
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New access road soon to open

A new connector road along the CSX railroad tracks from Porter to Querens avenues is being constructed. The new road will allow motorists to travel along the area when a crossing closes in the future.

As of this writing, crews are in the final stages of the road installation. Striping is next before the roadway opens to traffic.

This project is part of the Popp's Ferry Extension

project where three crossings have to be closed in order to add a new crossing for the extension. It also lessens the number of crossings in East Biloxi where the majority of the crossings are in the city.

Crossings at Dorries and Nixon have already been closed.

The connector road from Porter to Querens is expected to open to motorists by the end of April.

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Nine ways to fill a day on the peninsula

Raise your pulse by discovering all the things downtown has to offer!

Visit Museums – There are several museums on the eastern end of Biloxi. You could easily spend a day in the halls and galleries of the Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art on Beach Boulevard, and learn about the city's history at the Maritime & Seafood Industry Museum off 1st. Street, Coastal Mardi Gras Museum, and the Biloxi Fire Museum, both on Howard Avenue.

Have a cup of coffee – Believe it or not, Biloxi has become a hub for delicious coffee. The Greenhouse Biloxi on G E Ohr Street, and Jacked Up Coffee Shop on Howard Avenue have been holding it down for years, but several others have joined them in the last few years. Recent additions include Brewpaddle Cafe, Empanola Biloxi on Howard, and Makin' Groceries, all of which can also offer you a tasty cup of joe and are located on Howard Avenue.

Drink a beer (or 20) – Biloxi is home to the Coast's most popular brewery - Fly Llama Brewing Company. Fly Llama on Bohn Street offers a rotating wall of 32 beers and seltzers and is the perfect place for an afternoon hang with the family. They are also home to the Hungry Llama so you can keep your belly full as you responsibly enjoy a few tasty brews. Fly Llama has also

welcomed a new neighbor to town. Altered Reality is a nanobrewery just around the corner on Howard Avenue. Altered Reality will have eight taps to enjoy along with old-school arcade games and a great yard that will host food trucks and regular events.

Take a walk and look at some art – Downtown Biloxi has a thriving public art scene featuring more than 30 pieces, including murals, sculptures, and even interactive art. You can find a walking map at many of the downtown businesses that will guide you through the art, highlighting topics focusing on Biloxi's history. You can also take a few extra minutes and check out the work of local artists at Gallery 782 on Jackson Street in the heart of the arts district.

Buy fresh seafood – Seafood built Biloxi, and you can still get the fresh, local stuff at several spots on the east side of the city. Along Caillavet Street, we have Desporte Seafood and Quality Poultry & Seafood. If you want it even fresher, you can head to the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor, south of Beach Boulevard and Dukate Street, to find several local fishermen selling their catch right on the boat!

Enjoy unique dining – Downtown Biloxi is home to over 35 local eateries, too many to list here. So, go ahead, clear your calendar for the foreseeable future, and head downtown to enjoy everything from croque madames to the famous burger burger. You can find a complete list of downtown restaurants at mainstreetbiloxi.com.

Take in a game – The Biloxi Shuckers have been around for almost a decade now, but they are

making big changes to improve the experience at the ballpark on Caillavet Street and Howard Avenue. This season, we'll see a new wiffle ball field for the kids and a tiki bar area complete with a splash pad in the outfield. So get out and enjoy some affordable fun with the family this summer to see these new additions and several more.

Get some exercise – Downtown has seen a recent boom in outdoor activities. Group bike rides have been available for years and currently host over 500 riders per month between Biloxi Bicycle Works weekly Friday rides and the monthly Bike Biloxi ride. New additions to the area include disc golf, pickleball, and skateboarding, all available in the HowHop Creative District. And we will have a weekly running club meeting up at the brand-new Altered Reality Brewery.

Go shopping –After you've gotten your fill of food, beers, art, and history, you can spend the rest of your money in one of our local shops. Downtown's shopping options include a bicycle shop, a record shop, six clothing stores, a coin shop, a quilt shop, an interior design store, and a hardware store that has been around for over 100 years!

Biloxi offers something for everyone! So, whether you're an art lover, a history buff, a foodie, or an outdoor enthusiast, Biloxi invites you to indulge in its unique charms and create unforgettable memories.

The Old Brick House: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow

The Old Brick House has sat facing the Back Bay of Biloxi for more than 170 years. The nineteenth-century building has stood as Biloxi became the seafood capital of the world, a resort town, and as the city ushered in dock-side gaming. The Old Brick House has seen many owners and custodians including two Biloxi mayors, a consortium of Garden Clubs, and the city itself. Today, the Old Brick House is one of the few structures left that was built in the 1800s and competes only with our lighthouse, which was built in 1848, as the oldest building in the city.

The Old Brick House, also known as the Rodgers House, sits on land that was originally part of the Spanish land grant received by Jean Baptiste Carquote in the late 1700s. By 1843, the land was sold to William Rodgers. However, the Old Brick House was probably not constructed until John L. Henley purchased the property in 1850.

Although from New Orleans, John L Henley served as sheriff of Biloxi and later mayor. From 1872 through 1953, the building passed through several owners including another Biloxi Mayor Hart Chinn. It was also used in several different compacities such as an office building, junk shop, and more. Around this time, the Old Brick House carried the nickname, "The Haunted House" due to its battered looks. At some point, the Old Brick House was acquired by the City of Biloxi due to back taxes.

Spearheaded by the Dogwood Garden Club, preservation work began on the house under the chartered Biloxi Garden Center. The collective of Biloxi Garden Clubs began to fund preservation work allowing for the house to open in 1955 for the group's annual Pilgrimage.

Ownership of the building transferred to the Biloxi Garden Center in 1966 and then back again to the City of Biloxi in 1989. However, the relationship with the Biloxi Garden Clubs continued throughout the years with the groups meeting and hosting annual events such as a Christmas coffee fundraiser and concerts in the garden of the property.

In years since Hurricane Katrina, the Old Brick House has been a rental facility for weddings and other gatherings.

The house has seen changes throughout the years, both due to storms and time. By the 1920s, an attached kitchen on the Bayview side of the house was removed. And, both Hurricane Camille and Hurricane Katrina caused major damage to the structure. A














restoration took place and each time, brought the Old Brick House back to its charm and character.

Currently, the building is listed on the National Registry of Historic Places and has been since 1987. It is also a Mississippi Landmark and a locally designated Biloxi Landmark. However, the conditions of dampness have once again taken a toll. A new restoration plan is in the works involving repairing the brickwork, sealing the moisture coming up through the bricks and foundation, and replastering. The work will be long,



but the results will be a more sustainable restoration project protecting the building for generations to come.

Biloxi has seen a lot of change and loss. However, places like the Old Brick House through their adaptive reuse give us a glimpse into the past and a hope for the future of preserving our cultural heritage.

The Biloxi Garden Club was quoted in The Daily Herald in 1955 stating: "To members of this group, the preservation of the old brick house is a treasure far more valuable than the gold doubloons said to be buried there."

333rd TRS Mad Ducks add to the instructor flock

The 333rd Training Squadron and instructional coaches from the Biloxi School District have partnered to broaden military instructor capabilities.

This community partnership, aligned with the 81st Training Wing's priority of focused training, enhances the quality of education military students receive by equipping instructors with more techniques and skills to teach in a diverse classroom.

Instructional coaches use their extensive experience as educators to serve as mentors, helping teachers stay up to date on the

newest teaching techniques and technologies. They also ensure consistency in the delivery of teaching curriculum across different teachers, striving to maintain uniformity.

"As a training squadron, we're always looking to better the students' experience, so we're starting with the ones giving the school experience," said Lt. Col. Nicholas Kuc, 333rd TRS commander. "We pull our instructors internally in the Air Force, out of their operational career field, and into the training squadron. Most people don't have

experience in teaching, so they'll go through an instructor internship period within the basic instructor course. As with any job, it takes time to master, so we sought to see if teachers in the local community were

willing to serve as mentors to our instructors."

The mentoring process begins with the instructional coaches observing instructors on the podium. After the observation period, instructors and coaches converse, sharing feedback, tips, and tricks, or different styles of teaching or classroom management.

Instructional coaches may also introduce a new piece of technology that might be considered for use in the classroom.

Approximately 20 of Keesler's instructors have experienced coaching so far. The experience has validated that Keesler's recent technical training transformations

and pivots to hands-on learning models reflect the state of education across the country.

"It's all about trying to be hands-on and employ project-based learning. That's really what helps learning stick," said KC Curtis, Biloxi School District instructional coach. "Learning and teaching are the same regardless of the age of the student or the content. It's about increasing the engagement, wanting our students to be there and for them to desire to be there."

> This partnership underscores the dedication to education at Keesler and within the local community. This pilot program and discussion of future iterations are expected to leave lasting results.

Some are involved for the duration of their child's youth sports career, while others continue the donation of their time after their child ages out of our leagues. Whatever the length of time or reason, often, it's not the easiest job and can demand time away from their families and hobbies.

Most of our coaches have shown their talent for teaching the game but more importantly,

Those who serve on the various sports boards are also appreciated for their countless donated hours in assisting to make each child's experience one to remember.









For the episode, videographer Renny Sherman set up his cameras in the kitchen of Biloxi Fire Station No. 7 and filmed the team preparing the food while narrating the process and filling the firehouse with an aroma no one could resist.

This month's recipe:

Baked Cajun Chicken Alfredo With Buttermilk Garlic Butter Biscuits

By Biloxi Firefighter III David Allen, along with other Biloxi Firefighters

Chicken Alfredo Ingredients:

- 3 large sweet onions
- 1 yellow bell pepper
- 1 orange bell pepper
- 1 red bell pepper
- 1 dozen baby Bella mushrooms
- 1 8.5 oz jar of sliced sun-dried tomatoes
- 12 oz of shredded Parmesan cheese
- · 2 cup of Italian blend shredded cheese
- 1 ½ lbs of bow tie pasta
- 4 sticks unsalted butter
- 1 quart of heavy whipping cream
- Approx. 3 tbsp of Zataran's blackening seasoning
- · 3 lbs of chicken filets

Prep (approx. 20 minutes)

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Dice all peppers and onions and set aside in a bowl. Cut all mushrooms in half then thinly slice, after those are done set aside in a separate bowl. In a large pot, boil your pasta till al dente. Lastly cube your chicken and set aside.

Cooking (approx. 45 minutes)

- In a large pan, melt a stick of butter and place in chicken. You are going to generously season the chicken with the blackening seasoning and constantly stir every few minutes to ensure the chicken is thoroughly cooked.
- In a separate large pan, you want to melt a stick of butter and begin to sauté your onions and peppers over medium heat. Once they are beginning to get tender, you will then add in your mushrooms and entire jar of tomatoes.
- Once you've let your veggies get to know each other for a few minutes you will cube up your last two sticks of butter and add them.
- When the butter begins to melt, add your heavy cream and season with the blackening seasoning. Continue to season, constantly tasting till you reach your desired flavor.
 - If you feel as if you over seasoned don't stress, when you mix in your noodles and cheese it will knock a lot of the spices down.
- Once your sauce is all together, crank up the heat and bring your sauce to a boil. Once to a boil, bring down to a low simmer and keep that simmer for around ten minutes.
- 6. In a large deep baking pan: a. Place in your noodles; b. Cover noodles with Parmesan cheese c. Place in your chicken; d. Pour entirety of sauce on top
- Stir all content of the baking pan till thoroughly and evenly mix.
- Cover top of your alfredo with your Italian blend shredded cheese then lightly dust with your blackening seasoning
- 9. Bake for approx. 20 minutes or until cheese on top begins to melt and brown.

Biscuits (yields 13-15 large biscuits)

- 4 cups of self-rising flour
- 1 frozen stick of garlic and herb butter
- 1 melted stick of garlic and herb butter
- 1 stick of vegetable shortening
- . 1 quart of cultured buttermilk

Prep (approx. 10 min)

Optional* sift your flour into a mixing bowl. Place one stick of butter into freezer and grease your pan you'll be baking in.

- Once you've placed your flour into the bowl, you'll begin to break off ½ a cup of your shortening into little pieces and place into flour.
 Using your fingers, pinch the shortening into the flour till it is incorporated in little flakes. (your flour
- should look like it has little crumbs and clumps in it)
- 3. Then you are going to create a crater in the middle of your flour and pour ¾ of your buttermilk into the crater.

 A Posit to fold your flour with your hood station from the cutoida to the middle until you have a
- Begin to fold your flour with your hand starting from the outside to the middle until you have a
 consistency of cottage cheese, adding more milk if needed.
- 5. DO NOT over knead your dough, once you've reached desired texture STOP.
- 6. Take around half a cup of flour and dust your counter
- 7. Pour dough onto floured counter then dust the top of your dough ball
- 3. Gently flatten your dough till approximately ½ inch thick.
- a. Once flattened, take your frozen butter and grate it covering the entire surface of the dough.
- b. Once covered, gently fold the dough back together creating layers
- 9. ONLY fold a few time to create layers, do not over work your dough or they will not rise.
- 10. Once folded flatten out your dough to about 1 inch thick.
- 11. Use desired size cookie cutter or large cup and press into the dough. DO NOT TWIST when cutting dough, that will keep your dough from rising.
- 12. Place your cut biscuits into your greased pan tightly.
- 13. Once all your biscuits are in your pan, put a bead size piece of shortening on the top of each biscuit.

Bake (approx. 20-30)

- 1. In your preheated oven, place your pan of biscuits.
- 2. When the biscuits rise and begin to brown, take your melted garlic butter and evenly pour on top
- Place back in oven till you have the desired color on top. (If worried biscuit is not done, take a toothpick and stick it into the middle of the biscuit, if nothing comes out when you pull out the tooth pick it is finished.)
- 4. Remove biscuits when finished, allow to cool a few minutes before serving.

Early days of Biloxi baking

In the early days of Biloxi, around the 1700s, there were no ovens in which to bake and little wheat that survived the voyages from France. The earliest breads were made with "corn wheat." Corn was a staple commodity that the Native Americans thrived upon and which saved the earliest settlers and voyageurs from starvation. Corn Pone (also known as corn cake or hearth cake) was originally made with a few ingredients: finely ground corn kernels, water, salt, and animal fat. These were likely Biloxi's first cakes!

Bakery delivery in the early 1900s

As time evolved, so did the bakery industry. By the early 1900s, retail bakers began to organize in America. Product offerings expanded, and people's means of receiving baked goods advanced. In Biloxi, bread was delivered to homes via horse and buggy. Those were the days before our current online and delivery options were available.

Introduction of electricity

In the 1890s, Mr. Ed Burklin (from Missouri) came to Biloxi and, with permission from City officials, constructed a flour mill and electric plant. This electric plant was located at the corner of Esters Boulevard and Magnolia Street in downtown Biloxi, near the old train depot.

The early 1900s were the days when Biloxi saw its first electric colorful window, bearing several street lights, and homes and businesses were offered a safer means of lighting. Transportation (via electric trolley) and cooking also progressed because of electricity. In fact, our grandparents referred to their monthly electric service bill as their "light bill." Today, however, households and businesses simply refer to it as the power bill.

For a century, the Electrik Maid Bake Shop has been serving bread, cookies, pastries, cakes, and more. As Biloxi celebrates the bakery's 100th year, we take a look at some baking history.



The Birth of Biloxi's Electrik Maid Bake Shop

With the introduction of electric-powered ovens came an excellent opportunity for perfect baking. On April 12, 1924, Electrik Maid Bake Shop, the ideal name for the new

establishment, opened its doors for business. It was located in downtown Biloxi on West Howard Avenue in a location we recognize today as the Bara's Building.

Its early offerings included cakes, cookies, pies, rolls, and breads. Its original

slogan was "Taste the Difference."

Electrik Maid's founders were Donald Entringer

and A.W. Bissett, both natives of Wisconsin and experienced bakers. Mr. Entringer later became the father of McKenzie's Bakery in New Orleans. He was also a prominent contributor to the community and donated a stained-glass window to the nearby Nativity Church. This Entringer family names, can still be seen in the church today.

Recognizing the need for additional locations, Electrik Maid expanded, offering baked goods in some local grocery stores and adding more locations, including one on Porter Avenue. The Porter Avenue shop opened in 1955. Its location in the downtown area offered a perfect afternoon treat for nearby students.

A special anniversary congratulations to the Balius Family for a job well done!

Its current slogan: You Taste the Difference

is representative of a tribute to the celebration of the family's longstanding service to Biloxi's taste buds. The name Electrik Maid is certainly indicative of its successful business, whereby patrons could truly choose

a product prepared in "electric" ovens enhancing the overall baking process.

> Back in the day, the bake shop even offered fried chicken and home delivery, food services that were not commonplace at that time.

> Paul Balius, the head baker for Mr. Entringer, bought the shop in the early 1950s and primarily worked out of the shop on Porter Avenue. Today, it is a family tradition with the grandson, Harrel Balius, and others working in the Bakery.

Located at 1833 Pass Road, the shop still offers an array of fresh baked goods and is open Monday through Saturday from 6:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Through thick and thin


This century-old Bakery represents the steadfast resilience of Biloxi. It has survived a fire (while housed in the Yerger/ Bara's Building), the Great Depression, and multiple hurricanes. It should be noted that the current location is about 30 feet above level, which helped protect it from flooding during Hurricane Katrina.



Specialty Items

Besides its traditional baked goods, which include Wedding and Birthday Cakes, cookies, pies, donuts, rolls, cakes, breads, and pies, it has also expanded its offerings to include additional treats:

Petit Fours: small bite-size



savory pieces of cake, finely decorated with specialty icing and often served as a delicacy at celebratory events. (Petit four is a French term meaning "small

King Cakes: This Electrik Maid's Mardi Gras treat is usually decorated with swirls of their special cake icing representing the purple, green, and gold (yellow) colors of the season.

Eclairs: a culinary delight made from a long French delicacy filled with pastry cream or custard and dipped in a special icing (fondant icing).

Cream Puffs: a classic bite-size French pastry filled with sweet cream and sometimes dusted with powdered

Napoleons: a small layered French iced pastry with a creamy filling.

Fruit Cake: a Christmas delight filled with dried fruit, nuts, dates, and raisins.
