the Harrison County Utility Authority. Biloxi residents pay a monthly fee on their water bill -- \$15.75 -- for these services.

The Harrison County Utility Authority has two contractors:

Waste Management, which handles residential garbage and recycling, pickup carts in the northern areas of the city on Thursdays and the remainder of the city on Friday. Garbage must be placed in the brown cart; recycling in the green cart.

Pelican Waste, which primarily handles trash such as yard waste, follows the same schedule. Place items at the curb as shown in the illustration.

What will be picked up

Limbs should be no longer than eight feet. Leaves, pine straw and insulation must be bagged to be picked up. Furniture and appliances are acceptable for pickup; however, refrigerators must have doors removed and be tagged to show Freon has been removed before they will be picked up.

What will not be picked up

No unbagged household garbage or unbagged leaves will be picked up. Nor will hazardous materials. Contractor-generated waste, such as construction debris, or limbs left by tree or lawn services, will not be picked up. Removal of those items is the responsibility of your contractor.

What if the pickup is missed?

If your pickup is missed, call the number on side of the cart: 228-701-9086. Option 1 for Waste Management, Option 2 for Pelican Waste, or Option 3 for the Harrison County Utility Authority staff.

Curbside activities are monitored by in-vehicle cameras, and chips embedded into the carts. In fact, the HCUA contract includes penalties for repeated lapses in service.

About those empty lots

Neither Waste Management nor Pelican will pick up trash placed in the right-of-way in front of an empty lot. If you see trash on side of the road, please call the Public Works Department at 228-435-6271 or email Craig Ross at cross@biloxi.ms.us.

A few words about recycling

Recycling must be placed in the green cart.

Accepted: Aluminum cans, plastic products (rated #1 to #3 - bottles, jugs, etc.), clean pizza boxes, garden plastics, flattened cardboard boxes, empty containers, glass and paper products such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, etc.

Not accepted: Plastic bags, foam or Styrofoam containers, wire hangers, windows, mirrors, ceramic or Pyrex dishes, organic or food waste, electronics, paint, pesticides, cleaners, waxed cardboard, needles or syringes, scrap metal, or hazardous waste.

Etc.: Rinse all aluminum, glass and plastic recyclables before placing them in your cart. It is not necessary to remove labels from metal, glass, plastic jugs, cans and/or jars. Recyclables should be put loosely in your HCUA provided cart. Do not bag them.

What about hazardous materials?

Monthly Household Hazardous Waste Collection is by appointment only. Call 228-896-0207.

Accepted: latex or oil-based paint, used cooking or automotive oil, antifreeze, car or marine batteries, aerosol cans, flammable liquids (like gasoline), white goods such as refrigerators and freezers, fluorescent light bulbs, computers, cell phones, telephones, televisions, and tires (up to 25 per household).



Right tree, right place

Some thoughts on choosing trees and their location

Trees work hard for people in myriad ways: They shade us, provide oxygen, slow down storm water, prevent erosion, beautify our landscape, increase our property values and lower energy costs.

Trees clean our air by reducing particulate matter produced by engines and construction. In fact, the presence of trees is correlated with decreased rates of crime and depression (German Centre for Integrative Biodiversity Research).

All trees have an expected life cycle, and Live oaks often live several hundred years, which means they are deeply connected to the history and culture of this region.

As trees die or are removed, it is vital to replenish tree stock to ensure the continued services of this valuable natural resource. In the urban landscape, thoughtful site design and selection of species supports a healthy and high-functioning canopy for many years to come.

The Arbor Day Foundation provides guidance for replanting, summarized as, "The Right Tree for the Right Place."

Important factors in choosing a tree are summarized in the Arbor Day Foundation article "Right Tree in the Right Place," as follows:

Height and canopy spread


Will the tree grow up around power lines, only to necessitate severe cutting by a utilities company later on? If your goal is shade, will the tree's height and canopy spread achieve that? Is your lot large enough for a mature live oak or magnolia?

Tree form or shape

Certain shapes are species specific—and tree shapes can be pyramidal, round, oval, columnar, or V-shaped (Arborday. org). Will the tree shape be suited to an aesthetic result you have in mind? If you want screening from the street or neighbors, will a particular shape answer that need? Deciduous vs. evergreen

A tree that loses its leaves in winter will allow the sun to warm a house in cold

months, and create shade in summer. Evergreens provide year-round beauty. Sycamore, hickory, elm, cypress, maple varieties, tulip tree, silverbell, and sweetgum are just a few examples of deciduous trees suitable to Harrison County.

Growth rate

Do you have the patience for a live oak? Do you want a tree that will be a legacy for future generations? Or do you require shade or landscaping quickly? Our long-lived trees, such as bald cypress and live oaks, provide the greatest long term benefit for the investment, but are slow growers. Faster growers include our many oak varieties outside of live oaks, as well as sycamores, maples, river birch, and magnolias.

Soil, sun and moisture requirements

Native trees suit South Mississippi landscapes because they have already evolved to thrive here. Just a few species adapted to flourish in Biloxi's hot, sunny air and acidic sandy soils are live oaks, sweetgums, magnolias, titi, mayhaw, swamp bay and black gum. If poor drainage is a problem, thirsty bald cypress, pond cypress, river birch, and pine can help. A tree with a buttressed trunk, such as bald cypress, pond cypress, or swamp tupelo, will be more stable in hurricane winds.

Fruit

Do you desire trees that will provide food for your family, or food for birds or other wildlife, or will a fruiting tree be an annoyance or draw undesirable species?

Hardiness zone

When tree shopping, remember that with our average annual extreme temperature low is between 20 and 25 degrees Fahrenheit, putting South Mississippi in the "9a" growing zone, as explained on the website gardeningknowhow.com.

Consider your lot size and proximity

Avoid planting large-growing trees under power lines. Keep the direction of sun in mind, as tree location can affect heating, cooling and the level of interior sunlight of your home. Choose a tree whose dimensions at maturity will fit the available area. Arborday.org provides the following recommendations for planting near one-story buildings:

Avoid invasive trees

Popcorn, camphor, cherry laurel, and Bradford pear are invasive, non-native trees. Because they reproduce easily, they crowd out our native species and become a problem for the property owner. Biloxi has a list of recommended trees at biloxi.ms.us/RecommendedTrees.

Before you dig

Make a call to 811. Utilities will come out and mark underground utility lines free of charge.

Developing news

Here's an update on commercial, residential growth across the city

The city is continuing to experience economic growth in both commercial and residential development.

We have a number of projects that are either recently completed, under construction, under review, or in discussion.

Recent completions include Martini's Bar and Courtyard on Howard Avenue, and AutoZone on Cedar Lake Road. America's Thrift Store recently opened in the former SteinMart at Edgewater Village, and the new Bargain Bin in the former Furniture Mart on Pass Road.

An existing storage facility on Eisenhower has completed a large expansion, and a new climate-controlled storage facility is under construction on Popp's Ferry Road near Cedar Lake.

Commercial projects under construction include Community Bank on Howard Avenue, renovations to the Saenger Theatre, and major alterations to the former Josettes building to create new commercial tenant spaces, and 21 new market-rate apartments.

Margaritaville is nearing completion with its two-story parking structure that will provide the foundation for an amusement park scheduled to open next summer.

Other projects currently under construction or renovation include the Camp David RV Park



on Cedar Lake Road, the new Starbucks at Edgewater Mall, a three-tenant retail building on Pass Road to include a wine store, and the Ground Zero Blues Club in the former Kress Live building on Howard Avenue in The District.

Renovations for the Fields Flight Restaurant in the Old Magnolia Hotel should resume shortly, and repairs and renovations have begun on the Old Barg Building on Keller Avenue. Construction continues on Phase 2 of Arbor Landing apartments (174 units) on Popp's Ferry Road, and Phase 3 (50 units) is under review.

Other major projects in the works: the UMusic development at the Broadwater, a tenant and expansion for the former Margaritaville Casino on Fifth Street, a

Rizzuto's restaurant for the Redding House downtown, proposed townhomes for Caillavet Street, a condominium project for Cedar Lake Road, proposals for several RV parks, and we await plans for the renovation and expansion to the Barq Building at Howard and Reynoir.

Single-family subdivision developments and home construction continue to move forward, with 78 permits issued so far in 2021! We are reviewing plats for five proposed subdivisions.

Other positive economic indicators: Gaming revenues for the recently completed 2021 Fiscal year (October-September) exceeded \$1 billion, the largest figure since legalized gaming began in Biloxi 29 years ago! For the past five months, we have received record sales tax revenues of at least \$1.2 million, with July and August actually exceeding \$1.3 million.

We continue to be excited about the interest and energy we are receiving for developments throughout the city.

Using public transit just adds up, for many reasons

Public transportation is critical for the community, expected by tourists and new residents from larger cities, and it is how many locals get around. Riding the bus is better for your health and our environment. Get on board with saving money, being healthier, and positively contributing to the environment.

Savings

Coast Transit Authority's Fixed-Route operating budget for fiscal year 2022 is projected for \$1.9 million. The city of Biloxi provides approximately \$294,200, which is 15 percent of the operating subsidy.

Public transportation saves the rider money. In one year, a household could save about \$10,000 by taking public transportation and living with one less car. Imagine what you could do with that savings!

Safety

CTA focuses on safety for its passengers. It is 10-times safer to use the bus than to drive your automobile.

Imagine how much a person will "multitask" while driving their vehicle, from eating to playing music, leaving room for error and accidents.



No matter how good of a driver you are, you never know how distracted other drivers are.

Health

We all hate sitting and driving in traffic! Not only does it cause stress on a person's mental health, but the act of sitting and being sedentary also has consequences, in the long run, such as obesity and other diseases like diabetes and heart disease.

Public transportation promotes physical activity because people must walk or ride a bike to the bus stop and people are less stressed. CTA provides bike racks that hold a minimum of two bicycles at a time on all Fixed-Route buses and trolleys. Take advantage of the Bike & Bus services for a healthier you.

Environment

Riding the bus reduces gasoline consumption and carbon emissions. Overall effects of public transportation save the United States six billion gallons of gasoline annually and help to reduce carbon footprint.

CTA has been proactive in promoting a greener environment and has been using alternate energy since 2003.


CTA currently operates with a fleet of six Hybrid Electric buses. These buses run on Fixed-Route Routes, so we invite you to hop aboard a CTA bus and promote a greener environment.

Future

Coming soon to the CTA fleet, first-ofits-kind in the state, will be a pure electric bus. It will be right here on the Mississippi Coast and will allow for less pollution and energy-efficient rides. Funding to purchase the electric bus is made possible with government grants from the U.S. Department of Transportation, funding by Mississippi Power, and Coast Transit Authority.

So, get familiar with riding the bus routes so when the electric bus arrives, you can hop on board and be part of Mississippi history. Buy a \$50 monthly bus pass at the CTA offices or any CTA Transit Center.

Fred Haise will get what's coming to him

For nearly two years now, going back to the 50th anniversary of Apollo 13 in 2020, the City of Biloxi, Mississippi Power and the state have been trying to honor Biloxi's most famous citizen, our own Fred Haise.

Events to honor the Apollo 13 astronaut have been delayed and postponed for all sorts of



reasons. The challenges have been reminiscent of the life-of-death struggle of the original Apollo 13. The latest date was this month, Nov. 14, Fred's 88th birthday, but Fred has agreed to push back the date to a more significant

one in Biloxi's history.

You can also see the progress being made down at the public parking area south of the Biloxi Lighthouse. The big news about the project: It will increase the number of parking spaces from 78 to 182, including 12 handicapped spots.

The work will move the shrimp tour train from adjacent to Highway 90 to adjacent to the beach, and, says Bobby Weaver of Seymour Engineering, there's a 60-foot flagpole in the works for the site. All the work is scheduled to be completed in early November.

Mark down 2-13-2022. That is the date for the unveiling of the Fred Haise statue, which also happens to be the anniversary of Biloxi's founding, 2-13-1699; and the Visitors Center dedication of the statue honoring Biloxi's original explorer, Pierre Le Moyne d'Iberville, 2-13-1999, during Biloxi's Tricentennial.

The time on 2-13-2022? It's 13:13, of course.







Sixth Street South

Lane Construction in October 2019 began a \$10.5 million, 550-day project to install new water, sewer and drainage lines in a Point Cadet area south of the CSX railway. It involves three miles of roads, from the tip of the peninsula at Michael Boulevard, south to Third Street and west to Hoxie. Deadline: April 16, 2021, Aug. 14, 2021, Aug. 29, 2021, mid-September, Nov. 17. Extension primarily because of inclement weather.










St. Michael 1 & 2


Necaise Brothers Construction Water

Water Mains to be installed as of October 15, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Sewer

Sewer Mains to be installed as of October 15, 2021




Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage

Necaise Brothers Construction Pavement Roads to be paved as of October 15, 2021










Time capsule: Veterans Day, 1978

"I remember writing a story about how, for a few hours, it was like he was still in office," former Sun Herald staffer Tim Kriehn remembers of the 1978 Coliseum appearance by Richard M. Nixon, 43 years ago this month. It was one of Nixon's first public appearances since Watergate, four years earlier. "Hail to the Chief" played as the former president entered the arena, where a crowd of 8,000 gave him a standing ovation that lasted for three minutes. Credit former Biloxian and Nixonite Fred Larue with envisioning the scene, aware Nixon had endeared himself to the community in aftermath of Camille. In fact, a few years later, in the '72 presidential race, the Fifth District gave Nixon 84 percent of the vote, the highest percentage of any congressional district in the country, they say. Where else would he find a friendlier crowd?





Another downtown happening

'Democracy' shines this month on BTV



"Sometimes we're accused of having a fondness for history here in Biloxi, especially on BTV," William Sackett intones on BTV this month. "We're guilty as charged. We love our colorful history and we share it here regularly to educate, to inspire, to entertain."

Sackett's voiceover introduces this month's special presentation on BTV, yet another offering of the 1950s-era "Social Change in a Democracy." The black-and-white program, filmed in Biloxi, airs at 8 a.m., 8 p.m. and 2 p.m. each day in November on BTV.

"All this month, as we celebrate Veterans Day, the 11th day of the eleventh month, we salute all of our veterans," Sackett says in his introduction. "We often hear that they fought for our freedom. But have we ever thought of just how important those freedoms are to our everyday life.

"And so, this dear friends, is your chance to once again see one of our cherished documentaries, yes, 'Social Change in a Democracy' is back on BTV for the month of November.

"It's about our form of government. It's about how we speak as a community. It's about how we solve problems. It's about the freedom we enjoy in our beloved republic. And it's all set in Biloxi, 1951."

This month's recipe: Chow Chow

Cora's Restaurant, White House Hotel

Ingredients:

- 3 cup diced bell peppers
- 2 cup grated cabbage
- 2 cup diced onions
- 1 cup diced green tomato
- 1 each jalapeño, minced
- · 1 TB kosher salt
- 1 tsp mustard seeds
- 1/2 tsp celery seeds

- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
- · 1 cup water
- 1/2 tsp crushed red pepper
- 1/2 tsp ground mustard
- 1/4 tsp ginger
- 1/4 tsp turmeric

Instructions:

- In a mixing bowl, combine peppers, cabbage, onions, green tomatoes, jalapeno, and kosher salt. Cover with plastic and place in cooler overnight.
- Cover with plastic and place in cooler overnight.In large saucepan, toast mustard seeds and celery seeds until begin to pop (about 2-3 minutes).
- Biloxi established 1699
- 3. Drain liquid off vegetable mixture and add to toasted seeds pan.
- 4. Add remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce to a simmer, stirring occasionally for 18-20 minutes. The chow chow mixture should be aromatic and still brightly colored. The cabbage and peppers should still have a bit of crunchiness...not totally softened.
- Remove from heat and allow to cool. Store chow chow in air-tight container in the cooler.

Unlike a chow chow for canning, this is a "quick-pickled" version designed to maintain the color and some amount of crunchiness in the vegetables. At Cora's, we serve this chow chow atop Blackened Tuna, but it also pairs well with vegetables. It even works well as a topping for hot dogs.

Keesler Air Force Base This history of the land

The land where Biloxi's Keesler Air Force Base is currently situated wasn't always an Air Force Base. The history of that land goes back centuries.

In 1821, there was a federal land survey on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. During that time, the land was laden with the best quality timber (cypress and oak) to be set aside for the construction and repair of U.S. Navy Vessels. The northwest area of Keesler Air Force Base and all of its Biloxi Bay shoreline was identified as a "Naval Reserve".

Later, in 1851 and again in 1860, the Biloxi peninsula was again surveyed. The surveys resulted in the location of thirty-seven miles of roadways, including the Pass Christian-Point Cadet Road, running through the current Keesler Air Force Base property.

After a steady progress of improvements, the year 1928 saw a golf course, a Coast Guard Base, a baseball stadium, a zoo, and a park on this location. By the 1930s, a veteran's hospital, a boy scout camp, an airport, and a gun club occupied the land.

In 1935, the City of Biloxi began the construction of a commercial airport, which included a large hangar, weather station, beacon light, and a 3000-foot runway. In 1938, residents could watch airplane maneuvers flying in and out of this new facility. The airport, constructed with the help of Works Progress Administration (WPA) workers, was the catalyst for the establishment of the birth of one of the finest military technical training facilities in the United States.

By June 1941, the construction of the first barracks began. A total of 650 tents were constructed while waiting for the new barracks to open. The first team of recruits arrived at Keesler field in August of that year. By August 25, the Army Air Corp Station was officially named Keesler Army Airfield. In those days Pass Christian Road (Howard Avenue/Pass Road) went right through the property.

Biloxi's Coast Guard Bases Coast Guard history

With its beginnings in 1790, the United States Coast Guard recently celebrated its

231st birthday in August. Its original mission was to "combat smuggling and enforce tariff laws" and in 1939 President Roosevelt gave the Coast Guard the responsibility of maintaining the lighthouses.

water in the 1930s and 1940s

Today, the Coast Guard's fleet includes not only small and large boats but aircraft as well. The Coast Guard responds to search and rescue situations and has saved thousands of lives through the years.

Biloxi's bases

In the 1920s, boats filled with illegal liquor were noticeably spotted traveling through nearby marshes, bayous and the Mississippi Sound. Thus, a temporary Coast Guard substation was established in Biloxi to provide service for patrol boats chasing "rum runners."

In 1927, the City of Biloxi provided a facility for the Coast Guard on our Back Bay, located on the western side of the Naval Reserve Park. In 1933, this old Coast Guard base was ordered to close. The abandoned Back Bay Coast Guard site later served as a Boy Scouts camp. Boy Scouts' cabins were constructed, and by 1937, Biloxi Mayor Braun announced that the new camp would be built as part of a WPA project. The new huge camp site was frequented by Scouts from five states.

By 1934, the new Coast Guard Base made its new home at Point Cadet. It was very active with amphibious aircraft seen utilizing the new airplane ramp. Old photographs show special landing ramps for these unique airplanes. (Amphibious aircraft are those which are capable of taking off and landing in water.) Sometimes people call them seaplanes.

By 1966, the Point Cadet facility was abandoned and deeded to the City of Biloxi. In 1986, the Maritime and Seafood Industry Museum established in a Spanish influenced structure built in 1934 as part of the U.S. Coast Guard station.

*** Did you know that Biloxi's iconic lighthouse was once under the jurisdiction of the Coast Guard?

In the year 1967, the lighthouse was decommissioned, and in 1968, the year before Hurricane Camille, the City of Biloxi took ownership. Older pictures of the lighthouse show a huge rock garden around the circumference. The local newspaper reported that these rocks came from a grotto which once stood by the old Nativity Church.

Our USO

Once upon a time Biloxi had a huge United Service Organization (USO) building which was located next to Biloxi's Small Craft Harbor where the Glennan and Guice military parks are today.

The USO is not a part of the federal government. It is a private organization dependent on donations from individuals, organizations, and corporations, and is supported by the good will of volunteers. It was founded on February 4, 1941, at the recommendation of President Franklin Roosevelt to provide resources and recreational opportunities for members of the United States armed forces.

Today, military personnel can benefit from the USO at airports. Our Gulfport-Biloxi International Airport has a section set aside to assist military travelers. It opened in 2007 and is an area where military personal can relax, enjoy food and beverages, connect devices to Wi-Fi, play video, board and table games, and access a library.

Gulf Coast Military Academy

Did you know that some renowned Biloxi
Citizens were schooled at the Gulf Coast
Military Academy? The all-boys facility first
opened its doors in 1912 in Gulfport. The
academy promised to provide both Military
and academic training. Its senior campus
(formerly called the Naval Retirement Home)
closed in the 1950s. The Junior division closed
its doors just east of that facility in 1976. Its
motto was "Send us the boy and we will return
you the man."

The very first Biloxi resident to have graduated from this academy was Theodore Paul ("T.P.") Dulion (1895 – 1949), who graduated in 1914. According to the 1914 yearbook, Mr.

Dulion lived "far away" and spent much of his day commuting by car to and from school. His ambition was to be a merchant, and a successful merchant he certainly became, as proprietor of the famous A P Dulion store at the northwest corner of Reynoir and Howard.

Later, the mercantile establishment became known as Joyce Department Store. This three-story brick structure was located at the northwest corner of Howard Avenue and Reynoir Street. Joyce's was torn down in the 1970s during the Urban Renewal program to make room for the widening of Reynoir Street.

Long ago, our very own Biloxi Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich also attended the Gulf Coast Military Academy. In 1960, he received a special award for the Best Cadet Leader. That year, 12-year-old Cadet Lt. Gilich was also

awarded the highest grade in the school. He received leadership and academic awards each term and was the commander of Company D at the Academy. Seems Mayor Gilich learned his leadership skills early in life!
