

State of the City

The origins are humble for a story that is so big

This column originally appeared in this space in February 2021.

As this year's State of the City presentation makes its way to mailboxes, cyberspace and BTV this month, it marks another turn in a long and winding road for the annual presentation.

And we're not talking about the impact of COVID-19 and its havoc on annual events. No, we're talking about an annual presentation that has evolved from a gathering of a few dozen people in the auditorium of the J.L. Scott Marine Education Center on Point Cadet 30 years ago, to an event that has been presented to luncheon audiences of 600 or so people who paid \$50 a head to hear the news of their city.

The event is a brainchild of the late Tommy Munro, the longtime Biloxi booster, civic leader, respected businessman and benevolent one. Munro marshalled support among like-minded citizens – Dickie Schmidt, Franklin Kyle, Larry Corban, Dr. Frank Gruich, to name a few – to shine a favorable light on the city, to present an annual State of the City report.

"That small group of us were thinking that there wasn't one, and there should be," said Biloxi attorney Wayne Hengen, a charter member and former president of what today is the Biloxi Bay Area Chamber of Commerce. "Tommy likened it to the State of the Union, and I don't know that any other cities had done it back then."

Hengen has attended every State of the City presentation since that first year.

"Oh yea," he responded matter-of-factly. "And I couldn't be more proud that we have gotten so much participation in the event. They've been informative and it seems like it's growing every year. Tommy Munro hit the nail on the head."

To be sure, the annual presentation is actually rooted in state statute: In the mayor council form of government, state statute says the mayor "shall annually report to the council and the public on the work of


the previous year and on the condition" of the municipality. The mayor, the statute continues, shall also require each city department to make an annual report.

Of course, it could be as simple as "hey, we've had a good year." But when has government taken the simple route?

In fact, Mayor Holloway, never known to relish the role of public speaking before large audiences of, say, three or four, much less 600 to 700, was forced to deliver two state of the city addresses. One for the Biloxi chamber and one for the Biloxi Bay chamber. Usually about a month apart, and to essentially the same audience. Mercifully, the Biloxi Chamber of Commerce eventually opted to stage Breakfast with the Mayor every couple of months instead of a state of the city.

Credit Don Snyder, the longtime and enterprising Biloxi Parks & Recreation chief, with the idea of a multi-media presentation.

"You know," Snyder said one year after sitting through a 30-minute delivery by Mayor



Holloway, "it might be good to do a movie every year. That way, people won't have to just sit and listen to the mayor. They can have something to see."


Tactful, you were, Don Snyder.

Mayor Holloway, for sure, loved the idea, with the majority of the heavy lifting taken off Game Day. What has ensued is a fast-paced, 18- to 25-minute presentation, set to recorded word and using nearly 200 images and supporting video.

For 20 years, the address has been supported by a mailout sent to every postal customer in Biloxi, and now with a robust online presence as well.

And, in this election year and in these often uncertain times, here's one certainty: the State of the City is the one presentation each year where you get a broad-yet-comprehensive take on the program of work in your city. And, yes, to borrow a phrase from a Tommy Munro bumper sticker, it shows that "things are brighter in Biloxi."

The nom de plume Nick L. Shrimp is a homage to the late Walter Fountain, original olde crab, longtime editor of the Biloxi-D'lberville Press, and longtime Biloxi Chamber of Commerce manager.



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Keeping it simple: Where does that record-breaking gaming revenue go?

Clark Griffith, the retired Air Force general, fighter pilot and former Keesler commander, and Biloxi City Councilman, used to draw on his Gadsden, Ala. roots when it came to complex public policy issues.

"Put that in 'farmer' for me," he would say occasionally with a smile. "Keep it simple."

And so it was, with the latest recordbreaking monthly gaming figure to come from Biloxi casinos: \$115 million in gross gaming revenue reported by Biloxi's eight casinos for the month of March 2022. The figure -- the seventh time the monthly gross gaming revenue has crossed \$100 million since it all began in August 1992 -- eclipses the previous Biloxi records of \$111 million in April 2021 and \$105 million in July 2007.

Huge numbers, for sure. The \$115 million generates a tax windfall of \$13.8 million in taxes, including \$9.2 million to the state, \$2.4 million to the city, and \$1.07 million to the county.

But we'll put in "farmer," too:

Let's say you lose \$100 in a slot machine at a Biloxi casino. Where does that "lost" \$100 go? It's been a question Biloxians have asked since Day 1.

Here's the breakdown, in general terms, on a \$100 loss at a slot machine in Biloxi: \$88 goes to the house; \$12 is paid in gaming taxes:



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Catching #ShuckFever

After hitting a grand slam to power the Biloxi Shuckers to a Friday night victory over the Mississippi Braves, Shuckers' catcher Brent Diaz was asked in his postgame interview just how hot the Biloxi Shuckers were as a team.

Diaz looked out on the crowd at MGM Park and said, "We've got a saying in the clubhouse right now, and it's that WE'VE GOT SHUCK FEVER!" The culmination of his interview over the speaker system drew a resounding roar from the Biloxi faithful that heard from the catcher while waiting for the first fireworks show of the year.

The phrase has become the rallying cry for the Shuckers, who started the 2022 season with an incredibly hot streak, winning seven in a row to start the year and eight of their first nine to match the best start in franchise history.

This Biloxi Shuckers team is incredibly entertaining to watch. Armed with some of the best prospects in the Milwaukee Brewers' farm system, they had the top-scoring offense in the Southern League through the first two weeks of the year, scoring no less than three runs in any of their victories.



Biloxi's lone loss in the first two series of the season came in a rain-shortened game that only lasted five innings. And considering the Shuckers have already mounted one comeback of at least four runs this season, it's within reason that had the game been a full nine-inning contest, they likely would have come back and won that one too.

Leading the charge for the Shuckers is outfielder Joey Wiemer, the second-ranked prospect in the Brewers' system. Standing at 6'4", Wiemer takes some of the hardest swings in baseball. If you get a chance to sit down near the on-deck circle, you can hear the 'whoosh' of air with every practice swing the imposing outfielder takes. Proof that baseball players come in all shapes

and sizes, 5'9" Felix Valerio was the early team-leader in home runs for Biloxi, banging out three in the first nine games while also reaching base safely in every contest.

These Shuckers aren't just mashers though; through their first two series, they also had the lowest ERA in the Southern League. All of that has produced an exciting (and winning) team in the early stages of the season.

Of course, there is more than just what's happening on the field to look forward to during the month of May at MGM Park. During the Shuckers' pair of homestands in the month, there are two Fireworks Fridays, three giveaway nights, and Education Day on May 11 against Birmingham with a 11:05 a.m. first pitch. And every new season brings some small changes at the ballpark, including digital ticketing, cashless concession stands, and improved fan concession ordering with Waitr at the ballpark. Details on policies, players, and tickets can all be found at biloxishuckers.com.

The weather is warming up and so are the Shuckers, so make your plans to come out to MGM Park multiple times to see the future stars of the Major Leagues and catch #ShuckFever too!





Compound expansion at Keesler increases training efficiency

The 823rd Rapid Engineer Deployable Heavy Operational Repair Squadron Engineers are expanding the Air Expeditionary Force compound to increase the efficiency of simulated deployment training for the 338th Training Squadron.

The expansion was initially brought forward in 2016 and is projected to be ready to use this month.

"Future war will be small team dynamics, geographically separated from one another," said U.S Air Force Capt. John Presswood, 338th Training Squadron director of operations.

The compound creates a geographically separated environment for Airmen to build teams, stand up, operate, and troubleshoot radio and terrestrial networks while focusing on

compound security and wingman-ship.

Located near Jones Hall, Airmen will now have a classroom and four concrete pads where they will set up AEF tents while under the stressors of being in a simulated combat environment.

By eliminating the transition time Airman use carrying equipment, they will have more time to be engaged in their simulated deployment training. The expansion of the compound improves the expeditionary

training for roughly 1,900 Airman annually in Radio Frequency Transmissions and Cyber Transport courses.

"We have absorbed other Air Force Specialty Codes over the years," said Stephen Johnson, structural supervisor for radio frequency transmission operations. "With the need to increase our student load and also the amount of equipment we have, we want to have a better training area designed for us."

The expansion of the AEF compound

is providing more opportunities and possible integration with other Air Force Specialty Codes, as well as providing the 823rd RED HORSE with training opportunities.

"This is meant to be a training experience for us, we're here to learn how to properly do our specific roles," said U.S. Army Capt. Olivia Theodore, 823rd RED HORSE project engineer.



The infrastructure work in Biloxi





Water Mains Installed as of April 15, 2022




Necaise Brothers Construction Sewer Sewer Mains Installed as of April 15, 2022




Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage

Necaise Brothers Construction Pavement Paving Installed as of April 15, 2022












Jimmy Buffett had a chance to wax nostalgic about his first gig in Biloxi when he appeared before the Mississippi Gaming Commission back in 2011 to support an ill-fated gaming operation off Oak Street in East Biloxi. His first playing opportunity, he told commissioners, was working for Jake Mladinich at Trader John's on West Beach, which was located due south of where Treasure Bay sits today. That first night at Trader John's, Buffett said, he broke two strings on his guitar while performing. Mladinich said, You break another one, you're fired. I was nervous, Buffett recalled, and I asked him, Well, what do you want me to do? LOOSEN 'EM, he said.



Cheers to Charles Liberis on a milestone day

What a day April 9, 2022 was. Biloxi reported that its eight casinos had record-shattering numbers for gross gaming revenue for the previous month, \$115 million, and Charles Liberis was celebrating his 80th birthday. Charles who? Read on.

Many people may can tell the story of opening day at the Isle of Capri, which has its 30th anniversary in August, but the real story of this multibillion dollar industry began in December 1987.

That's when the City of Biloxi, under Mayor Gerald Blessey, and the Europa Star filed a lawsuit against the State of Mississippi. A ruling by Judge James Thomas that the Supreme Court declined to review allowed Liberis's 187-foot Europa Star to dock at Biloxi's Point Cadet while offering cruises, with gambling, to nowhere.

They ended up being cruises to the future; three years later the state Legislature allowed the voters of Harrison County to vote on "dockside" gaming, and the measure was approved on its second local referendum, leading to the Isle of Capri opening as the first legal casino in the South on Aug. 1, 1991.

The Isle was the first to open, but only after the Europa Star tested the waters. Happy birthday, indeed Charles Liberis!



Numbers add up at this busy corner

As restaurants go, it's one of the busiest corners in Biloxi, Lameuse at Water. There's the always-popular Half Shell Oyster House, Adventures, Le Beignet, CB's Jamaican Jerk, and Fuji, which shares a roof with Rena's, the lunch spot.

Situated atop Fuji, is One Thirty One Lamuese, at 131 Lameuse St., of course. The restaurant serves lunch and dinner and is featured on this month's "Biloxi Cooks!" serving up Duck Poppers.

The episode premiered in August 2021 on BTV. The replay can be seen this month each day at 7 a.m., 7 p.m., and 1 p.m. on BTV.

This month's recipes

Duck Poppers

One Thirty One, 131 Lameuse St.

Ingredients:

- 8 slices bacon
- 1 skinless duck breasts
- 2 jalapeños
- ¼ cup Creole cream cheese*
- · Blacken seasoning to taste
- 2 cups fresh blackberries, rinsed and drained
- · 2 tbsp sugar, or more to taste
- 1 tsp lemon juice

Duck Poppers

Instructions:

- · Cut jalapeno it to halves vertically, remove seeds and ribs
- · Slice each horizontally
- Spread cream cheese inside each, lightly season with blacken seasoning spices and set aside
- Slice duck breast into 8 slices, about ¼ inch thick, place each on top of the cream cheese stuffed jalapenos
- Lay bacon slice vertically and place jalapenos at bottom of the strip
- Roll bacon with piece of stuffed jalapeño upwards until complete a full roll with bacon connected to bacon
- Turn rolled piece of bacon 90 degrees with the strip still vertical
- Continue to roll bacon to fully cover stuffed jalapeno slice
- Repeat process with 7 other strips of bacon and stuffed jalapeno slices
- Place 8 rolled poppers on grill heat on high, 6-8 mins. each side
- Arrange on a plate and top with a small amount of blackberry coulis

Blackberry Coulis:

Combine blackberries, sugar, and lemon juice in bowl of small food processor. Blend until smooth and sugar has dissolved, 15 to 20 seconds.

Adjust sugar if desired, and blend again. Then strain mixture using a fine mesh strainer to remove seeds.

Refrigerate until ready to use.



Biloxi's Artist Views

Early art illustrations

In the early 1700s, Dutchman Le Page Du Pratz compiled a multi-volume illustrated publication in which he recorded information about the plants, animals, insects, and people he found in this area. Even though Monsieur Du Pratz's drawings are limited, the few that he chose to depict are quite interesting.

The "Diderot Encyclopedia" from the early 1700s contains unique line drawings of what he saw here.



Art of the explorer

Did you know that Monsieur D'Iberville's brother, Jean-Baptiste Le Moyne, Sieur de Bienville, had artwork drawn on his body from neck to foot? Born in Montreal, Canada in 1680.

Bienville often traveled to Mobile, met with tribes in that area, and had many serpentlike inkings etched all over his body.

A recent magazine article describes his choice of snakes as being a connection with the Native American culture on the Coast. None of Bienville's fully-clothed portraits give any hints of his hidden artwork. In those days tattooing practices first began with a stencil tracing of charcoal followed by the actual prickling process, usually requiring a few days of recovery, treated with a diet of boiled corn.

In spite of all those painful inkings, Monsieur Bienville died in 1767 at age 87 in Paris, France.

Soldier art

In 1943, when Keesler Air Force Base was still titled Keesler Field, "Art and the Soldier" was published by the Special Service Department of Keesler Field. This 68-page book includes quite an assortment of talent, including paintings, murals, cartoons, photographs, drawings, and posters. It offers a peek into Keesler's past with visuals about its buildings, people, aviation, posters, events, and even music.

"Art and the Soldier" is available for viewing at the Local History and Genealogy Department at the Biloxi Library.

Mosaic art

In 1999 when Biloxi celebrated its Tricentennial, a special outdoor mosaic evolved at 136 G. E. Ohr Street behind the old 1970's Biloxi Library building and near the present-day 782 Art Gallery.

Local artist Elizabeth Veglia was the supervising artist and its construction included a host of volunteers. Funded by the Harrison County Board of Supervisors, this outdoor visual tells the story of Biloxi's unique history through the centuries. It survived the wrath of Hurricane Katrina and is the 21st stop of the Historic Downtown Biloxi Walking Tour.

In 2006, Veglia once again created a mosaic art display. In collaboration with Denis Cowart, Elizabeth Veglia planned and designed the Katrina Memorial for the "Extreme Makeover" television series. The 12-foot-high feature signifies the height of Katrina waters at that location. The neighboring glass case includes special mementos.

This spot is featured as Stop 1 of the Historic Downtown Biloxi Walking Tour.

Window art

Many old churches offer a different type of art via stained glass windows. This specialized and delicate glass art can be found in downtown Biloxi's Nativity Cathedral on Howard Avenue.

Each colorful window tells a story and





illuminates the interior of the structure on a sunny day. A total of 61 windows can be viewed, with the first being installed in 1905. Many have the donors'

names inscribed onto the glass.

St. Michael's Church, built back in the 1960s has gone through many hurricanes but its array of marvelous stained glass windows can still be visited today.

Near the staircase, inside the Biloxi Visitors Center, folks are awestruck to see two beautiful stained glass windows by the elevator. These works of art were rescued from the old Dantzler House on that same property after Hurricane Katrina.

Art murals

Within the last few years, another interesting outdoor art feature has been added to downtown Biloxi. Overseen by Biloxi Main Street, the Biloxi Public Art Project has successfully commissioned 21 completed murals, with more on the "drawing board."

Basically, these colorful works of art can

be found on the sides of public buildings and structures in the area bounded by Porter, Bellman, Division, and Hwy. 90. The inaugural project began under the I-110 adjacent to the Biloxi Community Market.

A virtual tour of the murals is available on the city's website.

Art where you walk

Be on the lookout for at least 10 new art murals embedded in the street's surface in Downtown Biloxi. A new undertaking has commissioned murals to be drawn by local artists on downtown intersections. The Cross Walk Mural project was funded by a Mississippi Main Street grant with matching funds from Heritage Trails Partnership and is expected to be completed soon.

Poster Art

At least twice a year, artists are afforded the opportunity to participate in poster

The City of Biloxi and The Blessing of the Fleet Committee are among the sponsors of the annual event. After careful review of this year's entries, a winner will be announced on Wednesday, May 11 at an unveiling event at St. Michael's Parish Life Center.
