

Biloxi implements special events ordinances

Thinking of hosting an event in Biloxi? Before you set the date, there are some new rules to follow to help ensure that you host a safe event.

Throughout the year, numerous events are held in Biloxi that impact roadways and create large crowds. Take one look at the event calendar, and you will often notice multiple events on any given weekend. These events, small or large, require city resources.

To help protect the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors, special events ordinances were created to put rules and requirements in place to give organizers expectations to follow.

The City of Biloxi has implemented special event ordinances on the rental of municipal facilities, mobile food vending, and parades. When planning an event in the city, your first step should be to contact the city's special events coordinator at the Biloxi Police Department.

"We want to make sure everyone is on the same page," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich said. "The special events coordinator will have the tools for events, to schedule events in the right way to not overbook or overstress the tools we have." Here are some of the major things you need to know during event planning to make sure the event is permitted and all requirements are followed.

- Any person or organization that wants to hold an event in Biloxi is to request a special event permit.
- Permitting requirements are based on five tiers. The five tiers are categorized based on the number of extra personnel hours needed and the anticipated attendees. This ranges from more than 75 extra personnel hours and/ or anticipated attendance for more than 1000 persons to no city services required.
- Applying for a special events permit is done by filling out an application with the Special Events Coordinator, Capt. Everett.
- Applications must be completed within a timeline based on the tier the event falls under. Timelines range from 30 to 60 days prior to the event to 120 to 360 days prior to the event, depending on the anticipated attendees and the number of extra personnel hours needed.
- Completed permit applications will be provided to the Special Events Committee for recommendation of approval, conditional approval, or denial by the Mayor's office/City Administration.

Before the approval of these ordinances, the city often used a parade ordinance as a guideline for events.

"We are procedurally doing the right thing to ensure safety and welcome our visitors to enjoy this safe, friendly, and beautiful city," Mayor Gilich said.

The Land Development Ordinances regarding recreational vehicles, storage or parking of heavy trucks, trailers, major equipment, or mobile homes were tabled from a November and December city council meeting because of language changes resulting from the approved ordinances. The LDOs are expected to be addressed at a city council meeting in January.

Be in the know before celebrating with fireworks

Fireworks are a New Year's Eve tradition, marking the calendar turn into a new year. But in Biloxi, fireworks are unlawful to shoot within the city limits except on certain days. New Year's Eve is one of those exceptions.

Fireworks are allowed on December 31 after 6 p.m. through 1 a.m. on January 1.

Other days when residents are allowed to shoot fireworks in the city limits are the Fourth of July and the first, second, and third day of Tet only in conjunction with the Dragon Dance which requires a special permit from the Biloxi Fire Department.

The Biloxi Fire Department is asking residents to keep safety in mind when celebrating the new year with fireworks. Residents should use fireworks correctly, only use fireworks outdoors, keep fireworks away from children when adults are not around, not shoot any fireworks near any buildings, and steer clear of wooded areas.



Biloxi to get new ambulance service

Residents and visitors will soon see a new ambulance service rolling along the streets of Biloxi.

Pafford Medical Services has been selected as the new provider. Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich announced the future change in December before the City Council approved the agreement later in the month.

This comes after the city created its own emergency management district back in June. For decades, the city has fallen under the Harrison County contract with AMR but now it has its own district. And soon you will see a new provider serving the residents and visitors of Biloxi.

"This will allow the city to have a direct connection with the ambulance service," Biloxi Fire Chief Nick Geiser said. "This will allow us to have dedicated ambulances with additional units staffed for non-life-threatening emergencies."

Pafford will provide the city with a minimum of five fully staffed, outfitted, and equipped advanced life support ambulance units at all times with staff housed at a number of Biloxi Fire stations. They will also have up to eight fully staffed ambulance units available during peak hours.

Pafford will receive emergency and non-



emergency 911 calls, transport general acute care and critical care, and respond to calls within 15 minutes or less.

The new agreement will assist in providing residents and visitors with the highest quality clinical care and provide

reliable EMS services.

"This new service agreement will also allow us to work through operational issues more efficiently," Chief Geiser said. "This basically translates to a system that can adapt over time to address the needs of Biloxi residents and visitors."

The city will continue to participate in the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund, a special fund created in the State Treasury that distributes funds to counties, municipalities, and organized medical service districts. The city contribution is 15 cents per capita or approximately \$7,500 a year.

The fire department has 168 firefighters and 10 stations across the city and responds to about 180 calls a week, with two-thirds of those being for medical emergencies, minor and major.

Added Geiser: "The emergency medical service world has changed over the past several years which led to some operation issues in our local EMS system. By going through the RFP process, the city was able to evaluate multiple ambulance services and choose the best fit for our community."

Pafford EMS, with its Mississippi headquarters in the central part of the state, has been in service for more than fifty years with divisions in Arkansas, Oklahoma, Mississippi, and Louisiana. Currently, Biloxi falls under the Harrison County contract with AMR. AMR will continue to provide care in the meantime.

Property tax statements receive a new look

Residents may have noticed that their property tax statement looks different this year. The Harrison County Tax Collector says the new version, which was mailed in early December, allows the county to put more information on the statements, including a QR code.

"Our goal is to improve performance and efficiency and do so by using new technology," said Harrison County Tax Collector Sharon N. Barnett. "The OR code is what everyone is using to read a menu or pay a bill. So why not us?"

The improved statements include the physical address, OR code to scan and pay by, a phone number to text for questions, an office number to call and pay over the phone, and a section to update your address instead of changing it through a phone call. Multiple statements also arrive in one envelope for convenience.

The statements are also now colored for efficiency and to help lessen errors in the posting process. Yellow is for real estate, green is for personal property (furniture taxes), manilla is for mobile homes, and blue is for delinquent personal property (furniture taxes)

Barnett asks that residents remember payments are still due by Feb. 1, 2024 to avoid interest and to make sure you look over your check before mailing it in. The legal line should match the check box, and a phone number and PPIN or parcel number should be included on the check.

The new property tax statements are a process for Harrison County. It is not state-wide.



Feb. 12 at 8 p.m. also at the Mississippi Coast Coliseum.





Mississippi Coast Historical and Genealogical Society: Its origin, history, and meeting place

The early years

On a cold winter day back in 1968, the Mississippi Coast Historical and Genealogical Society was born in downtown Biloxi, having its first meetings at the historical Spanish House on Water Street and the Buena Vista Hotel on Hwy. 90, and Mary Mahoney's Restaurant. The very first organizers included wellknown historians Julia Guice and Dale Greenwell, Julia Guice would later be designated as the City Historian for Biloxi, helping to coordinate recovery efforts after Hurricane Camille in 1969. Dale Greenwell conducted several archaeological digs throughout the Biloxi area and has authored several historical publications.

The purpose of the Mississippi Coast Historical and Genealogical Society is stated as follows: "To encourage and promote an increased interest in the history of the Mississippi Coast, the State of Mississippi, and the genealogy of the residents thereof."

This historical society was responsible for the initial establishment of Biloxi's "History Week," which included days of reenactments, demonstrations, and community gatherings on the grounds of Tullis Manor and the prior Seafood Industry Museum (both destroyed by Hurricane Katrina in 2005).

A special history art contest for young students was also featured. Our first History Week dates back to February 1990, which commemorated

the anniversary of the first landing of Monsieur D'Iberville on February 13, 1699. In recent years, this event evolved into the familiar History and Cultural Expo held in the Biloxi Visitors Center, which is currently organized and sponsored by the City of Biloxi.

Through the years, this Historical Society has published over sixty historical journals as well as over ten special editions, which include family genealogies, recipes, land records, and the Biloxi Cemetery Index book. Its publications also include the "1850 Census of Harrison County," genealogy books on the Bosarge, Ladner, Farve, and Caillavet families, and even a kid's historical coloring book.

Years ago, this part of town was once addressed as 500 East Howard Avenue, and the land was the original estate of famed engineer and wooden lighthouse owner Baldwin Wood, who was also master of the schooner "Nydia."

The Gruich Community Center opened in 1968 during the leadership of Biloxi Mayor Danny Guice. It was built to replace the prior Center, which was destroyed by a massive fire. The facility was designed by architect H. F. Fountain, Jr. The general contractor was Marion Brick, Tile, and Cement Company, with an initial contract price of \$286,237. Through the years, this City of Biloxi building has served the community in countless ways, including meetings, Mardi Gras balls, political rallies, fashion shows, concerts, graduations, dance recitals. plays, and wedding receptions, just to mention a few. Unfortunately, this is not the same community center where Elvis Presley once performed. That structure was on Hwy. 90.

In June 2008, the Community Center's name was changed from Biloxi Community Center to its current name. It was renamed in memory of Dr. Frank Gruich, Sr. (1920 – 2007), a longtime physician and civic leader whose childhood began at Point Cadet.

This sturdy structure has endured the wrath of both Hurricanes Camille and Katrina. In fact, this facility was the go-to place in Biloxi for post-Katrina assistance and recovery supplies.

Meetings

The initial gathering at our new location was held on December 2, 2023. The next membership meeting is scheduled for the afternoon of Sunday, February 18, 2024. A reminder of the exact time and date will be posted in the February 2024 Biloxi BNews monthly edition.

With the holiday season finishing up and the calendar flipping to 2024, we're one month closer to Opening Day for the Biloxi Shuckers! The Shuckers are set to open the 2024 season on Friday, April 5, at 6:35 p.m. against the Montgomery Biscuits, the Double-A affiliate of the Tampa Bay Rays. The 2024 season is set to be Biloxi's ninth season on the Coast.

Even in the off-season, the Shuckers and former players have made multiple headlines, including the announcement of three college games on the Coast and a brand-new contract for one of Biloxi's biggest stars from 2023.

The biggest news involving the Milwaukee Brewers this off-season, the parent club of the Shuckers, involved 2023 Southern League All-Star Jackson Chourio. On December 3, the Brewers announced an eight-year, \$82 million extension for the team's top prospect. The deal shattered the previous record for the largest for a player

yet to make their MLB debut.

Chourio, who's just 19 years old, starred in 122 games with the Shuckers during the 2023 season. Chourio became the first player in Double-A since at least 2005 to record at least 20 home runs and tally more than 40 stolen bases. He was also one of four Shuckers selected to the Southern League All-Star team, setting a franchise record, and set the franchise record for RBI in a season with 89.

Entering 2024, Chourio is tabbed as a top-two prospect in baseball by all major publications. He could potentially open the season with the Brewers, where he would become the 67th former Shucker to make their big-league debut.

The Shuckers have also announced a slate of college games at MGM Park for the spring. On February 27, Southern Miss will return to MGM Park for the first time since the 2019 Conference USA Tournament. The Golden Eagles will take

on Nicholls, who appeared in the 2023 Hancock Whitney Classic. Tickets start at \$20 for reserved seating.

Mississippi State will return to Biloxi for the 2024 Hancock Whitney Classic on March 12 and 13 against the University of South Alabama and the University of New Orleans. Tickets start at \$21 for students and Shuck Nation Members in the reserved level and \$23 for the general public.

Suites are also available for all three games through the Biloxi Shuckers Sales Department. Fans are encouraged to get their tickets in advance as prices will increase on the day of the game.

The Shuckers have also officially announced their first pitch times for all 69 home games in 2024. Fans can get tickets for 2024 Shuck Nation Memberships with a \$100 deposit by emailing the Shuckers Sales Department or by calling (228) 233-3465. Members will gain early entry to games through an exclusive Shuck Nation Gate and earn additional perks with a membership.

Aim High, Sleep Deep

There are many facets to optimizing human performance, and the Second Air Force is tackling how well Airmen sleep.

Sleep issues are highly prevalent among activeduty service members and the numbered air force, responsible for training 93% of the Air Force, recognizes their responsibility to prevent sleep concerns from forming early in an Airman's career.

"While we toured the wings, sometimes we saw students who were functional zombies, living on energy drinks and no sleep," said Dr. Brian Davis, Second Air Force chief training officer. "We want to help Airmen develop the discipline to continue with the good habits they created in seven and a half weeks of basic training. Making these choices now will make them a well-rounded, better, stronger Airman for the Air Force."

The Readiness and Performance Lab (RiPL) at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland, Texas was formed through a collaboration between the Military Readiness Psychology fellowship and academic researchers from the University of Virginia and has worked with Second Air Force to research the effects of good and bad sleep.

"Sleep hygiene is just as important as proper nutrition and physical fitness," said Maj. Gen. Michele Edmondson, Second Air Force commander. "If this is something we can instill in an Airman for the rest of their lives, it will help readiness, morale and promote a healthier force."

The team created two informative videos, which will be presented to Airmen and Guardians in technical training. The videos explain some of the science behind healthy sleep and provide tips for better sleep health.

"Sleep hygiene are the behaviors we engage in on a daily basis that promote good sleep health," said Capt. Jordan Ellis, PhD, 59th Medical Wing military readiness psychology fellow. "Much like brushing our teeth, maintaining daily sleep habits prevents more problematic sleep disorders and associated

According to RiPL, approximately 50 to 70% of Airmen in technical training report insufficient sleep duration or poor sleep quality. The most common causes of poor sleep health for Airmen in technical training include chronic insufficient sleep (consistently sleeping less than six hours per night), inconsistent sleep-wake times (trying to "catch-up" on sleep debt during a weekend), excessive caffeine use, drinking caffeine late into the day, and utilizing their beds as furniture to watch TV, use their phones or play video games.

Poor sleep over time can place individuals at higher risk for symptoms of depression and

anxiety. Chronic poor sleep can lead to problems with anticipating and solving problems, acting decisively under pressure, poor communication within a team and poor moral reasoning.

The first step to improve sleep hygiene is to get back to the basics. "Perhaps the number one behavior we can change to improve sleep is to maintain a consistent wake time seven days per week," said Ellis. "This allows for our natural biological rhythms that govern wakefulness and sleep to optimize. When we sleep in on the weekends, we are often unintentionally jet lagging ourselves each and every week."

Airmen and Guardians who work swing shifts or have night classes often struggle to maintain a proper sleep schedule.

"Shift work certainly makes sleep more complicated as it often works against our natural biological sleep-wake rhythms," said Ellis. "Individuals on shift work should still work to obtain seven to nine hours of sleep per day, even if this is split into two chunks - for example, sleeping four hours after a shift then getting three more hours before the next shift starts."

Airmen of all ranks can remember that good sleep supports memory consolidation and learning, improves concentration, enhances productivity, boosts mood, combats anxiety and irritability, and is beneficial for overall human performance.

"Human capabilities will make or break our performance in any

future conflict," said Ellis. "When we get our sleep right, it makes just about everything we do that matters easier and more possible."



Cooking up a Mardi Gras-inspired dish

Take another look at Gable and fellow firefighters mixing up a Mardi Gras pasta and crab cakes, a dish Gable says is requested often at Station 10.

This month's recipe: (similar to Capt. Gable's recipe)

Mardi Gras Pasta and Crab Cakes

Biloxi Firefighters, Station 10 See Capt. Gable's version on "Biloxi Cooks!"



- 12 ounces fettuccine
- · 8 tablespoons butter, divided
- 1 pound medium to large shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 1 teaspoon Cajun seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- · 4 green onions, sliced
- 1/4 cup diced yellow pepper
- 1/4 cup diced green pepper
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms

- 12 ounces andouille sausage, sliced
- · 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 cup diced tomato
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- salt and pepper

Instructions:

- Cook pasta in salted water according to package directions. Drain.
- While water comes to boil and pasta cooks, melt 2 tablespoons of butter in large skillet
- Sprinkle shrimp with cajun seasoning and paprika. Cook in butter until they turn pink.
- Remove with slotted spoon and set aside.
- Add remaining butter to skillet. When melted, add onion, bell peppers, mushrooms, and sausage and cook until sausage is browned and veggies are soft.
- Stir in the garlic and tomato and cook 1 minute.
- Stir in heavy cream and simmer until thickened some.
- Add lemon juice, Parmesan, and parsley. Stir to melt Parmesan.
- Check for seasoning and add salt and pepper to taste.
- Remove from heat. Add fettuccine and shrimp and mix in.

Crab Cake Ingredients:

- · 4 tablespoons butter
- 8 ounces lump crabmeat
- 6 ounces crabmeat
- 1 tablespoons dry bread crumbs
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon coarse ground black pepper
- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- ½ teaspoon hot sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon ground dry mustard

Instructions

- $1. \ Mix \ together \ crabmeat, \ bread \ crumbs, \ parsley, \ salt \ and \ pepper.$
- Beat together egg, mayonnaise, hot sauce and mustard. Combine with other ingredients and mix well.
- 3. Form into patties and place on a baking sheet.
- 4. Add half the butter to the large skillet and add the crab cakes to the skillet on medium heat, cooking for 5-7 minutes.
- Flip the crab cakes with a flat spatula gently, add the remaining butter and cook for an additional 5 minutes



BILOXI'S SOLDIERS' HOME



Biloxi chosen for Soldiers' Home

On April 6, 1931, The Daily Herald headline announced the good news: "Biloxi Selected as Location for Soldiers' Home." President Herbert Hoover approved the choice of Biloxi after competition among over thirty sites, all of which offered free land for a new facility to meet the increasing need to take care of the nation's veterans, especially those of World War I. Biloxi donated part of its wooded Naval Reserve Park on Back Bay, plus some adjoining land purchased by Biloxi taxpayers for the project.

A place of beauty and healing

Biloxi offered more than free land: Biloxi offered a beautiful, healthy place for veterans. Selection officials liked Biloxi's location "on an inlet of the Gulf of Mexico, where the warm Gulf helps make an equitable climate and affords bathing and outdoor water recreation year

round." The site was on high land "with a wealth of oak and pine trees and the atmospheric conditions conducive to cheerfulness and health." In addition, it was noted that "evergreen" Biloxi had a clean water supply from deep wells, a good milk supply, a decrease in typhoid, malaria, and tuberculosis in the prior ten years, reliable rainfall, and proximity to Gulfport's veterans' hospital. Gulfport leaders endorsed the Biloxi site.

Construction began in 1932, bringing much needed jobs during the Great Depression. The home opened in 1933.

No expense was spared in transforming an already stunning site into a soothing and restful retreat. The bayside campus of the Soldiers' Home, known also as the Veterans Administration facility, offered housing for veterans, nurses and staff, dining and recreation facilities, a modern hospital, and support buildings. These were connected by trails and winding roads, set amid woodland, lush gardens, and lawns.

Sunken Gardens

Biloxi's master gardener and landscape architect Frotscher Steckler created scenic grounds with an entry avenue of oaks and natural low areas transformed into a network of pools, streams, rustic bridges, stepping stones, sitting nooks, and plantings called "Sunken Gardens," described by *The Daily Herald*:

"The ravine was a swamp originally and now it is a dream of beauty. A stream runs through the center, and the beds are planted so there will be a succession of blossoms. The high banks on either side are being filled with mountain laurel, wild azalea and many other suitable plants. From the high bridge a beautiful vista of the garden is seen, and from the other side one looks out upon the shimmering waters of Back Bay where numerous artificial islands connected with bridges are under construction connecting the garden with the bay."

Some resident veterans helped build the garden retreat and plant miles of flowers from the home's nurseries.

Caring for "those who have borne the battle"

In May of 1935, administrators invited the public to tour the Biloxi veterans' hospital, which had "every modern convenience, treatment and appliance." The newspaper invitation to the public stated the on-going mission of the Soldiers' Home on Back Bay:

"Today the men of 1917 and 1918 no longer are young, and the soldiers of '98 gradually are assuming the venerable appearance which the Civil War veterans had not so very long ago... as time goes inexorably forward, even the World War veterans grow fewer and fewer. The veterans who were stricken in battle or otherwise suffered health impairing from the war's effects, require greater care as time goes on. War has ended. Peace has been declared but the care of the country's casualties in peacetime, as in war, does not end as long as a veteran may need help."
