



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# Each Mardi Gras, Biloxi Elks serve as a reminder of what once was

This column originally appeared in this space in March 2019.

One of the many-time honored traditions of Mardi Gras - the public traditions anyway - is the customary toast to the respective Kings and Queens as they parade by the City Hall reviewing stands.

The ritual doesn't offer the pomp and pageantry of, say, the Neptune Ball or the Gulf Coast Carnival coronation, but nonetheless it's an obligatory custom. Whatever words are



proclaimed or exchanged is usually drowned out by the blare of nearby floats and crowds down the street wondering why

the parade has paused passed albeit temporarily. But it's a custom. Thankfully, you know it's over when the glasses are raised.

One of the things that may be lost on the occasion is the participation of a handful of tuxedoed gents. They're usually in the background, but they were there.

They represent the Biloxi Elks Lodge 606, and their presence is a reminder of the days when the stately, three-story Elks lodge stood across from Biloxi City Hall.


"The toasting was actually done from the third floor balcony of the Elks Lodge, not from City Hall," says current Elks Lodge Exalted Ruler "Chuckie" Burdine, who will be among the Elks representatives on the City Hall reviewing stand this year at toast time.

The old wood-frame building opened in 1913, after three years of construction, remembers longtime Elk Jimmy Poulos.


"All the carnival balls, any big event, this is where it would be held," Poulos said. "There was a ballroom on the third floor, and we had our meetings and other stuff on the second floor. I remember that third floor had ceilings of 25 to 30 feet high, and a metal, powder blue horseshoeshaped balcony, which was one of the last on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

"In fact, the Elks lodge was where the people who started Mardi Gras met. They would discuss the preparations, the ball, which of course was held at the lodge, and the parade, which is where the Exalted Ruler would toast the king and queen.

"And the balls, that was a story, too," Poulos said. "They didn't have a fire escape to handle the people that were at the balls or other big events,








emergency."

For children, it was a bewildering place -- year 'round. "My Daddy and my Grandpa and my uncles would take me places when I was a kid," said Biloxi Public Works Director Billy Ray Allen. "One of the things I remember about the Elks Lodge, as, maybe a 7-year-old, was this staircase that was lined with all of these old pictures and old downtown Biloxi and the old factories, where I eventually worked growing up."

The building began losing its popularity as a venue when the Hurricane Room opened at the Buena Vista in the '60s. In 1975, it became a victim of urban renewal. The Elks moved to a beachfront site adjacent to the Biloxi City Cemetery, and their former footprint in downtown was ceded to a new downtown public library,





which, owing to its San Francisco-based architects, was said to be earthquake-resistant. Such resistance, did not cover hurricanes, however.

So the Elks Lodge was torn down and the new library was built on even higher ground a few blocks away, on Howard Avenue.

But surviving is the membership of Biloxi Elks Lodge 606, an organization that's been around 118 years, focusing on a year-round program of philanthropy that focuses on the less fortunate. And at Mardi Gras for the toast.

"Last year, I think they helped served the champagne on the reviewing stand, and when the King and Queen arrived and were toasted, I think the exalted ruler toasted as well," Burdine said. "It's an important tradition for the Elks, as an organization that has been a part of this community for so many years. And will continue to be"

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'Iberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.

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Here's the look at Howard Avenue just west of Oak where city contractor Necaise Brothers Construction is using three trackhoes to install a 30-inch PVC sewer main that will be 22 feet below ground. Also being installed are precast concrete sewer manholes about every 300 feet or at intersections. The sewer main will be set shallower, to 19.5 feet, as it moves westward toward Holley Street. The work is part of the \$42 million St. Michaels project,

which is included in the city's \$355 million Katrina infrastructure repair and replacement work. Currently, city infrastructure manager Walt Rode says, Necaise has completed \$14 million of its projected \$42 million contract. This section of Howard, by the way, should be drivable by mid-April, Rode said, the entire Necaise work is expected to be complete in late 2023.

# 2020 audit shows impact of pandemic

A newly published audit of municipal finances showed that the city's casino and sales tax revenue dropped by \$9 million during Fiscal Year 2020, the year the pandemic began.

The 177-page report, titled the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, uses graphics, bar charts and balance sheets to provide an accurate and

complete financial position of the city. It's a snapshot in time from Sept. 30, 2020, nearly two years ago.

Perhaps the most important part of the report is its overview, known as a

Letter of Transmittal. This 13-page summary shows 10-year trends in key municipal economic indicators: revenue from sales, gaming and property taxes; building permits and their valuations.

Said Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich in the document:

"Total revenue, including casino and sales tax revenues for the fiscal year were below prior year totals by \$9 Million. Even the water/sewer revenues declined as hotel and hospitality business declined. In response to the revenue shortfalls, the City immediately canceled travel, established a hiring freeze and eliminated most capital purchases. At fiscal year end, the City was operating with over 40

personnel vacancies.

"Despite aggressive budget control, General Fund expenses exceeded revenues, which accounted for the decrease in fund balance during the period, Water/Sewer fund revenues did exceed expenses for the period.

"One bright spot was ad valorem tax collection

which saw continued growth as many new homes and businesses came online during the year. Across the city, 265 new residential home construction permits were issued and

180 certificates of occupancy were issued for new homes.

"The city's bond rating remained an excellent AA- which allowed the City to refinance two general obligation bonds and significantly reduce the interest needed to pay off these bonds."

The document was prepared by Piltz, Williams, LaRosa & Co., certified public accountants.

The report - which is shared with credit-rating agencies, regulators and those interested in a detailed financial analysis of the city — also includes a section that traces the city's departmental spending over the past 10 years.





# MGM Park heating up as baseball approaches

As of March 1, there are just 38 days until the Biloxi Shuckers take the field for the 2022 season. And while a lockout has been in the headlines for Major League Baseball, fans on the Coast can lock in dates for the Shuckers as Minor League Baseball is unaffected by the negotiations at the Major League level.

There's plenty happening at the corner of Howard and Caillavet before the first pitch of a new Double-A season though. For a second time, MGM Park will host two top 25 baseball teams as the defending national champion Mississippi State Bulldogs come to the Coast to take on the Texas Tech Red Raiders in the Hancock Whitney Classic. The teams will square off for two nights in an elite mid-week series on March 8 at 6:00 pm and on March 9 at 5:00 pm. When these two squads met at MGM Park in 2020, they packed the house, and another pair of record crowds is expected this season.

High school baseball will also have its days at MGM Park in the month of March as the Battle of the Beach takes over the ballfield from March 17 through March 19.

Of course, the excitement for the Shuckers' season is already building with the announcement of Biloxi's coaching staff for 2022. Mike Guerrero, who picked up his 1,300th win as a manager in 2021,




returns for a sixth consecutive season at the helm. Under Guerrero's guidance, the Shuckers have registered a winning record in four of his five seasons in charge, including back-to-back division titles in 2018 and 2019. Chuckie Caufield


will also be back as the hitting coach, his fifth consecutive season with the team, and Nick Childs is set to be the Shuckers' pitching coach for a second straight year.



Women have a long history of commitment to healing, in different cultures of the world and as medical personnel throughout the history of the U.S. military. This March, we



recognize and thank women Veterans and recognize their service to serve others during these unprecedented times.

Women have been healers and warriors in military activities for centuries. During World War I, women served on the front lines as nurses, ambulance drivers, and relief workers. Women supported war efforts by volunteering in organizations such as the American Red Cross. Women physicians ran their own hospital units and served in the military as contract surgeons.

More than 59,000 nurses served on the front lines in the Army Nurse Corps during World War II. They served under fire in field hospitals, on hospital trains and hospital ships, and as flight nurses on medical transport planes.


Throughout both World Wars and in the Korean and Vietnam conflicts, many women faced discrimination and criticism when they prioritized serving their country over taking care of their families. Women persisted

despite criticism. Women became leaders within their units, top physicians at hospitals, chief nurses, educators, trainers, scientists, and medical directors.

During this ongoing pandemic, VA has seen our front-line women health care workers in leadership roles at their respective facilities. They have found solutions to problems and have managed large-scale triage systems, urgent staffing, equipment and PPE ordering and national telehealth programs. Women front-line workers championed VA in distributing 8.9 million vaccine doses to more than 4.1 million people. VA will always be grateful for and proud of our front-line workers.

Women serve with the gift of compassion. As health care workers, teachers, law enforcement, community volunteers, caregivers, and more, women provide healing and hope and are a beacon of light to their families, workplaces and neighborhoods.




# Sixth Street South

Lane Construction in October 2019 began a \$10.5 million, 550-day project to install new water, sewer and drainage lines in a Point Cadet area south of the CSX railway. It involves three miles of roads, from the tip of the peninsula at Michael Boulevard, south to Third Street and west to Hoxie. Deadline: April 16, 2021, Aug. 14, 2021, Aug. 29, 2021, mid-September, Nov. 17, Dec. 31, Jan. 31, 2022. Punch list items being completed.










# St. Michael 1 & 2


The Necaise Brothers Construction contract began on Jan. 4, 2021 with the next phase of infrastructure work in East Biloxi. The first order of business for this \$41.5-million project: installation of a new sanitary sewer on Howard, from Maple to Cadet, while maintaining access to the Palace Casino throughout construction. The Necaise work is scheduled to take 900 days.

Water Mains to be installed as of February 15, 2022




#### Necaise Brothers Construction Sewer Sewer Mains to be installed as of February 15, 2022




#### **Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage**

# Time capsule: Two for the road




#### **'B.B. King' award, 2003**

It was an annual Mardi Gras contest that had impresario Bill Holmes pulling his hair out for years, this idea of whose is bigger. But a trio of King D'Ibervilles -- Frank E. Bertucci (1994), Dave Dennis (1995) and Roy Anderson III (1999) -- made it official on March 4, 2003: "The Real 'B.B. King' Award" was presented to Keith Crosby, the affable Palace Casino Resort GM.

#### Michael Esters, 1983

March 24 will mark 39 years since Michael Esters, Biloxi's first Black councilman, was killed after his car was struck by a freight train at the Main Street crossing. He was 31 in 1983 and had been elected only two years earlier, but his name and memory live on. When a measure was suggested to rename one of the two streets bearing his name, leaders in Ward 2 and family from near and far said the solution was easy: The roadway north of the CSX railway in East Biloxi will be Esters Boulevard North and the roadway south of the railway will be Esters Boulevard South.



# This month's recipe: St. Patrick's Day Feast

#### Ingredients:

- 2 Groebel's Corned Beef Briskets (Flats)
   1 pkg Durkee/French's Fried Onions
- 1 bottle of beer
- · 2 cabbage heads
- 3 lbs potatoes, peeled and mashed
- 1 pint of sour cream
- 2 cups of milk
- 8 oz block of cream cheese
- 1 pkg Hormel Bacon Pieces
- 8 oz Mozzarella cheese
- · Apple Cider Vinegar
- Ground cloves
- Salt
- Pepper

#### Instructions: Beef

 Place Corned Beef brisket in a roasting pan, fat side up. Sprinkle contents of seasoning packet on top of beef. Pour beer into pan until just below top of beef.



- · Seal pan tightly with aluminum foil
- Place in 325 degree oven
- Cook time 6 hours, but at end of 2 hours than 4 hours, open cover and remove ½ of liquid surrounding beef. Add liquid to cabbage.

- Cut cabbage into desired size pieces. Wash and add to tall pot. Add enough water to cover cabbage. Add tablespoon of vinegar, ½ teaspoon of ground cloves and tablespoon of salt.
- Simmer cabbage until tender adding beef braising liquid for seasoning
- Peel, boil and mash potatoes when done. Note: Instant potatoes will work, follow instructions on box.
- Add milk, cream cheese, and sour cream and whip until creamy. Add French's Onions and Hormel Bacon Pieces. Mix well; add salt and pepper to taste.

Put potatoes in baking dish, top with Mozzarella cheese and bake alone for 45 minutes at 325 degrees.

As we close out carnival season in Biloxi we look to the next season on the calendar. It is sometimes referred to as the Lenten Season which is the 40 days before Easter Sunday. It is a time when our culinary habits change. Inspired by the Lenten tradition of not eating meat on Friday, there comes a yearn for seafood, and the very best can be caught in our waters.

Upon their arrival in 1699, when Monsieur Lemoyne d'Iberville and his crews came to our shores, their lives were probably saved by our manna from the sea. After months of voyaging, their ships' cupboards were bare. When they opened their portholes and saw



an endless array of mouth-watering seafood, they must have been aghast to visualize all the buffet possibilities.

#### Biloxi Bacon?

A casual survey about Biloxi Bacon was completed recently and it yielded predictable results. Those who grew up in Biloxi knew exactly

what Biloxi Bacon is. Youngsters and those from afar had no idea. The conversations about Biloxi Bacon truly brought back great memories as well as great fishing and culinary stories about our popular fish: the mullet! Someone even mentioned a map of Biloxi's Back Bay with a place called "Mullet Lake". Of course, the dialogue about mullet with our younger generations wandered onto other topics, including the popular mullet haircut and popular celebrities.

#### Casting a net

The term Biloxi Bacon was derived from stories years ago. During the Civil War when Biloxi experienced a blockage preventing its inhabitants from receiving goods from afar, locals developed a means of surviving. With a plentiful supply of mullet, fishermen could catch and cook whatever they needed to subsidize their family's table. Mullet became known as "bacon" because this fish could be smoked and salted (just like they do for

bacon) before the days of refrigerators. Today, we traditionally cook these fish by first drenching them in cornmeal then frying them until they are tasty and crispy.

The most popular method of catching these fish is with a cast net, a circular woven net that is cast or thrown with a special twist of the wrist into the shallow waters along our shores. Some fishermen even relate stories about catching them with a dough ball and a little fishing hook.

The special technique of cast nets, as well as weaving these nets, is of a special art handed down by Biloxi's forefathers from generations ago.

#### Fun facts

Did you know that mullet have teeny tiny teeth? Some have none at all. They simply suck up their food. Mullet are called bottom feeders. They are not fussy eaters and eat tiny plants, insects, bread, leftover fish, and even pieces of fruits and vegetables. Their favorite treat is maggots! They spend the majority of their day searching for and eating food. Mullet do require rest but they have no eyelids, so their eyes are always wide open. They have exceptional vision, too!

#### Gizzards and Roe

Did you know that mullet is also renowned for not only its tasty meat but also for its other edible parts? What about mullet gizzards? Mullet have gizzards, not unlike, say a chicken. For that reason, some people call them the "chicken of the sea."

Gizzards are the muscular stomach that grinds up the food along the fish's digestive tract. This edible mullet part is another delicacy and can be fried or dried to perfection.

Many years ago two young boys were



arrested for catching mullet out of season. To prove a point, their attorney cut up one of their prize mullet right in the courtroom to prove it had a gizzard and could not possibly be counted as a fish. As a result, the boys were instructed to be freed. This scenario would not likely occur today.

Another added culinary feature of the mullet is its edible roe. Roe is a delicacy and is the sacs of mullet eags, a type of caviar.

#### **Jumping for joy**

One special feature of the mullet fish is that they jump a lot. No one knows for certain why they act this way. Some theories include: running away from their predators, cleaning out their muddy gills, and finding a mate. Who knows for sure, but watching mullet jump is a sight to behold!

Biloxi Port Manager Larry Sablich and his crew at the Biloxi harbors confirm that they still spot mullet jumping near both the Back Bay and front beach piers. Sablich said mullet are not as noticeable as they were decades ago, but folks still come out with their cast nets in search of a good meal.

In 1984, Biloxi began an annual Biloxi Mullet Rodeo Festival. It was held in October at the Point Cadet Plaza and was sponsored by the Fleur de Lis Society and the City of Biloxi. The rodeo rules stated that only cast nets could be used. The premier mullet festival booths offered choices of oysters, hamburgers, sausage, crabs, and fresh fried mullet. There was even a contest for the fastest mullet cleaner and the fastest mullet eater. Awe, the fun that was had, all in honor of Biloxi's pop-eye mullet.

#### The Mullet Brigade

Back in the day, a group of men got together and began cooking mullet for charitable events. They were affectionately called the Biloxi Mullet Brigade (sometimes referred to as the Biloxi Bacon Brigade). They would never accept any compensation for their generous time, and produced perfectly fried fish plates offering countless hours as a team, frying Biloxi bacon for fundraising events. Sadly, many of Biloxi's Brigade members have passed, including Bruce Strong, William Raymond, Ralph Lechner, Stanley Dellenger, Raymond Washer, and Kenneth Husley, just to mention a few.

Mullet on the menu

Years ago, in 1979, two popular Biloxi restaurants offered mullet on their menus: Baricev's and McElroy's. At Baricev's, customers could order a mullet entree consisting of fried Biloxi Bacon, fries, and coleslaw for only \$3.00. And, at McElroy's Harbor House seafood restaurant customers could order a plate of fresh Biloxi Bacon (fried mullet) with a baked potato and salad for only \$3.75.

McElroy's Harbor House is still nested in the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor, but Baricev's location on Central or Beach Boulevard has evolved into other sites. Baricev's restaurant was once located on the shoreline where the Biloxi Belle Casino was docked and where the Beau Rivage property is today.

#### Biloxi's bowl game

The post-football season has always commenced with bowl games everywhere, including the Super Bowl and the Sugar Bowl. Did you know that once upon a time Biloxi had its own Mullet Bowl? It was a popular annual affair that was sponsored by the Biloxi Kiwanis Club for the benefit of the Biloxi Boys Club. The first Mullet Bowl was held at the Biloxi Municipal Stadium in December 1973 and featured a great competition between the pee-wee football teams. Halftime game entertainment was provided by school bands throughout the city. Admission in those days was only one dollar.

The Boys Club began as a boxing club,

originally organized by Senator Tommy Gollott, Ronald Marion, and Bruce Stewart. Today, this group has evolved into the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Gulf Coast.

As for that famous Biloxi Municipal Stadium, it is now the location of The Salvation Army Kroc Center on the corner of Lee and Division streets.

#### The Golden fisherman

In 1977, when Biloxi first introduced its concept of the Vieux Marche to downtown Howard Avenue, a special statue of a fisherman casting a mullet net was designed by artist Harry Weeks. The statue was positioned across the street from our new Ground Zero music venue.

The purpose of this 15-foot, \$34,000 statue was to commemorate the many fishing industry families that made their livelihood in Biloxi's seafood industry history. The statue was given the name "The Golden Fisherman" because it was gilded with a 23-carat gold finish. It was constructed with phosphorus bronze and weighed about 4,000 pounds.

In the 1970s, when the city unveiled the Golden Fisherman statue, a fish fry of Biloxi Bacon was planned. It was to be the biggest fish fry in the history of Biloxi serving 10,000 pounds of mullet.

Fish dinners then cost only \$1.50. This symbol of Biloxi's hard-working fisherman and his mullet net was later moved to Point Cadet in 2002. In 2005 during Hurricane Katrina, the fisherman and his net took a tumble and received serious injuries. Today, a new Golden Fisherman stands by the Maritime and Seafood Industry Museum. This one-of-a-kind, seven-foot bronze sculpture was unveiled and dedicated in 2018. The Golden Fisherman now welcomes travelers at the foot of the Biloxi Bay Bridge.

Mullet through time

Mullet can be found worldwide. History books tell us that the ancient Egyptians and Romans cultivated them in saltwater ponds. One interesting legend from the past tells us that the tradition of eating non-meat products, such as mullet, on Friday was actually to boost fishermen's livelihoods.

As for some local folklores, an old 1905 local legend relates a claim that eating Biloxi mullet will shoo away yellow fever. In fact, a popular journalist, Kat Bergeron, even uncovered a story from the past relating that some declared that mullet was a remedy for illness. Another promises that visitors who sample our Biloxi Bacon will always return to Biloxi for another visit.

Mullet has served many in Biloxi as a dish, a sight of flight, and as a remedy for illness. Today, they swim in the gulf and are occasionally still caught by cast nests. Biloxi's pop-eye fish continue to be a favorite for residents and visitors!
