




Sales tax collections are record-breaking For several months now, 28 to be exact, "Confidence in what is happening here in

For several months now, 28 to be exact, Biloxi has seen record sale tax collections, with July being a record-breaking month. The numbers were reported in mid-August showing more than \$1.4 million in sales tax collections in July, making it the highest reported monthly sales tax revenue in decades, possibly even in the history of Biloxi. Records continue to be set monthly with figures eclipsing the million-dollar mark for more than 28 months in a row. "Trends continue to move in the right

direction," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich said. "Growth is taking place, bringing more people to Biloxi."

Community Development Director Jerry Creel says that there are a number of factors that contribute to the upward trend. "Confidence in what is happening here in Biloxi is evident," Creel said. "Single-family home inventory has greatly increased, as well as commercial businesses and retail shops. The number of events taking place in Biloxi also contributes to people staying and shopping in our city."

Added Gilich: "The numbers don't lie and they are up. Our goal is to keep people coming back and to continue to make Biloxi a safe, friendly, and beautiful community that all want to enjoy."

East Biloxi Community Center in the offing



After years of talk and infrastructure work, a new community center in East Biloxi is closer to reality. Renderings have been created and plans are in the works for a more than 13,000-square-foot facility to be built on Lee Street south of the Salvation Army Kroc Center. The community center is estimated to cost \$3 million and includes a basketball court, restrooms, and meeting rooms.

No timeline has been set for the completion of the plans or for construction.



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Upgrades underway at A.J. Holloway Sports Complex

For nearly two decades, the A.J. Holloway Sports Complex has been the sports headquarters for Biloxi youths. It has been

used by hundreds of athletes participating in football, soccer, softball, baseball, and cheerleading. Over the years, the considerable use of the facility has caused wear and tear. So, the city set a game plan in place and is advancing on an improvements plan.

Contractors with J.E. Talley Construction, Inc. have been awarded a \$5.16 million contract job that is set to begin early this month. The 270-day project, weather

permitting, includes adding artificial turf and sod to the baseball and softball fields, regrading the soccer and football fields, upgrading the drainage and irrigation in the baseball fields, and paving and striping the park areas.

"We have seen an increased participation in youth sports over the last few years," said Jamie Lee, Parks & Recreation assistant director. "And we have also seen an increase in teams not being able to play because of drainage issues. So, we felt now was the time to tackle this massive project."

This is also the time for youth football and cheerleading to take place. The games are

usually played at the complex and Lee says they will continue.

"The contractors and the Parks & Recreation

Department are working together to allow play during the improvement project," Lee said. "Work will first begin on the ballfields so that the football and cheering leagues will be able to hold their season at the complex over on the west side fields."

The project, funded by the general obligation bonds, is made of up several phases which will overlap at times but the city is working to lessen the disruption.

According to the city's engineering

department, which oversees the contractors, the baseball and softball fields are required to be finished by the end of February and work cannot begin on the soccer and football fields until after the first of January.

Added Lee: "There may be a little inconvenience at times but overall, this will allow for more playability for our city leagues, opening up more options and fewer rainouts."

The A.J. Holloway Sports Complex is a 68-acre site south of Popp's Ferry and Cedar Lake roads. The complex opened in 2003 and includes concessions stands and restrooms.

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The Shuckers are set to make a playoff push and fight for a title in September

It's down to the final stretch of the 2023 Biloxi Shuckers season as we head to September! The Shuckers, looking to lock up a playoff spot for the first time since 2019, have one final homestand from September 12 to 17 against the Montgomery Biscuits.

If the Shuckers make the Southern League Playoffs, they'll host the Pensacola Blue Wahoos at MGM Park on Tuesday, September 19. If they advance to the championship series, which they did in 2015, 2018, and 2019, they'll host games two and three at MGM Park.

In August, the Shuckers made sure there were plenty of memories on and off the field. On Saturday, August 12, the Shuckers made a \$10,000 donation to Moss Point Parks and Recreation through the Heart of a Shucker Community Fund. The donation, set to help the recovery efforts after a devastating tornado hit the city in mid-June, was the largest of the 2023 season.

The Shuckers also celebrated Brittney Reese on the same night with a bobblehead giveaway presented by Keesler Federal Credit Union. Reese, a three-time

Olympic medalist, and a seven-time world champion, was honored throughout the night as the Shuckers celebrated Women in Sports. Even with the season winding down, there are plenty of opportunities to cheer on Shuckers during their final homestand and a hopeful playoff run.

On Tuesday, September 12, the Shuckers will host a Strike out the Stigma T-Shirt Giveaway presented by Gulfport Behavior Health Systems. They'll also host their final Bark in the Park night on Wednesday. The Shuckers will then celebrate Ocean Springs on Thursday with a first pitch from Mayor Kenny Holloway.

On Friday, September 15, the Shuckers will blast off with their final fireworks show of the season presented by Waste Pro on First Responders and Frontline Workers Night. The night will also include a special military flyover before the first pitch.

The Shuckers will wear special YMCA jerseys on Saturday night to be auctioned off during the game before fan appreciation day on Sunday! On Saturday night, the Shuckers will honor their final recipient of the season from the Heart of a

Shucker Community Fund.

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Participation in city youth sports on the rise

"When we began registration for youth football and cheerleading, we set a goal of enlisting more players this year than last year," said Cheryl Bell, Biloxi Parks & Recreation director, "We are proud to say the numbers increased from 275 to 365. That is more than a 30 percent increase in one year."

Registration for this year's youth leagues took place on two Saturdays in early August as it normally does. But what made the difference? Well, when youngsters walked into the Donal M. Snyder Sr. Community Center on Pass Road to sign up for the city leagues, they were greeted by a number of Biloxi High football players and cheerleaders.

"Partnering with the Biloxi High athletics has made a huge difference in our numbers." Bell said. "We even had to put a call out for more coaches."

Bell said that youth league sports are a development of school sports. It gets the children ready for school ball and shows them where they can go in sports.

The 2023 season begins this month with sixteen teams. Here is the breakdown:

• Ages 5-6, flag football - 60 players

making up four teams;

- Ages 7-8, flag football - 65 players making up four teams;
- Ages 9-10, tackle football - 65 players making up four teams:
- Ages 11-12, tackle football - 50 players making up two teams;
- Ages 5-12, cheerleading - 100 members.

Opening day is set for Saturday, Sept. 9 with activities at the A.J. Holloway Sports

Complex, 765 Wells Drive. League games will follow on Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the complex until the end of the season, which usually wraps up in late October.

In addition to the increased number of players, the Biloxi Parks & Recreation Department is bringing back its City Bowl for each of the age groups. The bowl will take place in October at the Biloxi High School Stadium where the

youth league players will run out of the tunnel onto the field with high football players and cheerleaders.

What to know before you roll

Low-speed vehicles, primarily golf carts, are allowed on city streets with limits of 25 mph or lower, but, before you roll down the road, your golf cart needs to be legal.

Golf carts must be inspected by the police department and must have the required safety features. The process includes an on-site inspection. After a successful inspection, the applicant must pay a \$75 fee at the police department before the annual registration sticker is installed.

Is your golf cart legal?

First things, first. Does your golf cart or low-speed vehicle meet the requirements of being legal? Here is what police will be looking for in the way of required, functioning safety equipment:

- Headlamps
- Tail Lamps
- Stop Lamps
- Front and Rear Turn signals
- Operational Horn
- Red Reflectors (one per side, one on rear of vehicle)
- Parking Brake
- Windshield (provides eye protection for the front-seat passengers with an unobscured view)
- Vehicle Identification Number (Provided) by the manufacturer, generated by the Mississippi Tax Commission)
- · Seatbelts for all seating positions
- Mirrors (drivers side exterior and/or exterior passenger, interior rear view)
- Unobstructed Rear Visibility

An important note

No golf cart or vehicle designed to go faster than 25 mph can be approved as a low-speed vehicle.

How to register your golf cart

After verifying your safety equipment is properly functioning, set up an onsite inspection by emailing Isvregistration@ biloxi.ms.us or calling 228-385-3033. The police will need your name, address, and phone number.

After successful inspection, you'll go to the Lopez-Quave Public Safety Center, 170 Porter

Ave., and pay a \$75 fee before the decal can be installed.

Who can drive the golf cart

Driving a golf cart on a city street has the same standards as driving a vehicle. The driver must have a valid driver's license or valid driver's permit and proof of insurance at time of inspection and when operating golf cart.

Where you can drive

Golf carts can only be driven on city streets with a speed limit of 25 mph or less. In some cases, you can cross a street with a speed limit higher than 25 mph. Golf carts must adhere to all rules of the road.

Where you cannot drive a golf cart

Golf carts are not allowed on any city street that has a

speed limit of more than 25 mph. This means no golf carts are allowed on U.S. 90. In fact, golf carts are not allowed on, over or across any interstate or state highway. This also means no golf carts will be allowed south of U.S. 90.

Golf carts are permitted to cross certain streets that exceed the 25 mph speed limit, but only for the purpose of crossing these streets, in which case the shortest traveling distance to do so shall be required at an intersection signalized by a traffic light.

The cost

A \$75 registration fee is required annually which means decals are to be updated each year in the issue month. New decals can be obtained at the Lopez-Quave Public Safety Center.

Pet therapy at Keesler: Creating a paw-sitive environment

Overall, both military men and women were nearly twice as likely to report feeling high levels of stress in their military work (39%) than in their family life (22%), according to the National Library of Medicine.

Having networks and relationships that can offer physical and psychological can help military members and

their families feel a sense of belonging and community.

Keesler provides multiple resources for Airmen and their families who may need the support, including four-legged friends.

"Having a therapy animal creates connections between people where sometimes they may be hesitant to start a conversation," said LisaMarie Mariglia, 81st Training Wing violence prevention integrator. "You can talk to your resiliency trainers and violence prevention facilitators, but some people feel a burden when they ask. Part of my job is bringing people together to be healthy, and people naturally gravitate towards other living things."

Mariglia worked with 81st Training Wing leadership to implement a pet

therapy team at the wing level. She and her bernedoodle, Charlotte, conduct morale visits around base. In addition to the wing pet therapy team, volunteers with Visiting Pet Teams of South Mississippi visit patients and staff at the

and technical training students at the Levitow

Levitow for Right Start, where different base organizations set up for the Airmen, and then we have the dogs here," said Tech. Sgt. Kristen Doyle, 335th Training Squadron military training leader.

The therapy dogs are trained to interact with and provide comfort to people and help provide a sense of home to new technical training Airmen who are adjusting to Air Force life. The VPTSM Keesler pet therapy coordinator, Sandie Schlett, explained she often hears about Airmen's pets when she and her therapy dog, Xena, are at Keesler.

> "You just see people's faces light up and it takes their mind off what's going on for a minute, gives them a little mental break," said Schlett.

The infrastructure work in Biloxi

The city currently has two major infrastructure projects underway, St. Michael 1 & 2 taking place in East Biloxi and Beauvoir 1, 2, & 3 in West Biloxi along Beach Boulevard from Veterans to Debuys. Here is an update on the work.

As of mid-August, more than \$282.5 million of the more than \$355 million-dollar infrastructure program has been completed. \$39.6 million is under active construction, with \$18.3 million remaining under construction in the St.

Michael's project area and an additional \$21.3 million is under construction in the Beauvoir project area, along Beach Boulevard between Debuys Road and Veterans Avenue.


All roads east of Oak Street in the St. Michael project will have the final layer of asphalt placed. Construction will continue west of Oak Street, between Oak Street and Holley Street.

On the Beauvoir project, work on Brady Drive, the water, sewer, and drainage will be completed in September on the south portion of Brady Drive. The south portion accounts for 85 percent of the work. Once that work is complete, Necaise Brothers Construction will move to the north portion of Brady Drive.

And throughout the month in the Beauvoir project, contractors, along with City of Biloxi and Harrison County crews, will be weed-eating and mowing the grass adjacent to Beach Boulevard in preparation for Cruisin' The Coast.







Mardi Gras Pasta and Crab Cakes

Biloxi Firefighters, Station 10 See Capt. Gable's version on "Biloxi Cooks!"

Pasta ingredients:

- 12 ounces fettuccine
- 8 tablespoons butter, divided
- 1 pound medium to large shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 1 teaspoon Cajun seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 4 green onions, sliced
- 1/4 cup diced yellow pepper
- 1/4 cup diced green pepper

- 1 cup sliced mushrooms
- 12 ounces andouille sausage, sliced

Biloxi

- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 cup diced tomato
- · 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan
- · 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- salt and pepper

<u>Instructions</u>

- Cook pasta in salted water according to package directions. Drain.
- While water comes to boil and pasta cooks, melt 2 tablespoons of butter in large skillet.
- Sprinkle shrimp with cajun seasoning and paprika. Cook in butter until they turn pink.
- Remove with slotted spoon and set aside.
- Add remaining butter to skillet. When melted, add onion, bell peppers, mushrooms, and sausage and cook until sausage is browned and veggies are soft.
- Stir in the garlic and tomato and cook 1 minute.
- · Stir in heavy cream and simmer until thickened some.
- Add lemon juice, Parmesan, and parsley. Stir to melt Parmesan.
- · Check for seasoning and add salt and pepper to taste.
- Remove from heat. Add fettuccine and shrimp and mix in.

Crab Cake Ingredients:

- · 4 tablespoons butter
- 8 ounces lump crabmeat
- · 6 ounces crabmeat
- 1 tablespoons dry bread crumbs
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon coarse ground black pepper
- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- ½ teaspoon hot sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon ground dry mustard

Crab Cake Instructions:

- 1. Mix together crabmeat, bread crumbs, parsley, salt and pepper.
- Beat together egg, mayonnaise, hot sauce and mustard. Combine with other ingredients and mix well.
- 3. Form into patties and place on a baking sheet.
- 4. Add half the butter to the large skillet and add the crab cakes to the skillet on medium heat, cooking for 5-7 minutes.
- Flip the crab cakes with a flat spatula gently, add the remaining butter and cook for an additional 5 minutes.



The first Howard II school, 1902

On November 27, 1902, a crowd then believed to be the largest ever assembled in Biloxi gathered on East Howard Avenue near Maple Street. The occasion was the laying of the cornerstone by the Grand Lodge of Masons of Mississippi for the new Howard II school on Point Cadet. The Daily Herald reported that "A big barbecue was held. There was a large quantity of beef, bread, butter, pickles, etc., served to the crowd on that day. It was estimated that at least 5,000 attended."

For the next 27 years, this two-story school building served the children and families of rapidly growing Point Cadet, a neighborhood of seafood factory workers, fishermen, canneries, and related marine businesses. The many newcomers who arrived during that time included people from Croatia, known then as Slavonians, and from French-speaking parts of south Louisiana, joining families from many other diverse backgrounds, contributing to the seacoast cultural mix of Biloxi, more typical of New Orleans rather than of noncoastal Mississippi.

The second Howard II school, 1929

By the late 1920s the school was so overcrowded that a second "Howard II" was built. On January 17, 1929, The Daily Herald reported "Biloxians in general

and pupils." Over the door was carved the name "Harry T. Howard," benefactor. Officials envisioned a long life for the new school, stating that "when Biloxi builds, she builds permanently."

School as neighborhood community center

The first Howard II lacked an auditorium for assemblies and performances. The second Howard II had a state-of-theart auditorium with theatre seats, a 27-foot stage with concealed footlights, a projection booth, plush curtains, and a baby grand piano. Most importantly, it was large enough to hold community events

in an era when elementary school buildings served as neighborhood community centers. With a student body of 362, the auditorium had 450 seats downstairs and 100 seats in the balcony.

Beginning in the late 1970s and 1980s Vietnamese families joined others on Point Cadet working in the seafood industry. By the early 1990s over 50 percent of the students at Howard II were Vietnamese. Howard II welcomed these newcomers. The school published a Vietnamese language newsletter for parents and provided classes in English as a second language. Staff encouraged cross-cultural understanding through hosting festive traditions at school such as the Tet New Year dragon dance and local Gulf Coast Mardi Gras customs. As for earlier generations of Point Cadet residents, Howard II served as a community center for the neighborhood. Teachers of the time described it as "a happy school."

The 76-year-old historic building was no longer serving as the neighborhood school when it was destroyed by fire in the early hours of July 5, 2005.
