










Two Popp's Ferry projects in the offing

Two high-profile Popp's Ferry facilities, the Popp's Ferry Bridge and the Popp's Ferry Causeway Park loop pier, have received a major boost for some muchneeded work.

In October, the Biloxi City Council approved an agreement with the Mississippi Department of Transportation for a \$12 million grant with a \$3 million match from the city to replace the draw span and the locks of the Popp's Ferry bridge. The bridge, a north-south connector used by nearly 20,000 motorists a day, continuously causes headaches for motorists because of draw malfunctions. This grant will allow a mechanical system upgrade and maintenance overhaul of the draw, prolonging the service life of the bridge and alleviating the draw malfunctions.

So what's next? According to the city's engineering department, the city, along with MDOT, will go through a process of selecting a design consultant who will then design the project. Once the design is complete, the city will bid the project for the construction.


There is no time set at this time for the lengthy process to be complete and for work to begin.

The nearly 45-year-old bridge is a three-quarter mile, two-lane, low-level bridge that connects I-10 at Cedar Lake to Beach Boulevard via Beauvoir Road. The replacement of the bridge is in the plans for the Popp's Ferry corridor, part of the overall plan known as the Biloxi Beach Connector. The plan includes a four-lane roadway that connects from Beach Boulevard at the new Popp's Ferry extension, includes a new, higher Popp's Ferry bridge, and connects to I-10 at Shriners Boulevard, which also provides access to Miss. Hwy 67. The city has begun the process and is continuing to

seek funding.

Also, last month the Secretary of State's office announced the allocation of \$500,000 in Tidelands Funds for the demolition and repair of the Popp's Ferry Causeway loop pier. The pier was damaged in 2020 by Tropical Storm Cristobal and Hurricane Zeta and has sat dormant while the city sought funding from FEMA, which was denied.

The city expects to bid for the construction of the project next year.








Maintaining the water tanks

Biloxi's water production and distribution system consists of 24 deep wells, 11 water tanks, and many miles of pipe, along with other equipment such as emergency generators that keep the wells pumping when there are power outages.



The 11 water tanks include seven elevated tanks such as the one shown in the picture and four on-ground tanks. These tanks not only provide storage but also provide the water pressure needed for residential and commercial use and, of course, water pressure in the 2,619 fire hydrants needed for firefighting.


In 2019, the City began a much-needed repair and maintenance effort on our tanks. Financed by the City's water-sewer fund, the City entered

into a contract with Utility Services Corporation to clean, repair, and paint the four on-ground tanks. While this effort is long term, each tank

> is actually a separate contract, so in 2020 the city engaged **Utility Service** Corporation to clean, repair, and paint the inactive Kuhn Street elevated tank and put it back in service. In 2021, the Bay Vista water tank in West Biloxi was cleaned. repaired, and painted.

The Margaret Sherry Tank and Crazy Horse Tank are scheduled for 2024 and 2025 respectively, with 6th Street Tank, Broadwater Tank and Woolmarket Tank scheduled in the following years.

This long overdue rehabilitation of water tanks, along with replacement of aged water lines in West Biloxi, is being funded without borrowed money but instead from the City's water-sewer enterprise fund.

CTA bus fare increase: On Nov. 3. Coast Transit Authority bus rate increase goes into effect. Regular

adult bus fare goes from

\$1.50 to \$1.75. The half fares (senior citizens, Medicare, disabled) go from \$0.75 to \$0.85. This increase will not affect any other fares, any daily, 3-day, or 31day passes, or the ADA/ Paratransit rates.

Keep safety in mind this holiday season

Fire cooking safety is essential to prevent accidents and ensure a pleasant and successful cooking experience.

Thanksgiving is the leading day of the year for home fires involving cooking equipment.

Keep children away from the stove. Have activities that keep kids out of the kitchen such as games, puzzles, or books, to keep them busy.

Here are some key fire cooking safety tips:

1. Location and Equipment:

- Choose a safe location for your cooking activities, away from flammable materials and structures.
- Use appropriate cooking equipment such as grills and stoves that are in good working condition.

2. Supervision:

Never leave your cooking unattended, especially when using an open flame or hot equipment.

3. Fire Extinguishers:

Have a fire extinguisher nearby and know how to use it. Different types of fires (grease, electrical, wood) require different extinguishing methods.

Be cautious when using oil and grease; they can splatter and cause fires. Use a deep fryer for deep-frying and keep a lid nearby to smother grease fires.



Help protect our new drainage systems and local waterways

Household Hazardous Waste

- · Before beginning an outdoor project, locate the nearest storm drains and protect them from debris and other materials.
- Do not "wash out" concrete and mortar into storm drains or ditches.
- Use hazardous substances such as paints, solvents and cleaners in the smallest amounts possible; follow directions on the label. Properly store substances to avoid leaks and spills, clean up spills immediately, and properly dispose of the waste. Dispose of household chemicals at a household hazardous waste disposal site.
- Use nontoxic, biodegradable, recycled and recyclable products when possible.
- Properly dispose of excess paint through a household hazardous waste collection program; do not pour paint into the storm drain or sink.
- Reduce the amount of paved areas and increase the amount of vegetated area in your yard. Consider directing downspouts away from paved surfaces onto lawns and other measures to decrease infiltration and reduce runoff.
- Never pour fats, oils and grease down the sink or garbage disposal. After they have cooled, pour them into a container, such as an empty glass jar or coffee can. Once the container is full, secure the lid and place in the trash. Before washing dishes containing oil or grease, scrape and dry wipe with paper towels and dispose of materials in the trash.



Harrison County operates a free hazardous waste site the second Saturday of every month, from 8 a.m. until noon at 10076 Lorraine Road. The site accepts latex or oil-based paint; used cooking or automobile oil; antifreeze; household, marine and car batteries; aerosol cans; flammable liquids (such as gasoline); freezers and refrigerators; fluorescent light bulbs; tires (up to 25 a household); and computers, cell phones, telephones, televisions. Do not bring items in containers larger than five gallons. No herbicides, pesticides, asbestos, rubber cement, roofing material, explosives, pharmaceuticals, chemicals, construction debris, furniture, or waste from businesses. Pet Care

 When walking your pet, pick up pet waste and dispose of properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks; harmful bacteria and nutrients wash into ditches, storm

drains and eventually into local water bodies.



If you own a septic tank:

- Have a professional inspect your septic tank at least every three years and have the septic tank pumped as necessary (usually every three to five years).
- Care for the septic system drain field by not driving or parking vehicles on it. Plant only grass over and near the drain field to avoid damage by roots.
- · Flush responsibly. Flushing household chemicals such as paint, pesticides, oil and antifreeze can destroy the biological treatment taking place in the system. Other items such as diapers, paper towels, and cat litter can clog the septic system and damage components.

If you're connected to the city sanitary sewer system:

- · Check your sewer "clean out" periodically to ensure the line is not clogged or that sewage is leaking out of the "clean out" into your lawn.
- . Ensure that the sewer "clean out" cap is on properly to prohibit rain water from infiltrating the sewer system and causing overflows.
- · Avoid planting trees and shrubs above or near the service lateral that runs from your house or building to the sewer main. Roots damage sewers.

• Flush responsibly. Wastewater treatment plants are not designed to remove pollutants from household chemicals such as paint, pesticides, oil and antifreeze. Never flush or pour down the sink any household chemicals or other items such as diapers, paper towels, and cat litter. They can clog the sewer system.

• DO NOT flush "flushable" wipes. They do not disintegrate well. They clog septic tanks and damage sanitary sewer systems. They should be thrown in the trash.

With the first full month of the Biloxi Shuckers off-season officially wrapped up, the Shuckers are preparing for an incredible year of baseball in 2024. Awards for 2023 have been announced, 2024 game times are here, and the Shuckers have announced a few additions to the baseball slate this off-season!

THE AWARDS

With a team as talented as the 2023 Biloxi Shuckers, one that broke nine different franchise records, the yearly awards across the Brewers' organization and the Southern League were dominated by Shuckers.

On the pitching side, right-handed pitching star Carlos Rodriguez was named the Southern League Pitcher of the Year, but it wasn't the only award that Rodriguez took home. He became the second pitcher in Brewers' franchise history to win the organization's Minor League Pitcher of the Year award twice, and the first to win it back-to-back.

Rodriguez was one of three Shuckers honored by the Brewers, along with Jackson Chourio and Tyler Black. The two shared the organization's Minor League Player of the Year honors, and Chourio became the first player in Brewers' franchise history to win the award twice.

With the record-shattering performances

throughout the year from the Shuckers, it was also no surprise to see them dominate the league's All-Star team, earning a franchise-record four selections. Carlos Rodriguez, Tyler Black, Jackson Chourio, and Jeferson Quero were all selected, the most out of any team in the league.

COLLEGE BASEBALL IS BACK IN BILOXI

College baseball has been on display at MGM Park numerous times over the Shuckers' nine years on the Coast, and is set to continue this off-season.

Auburn, an SEC powerhouse who has hosted back-to-back NCAA Regionals as a national seed at Plainsman Park, is set to make a trip to MGM Park for the first time in program history to face the Louisiana Tech Bulldogs on Saturday, November 4. The game is one of two fall baseball exhibition games at MGM Park, with the other coming on Sunday, October 29 between Southeastern Louisiana and Samford.

The Shuckers also announced that the Southern Miss Golden Eagles will be returning to Biloxi for the first time since winning back-to-back Conference-USA Tournament titles at MGM Park in 2018 and 2019. Southern Miss will take on Nicholls on Tuesday, February 27 at MGM Park.

Tickets for all college games are available through the Shuckers Box Office and Ticketmaster.

The Shuckers have also officially announced their first pitch times for all 69 home games in 2024. Fans can get tickets for 2024 Shuck Nation Memberships with a \$100 deposit by emailing the Shuckers Sales Department or by calling 228-233-3465. Members will gain early entry to games through an exclusive Shuck Nation Gate and earn additional perks with a membership.

For most games on Tuesday through Friday, first pitch is scheduled for 6:35 p.m., with gates opening at 5:30 p.m. for fans and at 5:15 p.m. for Shuck Nation members. The two exceptions will be on Tuesday, May 7, and Wednesday, May 8. The Shuckers will start at 6:05 p.m. on Tuesday against the Biscuits before playing an 11:05 a.m. game on Wednesday in Biloxi. The Shuckers will also play one Monday home game in 2024, facing off against the Mississippi Braves at 6:35 p.m. on July 1.

"The 16-week program covers numerous topics and is project-based," said Lt. Col. Christopher Donahue, 335th TRS commander. "Students are

Talk of the town

Details regarding individuals in the photo from a Biloxi Daily Herald article dated April 2, 1960, and gathered from a 1956 article by Ray M. Thompson.

According to a 1902 Times-Picayune article, "E. Bakeler is the manager of Biloxi News, which handles newspapers, periodicals, and magazines and the latest books of the day, with a sideline of tobacco and cigars."

Eugene Bakeler came to Biloxi in the late 1880s from New Orleans, where he worked as a bell boy for D.H. Holmes. It is said that he later influenced another New Orleanian, Ed Barq, a sugar chemist, to relocate to Biloxi, where he opened his first pop factory.

Bakeler's shop was located at 433 Reynoir Street, with his home directly next door. It was rumored he never left his shop or home except to vote or go to the barber. The Biloxi News Company was open seven days a week, 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., and was a hub for local commentary and opinions. All the Biloxi folks "in the know" would gather and debate the matters of the day.

Some notable regulars were Old Man Popps of Popp's Ferry, George W. Wilkes, founder of the Daily Herald in Biloxi, and J.B. Chinn, of the Biloxi Milling Company that once sat at the northeast corning of Magnolia Street. I'm sure it made for a fascinating and informative publication.





How did the restaurant get its name? Well, the restaurant is inspired by "Las Vegas' popular dining hot spot and the salt of the Gulf waters and the ivy found on the stately Southern homes and gardens," (https://beaurivage.mgmresorts.com/en/ restaurants/salt-and-ivy.html).

"Biloxi Cooks!" airs at 7 a.m., 1 p.m., and 7 p.m. daily throughout November.

This month's recipe:

Lump Crab Cakes with Hollandaise Sauce and Poached Eggs

Salt & Ivy, Beau Rivage

Hollandaise Sauce

Ingredients: (Yield: 1 cup)

- 4 Egg yolks
- 1 tbsp Fresh squeezed lemon juice
- 1/2 cup Unsalted butter
- · Pinch Cayenne pepper
- Pinch Salt

Instructions:

- 1. Vigorously whisk egg yolks and lemon juice together in stainless-steel bowl until mixture is thickened and doubled in volume.
- 2. Place bowl over a saucepan containing barely simmering water, or use a double boiler. Water should not touch bottom of bowl. Continue to whisk rapidly. Be careful not to let eggs get too hot or they will scramble.
- 3. Slowly drizzle in melted butter and continue to whisk until sauce is thickened and doubled in volume.
- 4. Remove from heat, whisk in cayenne and salt. Cover and place in a warm spot until ready to use. If sauce gets too thick, whisk in a few drops of warm water before serving.

Poached Eggs

Ingredients:

• 1.5 tbsp Vinegar 1 Egg

Instructions:

- 1. Bring a large pot of water to a boil, then reduce heat to low.
- 2. While waiting for water to boil, crack an egg into a small fine mesh sieve over a bowl. Swirl egg in the sieve until all liquidy egg whites have been removed. Then, place egg in a ramekin.
- 3. Stir vinegar into the water and create a vortex. Add egg to the middle of vortex and cook egg for 3 minutes.
- 4. Remove egg with a slotted spoon and dab it on a paper towel to remove excess water. Serve immediately.

Crab Cake Recipe

Ingredients: (Yield: about 18, 2 oz portions)

- 1 lb Fresh Lump Crabmeat
- 10.5 oz Mayonnaise
- 1 1/3 tbsp Creole Mustard
- 1 1/3 tbsp Fresh Squeezed Lemon Juice 2 oz Red Bell Pepper, small dice
- 1 ½ tsp Worchetershire Sauce
- 1 ½ tsp Crystal Hot Sauce
- ¾ tsp Old Bay Seasoning
- 1 ½ tsp Granulated Onion Instructions:

- 1 ½ tsp Granulated Garlic
- 6 ½ oz Oyster Crackers
- · 2 oz Red Onion, small dice
- 2 oz Green Bell Pepper, small dice
- 2 oz Yellow Bell Pepper, small dice
- 1 ½ oz Cilantro, finely chopped
- 1 1/2 oz Green Onion, finely sliced

1. Combine ingredients in large bowl, mix well.

- 2. Add crab meat (be sure to check meat for any hard and sharp cartilage) and Oyster Crackers; using a rubber spatula, gently fold mixture together until just combined, being careful not to shred crab meat.
- 3. Shape into cakes (each about 2 ounces) and place on prepared baking sheet. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour. This helps them set.

Alligator Gars and Spanish Moss: Early Keesler Field By Paige Gutierrez

A New Record

On October 29, 1941, the *The Keesler Field News* reported a record set for Biloxi's new Army Air Force base:

Using a 250-test pull hand line and a three-inch shark hook, Corp. Albert T. Niccolai of the 413th Squadron last week bagged the largest alligator gar ever caught by a Keesler Field soldier.

The 6-foot fish, weighing 120 pounds, took about 20 minutes to land and had to be slugged before the night was over. It was caught at the Southern Shell Company pier in the Back Bay of Biloxi, east of Keesler Field, late at night after several hours of fishing in which the corporal also caught a smaller gar weighing 60 pounds and an 85-pound sand shark.

Corporal Niccolai's huge fish was one of many entered in Keesler's alligator gar tournament, open to all Keesler soldiers. These gars were described as "large prehistoric-looking fish" that were sometimes mistaken for alligators in the water.

The newspaper further reported:

The tournament, smacking more of the old-time wild west rodeo in excitement, had no restrictions placed on the manner of catching the fish and no holds barred, even to lasso coming into play. In landing, however, the rules barred shooting the fish.

The soldiers used rods and reels, throw lines, spears, bows and arrows, and, at night, flares. For most of them it was their first taste of such fishing, and they made the most of their opportunity. The waters fished were Bay of Biloxi, Bayou of Bernard, Biloxi River, Tchouticabouffa River, Fort Bayou and its tributaries, and the Mississippi Sound from Gulfport to Ocean Springs.

Prizes were given every two weeks for the heaviest fish, and every month for the greatest number caught. A lieutenant colonel donated the grand prize: "a handsome silver trophy, inscribed with the name of the winner."

Fisherman's Paradise

The Keesler newspaper told troops that "our Back Bay is a real fisherman's paradise, with brackish water with tarpon, speckled trout, white trout, redfish and more. From the standpoint of the Army, this is one of the few military posts in the country where many kinds of fish can be caught from the reservation itself — from the elusive speckled trout to the fighting tarpon, which will drag — yes — your skiff about the bay!"


But this paradise was impacted by the overgrowth of the voracious alligator gar that decimated game and other fish populations in local waters. The tournament was encouraged by fish and wildlife officials to help reduce the numbers of the alligator gars. Alligators, the natural predators of alligator gars, had been overhunted in response to demand by high-end fashion houses for valuable alligator skins. Fish and wildlife officials warned that fewer alligators meant more alligator gars.

Under Spanish Moss

When the gar rodeo started, Keesler Field was new, and construction was far from complete. Troops lived in open-air tents among the heavily mossed oaks on Back Bay. Cooking was outdoors among the trees, and church services were held "outdoors 'neath the hanging Spanish moss." For many soldiers from other parts of the country, this was an unusual, even exotic setting, especially with the unfamiliar hanging moss, much more abundant then than today. A cartoon series entitled "Spanish Moss" in *The Keesler Field News* satirized life on the new base. One such cartoon refers to the alligator gar tournament: See cartoon above left on the previous page.
