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HURRICANE REMINDER: Stay prepared. Do not become complacent.

We are in the midst of hurricane season and want to remind residents to not become complacent. Stay prepared.

"Over time, people tend to minimize the threat we face from storms and flooding," says Biloxi Fire Chief Nicholaus Geiser, who also serves as the city's emergency manager. "Our continuing advice is this: Do not become complacent. People think about the big storms, such as Camille or Katrina, but it doesn't take a catastrophic storm to cause loss of life or significant property damage. In fact, it doesn't even have to be a hurricane. Torrential downpours can happen at any time, given our tropical climate."

Here are some precautions you should take before, during, and after a storm.

Have a plan

Plan an evacuation route, prepare a storm kit, make arrangements for family, including pets and flood insurance, and develop an emergency communication plan.

Know your evacuation route

You need to know what route to take, how to get to where you need to go, and plan for an alternate route. Having an emergency evacuation plan can help get you and your family to safety and avoid getting stranded.

Visit the evacuation map link in the Storm and Flood Preparedness section of the city's website at biloxi.ms.us/stormandflood, to determine the safest route. Be prepared to drive several miles inland to locate a safe place.

Prepare a storm kit

If you have not already done so, make a storm kit today.

Here are some essentials the kit should include:

- Water at least one gallon of water per person per day for three to seven days
- Food non-perishable packaged or canned food and juices. Don't forget the paper products, utensils, and cooking tools



- First aid and medications. This should include a first-aid kit, prescription medications, and baby and pet supplies.
- Tools and emergency supplies include items such as flashlights and extra batteries, duct tape, portable battery-operated radio, can opener, phone chargers, and cash and credit cards
- Clothes and bedding include some sturdy shoes and warm blankets
- Store important documents like medical records, insurance paperwork, bank account numbers, and social security cards in a waterproof container or resealable plastic bag.

Make arrangements for family and pets

Make sure that each family member knows how to respond. Teach members how and when to turn off gas, electricity, and water. Teach children how and when to call 911, the police or fire departments, and which radio station to tune to for emergency information.

If you have a pet, make sure the place you are planning to stay allows pets. Many shelters do not. Contact your local humane society for information on local animal shelters.

Consider direct deposit for things like social

security checks or even paychecks. The U.S. Treasury and the Federal Reserve Banks urge Social Security check recipients who live along the Gulf Coast to use direct deposit to ensure immediate access to their benefits without disruption.

Prepare your home

Prepare your home by trimming back dead or weak branches from trees. Protect your windows with storm shutters or plywood boarding. For plywood, use ½ inch of wood cut to fit the window and predrill holes every 18 inches for screws.

Have flood insurance

Don't forget about flood insurance. It is essential to check into before a storm. You can find out about the National Flood Insurance Program through your local insurance agent or emergency management office.

Develop an emergency communications plan

If a storm causes members to be separated from one another, it is important to communicate a plan for getting back together.

Designate a contact outside of your area – such as a relative or friend – to serve as the emergency contact. Make sure everyone knows the name, address, and phone number of the contact person. That contact could be your connection to family and friends even if there is no way to contact each other.

Remember, a disaster can strike quickly, so be prepared. Those days and hours leading up to a storm can be an anxious and stressful time. Should you evacuate? Will the storm make landfall, and, if so, where and when? And the list goes on and on. We'll certainly help communicate those answers with the best information. However, right now, we've given you a host of simple things you can do to be ready. Taking these steps also will take a good bit of the anxiety and stress from the situation. Let's all be ready and prepared next time a storm threatens.



Forrest, Porter piers receive renovations

Two Back Bay piers, Forrest and Porter, have closed and are being rebuilt.

Crews with J.E. Borries, a firm that specializes in marine construction, began demolishing both piers in early July.


"The Forrest Avenue Pier has not been renovated in over twenty years," Port Manager Larry Sablich said. "The entire structure was not sound so it was necessary for us to restrict public access and bring in contractors who specialize in marine construction to take on a job of this magnitude."

The \$306,948 project includes the replacement of the decking, handrails, and pavilion. Work on the nearly 430-foot long by 6-foot-wide pier is expected to be completed by the end of July.

The boat launch will remain open during the work.

Once the Forrest Avenue Pier is rebuilt, crews will move over to the Porter Avenue North Pier and rebuild that pier which is nearly 115 feet long by 6 feet wide. That project will cost \$93,798 and is expected to be completed by the end of August.

Both projects are being funded by the city. The public is asked to use the Old Ice Wharf pier, located on Bayview Avenue at Parker Street, while the projects take place.



More downtown parking coming soon!

The MGM Park parking garage will soon open to Biloxi Shuckers fans as well as the general public. The Beau Rivage recently transferred the rights of the garage to the City of Biloxi and, after some minor adjustments are made, the garage will open to the public. A small fee is expected to be charged in the future.


2023 STORM SEASON

They'll also host Bark in the Park on Aug. 9, where owners and their four-legged friends can spend a night on the right field berm for \$8.

On Aug. 12, the Shuckers will celebrate local Olympian Brittney Reese with a special bobblehead presented by Keesler Federal Credit Union.

On Tuesday, Aug. 22, the Shuckers will award the first 250 fans through the gates at 5:30 p.m. with a "Day of the Dead" themed t-shirt presented by Wellcare.

On Aug. 23, the Shuckers will host a College Fair Night! Fans can tune into the Shuckers' social media closer to date for a list of colleges in attendance.

On the field, the Shuckers will have plenty of top prospects to root for, including Tyler Black, Jeferson Quero, Jackson Chourio, and Carlos Rodriguez! In July, Jeferson and Jackson both had the opportunity to play in the 2023 SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game in Seattle, which showcased the best

The inductees are chosen based on, but not limited to, statistical performance, individual achievement, leadership, citizenship, and community service. The number of inductees each year is solely the discretion of the selection committee.

Here is the Class of 2023



Melvin Brown

Football and track player for Biloxi High and the University of Mississippi. In high school, Melvin Brown was an outstanding running back who was one of the first to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was the Most Valuable Player at the 1978 Shrimp Bowl. In track, Brown played in the Big 8 Championships, District 8 Championships, and Biloxi Relay Championships. He received a scholarship to Ole Miss where he was a football letterman playing as a running back and a cornerback. In 1983, Brown was drafted in the 10th round by the Minnesota Vikings.



Stanley Dellenger Jr.

Football, basketball, and track player at Notre Dame High School and the University of Southern Mississippi, and football and track coach at Central Catholic High School, Pope John Paul II and Holy Cross in Louisiana and Mercy Cross High School, St. Stanislaus College, and St. Patrick Catholic High School in Mississippi. Stanley Dellenger Jr. was a four-year letterman in football, basketball, and track and signed a football scholarship to USM. During his coaching career, Dellenger's players won 40 gold medals and 68 All-State selections in track and football; the 2009 St. Stanislaus football team was named state champions; and while coaching at St. Patrick, the boys track team won the State Track Championships, and was named runner up in State Track Championships, and the girls track team won three State Track Championships.



Lionel Fayard

Baseball and football player at Central Junior High, Biloxi High School, and University of Southern Mississippi. Lionel Fayard was a three-year starter and played both offensive and defensive lines. In high school, Fayard was part of the All-Star team. He received a scholarship to the USM. There, Fayard was a threeyear starter from 1968 to 1970. Fayard is a member of the USM Hall of Fame.



Lawrence Love

Football and track player at Biloxi High School and Southern Illinois University. Lawrence Love ran track in high school where he achieved a number of school and state records. In 1972 and 1973, Love attained the school and state records in the 120 high hurdles and the 180 low hurdles. Love went on to play football at Southern Illinois University where he received a NCAA scholarship and took 7th in the nation kickoff return.



Tommy Lyons

Baseball player with Notre Dame High School, Cleveland Indians, New Orleans All-American Team, and the University of Mississippi from 1969 to 1977. In 1972, while at Notre Dame, Tommy Lyons' ERA was .52 with a batting average of .583. He was awarded the most valuable trophy for the New Orleans All-American Team. That same year, Lyons was drafted by the Cleveland Indians in the 18th round of MLB Amateur Draft. Lyons was a fast right-handed pitcher, named Catalyst Player of the Month, and received a baseball grant-in-aid scholarship with the University of Mississippi.



Al Pickich

Football player at Biloxi High and Mississippi College and coach at D'Iberville High, Mississippi College, and Biloxi High. Al Pickich was a three-year letterman in football at Biloxi High where he played offensive and defensive lines. Named All-Big Eight and played in the Mississippi High School All-Star Game. Played All-Big Eight and Mississippi High School All-Star Game. Al Pickich received the 1978 Pat Patterson Award and a full football scholarship to Mississippi College where he played offensive line for four years. During his time at MC, Pickich and his team made the semi-finals for Division 2 National Championships in 1979 and he played All Gulf South Conference Division 2 in 1981 and 1982. Pickich was awarded the Mississippi State Player of the Week in 1982. Pickich coached football at Mississippi College, D'Iberville and Biloxi High Schools, and swimming and golf at Biloxi High. Under Coach Pickich, weight lifting and CrossFit training was added to the swim program and teams won State Championships in 2001, 2002, 2003, and 2004. Under Coach Pickich, girls golf teams won championships in 2016 and runner-up in 2011, 2012, and 2013.



Harold Sablich Jr.

Baseball and football player for Notre Dame High School. Harold Sablich played baseball, growing up, hitting home runs on the diamond at Savarro Park. In the eighth grade, Sablich pitched for varsity (12 grade) and hit several home runs over the railroad tracks at Lee Street baseball field. Sablich played football while in high school. From the late 1950s to 1966, Sablich's name appeared in the newspaper nearly 300 times for his outstanding feats in sports.



Johnny "Ray" Smith

Football and track and field player at M.F. Nichols and Biloxi High Schools. While at M. F. Nichols, Johnny "Ray" Smith was named All-American player and Most Valuable Player in football, and in track and field, Smith received the honor of MVP. While at Biloxi High, Smith played track and field and was named MVP and received the Booster Club Award and first place in the 440-yard relay at the Pas Point Jaycee Invitational. He also broke the record for the 220-yard dash, 440, and 880 relay. Smith received a partial scholarship to MVSU.

George L. Sumrall Jr.

Football and baseball player for Biloxi High School and the University of Southern Mississippi. George Sumrall excelled in baseball as a little league All-Star player and pitcher in 1957. Sumrall's passion for sports led him to play at Biloxi High School from 1959-1962 where he was a four-sport letterman. Sumrall played as a football halfback in the 1961 Shrimp Bowl, All-Star football team, and pitcher on the Biloxi High School baseball team. Sumrall won a football scholarship in 1962 to play at the USM. In 1965-1966, he was a starter and a letterman. He also played baseball at USM from 1965 to 1967 where Sumrall lead the team in battering average and home runs.



Tommy Williams

Baseball, basketball, and football player and coach. Tommy Williams played high school baseball, basketball, and football at Newton High School in Newton, Mississippi. He was a four-year letterman in baseball where he played in the 1953 State Championships. Williams was also a three-year letterman in basketball and a three-year letterman in football where he received the All-Choctaw Honor in 1954-1955. Williams played baseball at East Central Junior High in Decatur, Miss., and at the University of Southern Mississippi as well as semi-pro throughout Mississippi and Alabama. Williams coached sports in 7th, 8th, and 9th grades at Central High, Michele Middle School, Fernwood, and Mercy Cross schools in Biloxi as well as Pee-Wee football, baseball, and basketball.

Keesler's take on 6th Gen Learning

"We are taking a more holistic approach of how we can be faster and better," said Dr. Lynn Soots, 81st Training Group training administrator. "We want to make sure we are training to the highest quality we can."

Second Air Force is phasing out traditional instructor lead learning and transitioning to student-centered learning. The 81st TRG is accomplishing this by introducing the T4 Learning Environment.

"In the T4 Learning Environment, which stands for Teach, Technology, Tailor, and See more photos at www.keesler.af.mil Watch the Keesler update daily at 7:45 a.m., 1:45 p.m., and 7:45 p.m. on BTV. Traverse, we look at how we can train in ways that are more agile, flexible, and adaptable," said Soots. "Traverse is the most important point because that's what happens after the classroom, giving students the opportunity to study and hone their skills outside of classroom time."

Students will have access to tablets, simulators, and even apps on their personal devices to further increase their skills and knowledge outside of the classroom, increasing

the capability of our multi-capable Airmen.

"What the Airmen have already available to them in their lives is very quick; technology is very quick; information is very quick. To ask students to suddenly reverse their ways of learning is taking them out of their element," said Soots. "How we fight is not going to be just boots on the ground anymore, it's being a commanding force in cyber, space, and information. To maintain our dominant

power, we need to train with the future in mind. We need to tap into the best quality of education we possibly can."

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Biloxi finds new home for aging fire trucks

The Greenville Fire Department was in Biloxi recently to take delivery of two aging Biloxi Fire trucks.

Biloxi Asst. Chief Jason Davis met with firefighters of the Greenville Fire Department in mid-July to hand off the keys and to do a walk around before they hit the highway to their new home.

Greenville Fire Department, located in central Mississippi just miles from Rolling Fork, serves their city and supports the surrounding community where these trucks will be utilized. The tanker pumper trucks hold up to 1000 gallons of water, allowing firefighters to fight fires in rural areas without hydrant access.

"Volunteer firefighters often serve our rural communities with limited equipment resources, Greenville Fire Chief Ruben Brown said. "The large capacity of water that can be transported with these pumper trucks will provide those areas much better protection."

Earlier this year, the Biloxi Fire Department visited the Greenville area after a powerful tornado devastated the nearby community of Rolling Fork in late March. Firefighters were able to see and hear firsthand what the communities needed. And since the city recently purchased three new state-of-the-art trucks for nearly \$1.7 million, it put the department in a position to offer the aging pumpers a new life.

"We are happy that we have the opportunity to transfer a truck to a department in need," Biloxi Fire Chief Nick Geiser said. "The truck is no longer being used by the department and is not needed. We were also able to provide the Greenville Fire Department with a second truck for \$25,000."

Biloxi remembers well the outpouring of support following Hurricane Katrina. With the recent severe weather experienced in that area of our state, this is another way for Biloxi to assist other Mississippians in their time of need.

Added Fire Chief Brown: "On behalf of the City of Greenville, I sincerely thank Biloxi Fire Chief Nick Geiser, Asst. Fire Chief Jason Davis, Mayor Gilich, and the Biloxi City Council for making this transfer of equipment possible. It will definitely assist in the life-saving efforts of our community. "




St. Michael 1 & 2

The Necaise Brothers Construction contract began on Jan. 4, 2021 with the next phase of infrastructure work in East Biloxi. The first order of business for this \$41.5-million project: installation of a new sanitary sewer on Howard, from Maple to Cadet, while maintaining access to the Palace Casino throughout construction. The Necaise work is scheduled to take 900 days.


Necaise Brothers Construction Water Water Mains to be installed as of July 15, 2023




Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage Drainage Mains to be installed as of July 15, 2023



Necaise Brothers Construction Drainage Drainage Mains to be installed as of July 15, 2023









Remembering the monster storm

Katrina became the new gold standard, no doubt, when the storm made landfall Aug. 29, 2005, but Mississippi filmmaker Rex Jones wanted to make sure the original monster storm, Camille, got appropriate due in 2019, when the killer storm's 50th anniversary rolled around.



All this month, the anniversary months of Camille and Katrina, the city's municipal TV channel, BTV, will be airing a replay of Jones's "Camille: The original monster storm." The hour-long documentary airs at 8 a.m., 8 p.m., and 2 each afternoon throughout August.

Camille ranks as the second-most intense hurricane to strike the continental United States, claiming the lives of 256 individuals and causing more than \$1 billion in damage.

This month's recipe:

Tomato Watermelon Salad

BR Prime, Beau Rivage

875 Beach Blvd.

Salad ingredients

- 5 Each Heirloom Tomatoes cut into 1 ½ inch chunks
- 1 Each Small Watermelon cut into 1 ½ inch chunks
- 1 Tsp Sea Salt
- 1 Tsp Sugar
- 2 Tbls Chopped Fresh Mint
- 1/4 Cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 2 Tbls Calamansi Vinegar
- 1 Recipe Spicy Tahini Sauce
- 3 Tbls Pistachios

Instructions for the salad

Combine cubed tomatoes and watermelon in large, nonreactive bowl and toss gently to combine. Add sugar and salt and let stand 5 to 10 minutes while you prepare the dressing. Whisk together oil and vinegar and season with salt and pepper to taste. Toss the watermelon and tomatoes with the dressing. Top with Spicy Tahini Sauce, fresh mint, and pistachios.

Spicy Tahini Sauce Ingredients

- 2 Tbls Coriander
- 2 Tsp Cumin
- 1 Each Jalapeno
- 12 Cloves Garlic
- 1/2 Cup Fresh Squeezed Lemon Juice
- 1 Cup Tahini
- 1/2 Cup Mint
- 1/2 Cup Cilantro
- TT TT Salt & Pepper

Instructions for the sauce

Combine all ingredients in blender and blend until smooth. Adjust consistency with water.

THREE FIRES By Paige Gutierrez

Biloxi Community Center, 1966

On August 20, 1966, The Daily Herald reported that "The Biloxi Community Center, a large wood frame building which served many years as the USO Center, was destroyed by fire Friday afternoon. The loss was estimated at \$160,000. Fire broke out in the southeast corner of the building on the south side of Highway 90 at Main Street about 4 p.m., and within a short while, the entire roof had collapsed.

All units from the Biloxi fire department, along with units from Pascagoula, Ocean Springs, d'Iberville, Gulfport and Keesler AFB, were able to do little to control the blaze which roared through the structure... flames reached as high as 50 feet and a cloud of black smoke trailed across the city over the Bay of Biloxi, blown by a south wind. 'We had five lines on the front of the building at one time and it didn't faze the fire,' said Bn. Chief Vearl Parker, one of the firemen in charge."

The large building burned down in about an hour and a half. Among items lost in the fire were uniforms for Colt and Pony League baseball teams and Peewee football teams, as well as musical instruments owned by The Outrage, a teen-age band scheduled to play for a dance at the community center that evening. Firefighters worked into the night to prevent the fire's spread to nearby buildings and the many cypress trees near the site. Source: The Daily Herald.

Accomo Hotel and Restaurant, 1972

A Mississippi Blues Trail marker for Biloxi's central Main Street reads as follows: "The Mississippi Coast, long a destination for pleasure seekers, tourists, and gamblers, as well as maritime workers and armed services

personnel, developed a flourishing nightlife during the segregation era. While most venues were reserved for whites, this stretch of Main Street catered to the African American trade, and especially during the boom years during and after World War II, dozens of clubs and cafes here rocked to the sounds of blues, jazz, and rhythm & blues."

A part of this history was lost in a fire on November 22, 1972. The Daily Herald reported that "Biloxi's oldest Negro hotel, the Accomo Hotel and Restaurant, was gutted by an early morning fire today. The hotel, located at 744 Main St. and a mecca for some of the nation's foremost Negro bands during and immediately following World War II, was

gutted and virtually destroyed within 45 minutes after the fire had broken out. The hotel was originally a nightclub, known as the Paradise Gardens. Later, it was converted into a rooming house and finally into a hotel." Famous entertainers who appeared at the hotel included blues, rhythm & blues, and rock & roll greats Fats Domino, Guitar Slim, Chuck Willis, Johnny Otis and others.

The fire was attributed to a faulty space heater. Source: The Daily Herald.

Buck Theatre, Mardi Gras Night Parade, 1966

On February 23, 1966, The Daily Herald reported on the prior evening's unexpected Mardi Gras drama: "The Buck Theatre was gutted by flames Tuesday night in Biloxi in a fire that broke out as the Mardi Gras parade was passing. Two other buildings were destroyed in the fire which was fought by units from four Coast cities and Keesler Air Force Base in addition to the Biloxi equipment. The blaze broke out during the height of the gala night parade, climax of the day of merriment." The Queen's float had already passed the Buck Theatre at the corner of Lameuse and Jackson Streets when the fire was reported at 8:50 p.m. The two units immediately behind the Queen's float – the Sacred Heart Girls High School band and the Duke's float – were sent east on Jackson Street as firefighters cleared Lameuse Street. Other parade units were turned west at a safer distance from the fire, on Water Street. After the blaze was brought under control. firemen and civilians worked through the night fighting hotspots. By Ash Wednesday morning, the fire was out. Source: The Daily Herald
