

Back in the Day,
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Special election set for June 18 to fill Ward 4 seat

The Biloxi City Council has scheduled a special election for Tuesday, June 18 for Ward 4 residents. The special election is to fill the unexpired term of Ward 4 Council member Robert Deming III who resigned on May 7.

- July 9, 2024 SPECIAL ELECTION RUNOFF WARD 4 (If necessary)


Info for candidates:

Those interested in qualifying as candidates for Ward 4 must be a registered elector of Ward 4, file a Qualifying Statement of Intent, and secure a petition of the signatures and names of at least 50 registered electors in Ward 4. Petitions are available on the Secretary of State's website, sos.ms.gov; Municipal Clerk's office, 140 Lameuse St, 2nd Floor; or by email request at sthacker@biloxi. ms.us. The deadline to submit a petition to qualify for the special election is 5 p.m., May 29 at the Municipal Clerk's office.

Registered voters:

You must be a registered voter in Ward 4 to vote in the Special Election. To be a registered voter, you must be at least 18 years of age by the date of the special election, and you must be a resident of Ward 4 for at least 30 days prior to the election date.

The voting location will be at Margaret Sherry Library & Fire Station Complex (Station No. 6), 2139 Popp's Ferry Road

The stadium gets a new name

It's official! Keesler Federal Credit Union, who was awarded the naming rights to the stadium, has announced the new name of the ballpark on Caillavet Street. It is now the Keesler Federal Park.

"We are thrilled to make it official and add to the excitement of the Biloxi Shuckers' new season and new owners," Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich said. "We anticipate a great relationship with the credit union and look forward to all experiencing the Keesler Federal Park."

The ballpark recently went through renovations adding a beach and boardwalk area that features a Tiki Bar, a sand beach, and a splash pad, and has expanded the Shuckers Shop to a 1,466-square-foot facility housing Shucker items. Since it opened in 2015, the ballpark has welcomed hundreds of visitors each year to the park for Shuckers baseball as well as high school and college baseball games. Now, Keesler Federal is part of the team.

"Seeing the Keesler Federal name unveiled at the park will be a truly proud moment since the credit union has deep roots in Biloxi, and we owe our

success to the loyalty and support this community has shown since we were founded in 1947," said Andy Swoger, Keesler Federal's President and CEO. "This is an incredible opportunity for us to commit to the continued success of this premier family attraction that is a vital part of the Mississippi Gulf Coast's economy."

The ballpark also includes 4,500 reserved seats in the seating bowl, 12 suites, two open-air party decks, including the Renova Rooftop on the third-base side, a terrace, the all-inclusive indoor-outdoor Kloud7 SkyBox, the Sparklight Club lounge, and a 1,472-square-foot scoreboard. Fans can also visit Shuckers Plaza outside the North Gate which includes a wiffle ball field, retail kiosk, and a food and beverage cart.

As for when Keesler Federal Park will be displayed at the stadium, the credit union is in the beginning stages of logo and sign design. Keesler Federal and the city are working together to move the process along.





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Think ahead on evacuations, storm shelters

One of the toughest decisions that residents may have to make when a storm approaches is whether they should evacuate their property and possessions for either a local shelter or out-of-town accommodations.

Depending on the severity of the storm, that decision can be made for those in lowlying areas: Local authorities may order a mandatory evacuation.

In Harrison County, as many as 14 hurricane shelters can be activated in times of peril based on the number of people in vulnerable areas. A shelter should be refuge of last resort, but residents need to be aware of several factors if they are considering seeking refuge in a shelter.

The decision to open a shelter is usually based on the intensity of a storm and where it is expected to make landfall. Local Emergency Management leaders make the decision to open shelters in coordination with the American Red Cross, and the public is notified through the media.

The shelter sites can vary from year to year and storm to storm.

"The type of weather event, the direction of a storm and rising tides are just a couple of the factors that go into activating a shelter," says Biloxi Fire Chief and Emergency Manager Nicholaus Geiser. "The number and location of shelters that are needed to be activated during an event also have to be considered."

If you think you may seek refuge in a shelter, some points to consider:

- Bring enough food and water for at least the
- Bring your own blankets and other personal needs. Cots cannot be guaranteed.
- No pets at typical shelters (check with the local humane society): no firearms, alcohol or tobacco products are allowed.
- Public transit systems buses and taxis will stop operating when sustained winds reach 35 mph.
- · If you have an infant, bring an adequate supply of diapers and formula.
- If you or a member of your family is on a special diet, bring the necessary food.
- If you are on prescription medication, try to have a two-week supply of medication. If you're thinking about evacuating, be familiar with evacuation routes. Traffic may be delayed by bridges opening to marine traffic. Bridges, by the way, will not open for marine traffic when sustained winds reach 35 mph.

And, finally, if you encounter a flooded roadway - in times of peril or on a typical day, remember the oft-repeated advice:

"Turn around, don't drown."



Names to remember - or forget - in 2024

Who's to say there's not another Camille, Katrina or even Zeta in the group? Which name will gain notoriety this year, or merely be lost to the ages? There's no telling at this point, which is why preparation is the key.

Those points notwithstanding, here's the lineup of storm names for the 2024 Hurricane Season, which runs from June 1 to Nov. 30:

Don't expect to see the names Katrina, Camille, Isidore, Gustav, Nate or a host of others used in the future. The World Meteorological Organization, which creates the list of names, has been known to

repeat a name after seven years, but the aforementioned Katrina and Co. have been deemed so deadly or costly they're retired, to avoid confusion or insensitivity.

And the common denominator among Katrina, Camille, Isidore, Gustav and Nate? They all caused damage in Biloxi.

By the way, if the list of names is exhausted this year, as it was in the record-setting 2020, names will be pulled from a supplemental list, not the Greek alphabet. The Greek alphabet, meteorologists said of the 2020 season, was confusing and a distraction.

What you can expect to see when a storm threatens

This hurricane season, expect to see a regular flow of updates and information, all prepared by a coordinated team. This team includes the National Hurricane Center, the local National Weather Service office, and Emergency Management officials at the state, county, and city level. Here are some planning times to remember, recognizing each storm is unique:

- Up to 5 days in advance The National Hurricane Center regularly issues Tropical Weather Outlooks, indicating any tropical disturbances and their probability of developing over the next 5 days. If a disturbance is forecast in our area, closely monitor the situation and be prepared to adjust normal activities.
- 3 or more days prior (72+ hours before arrival) When a storm has developed or is expected to develop, the National Hurricane Center will issue Tropical Cyclone Advisories every 6 hours. If Biloxi is in the probability cone, expect to receive guidance from local emergency management officials.
- 2 days prior (48 hours before arrival) When storm conditions are expected within 48 hours, the National Hurricane Center will issue a Tropical Storm Watch or a Hurricane Watch. At this point, local governments will usually announce any decisions on closures of government facilities, and could also issue orders for evacuation of one or more evacuation zones. Most local businesses will implement their business continuity plans, adjusting their services or operating hours.
- 1½ days prior (36 hours before arrival) When storm conditions are expected within 36 hours, the National Hurricane Center will issue a Tropical Storm Warning or a Hurricane Warning. At this point, local governments will usually announce any decisions on community shelters, and could also issue orders for a curfew. Many local businesses will close early for the safety of customers and employees. Everyone should complete storm prep activities, and should proceed to a safe location for protection from weather impacts.
- What you can do now Don't wait until a tropical depression or hurricane is in the Gulf to begin preparing. There are steps you can take now. See the list on Page 10.
- Sign up for B-Alert by texting BILOXI to 99411. You'll get advisories via text messages.
- To see evacuation zones and evacuation routes, see map on Page 10.
- Information also will be available via city Bmail (sign up at biloxi.ms.us), and through a recorded message on the City of Biloxi Storm Info Line: 228-435-6300.

It's illegal to sweep lawn clippings into the street

Chances are, you've seen it done or even done it yourself: You cut your lawn, rake up the trimmings and pile them near the curb in front of your home. Or, you'll sweep the trimmings into the street, where you hope they'll be carried away by the wind.

These two scenarios result in one of the biggest causes of flooding in the city – blocked storm drains.

These careless or unthinking actions negate the millions of dollars in improvements that the city is making citywide to drainage systems.

Piling leaves at the curb or sweeping trimmings into the street means that they will eventually find their way into the city's storm drains. Either bag the leaves for pickup or compost them. A stopped-up storm drain or ditch cannot carry run-off water as it is intended to do. When it rains, that water can flood streets, your property or your neighbor's property.

It's actually a violation of city ordinance to dump any material into storm drains, ditches,

culverts, streams or waterways (Sec. 9-1-15, Code of Ordinances, 1992).

If you see anyone dumping debris into storm drains, ditches, culverts or streams, please contact the Public Works Department at 228-435-6271, or email Craig Ross, the citizens service representative at cross@biloxi.ms.us, or the Code Enforcement staff in the Community Development Department at 228-435-0841.

Be sure to get a building permit before construction

When you or a licensed contractor make repairs or alterations to your property, those repairs should be in compliance with established building codes. This ensures that

Contractors must have city license

Property owners are warned to beware of transient contractors who typically set up shop in the wake of disasters such as a major hurricane or tornado.

Ask to see the person's City of Biloxi license card, which is required to do business in this city.

Do not pay any money in advance. Do not sign any contracts. And do not pay any money until the work has been inspected and approved by a city inspector.

If you have any questions or concerns, call the Community Development Department at 228-435-6280. work is up to code and will be able to withstand most weather conditions.

To make sure that your plans are within code, a building permit must be obtained from the City of Biloxi Building Division before you build, alter, re-grade or fill on your property. New buildings in the floodplain must be protected from flood damage. Biloxi's building code requires that new buildings must be elevated to the base flood elevation, plus 1 foot.

The code also requires all additions and 'substantial' improvements or repairs from damage to a building be treated as new construction. A substantial improvement or repair is one in which the value of an addition, alteration, repair or reconstruction project exceeds 50 percent of the total value of the existing building.

Before you begin a project, contact the

Building Division at 228-435-6270 or online at building@biloxi.ms.us. Qualified staff can help make sure that your project complies with building codes. Biloxi is currently under the 2021 International Building Code and the 2023 National Electrical Code.

A ride out of harm's way

Coast Transit is ready to assist needy residents when an evacuation order is issued. If you need evacuation transportation, known as "Demand Response," it's free, but you must register to get a ride to a local shelter. Call CTA at 228-896-8080. Registration is easy: Your name, address, phone number and any special needs. You'll get all of the info you need.



Federal agencies encourage residents to use direct deposit

In those critical days after Hurricane Katrina, the U.S. Treasury Department worked with the Social Security Administration to get displaced Social Security and other federal benefit checks to recipients, as quickly as possible.

But those who already were using direct deposit had immediate access to their funds from virtually anywhere, thanks to ATMs and financial institution networks.

That's why the Treasury and the Federal Reserve Banks – through Go Direct – are urging Social Security check recipients who live along the Gulf Coast to switch to direct deposit.

The recommendation, offered in light of devastating hurricanes, is aimed at ensuring citizens receive their federal benefits without disruption.

Go Direct makes it easy to sign up for direct deposit. People can sign up by calling the toll-free Go Direct helpline at (800) 333-1795 or by visiting www.GoDirect.gov to sign up online. To learn more about Go Direct, visit www.GoDirect.gov.

Stay tuned for more storm information

The National Weather Service monitors hurricane and storm activity, and issues official bulletins to local and regional TV and radio stations. Since television coverage may be interrupted by power outages, you should also have a battery-operated radio to follow emergency advisories. It is vital that you monitor these weather broadcasts, especially as a storm approaches.

Additionally, the City of Biloxi relays vital information on a regular basis. The current temperature, conditions and forecast are displayed 24/7 at the top corner of the city's website at biloxi.ms.us.



What to do and when to do it

Before a hurricane approaches or NOW

Plan an evacuation route.

- · Review the evacuation route by clicking on the Evacuation Map link in the Storm and Flood Preparedness section of the city website. Determine the safest evacuation route for you. Be ready to drive 20 to 50 miles inland to locate a safe place.
- Prepare a storm kit that includes the following items:
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Portable, battery-operated radio and extra batteries
- · First-aid kit and manual
- Duct tape
- · Emergency food and water (at least one gallon of water per person per day for three to seven days; non-perishable packaged or canned food and juices; paper plates and plastic utensils; cooking tools)
- Non-electric can opener
- **Essential medicines**
- Cash and credit cards
- Sturdy shoes

- · Fully charged cell phone
- Store important papers in a waterproof container or resealable plastic bag. Among the important documents: insurance, medical records, bank account numbers, Social Security card, etc.

Make arrangements for pets.

Pets are not allowed in typical emergency shelters for health and space reasons. Contact your local humane society for information on local animal shelters.

Make sure that all family members know how to respond after a hurricane.

- · Teach family members how and when to turn off gas, electricity, and water.
- Teach children how and when to call 9-1-1, police, or fire department and which radio station to tune to for emergency information.
- Protect your windows.
- · Permanent shutters are the best protection. A lower cost approach is to put up plywood panels. Use 1/2 inch plywood - marine plywood is best - cut to fit

each window. Remember to mark which board fits which window. Pre-drill holes every 18 inches for screws. Do this long before the storm.

Trim back dead or weak branches from trees. Check into flood insurance.

· You can find out about the National Flood Insurance Program through your local insurance agent or emergency management office. There is normally a 30-day waiting period before a new policy becomes effective. Homeowners polices do not cover damage from the flooding that accompanies a hurricane.

Develop an emergency communication plan.

- · In case family members are separated from one another during a disaster (a real possibility during the day when adults are at work and children are at school), have a plan for getting back together.
- · Ask an out-of-state relative or friend to serve as the "family contact." After a disaster, it's often easier to call long distance. Make sure everyone in the family knows the name, address, and phone number of the contact person.

What to do and when to do it

DURING A HURRICANE WATCH

(A Hurricane Watch is issued when there is a threat of hurricane conditions within 24-36 hours.)

- Listen to a battery-operated radio or television for hurricane progress reports.
- · Check emergency supplies.
- · Fuel car.
- Bring in outdoor objects such as lawn furniture, toys, and garden tools and anchor objects that cannot be brought inside.
- Secure buildings by closing and boarding up windows. Remove outside antennas.
- Turn refrigerator and freezer to coldest settings.
 Open only when absolutely necessary and close quickly.
- Store drinking water in clean bathtubs, jugs, bottles, and cooking utensils.
- Store valuables and personal papers in a waterproof container on the highest level of your home.
- Review evacuation plan.
- Moor boat securely or move it to a designated safe place.
- Take pre-storm pictures of house and contents.

DURING A HURRICANE WARNING

(A Hurricane Warning is issued when hurricane conditions – winds of 74 mph or greater, or dangerously high water and rough seas – are expected in 24 hours or less.)

- Listen constantly to a battery-operated radio or television for official instructions.
- If in a mobile home, check tiedowns and evacuate immediately.
- Bring outside pets inside and provide shelter for farm animals.
- · Avoid elevators.
- If at home:
 - Stay inside, away from windows, skylights, and



glass doors.

- Keep a supply of flashlights and extra batteries handy. Avoid open flames, such as candles and kerosene lamps, as a source of light.
- If power is lost, turn off or unplug major appliances to reduce power "surge" when electricity is restored.
- If officials indicate evacuation is necessary:
 - Leave as soon as possible. Avoid flooded roads and watch for washed-out bridges.
 - Secure your home by unplugging appliances and turning off electricity and the main water valve.
 - Tell someone outside of the storm area where you are going.
 - If time permits, and you live in an identified surge zone, elevate furniture to protect it from flooding or better yet, move it to a higher floor.
 - Take pre-assembled emergency supplies, warm protective clothing, blankets and sleeping bags to shelter
 - Lock up home and leave.

AFTER THE STORM

- Stay tuned to local radio for information.
- Help injured or trapped persons.
- · Give first aid where appropriate.
- Do not move seriously injured persons unless they are in immediate danger of further injury. Call for help.
- Return home only after authorities advise that it is safe to do so.

- Avoid loose or dangling power lines and report them immediately to the power company, police, or fire department.
- Enter your home with caution. Beware of snakes, insects, and animals driven to higher ground by flood water.
- Open windows and doors to ventilate and dry vour home.
- Check refrigerated foods for spoilage; if electricity is off, keep refrigerator and freezer closed as much as possible.
- Take pictures of the damage, both of the house and its contents for insurance claims.
- Drive only if absolutely necessary and avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges. Refrain from sightseeing.
- · Use telephone only for emergency calls.
- Inspecting utilities in a damaged home:
 - Check for gas leaks. If you smell gas or hear blowing or hissing noise, open a window and quickly leave the building. Turn off the gas at the outside main valve if you can and call the gas company from a neighbor's home. If you turn off the gas for any reason, it must be turned back on by a professional.
 - Look for electrical system damage. If you see sparks or broken or frayed wires, or if you smell hot insulation, turn off the electricity at the main fuse box or circuit breaker. If you have to step in water to get to the fuse box or circuit breaker, call an electrician first for advice.
 - Check for sewage and water lines damage. If you suspect sewage lines are damaged avoid using the toilets and call a plumber. If water pipes are damaged, contact the water company and avoid the water from the tap. You can obtain safe water by melting ice cubes.
- Generally, utility companies restore services lost during major storm events first to public service providers, such as hospitals, water systems and public safety agencies.



Flood Zones



A few words about this map

Much has been made and said about the federal government's current flood elevations, which went into effect in Biloxi in May 2009. While much of the focus has been on the height of construction,

this maps shows the significant increase in the size of the flood zone. For instance, nearly all of Point Cadet, the eastern tip of the Biloxi peninsula, is now in a flood zone, as is Eagle Point in north Biloxi.

Completed elevation certificates are available from the city's Community Development Department.

Where to turn for help

The Community Development Department is here to help minimize the risk you face from storms and flooding. If you are having flooding problems, advice is available to help you resolve your flooding issues. To make an appointment, contact Floodplain Manager Rick Stickler at 228-435-6270 or rstickler@biloxi.ms.us.

Flood Protection Assistance also is available from such sources as the American Red Cross, the Small Business Administration, FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, United Way, Salvation Army, Catholic Social and Community Services, and Back Bay Mission.

Ok, we're in June, the beginning of hurricane season, so here is more information to help you prepare for the storm season.

DURING A HURRICANE WATCH

Are you aware that your homeowners insurance does NOT cover floods? Only federal flood insurance reimburses you for flood damage to your property. You should consider buying flood insurance now.

Some homeowners may have been required to buy flood insurance when they obtained a mortgage or home-improvement loan. However, in many cases, these policies cover only the structure and not your possessions. You can protect your home and contents through the National Flood Insurance Program, in which the City of Biloxi participates.

Local insurance agents can sell a flood insurance policy separate from your homeowner or windstorm policy.

Anyone can get – and everyone should have – flood insurance. These policies are regulated by the federal government. Any agent can sell a policy and all agents must charge the same rates, which are set nationally. Your rates will not change even if you file a claim.

There is a 30-day waiting period before the policy becomes effective. Contact your insurance agent to determine what type of coverage you have.

LOWER FLOOD INSURANCE PREMIUMS

The City of Biloxi is an active participant in the National Flood Insurance Program's Community Rating System, a voluntary incentive program designed to encourage local floodplain management activities that exceed the minimum federal requirements.

Flood insurance premium rates are discounted to reflect reduced flood risks that result from City actions to meet the three goals of the CRS:

- 1. Reduce flood losses,
- 2. Facilitate accurate insurance rating, and
- 3. Promote the awareness of flood insurance.

For CRS participating communities, flood insurance premium rates are discounted in increments of 5 percent. A Class 1 community would receive a 45 percent premium discount, while a Class 9 community would receive a 5 percent discount. The CRS rates are based four broad categories:

- 1. Public information,
- 2. Mapping and regulations,
- 3. Flood damage reduction, and
- 4. Flood preparedness.



In 2021, the City of Biloxi earned a Class 6 rating and continues to work actively to further lower it.

"The city takes a comprehensive approach in its efforts to reduce the risk of flooding," said Kristin Greger, Biloxi CRS coordinator. "Of course, we want to help property owners through lower insurance premiums, but our primary goals are to reduce risks to our residents and to minimize property damage from weather-related events."

BUILDERS, THIS IS FOR YOU

All Biloxi-licensed contractors are required to participate in annual stormwater management training before being issued a building permit, in compliance with the Biloxi Stormwater Management Ordinance. This training is offered at no cost to the contractors, to be sure they have information about how to protect local water quality and, at the same time, minimize the risk of flood and stormwater runoff damage by properly maintaining their construction sites.

City building and code inspectors, Public Works, and Parks and Recreation crews are trained to improve the management of stormwater in the city by:

- enforcing construction site erosion and sediment control regulations;
- identifying and correcting illicit discharges, such as illegal dumping;
- implementing "good housekeeping" practices at city-owned facilities; and

holding violators accountable for their actions.

DO WHAT YOU CAN

There are some steps that you can take now to prepare your property against flooding.

One option may be "retrofitting," which is altering your home to eliminate or reduce flood damage.

A few things to consider:

- Elevate your building so that flood waters do not enter or reach any susceptible portions.
- Construct barriers out of fill or concrete between your building and flood waters.
- "Dry flood proof" your non-residential building, which entails making walls and flooring watertight so water cannot enter.
- "Wet flood proof" your non-residential building, which entails modifying the structure and relocating contents to lessen the damage caused by any flood waters that enter your structure.
- Sandbagging is a short-term measure that can also be helpful.

CHECK THAT LICENSE

The City of Biloxi is home to many reputable, licensed building contractors who are qualified to make repairs for you. However, after each storm, a number of transient contractors sets up temporary shop in our community.

Before signing any contract or paying any money for repair work, you should ask to see the person's City of Biloxi license.

Risk Rating 2.0: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Storm season is just around the corner and one of the most concrete actions residents can take to protect their property from the damaging effects of hurricanes

Now is the time to look at your flood insurance policy and ask your insurance agent questions about Risk Rating 2.0.

is to purchase flood insurance. On October 1, 2021 a significant change was made to federal flood insurance as a new pricing methodology was introduced known as Risk Rating 2.0.1

With the newly implemented Risk Rating 2.0, the Federal Emergency

Management Agency (FEMA) incorporates new technology from the private insurance industry and National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) mapping data to provide a unique flood risk profile for an individual property.2 This will ensure that any rates increases or decreases are uniform

and equitable.

With improved technology, FEMA is able to incorporate private sector data sets and catastrophe models to create an individual risk profile for a property.

Under the old system, property risk was assessed primarily on a property's flood zone, the height of its lowest floor above the Base Flood Elevation (BFE) and its foundation type.

Under Risk Rating 2.0, a property's flood risk is assessed on a number of distinct variables. These variables include the property's flood risk rating, distance to the flooding source, number of floors, the replacement value and its lowest adjacent grade (LAG), which is defined as the lowest point of ground level immediately next to a building.3

Property owners who are interested in learning what their rates would be under Risk Rating 2.0 should consult their insurance agent who will guide property owners through the basic information needed to get a complete and accurate risk rating.

Although Risk Rating 2.0 will bring about a number of changes, there are some program features that will remain

the same. FEMA will continue to provide discounts for pre-FIRM subsidized and newly mapped properties. Communities that participate in the Community Rating System (CRS) will continue to receive insurance discounts.

Further, the CRS discount will now apply to all residents, not just residents in the special flood hazard area. However this discount does not apply until the full risk rate is achieved.4 Also, existing policyholders are still able to transfer their flood insurance discounts to a new owner with the sale of their property.


Risk Rating 2.0 is being implemented in phases and all policies renewing on or after April 1, 2022 will be subject to the new Risk Rating 2.0 rating methodology. Now is the time to look at your flood insurance policy and ask your insurance agent questions about how Risk Rating 2.0 may or may not affect your premium rate. Don't let storm season catch you off guard, be proactive in learning more about how to protect your property.

Under the **new pricing system**, 96% of current policyholders will see either an **immediate decrease** or **\$20 or less month increase** in their premiums. (Figure 1 Bar Graph)









Wild West Biloxi

At the western end of the city once stood a popular tourist attraction known as the Eight Flags Deer Ranch. It featured a petting zoo where visitors could hand feed tame deer and goats, and a bird vaudeville theatre that included a dancing chicken!

In the back of this park-like setting was the Six Gun Junction, a replica of a western town with can-can girls and hourly staged shootouts. It wasn't uncommon for a cowboy to tumble off the roof to the ground during a shootout!

This attraction was a big hit for tourists and locals from 1962 to 1984. The attraction closed in 1984.



This month, we head over to Biloxi Fire Station No. 1 to visit with firefighters for the June episode of "Biloxi Cooks!" Biloxi Firefighter III Sergio Acosta, along with other firefighters, prepares Latin cuisine with a homemade twist.

This month's recipe:

Homemade tortillas with marinated shredded chicken and mango salsa, and Cuban espresso

By Biloxi Firefighter III Sergio Acosta along with other Biloxi Firefighters

Tortillas Ingredients:

- 4 cups corn flour
 - 3 cups warm water
- 1 teaspoon salt

Biloxi

Tortillas Instructions:

- 1. In mixing bowl, combine corn, flour, and salt,
- 2. Slowly add warm water to mixture, and mix well until a dough forms. The dough should be soft and not too sticky.
- 3. Divide dough into equal-sized balls.
- Preheat a griddle or skillet over medium-high heat.
- Place a ball of dough between two pieces of parchment paper or plastic wrap. Using a tortilla press or a flat-bottomed heavy object, flatten the dough into a thin round tortilla.
- Carefully peel off top layer of parchment paper or plastic wrap, then flip tortilla onto your hand and peel off other laver.
- 7. Place tortilla on hot griddle and cook for about 1-2 minutes on each side, or until lightly browned and cooked through.
- Repeat with remaining dough balls to make more tortillas.
- Keep the cooked tortillas warm by wrapping them in a clean kitchen towel or cloth while you finish cooking the rest

Mango Pico de Gallo Ingredients:

- 1 15 oz. can of diced mangoes
- 1 red onion, finely chopped
- 2-3 Roma Tomatoes, seeded and diced
- · 2 jalapeño peppers, seeded and finely chopped
- 1/2 cup fresh cilantro, chopped
- Juice of 2-3 limes
- · Salt and pepper to taste

Mango Pico de Gallo Instructions:

- 1. In mixing bowl, combine diced mangoes, tomatoes, chopped red onion, jalapeño pepper, and cilantro.
- Squeeze lime juice over mango mixture and gently toss to combine.
- Season with salt and pepper to taste. Adjust lime juice, salt, and pepper as needed.
- Cover bowl and refrigerate mango Pico de Gallo for at least 30 minutes to allow flavors to meld together
- 5. Give salsa a final stir before serving.

Guacamole Ingredients:

- 4 ripe avocados
- 1/2 cup diced tomatoes
- 1/2 cup diced red onion
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- · 2 jalapeño peppers, seeded and finely chopped
- Juice of 2-3 limes
- Salt and pepper to taste

Guacamole Instructions:

- 1. Cut avocados in half, remove pits, and scoop flesh into a mixing bowl.
- Mash the avocados with a fork or potato masher until you reach your desired consistency.
- Add diced tomatoes, red onion, cilantro, and jalapeño peppers to mashed avocados.
- Squeeze lime juice over guacamole mixture and gently fold to combine.
- Season with salt and pepper to taste. Adjust lime juice, salt, and pepper as needed.
- 6. Cover bowl and refrigerate guacamole for at least 30 minutes to allow flavors to meld together.
- 7. Give guacamole a final stir before serving.

Chicken Thigh Ingredients:

- 3 lbs boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup honey 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1/2 cup crushed tomatoes + 1 tablespoon of sugar
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (optional)
- 1 teaspoon of adobo seasoning
- Salt to taste
- Corn or flour tortillas, for serving Toppings of your choice (such as shredded
- cheese, sour cream, etc.)

Chicken Thigh Instructions:

- 1. In slow cooker, combine chicken broth, honey, soy sauce, crushed tomatoes + sugar, garlic, ginger, taco seasoning mix, black pepper, paprika, cayenne pepper (if using), adobo seasoning, and salt. Mix well to combine
- 2. Add chicken thighs to slow cooker, ensuring they are coated with sauce.
- Cover and cook on low for 6-8 hours or on high for 3-4 hours, or until chicken is tender and easily shredded with a fork
- Once chicken is cooked, shred it using two forks right in slow cooker and mix it with sauce.
- Taste and adjust seasoning if needed.



BILOXI'S ARCHITECTURE Through the Ages Biloxi's architectural styles have changed quite a bit through the centuries. Here's an interesting look at the variations.

As Hurricane season commences this month, we often wonder as we travel along the highways and byways of Biloxi, "What was there before." Structures have come and gone through Biloxi's long and storied history; and, it's interesting to note how hurricanes and storms have impacted our ever-changing architecture and how events have prompted builders to establish more durable structures, both for habitation and business purposes.

Plant-based housing

The first hint of construction during the early days of Biloxi can be seen in the popular drawing of New Biloxi in 1720. With no floor plans in place, Biloxi's earliest French settlers had to immediately create instant

architecture upon arriving on our shores. Simple structures were erected with palmetto leaves and bamboo sticks providing immediate shelter from the weather and pesky insects. These huts could



be immediately replaced or improved upon, if necessary.

Bousillage houses

By 1800, structures were sturdier and built utilizing better materials. Walls were made using mud and dried Spanish moss, connected to post boards which were several feet apart. This building design proved to be longer lasting. One such house was located on Porter Avenue north of our presentday Visitors Center. It survived the test of time and was finally dismantled in the latter 1930s.

Houses of wood

With the coast's rich abundance of nearby forested areas, houses and structures made of wood became the most popular option for construction



Brick structures

In the late 1800s, downtown Biloxi suffered major fires that destroyed an abundance of wooden structures. Even George E. Ohr suffered a disastrous blow at his downtown Biloxi pottery.

After the fires, larger buildings were built utilizing brick instead of wood. Examples of brick construction around that time included the old Biloxi City Hall (that once stood at the corner of Main and Howard Avenue), the Masonic Lodge on Main Street, the Elks Lodge (that once stood on Lameuse Street), and many popular hotels back in the day. As time went on, more and more downtown buildings were constructed utilizing bricks, including the shopping district on Howard Avenue.

Homes for Seafood Factory Workers


In the early 1900s, Biloxi was crowned as the Seafood Capital of the World. Factory workers and their families arrived from other areas including

Slavonia, Cajun French Louisiana, and even Baltimore, MS to earn a living in our seafood factories at Point Cadet. The drastic increase in population meant more housing was in demand. Some factory workers were provided a place to live, but those structures were simple and not permanent.



Marble palace

Marble construction was a special exception to traditional building. Our present City Hall, originally constructed by the Federal Government for use as a customs house and post office, was built in the early 1900s. It is truly "solid as a rock" and still standing. It has weathered many storms including Hurricanes Camille and Katrina. Today, the building houses the Mayor's office, city council office, and the Biloxi City Administration Department.







Boat building

A significant type of historical Biloxi construction includes the wooden

boats utilized for both work and pleasure. Many boat construction sites could be found along Biloxi's shoreline peninsula. Boats had many different features and were constructed for many purposes: the seafood industry, travel, racing, and leisure activities. One excellent example of sloop (boat) construction can still be



seen today at the Biloxi Maritime & Seafood Industry Museum. The restored "Nydia" was originally built by Biloxian William Nels Johnson utilizing oak and cypress planks. The "Nydia" can be seen in person at the museum or from afar through the windows as it glows at night like a "ship in a bottle."

Victorian houses

Many Victorian homes once lined the beach. Wealthy businessmen often chose Biloxi for their summer or retirement homes. The Wood Brothers, (A. Baldwin Wood, an engineer, and Ralph Wood, an executive in the sugar processing industry) purchased two significant historical wooden Victorian mansions along today's Beach Boulevard just east of Bellman Street. Hurricanes Camille and Katrina were the culprits of the demise of these iconic mansions. Historical markers at those two locations are reminders of what used to be

Piers along the beach

Long ago, each home and seafood factory situated along Beach Boulevard had a pier jutting from the water's edge of its property. Piers

were originally constructed of wood and served many purposes: recreation, fishing, docking for boats, and moonlight strolls. Older maps of Biloxi acknowledged the presence of a pier with a little line jutting out into the Mississippi Sound. These were walkable piers and vehicles did not utilize them.

Seafood factories depended

on piers for successful business

operations. Fishermen would dock alongside piers to transport their catches to adjacent factories for processing. Rough storm waters and accompanying winds have demolished countless piers through the years

Building codes

With the loss of so many structures brought on by the wrath of recent hurricanes, Biloxi adopted more stringent building codes. These regulations assist builders in their endeavor to construct and/or substantially improve their properties, resulting in more durable projects, whether for business or residential purposes. Today, the City of Biloxi abides by the latest version of the International Building and Fire Codes. FEMA guidelines regulate matters relating to meeting the Base Flood Elevation, as required by flood codes.
