






# Coming to Downtown Biloxi

# HOWHOP

CREATIVE DISTRICT

A transformation is in the works for Downtown Biloxi in the area to be called How Hop.

How Hop is the soon-to-be creative district under the I-110 at the corner of Howard Avenue and Hopkins Boulevard, an area that funnels thousands each day to downtown. Biloxi Main Street will be leading a project that will help create

a gathering spot for all ages and feature a center for creative art, a place for children to play, and a spot for adults to enjoy a craft beer or a cocktail.

The project arose from a Downtown Roadmap workshop hosted by Mississippi Main Street and Biloxi Main Street that took place in August 2022 at Biloxi City Hall. The three-day session



City Hall. The three-day session included members of Mississippi Main Street and Mississippi State University as well as city and community leaders, Biloxi Main Street members, and Biloxi residents and business owners who provided input on the future development of Downtown Biloxi. From the workshop, the concept of the How Hop Creative District emerged.

In November of 2022, Biloxi Main Street received a \$50,000 grant from The Gulf Coast Community Foundation and The Knight Foundation for the enhancements. And in February, the organization put a call out requesting qualifications and project management services for the How Hop Placemaking Beautification Project. Through the project, Biloxi Main Street will oversee teams to design a conceptual art/lighting/reconfiguration of a section of the area for a multiuse public space that may include resurfacing and redesign, lighting installation, various art projects, and parking reimagining and installation.

The project has already received preliminary approval from MDOT as well as from the City of Biloxi.

Bids will be opened on March 1 at the Biloxi Main Street office on Howard Avenue. The project is expected to begin shortly after and be completed by the end of the year.

### **Lighting the way** to the heart of **Downtown Biloxi**


Have you noticed the string lights downtown? They are welcoming and inviting visitors to the heart of the city stretching north along Rue Magnolia from Highway 90, at The District Green during a First Friday Block Party, inviting music lovers to the entrance of Ground Zero Blues Club, or while visiting Fly Llama Brewery, Martinis, or catching a Shuckers game. These once dark, often blighted areas, dotted with vacant buildings now thrive with the activity and energy of dozens of new businesses.

For those of you who enjoy neighborhood stories of a community coming together, let's travel back to 2018 when the first stretch of string lights on Rue Magnolia went up.

Rue Magnolia has become a well-lit, safe walkway from Highway 90 to Jackson Street, an ideal stretch for evening strolls, a shortcut to nearby locations, a safe way to visit businesses, and where 'First Fridays' began. String lights became a catalyst for Biloxi Main Street, sparking the promotion, preservation, revitalization, and enhancement of downtown.

Fast forward to late 2019 when a core group of Biloxi Main Street members saw an opportunity to spark life back to Howard Avenue. Croesus Alley, between the Barq's and Kress buildings, was the very definition of a "dark and scary alley." Now it sparkles with lights framing the entrance to Ground Zero Blues Club. Accolades to our partners and property owners supporting and endorsing this effort.

Traveling east on Howard Avenue, the spark landed on the site of the former Upstairs-Downstairs which had been a barren, dark lot surrounded by empty buildings for years. It is now a vibrant area known as The District Green. The area is surrounded by easyaccess parking, new small businesses, a café, outdoor seating, an interactive musical sculpture, and the now famous "Greetings from Biloxi" mural. The District Green has become synonymous with Biloxi Main Street's First Friday's Block Party and is a community gathering place for myriad events, like Cruisin' the Coast and Christmas in the City. The generous support and donations from the property owners, and the surrounding businesses: ERK Properties, Marley's Music, and Greenhouse Biloxi, encouraged growth



and success in making the area enticing. As a result, since 2021, other businesses opened on G. E. Ohr Street flanking The District Green such as Broussard's Barber Shop and The Cornerstone, a lifestyle women's and gifts boutique.

The story continues in 2021 with the opening of Fly Llama Brewery on Bohn Street in a building with very limited onsite parking. To resolve the issue Biloxi Main Street brought together the City of Biloxi, MDOT, and Fly Llama to open up the parking lot underneath I-110. The lit pathway replaced an overgrown, old rusted chainlinked fence with a new concrete walkway from the parking lot to Fly Llama allowing customers and visitors access to 100-plus available parking spots. Again, partnerships and contributions from MDOT, the City of Biloxi, and Fly Llama lit the way to hassle-free parking and business growth.

Phase I of the string light project at Rue Magnolia launched the strategic plan to light up the Heart of Downtown. Orchestrated by Biloxi Main Street and the City of Biloxi, the initial investment was roughly \$20,000. Under the umbrella of Biloxi Main Street and spearheaded by its Economic Vitality Committee, each successive investment was completely underwritten by privately funded donations to the tune of \$50,000. Each location in the last three years has seen new businesses filling vacant buildings.

The saying "It takes a village" is so very appropriate to this comeback story, commemorated with a plaque at The District Green quoting Dr. Seuss - "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing's going to get better, it's not."

Where will the spark land next? More string lights are in the plans and yes, so is the sequel to the story.

# Downtown goes green for St. Patrick's Day











St. Patrick's Day festivities take place in Biloxi on Saturday, March 11 with a run, a grilling competition, and a parade.

On Saturday, the streets in Downtown Biloxi will be filled with Irishspirited shenanigans beginning with the annual Hibernia Marching Society St. Patrick's Day 5k and 1-mile Health run and walk. Late registration will take place in front of the Biloxi City Hall on Lameuse Street from 8 to 9:30 a.m. The 1-mile will begin at 9 a.m. followed by the 5K at 9:30 a.m.

Over at the Biloxi Town Green, Biloxi Main Street will host its annual Grillin' on the Green from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Dozens of grillers will be at 710 Beach Boulevard participating in the grilling competition and BBQ cookoff. Also part of the event: arts & crafts vendors and live entertainment from Rhythm & Rain Trio at 10 a.m., Symone French & the Trouille Troupe at noon, and Assumed Risk at 3 p.m. Admission to the affair is free, food plates will be available for purchase, and the BBQ Cookoff awards begin at 2:45 p.m.





### **Biloxi offers senior** programs year-round


Are you age 55 or older and looking for a way to stay active and involved? Well, the City of Biloxi Parks & Recreation Department has the program for you.

### Don't "leaf" storm drains to clog

Chances are you've seen it done or even done it yourself: rake up and pile leaves near the curb in front of your home or sweep them into the street where you hope they'll be carried away by the wind.

This scenario often results in a major cause of flooding in the city – clogged or blocked storm drains.

These careless or unthinking actions negate the millions of dollars in improvements that the city is making citywide to drainage systems. Piling leaves or sweeping them into the street means that they will eventually find their way into the city's storm drains.

Either bag the leaves for pickup or compost them. A stopped-up storm

drain cannot carry run-off water as it is intended to do. When it rains, that water can flood streets, your property, or even your neighbor's property.

It is actually a violation of city ordinance to dump any material into storm drains, ditches, culverts, streams, or waterways (Sec. 9-1-15, Code of Ordinances, 1992).

### Learning the ins and outs of computing

Welcome to the Biloxi campus of the Mississippi Coding Academies, the first on the Gulf Coast.

We are a growing team, currently

looking for partners. Over the last two years, MCA has engaged with many agencies and organizations to support our coders with jobs at or before the end of our program offering a sustainable career path at no cost to the students.

MCA develops its 11-month curriculum around the specific coding, software, and professional skill needs of local businesses. The curriculum is aimed at "Breaking the Cycle - Minimum Wages to Technology Wages." It allows a viable career path for participants who may come from underserved families and are either not college-bound or found that college does not provide the desired economic independence. Most only have a high school education and are typically earning parttime minimum wages. Starting salaries for MCA's graduate coders range from \$38,000 to \$45,000 a year. There are very few "free tuition" programs that can have such an immediate impact on the lives of individuals, the city, and the state.

Interested in applying? The Biloxi Campus accepts applications year-round. The current class, 2022-2023, will complete the certification program on July 31, 2023. And the 2023-2024 class will begin on Aug. 15, 2023. Applications should be submitted no later than Aug. 1, 2023.

In 2021, MCA announced the Biloxi location and more than 360 applications came flooding in. As the applications were reviewed, 30 individuals were accepted with 10 completing the program and obtaining certification. Within six months, seven of those

certified coders were fully employed with local companies. In September 2022, our second cohort began, and we expect to certify more than twenty coders by the end of this summer.

MCA depends on the generous continued support of our city council, our mayor, private businesses, state funding, and individuals. Donations and contributions are pivotal to MCA's success. It allows for an up-to-date curriculum using state-of-the-art equipment/software, allowing our coders to "learn by doing" at progressively more complex and challenging levels.

Let's stop the "brain drain" from our community; let's offer these students the best career opportunities on the Gulf Coast.

### VA remembers the sacrifices of Veterans

The Gulf Coast Health Care System (GCVHCS) honors all, and last month, we took the time to remember Black Veterans.

"It is a time to remember, recognize and revere the great sacrifice and selfless service of Black Americans to the United States. For decades, the second week of February was reserved for this observance, as it coincided with the birthdays of the luminaries Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln.

In the Armed Services, Black Americans have contributed to our nation's freedom since our very beginning. In fact, they have provided military service in every single war our nation has fought, from the American Revolution through Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

During the American Revolution, Black Americans served the colonies of Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island in the militia and the Continental



Army. During the Civil War, the all-Black 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment served to preserve the Union and extinguish the scourge of slavery. During World War I, the Harlem Hellfighters served on the front lines for six months. More than 170 received the Legion of Merit for their individual valor. During World War II, the U.S. Army's 761st Tank Battalion, nicknamed the "Black Panthers" after the unit's distinctive insignia, was assigned to General Patton's Third Army - at his request. Finally. In July 1948. President Harry Truman signed an executive order desegregating the military and requiring equal treatment and opportunity without regard to race, color, religion, or national origin.

Because of them, progress has been

made. But, for far too long, too many Veterans who fought to protect our rights and freedoms around the globe have had to fight brutal battles here at home for their own rights, freedoms, and benefits that they deserve. At VA, it's our job to make sure those fights are over – and that Black Veterans get the care and benefits they so rightly deserve.

We need to ensure that Black Americans – and people of every racial and ethnic group – enjoy opportunities to serve Veterans through a variety of rewarding and fulfilling careers here at the VA. We need to serve Black Veterans and Veterans of Color every bit as well as they have served our country. They have fought valiantly for us; we need to fight valiantly for them. It is on everyone here today to help make that happen.

Prepare to feel the roar in your chest that screams freedom as jets zip over the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

Keesler Air Force Base and the City of Biloxi are partnering to host the Thunder Over the Sound 2023 Air and Space Show, April 29-30.

Air shows provide an opportunity to showcase U.S. Air Force capabilities and allow civilians to meet the service members who serve and fly.

"Before I joined the Air Force I used to go to air shows and I'd watch the Thunderbirds," said Staff Sgt. Austin Guerra, Thunderbirds demonstration team advance crew chief. "I bought a replica F-16 Fighting Falcon at one of the air shows when I was younger and

I forgot about it. Then, I joined the team and when I went back home I found it again and it was a Thunderbird."

"We are particularly excited about this air show, as it is the first one at Keesler Air Force Base since 2019," said Lt.
Col. John Connors, Air Show director. "This also provides an opportunity to promote local area partnerships between the base and the

Additionally, the theme for this air show is Heritage and Honor. The air show will honor Keesler's history and today's mission, embracing innovative training and community partnerships.

"We have booked several heritage airframes that were previously assigned to Keesler Air Force Base for pilot training, such as the T-28 Trojan and C-21 Learjet," said Connors. "There will also be a re-enactment of the bombing of Pearl Harbor on Keesler, complete with Japanese Zeros and a large pyrotechnic display simulating bombings."

There will be civilian crowd viewing areas at both Biloxi Beach and the flight line at Keesler. Acts such as Tora! Tora! Tora!, the Trojan Phlyers, Patty Wagstaff, and Chef Pitts are scheduled to be performing over

Keesler in the morning to early afternoon while the beach is planned to have several aircraft flyovers as well as the Thunderbirds aerobatic performance in the late afternoon.

Since 2009, this will be Keesler's sixth Air show. Make sure to save the date for Thunder Over the Sound 2023 Air and Space Show.



The Necaise work is scheduled to take 900 days.





















### This month's recipe: St. Patrick's Day Feast

### Ingredients:

- 2 Groebel's Corned Beef Briskets (Flats) 1 pkg Durkee/French's Fried Onions
- 1 bottle of beer
- 2 cabbage heads
- 3 lbs potatoes, peeled and mashed
- 1 pint of sour cream
- 2 cups of milk
- 8 oz block of cream cheese

Biloxi

- 1 pkg Hormel Bacon Pieces
- 8 oz Mozzarella cheese
- Apple Cider Vinegar
- Ground cloves
- Salt
- Pepper

#### Instructions:

#### Beef

- Place Corned Beef brisket in a roasting pan, fat side up. Sprinkle contents of seasoning packet on top of beef. Pour beer into pan until just below top of beef.
- Seal pan tightly with aluminum foil
- Place in 325 degree oven
- Cook time 6 hours but at end of 2 hours then 4 hours, open cover and remove ½ of liquid surrounding beef. Add liquid to cabbage.

#### Cabbage

- · Cut cabbage into desired size pieces. Wash and add to tall pot. Add enough water to cover cabbage. Add tablespoon of vinegar, ½ teaspoon of ground cloves and tablespoon of salt.
- · Simmer cabbage until tender adding beef braising liquid for seasoning

#### **Potatoes**


- Peel, boil and mash potatoes when done. Note: Instant potatoes will work, follow instructions on box.
- Add milk, cream cheese, and sour cream and whip until creamy. Add French's Onions and Hormel Bacon Pieces. Mix well; add salt and pepper to taste.
- Put potatoes in baking dish, top with Mozzarella cheese and bake alone for 45 minutes at 325 degrees.



Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi began with the activation of Army Air Corps Station No. 8, Aviation Mechanics School, on June 12, 1941. Later that month the Army Air Corps became the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF). On August 25, 1941, the base was officially named "Keesler Army Airfield," and was commonly referred to as "Keesler Field." Construction of buildings and other facilities was largely completed by June of 1942, and the population of Keesler had grown quickly with the addition of basic training as part of the base's mission.

New recruits arriving at Keesler Field received a forty-page pictorial guidebook to their new home. The introduction to the guidebook, dated 1942, reads as follows:

"From the very beginning, only one thing was expected of Keesler Field. That was a steady flow of highly trained airplane mechanics, men qualified for the important task of keeping this nation's warplanes in first-rate fighting condition.

Today, as one of the great schools in the Army Air Force's Technical Training Command, Keesler Field has lived up to that expectation and established itself as a fitting memorial to the late Second Lieutenant Samuel R. Keesler of Greenwood, Miss., who died a hero in World War I, and for whom the field was named.

Keesler Field grew from an old golf course, ball park, airport, Naval Reserve Park and swampy woodland on the outskirts of Biloxi, Miss. Ground was first broken June 13, 1941, before war clouds burst over the Pacific. In February, less than eight months later, it made its first direct reply to the bombing of Pearl Harbor with the graduation of several hundred mechanics, the first to complete the intensive 19-week course in the AAFTS.

Keesler's work did not end there, however. In addition to supplying thousands of mechanics, it teaches new men the basic fundamentals of warfare in its Basic Training Center.

Regardless of their duties here or overseas, the men of Keesler Field have the same goal in mind – they intend to "Keep 'Em Flying!"


In 1947, the United States Air Force was created as a separate branch of the armed services. Keesler Field became Keesler Air Force base in 1948.
