in the City of Biloxi.

Development plans and projects are consistently being presented to the Community Development staff, the Development Review Committee, the Planning Commission, and the City Council for consideration and approval.

The following is a summary of the major Commercial and Residential projects that are either under construction, under review, or in some cases under discussion:


Major Commercial Projects currently under construction include: Rouses Market on Pass Road; Barg Building on Howard Avenue; Saenger Theatre; Zaxby's Restaurant on Pass Road; Classy Chassis Car Wash on Pass Road; Reef Convenient Store and Liquor Store on Beach Boulevard and Debuys Road; Climate Control Warehouse on Cedar Lake Road; gymnasium at Fatima Church; three tenant strip center on Jam Lane; convenient store at 1670 Beach Blvd.; and a mini golf course at Finishline Performance Karting on Beach Boulevard.

Commercial projects under review include: Renovations to the former Margaritaville structure located at 160 5th St.; a 55-room expansion to the White House Hotel: a new hotel, retail center. and condo development at Beach Boulevard and Gateway Drive; a new boutique hotel at Main and Water streets; two new

hotels on Iron Horse Drive. Other Hotels still moving forward include: Tullis Gardens Resort, Agua Suites and Home 2 Suites by Hilton; convenient stores at Popp's Ferry and Jam Lane and Popp's Ferry and Tee Street; a multi-phase medical facility at

> Shriners Boulevard and North Oaklawn Road.; Saucier Family Restaurant on Woolmarket Road; Azteca Restaurant in the former Hooters building on Beach Boulevard: Two Dollar Tree Stores at Popp's Ferry and Pass Road; major improvements to A.J. Holloway Sports Complex; Take 5 oil change and car wash on Popp's Ferry; two boat and RV storage facilities on Old 67 and Hudson Krohn Road; grocery market on Division Street; a sanctuary event center on Camelia Street; a banquet hall at

development on Tribe Drive; restaurant proposals for the Redding House and the former Sal & Mookies Building; and a new entrance Road for MGCCC at Pass Road and Fula Street.

Keegan's Bayou is a tidal marsh habitat that is about a half mile in length and was originally one to five feet deep. It is located on the south side of the Biloxi Back Bay. It was once a popular place for fishing and duck hunting. Hardwood trees near its terminus, tidal brackish marsh, and tidal salt marsh make up its vegetation.

Years of illegal dumping and unregulated stormwater discharge into the bayou have compromised its ability to function effectively as a natural buffer to mitigate storm damage and decrease upland flooding and support marine and upland habitat. The bayou has become so shallow and restricted that it causes storm surge waters to back up into the Air Force Base resulting in upland flooding.

The Mississippi Legislature has approved a \$2.5 million project to restore the bayou including removal of debris, accumulated sediment, and invasive/non-native plant species. The project, funded through the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act (GOMESA), which is administered by the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources (MDMR), is pending final permitting and is expected to begin in early 2024.

The project involves restoring Keegan's Bayou. The "headwaters" or origin of the Bayou actually reaches into the heart of Keesler AFB. After leaving the Air Force Base, the bayou snakes along the south side of Division Street and then turns north and flows parallel to I-110 before entering the Back Bay.

Restoration activities include the removal of marine debris, accumulated sediment, and invasive/non-native plant species. The restoration activities will result in a reduction of nutrients being introduced into Back Bay, thus improving water quality. The sediment removal will result in stormwater control and hydrologic restoration. Environmentally appropriate measures to be taken include establishing marsh plants to slow down and disburse roadway runoff and stormwater discharged directly into the bayou to allow pollutants to settle before outfall into the bay.

WHO WAS KEEGAN?

There was a Keegan family who came from Ireland and were in Biloxi by 1851. The patriarch Michael Keegan was born in Ireland around 1830 and died on December 25, 1875. The 1870 Census lists Michael Keegan as 40 years old with the occupation of "laborer."

His widow Catherine and most of his children lived in Biloxi for the rest of their lives. Catherine Keegan purchased a house at 801 Caillavet St. (now located around 343 Caillavet St.) in 1892. Sons James and John are buried in the old Biloxi cemetery.

The family probably lived closer to the Keegan Bayou before purchasing the Caillavet Street property, thus "Keegan's Bayou." The first mention in the newspaper using the name Keegan Bayou was in 1898.

Two of Michael Keegan's grandsons still live in Biloxi - John Allen Keegan and Francis Lee Keegan.

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The Biloxi Police Department reminds you to keep these safety tips in mind this holiday season.

At home

- Lock doors and windows when you leave home, even if you plan on being gone for a short time.
- Have a neighbor or family member watch your home and collect your newspapers and mail if you're going to be away overnight.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- Do not place boxes or shipping containers from recent purchases by the roadway for trash collection. Place evidence of new purchases in trash cans or plastic bags thus making it difficult for would-be thieves to shop from your neighborhood street.
- Be sure your Christmas tree is mounted on a sturdy base so children, elderly persons, or family pets cannot pull it over on
- If you use lights on your Christmas tree ensure the wiring is not damaged or frayed. Frayed or damaged wiring can cause
- Place your live Christmas tree in water or wet sand to keep it green.
- Never place wrapping paper in your fireplace.

In your vehicle

- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area.
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your vehicle unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your vehicle. This creates temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the vehicle, lock it in the trunk or put it out of
- Be sure to locate your keys before going to your vehicle. Do not activate remote access until you are close enough to enter.

- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag, and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the vehicle to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not approach your vehicle alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- If necessary, ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

At the ATM

- If you must use an ATM, choose one that is located inside a well-lighted occupied area like a mall, convenience store, or police station. Withdraw only the amount of cash you need.
- Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.
- When using a drive-through ATM leave your vehicle in drive with your foot on the brake while completing your transaction.
- Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.

While shopping

- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Dress casually and comfortably.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Do not carry a purse or wallet, if possible.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card and avoid carrying large amounts of cash when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen, or misused.
- Membership in a credit card monitoring service is strongly recommended especially during the holiday season.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion.
- Do not make multiple trips to load your vehicle with multiple packages. This could draw the attention of criminals.
- During the holiday season "con artists" are working overtime and may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings. Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason.

West Biloxi Library reopens with a fresh new look

The West Biloxi Library has closed the book on renovations and has opened a new chapter!

After months of repairs, painting, and shuffling around books, the library reopened its doors at 2047 Pass Road with a ribbon cutting on Nov. 13.

Approximately 30,000 books were boxed and relocated to climate-controlled storage for safekeeping during renovations. The Biloxi City Council approved funding earlier this year for the structure's maintenance and the doors closed to the public on Aug. 14.

Renovations included roof repairs and replacement of the air conditioning systems as well as the replacement of ceiling tiles

and carpeting, and interior painting.

The dedicated library staff even pitched in and assisted with the project by packing up and moving the thousands of books.

They also got their hands dirty by painting some of the interior walls.

The West Biloxi library, one of four in the city, is back to filling the pages for so many by offering its free services to the public. Conveniently located to many residential areas, it is the busiest of the town's libraries.

The library was built in 1968 and received an addition in 1997.

It is open Monday-Thursday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Friday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and closed on Sunday.

Stay fire smart during the holidays

Christmas trees are a holiday tradition for many, a tradition that is often accompanied by holiday decorations. The Biloxi Fire Department is asking residents to keep fire safety in mind while choosing a tree and decorating.

"Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious," said Biloxi Fire Chief Nick Geiser. "This can become more of an issue as time goes by and trees are not properly watered."

According to the National Fire Protection Association, Christmas trees spark an average of 150 home fires per year. As for the decorations, it is estimated that U.S. firefighters

respond to an average of nearly 800 home structure fires per year that begin with decorations, excluding Christmas trees.

Firefighters are asking that when you choose your

tree, make sure it is fresh and that the limbs are still flexible so that it still has moisture. Also, make sure to water the Christmas tree every day so that it does not dry out.

Once you get the tree home, set up the tree at least three feet from the

fireplace or any other heat source. Make sure to use indoor tree lights, preferably LED lights, which produce no heat, and turn the tree lights off before going to bed or before leaving the house.

"When decorating your tree with holiday lights, you want to be careful," said Biloxi Deputy Fire Chief Caleb Hudson. "Look at them. Make sure there are no cuts or tears in the strings of lights."

Strings of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections could be a fire hazard and should be replaced before using them.

"You also want to make sure you use only the number of strings

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recommended by the manufacturer when connecting the lights together," Deputy Chief Hudson added. When it comes to wiring, these safety measures also apply to outdoor decorations.

Biloxi firefighters also ask that you turn off the lights on the tree when you leave the house or go to bed.

Added Geiser: 'As always, make sure that you have a working smoke detector and fire extinguishers to help stay fire smart during the holidays.'

Building the Sixth-Generation Learning Environment

As the Second Air Force begins efforts to modernize and transform the Air Force's basic and technical training to keep pace with modern-day, near-peer competitors, the Numbered Air Force will incorporate human performance aspects into its plans to optimize an Airman's success in training and for the rest of their lives.

"Human performance factors are critical to enhance learning ability," said Maj. Gen. Michele Edmondson, Second Air Force

Commander. "We want to make lasting impacts on an Airman's lifestyle that carry on throughout their Air Force careers."

The NAF, which oversees basic military and technical training for 93% of the Air Force, is focused on building what it calls, the "Sixth-Generation Learning Environment," which will move Air Force training past a one-size-fits-all concept to an environment where Airmen have access to information at all times, incorporates new technologies, and puts the trainee at the center of the education process rather than an instructor.

An essential pillar of this effort will be the enhancement of each Airman's potential to not only learn the competencies of their career field but to be the best person they can be to meet future

"Airmen who are properly trained, educated, and developed will accelerate change and out-think and out-perform our adversaries," said Edmondson. "Airmen are our most valuable advantage in today's great fierce competition."

resilient.

"Human performance is a variety of disciplines that encompass the mind, body, and soul," said Col Joseph Lopez, Second Air Force, Director of Special Warfare Training. "It's the holistic care and development of our young Airmen, and so the idea is we're investing in humans to be better Airmen, better suited to handle stress, operate independently or autonomously in order to meet the demands of the unknown."

Optimizing Airmen's performance involves different factors including nutrition, sleep hygiene, stress tolerance, and resilience.

Second Air Force is working toward deliberately infusing and reinforcing these foundational skills into technical training curriculums, Airmanship 200, and throughout the development lifecycle of Airmen.

"We put together an operational planning team that tied in representatives across Headquarters Air Education and Training Command, Nineteenth Air Force, Second Air Force, Special Warfare Training Wing, 81st Training Wing, and 82nd Training Wing to evaluate how everyone is getting after human performance," said Lopez. "We're enhancing the learning environment by using the human performance tools to optimize an Airman's performance beginning at the foundation of their Air Force experience." The goal is to develop empowered Airmen who are adaptable and ready for

"We are setting the foundation to produce Airmen who can think critically and possess the soft skills of complex decision-making in a war-of-attrition environment, sustaining operations long-term, and

> enduring physical and mental challenges," said Lopez. "Preparation of curriculum and practice equals confidence, which equals competent Airmen for the future fight."



Add water, milk, salt, and pepper to a pot. Bring to a boil, then add grits. Cook for 5 minutes, remove from heat, and add cheese.

Shrimp


Ingredients:

- 8 Each Shrimp
- 1 Tablespoon Blackened Seasoning
- ¼ Cup Bacon, Chopped
- 1/4 Cup Tomatoes, Diced
- 1 Tablespoon Garlic, Minced
- 1 Ounce Lemon Juice
- 1 Tablespoon Butter
- 1 Tablespoon Cilantro

Instructions:

Season shrimp with blackened seasoning. Sautee shrimp, bacon, garlic, and tomatoes until fully cooked. Deglaze with lemon juice. Finish with butter. Pour over cheese grits and garnish with cilantro.

Reynoir Street, one of Biloxi's oldest, stretches from beachfront to bay, with many neighborhoods and stories along its length. These photos capture a lost section of Reynoir Street, between the train depot and Howard Avenue, before urban renewal and other forces destroyed part of the original two-lane street and adjacent downtown neighborhood. This part of Reynoir Street, convenient to both the railroad station and busy Howard Avenue, blossomed during the era of train travel, with a city park, two hotels, the Saenger Theatre, and other businesses and residences.
