


Operating budget approved for new fiscal year

Local Expenditures - \$83,860,447.00




The new city budget goes into effect with the beginning of the Fiscal Year 2025 on Oct. 1.

The operation budget for the new year is estimated more than \$83 million. Operations include all city departments that provide public safety, road maintenance, building permits, code enforcement, project maintenance and project implementations, recreation facilities, water and sewer services, and community programs, just to name a few.

City operations are funded by three primary revenue streams, gaming taxes, sales taxes, and property taxes.

One thing to keep in mind: the city budget is it is a living document. It's a piece of paper that is amended dozens of times throughout the year. based on unanticipated changes in revenue and unanticipated changes in expenditures.

Building Division

Dear Resident:

You have received this letter because your property is in an area that has flooded several times. The City of Biloxi is concerned about repetitive flooding and has an active program to help you protect yourself and your structure from future flooding. Here are some things

1. Check with the Building Division on the extent of past flooding in your area. Our Floodplain Administrator can tell you about the causes of repetitive flooding, what the City is doing about it, and what would be an appropriate flood protection level. Our Building Inspectors can visit your property to discuss flood protection alternatives.

2. Prepare for flooding by doing the following:

- Know how to shut off the electricity and gas to your house when a flood comes.
- Make a list of emergency numbers and identify a safe place to go.
- Make a household inventory, especially of contents.
- Put insurance policies, valuable papers, medicine, etc. in a safe place.
- Collect and put cleaning supplies, camera, waterproof boots, etc. in a handy place.
- Develop a disaster response plan See the Red Cross' website: www.redcross.org/services/disaster/ for a copy of the brochure "Your Family Disaster Plan."
- Get a copy of "Repairing Your Flooded Home" available within the <u>Building Division</u>.

3. Consider some permanent flood protection measures.

- Mark your fuse or breaker box to show the circuits to the floodable areas. Turning off the power can reduce property damage and save lives.
- Consider elevating your house above flood levels.
- Check your house for water entry points.
- Install a floor drain plug, standpipe, overhead sewer, or sewer backup valve to prevent sewer backup flooding.
- More information can be found in the "Homeowner's Guide to Retrofitting: Six Ways to Protect Your House from Flooding" available in the Building Division or visit www.fema.gov/hazards/floods/lib312.shtm
- Be aware that some flood protection measures may need a building a permit and other flood protection measures may not be safe for your type of structure, so be sure to check with the Building Division.

4. Visit the Building Division for information on financial assistance in terms of a flood insurance policy.

• Get a flood insurance policy – it will help pay for repairs after a flood and, in some cases, it will help pay the costs of elevating a substantially damaged building.

5. Flood Insurance.

- Homeowner's insurance policies DO NOT cover damage from floods. However, because the City of Biloxi participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy. This flood insurance is backed by the Federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded.
- The City of Biloxi participates in the NFIPs Community Rating System (CRS) and is at a Class 6. Therefore, a 20% insurance premium reduction is applied to all NFIP flood policies in the City of Biloxi.
- Some people have purchased flood insurance because it was required by the bank for a mortgage or home improvement loan. Usually these policies only cover the building's structure and not the contents. Due to the flooding that happens in your area, there is usually more damage to the furniture and contents then there is to the structure. Be sure you have contents coverage.
- Do not wait for the next flood to buy flood insurance protection. In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before the NFIP coverage takes effect.
- Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

Biloxi Elks Lodge.



boat builder and artist whose artwork is owned by two Presidents


- Voyle Moran (portrayed by Mitchell Gruich, Jr.) – craftsman and inventor

The Old Biloxi Cemetery Tour is in its 18th year. Our cast, known as the "Not Ready for the Afterlife Players" is made up of little theater actors from the area and actual descendants of those being portrayed.

The tour is self-guided and each actor will repeat performances for the entire length of the event. Attendees are encouraged to wear light clothing and comfortable walking shoes. Small bets equal big payoffs for Downtown Biloxi

Local organizations like Biloxi Main Street and The Greater Biloxi Economic Development Foundation have been investing time, money, and effort into small, incremental projects that are creating a sense of place for the downtown district.

These small steps are proving to be a great way to enhance the area. The two organizations have worked in concert with the city to complete several small projects, with more in the works. These efforts include new public art pieces, a clean-up incentive program, and a much-needed update to the sign welcoming visitors to downtown from the I-110 ramp at Bayview Avenue. These initiatives have led to increased traffic for downtown businesses and made the area more attractive to new ventures.

The Greater Biloxi Economic Development Foundation, whose mission states, "The purpose of the Foundation is to encourage, foster, and advance economic and community growth, and promote civic pride and awareness of the Greater Biloxi and Mississippi areas," has worked closely with the city to complete several small-scale projects over the past year.

Projects include partnering with Biloxi Main Street to hire Julia Reyes to paint a mural on the once unsightly utility panel on Howard Avenue, partnering with the Gulf Coast Chamber of Commerce to provide matching funds for small business grants, repainting the curbing at Porter Avenue and Irish Hill, and collaborating with the city to update the "Welcome to Biloxi" sign at I-110 and Bayview Avenue. The organization is also

partnering with Mississippi Power to launch a façade grant program in the near future.

Biloxi Main Street has also used these "small bets" to accomplish their mission "to preserve, revitalize, and promote the economic growth of downtown Biloxi, Mississippi." The organization has utilized proven strategies like public art, string lighting, and small business grants to make downtown a vibrant and appealing destination.

Main Street has several upcoming projects aimed at further enhancing the area. These include a trash pickup program (detailed in last month's edition of "Biloxi Pulse"), LED lighting under the I-110 bridge, rehabilitation of the alley next to The Greenhouse Biloxi, bicycle racks throughout downtown, and a wayfinding project for downtown Biloxi. Each of these projects will make the community cleaner and safer for residents while being more welcoming to visitors.

Music kicks off the off-season at Keesler Federal Park

As the 2024 season concludes for the Biloxi Shuckers, the staff and front office are already hard at work crafting the ballpark experience for 2025! With the Shuckers finishing out the 2024 season in September, it's time to look ahead to 2025.

2024 GRAND SLAM JAM

First up in the offseason is the 2024 Grand Slam Jam, set to be held at the ballpark on October 5. The all-day music festival at the ballpark features country and blues acts such as Chapel Hart, Tab Benoit, Tim Dugger, Taj Farrant, Rockin' Dopsie Jr., Bonerama, Leilani Kilgore, and Amanda Shaw. Tickets begin at \$65 for the festival, which will run from noon until 10 p.m. and can be purchased online or at the Biloxi Shuckers Box Office.

2025 Shuckers schedule

The Shuckers, in conjunction with Minor League Baseball, also announced the team's 2025 home schedule in early August, which features 69 games at Keesler Federal Park during the Shuckers 10th anniversary season. The Shuckers will begin their 2025 home slate against the newest Southern League team, the Columbus Clingstones (Atlanta Braves), on Tuesday, April 8. The Mississippi Braves will move to Columbus, Georgia, at the end of the 2024 season, remaining as the Atlanta Braves Double-A affiliate.

As with the 2024 schedule, the Shuckers will play every team at Keesler Federal Park, including multiple homestands against divisional rivals Columbus, the Pensacola Blue Wahoos (Miami Marlins) and the Montgomery Biscuits (Tampa Bay Rays). The Shuckers will also host at least one series against North Division opponents, including the Tennessee Smokies (Chicago Cubs), Birmingham Barons (Chicago White Sox), Chattanooga Lookouts (Cincinnati Reds), and Rocket City Trash Pandas (Los Angeles Angels).

Marquee matchups at home include Mother's Day on Sunday, May 11, against the Pensacola Blue Wahoos, Memorial Day Weekend on May 24-25 against the Tennessee Smokies, and the Shuckers Independence Day Extravaganza on Friday, July 4, against Pensacola. The Shuckers will also host a Labor Day game on Monday, September 1, against Pensacola. The Shuckers will have two homestands of at least nine games in 2025, including between July 4-13 against Pensacola and Birmingham and August 12-24 against Columbus and Chattanooga.

New approach to readiness: Al-powered religious affairs training

The 81st Training Group is embracing innovative training methods to better prepare its Religious Affairs students for the challenges they may face in the field. Previously six weeks long, the expanded eight-week Religious Affairs course is utilizing virtual reality to give students hands-on experience in crisis intervention and counseling.

"This career field is unique, in that it's very people-oriented," said Tech. Sqt. Alfred Perkins,

335th Training Squadron religious affairs instructor. "It is very feelings oriented, where we're dealing with people that are sometimes in the darkest place they have ever been and are looking for our help."

Before implementing VR training, the Religious Affairs course depended on instructors to act out crisis scenarios for students. This hands-on approach allowed learners to practice their counseling and intervention skills, with the instructors playing the role of individuals in distress; however, this method relies on the instructors' acting abilities and the inherent relationship between the student and teacher.

The introduction of artificial intelligence-powered VR has transformed this training model.

Students can now interact with fully customizable Al avatars within a simulated environment, allowing them to navigate complex situations

without the presence of a familiar instructor. This detachment forces the students to quickly build trust and rapport, mirroring the challenges they may face when responding

to a crisis for the first time in the field. By practicing with these Al-driven personas, which can exhibit a wide range of emotions and backstories, the Airmen gain invaluable experience that better prepares them for the realities they will encounter operationally.

"It can be challenging to interact with people and know how to approach those in distress," said Perkins. "Us using virtual reality training is going to give us the upper hand at understanding the types of crises that we can handle and give students the opportunity to practice before it's real world."

The Religious Affairs course's transition to VR training represents a significant step forward in preparing Airmen for the high-stress, people-oriented work they will encounter in the field. This allows the learners to hone their crisis intervention skills, build trust with individuals in distress, and gain confidence in their ability to provide effective support - all before facing these challenges for the first time in a real-world setting.

Recognizing the broader applications of this technology, Perkins believes virtual reality training could be leveraged to enhance preparedness across multiple career fields.

"I think that we're going to have the opportunity to do a lot of crosstalk with other career fields and share how we can make it better for everybody," said Perkins. As the Air Force continues to cultivate a

> culture of continuous improvement, the integration of VR is proving to be a valuable tool for developing the next generation of versatile, mission-ready service members.







Bird-friendly boating

There's a new sign posted at the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor, 679 Beach Blvd., reminding boaters to use caution when encountering local

birds. While enjoying the local waterways, it is important to remember that this is home to many protected species.

Audubon Delta's mission is to protect coastal birds and their habitats so they monitor and protect waterbird species that use the beaches and barrier islands. Recently, the program partnered on a "Bird-Friendly Boating" sign project with the National Park Service to help raise awareness for the birds using the barrier islands.



The sign highlights practices to help protect migratory and nesting birds, clearly identifies Gulf Islands National Seashore islands, and reminds the public of simple rules to follow while enjoying the islands.


The Tunnels to Towers Foundation honors military and first responders who make the supreme sacrifice of life and limb for our country. The annual Tunnels to Towers 5K run takes place every year all over the country, including Biloxi. This run starts in the Margaritaville parking lot and makes its way over the Biloxi Bay Bridge then back to Margaritaville where participants can climb 110 steps, symbolic of the 110 floors in the World Trade Center.

Who originally owned the land where the Biloxi cemetery is now? Louis Fayard (1758-1830). On Nov. 27, 1844, the Fayard heirs legally deeded approximately six acres of the then-existing cemetery to the Village of Biloxi.

What happens in the Biloxi Cemetery at the end of October each year? Families prepare their families' gravesites for All Saints Day (Nov. 1) by cleaning and adding flowers.

Why are many tombs built above ground? The high water level under in-ground burials can sometimes inundate the burial sites, causing caskets to rise to the surface. Above-ground tombs also allow more space for multiple burials.

What purposes did short-wrought iron fences around plots serve? These little fences ideally prevented animals from disturbing the burials and provided a boundary line for the family's site.

The address of our old Biloxi cemetery is 1166 Irish Hill Drive. What was the previous name of Irish Hill Drive? Cemetery Road.

Where did the bricks come from that make up the short red brick fence along the roadway by the cemetery? Bricks were recycled from the old City Hall that once sat at the intercession of Main and Howard Avenue when it was demolished in the 1960s. The fence is made from some of those bricks.

What is the gray threadlike vegetation dangling from old oak trees? Spanish moss. It is an air plant that derives all its nourishment from the air and is part of the bromeliad family, related to the pineapple plant.

What are some older uses for Spanish moss back in the day? Mattresses, insulation, mulch, and decorations.

Can Spanish moss produce flowers? Yes, in the springtime. Tiny flowers, which actually have a pleasant scent, bloom in the spring and early summer.

Where can you find the oldest burials in the Biloxi Cemetery? The oldest interments are in the southernmost portion of the land near Beach Boulevard.

What famous Cat Island settler is buried in the Biloxi cemetery? Juan de Cuevas – Hero of Cat Island during the War of 1812.

Are there any local publications that might list burials in the Biloxi Cemetery? Yes, in 2002, the Mississippi Coast Historical and Genealogical Society published The Biloxi Cemetery, which lists burials from the early 1800s through 1960. This book is available for viewing at the Biloxi Library Local History & Genealogy Department.



Back in the Day Back in the Day

BILOXI'S HISTORICAL ODDITIES BY JAME SHAMBRA

The reports in Biloxi's fascinating history books would not be complete without the inclusion of the unusual tales that come to life during the autumn days of wonder when leaves fall and a chill can be found in the air.



GHOSTS OF THE COLISEUM

A few years ago, the network series "Ghost Hunters" visited Biloxi in pursuit of reported sightings of ghostly figures, unexplained noises, and unusual occurrences within the Mississippi Coast Coliseum and Convention Center. Numerous production crew members traveled from afar to investigate. Even though no photos could be captured of "the unexplained," tales of several apparitions have been seen within that facility through the years.

One tale is related to the spirit of a young girl who perished under the bluff by the sandy

area of the Mississippi Sound in 1909. She disappeared while playing in the area and was found later. She was the daughter of a Beauvoir area worker and was buried somewhere in a small unmarked orphanage cemetery under the land where the Coliseum is built.

During the construction of the Coliseum in the 1970s, there were reports of the discovery of some abandoned grave sites. When confronted with this finding, workers would not confirm the report, and the case was closed. Could this little girl be a part of the unexplained apparitions? No one knows for sure.

WEATHER WITCH

One of the most curious architectural features in Downtown Biloxi is the famous weather witch weather vane. The Peoples Bank erected the bank oh so many years ago. Today, she is still

perched atop Ellzey's hardware store and has resided there since the building was constructed over a hundred years ago. This unique wonder was attached to that building when it was built in 1897. Indeed, she is strong and has endured hurricanes and the salty air of the Gulf. She flies atop the southern roof of the building and is fearless during our hurricanes.

GARGOYLE

Alongside our historic weather witch there once sat a famous gargoyle. Gargoyles are dragon-like creatures established thousands of years ago in ancient architecture. Their original purpose was to redirect rainwater off a roof and

ward off evil from penetrating the area.

After Hurricane Katrina, Mr. Gargoyle received much damage. He became a challenge to piece together. He was discovered to have been constructed of many unusual materials.

Mary Ott Davidson, a notable local sculptor, was able to repair the iconic Biloxi gargoyle, which now resides safely inside The Peoples Bank Building on Howard Ave and Lameuse Street.

Ms. Davidson, a Biloxi native, is also credited with the creation of our Fred Haise statue by the Biloxi Lighthouse, as well as the D'Iberville statue erected in 1999 during Biloxi's celebration of the tricentennial.

BONES UNDER THE BANK

In the 1980s, there once stood a federal building on the square block bounded by Howard, Main, Lameuse, and Martin Luther King Blvd. During its construction in 1982, workers discovered many bones and casket pieces, suggesting that an old cemetery from the 1700s might be under the surface. Investigators were summoned, and the official report released by the Biloxi Police Department concluded that these were merely remnants of an old dairy farm in the area.

That federal building was demolished in 2018. Near that spot, a more modern three-story Community Bank Building opened in May 2022. There were no discoveries of bones or any other unusual objects during the erection of the new structure.

TOMBSTORE IN THE STADIUM

In prior years, Biloxi High School football games were played at Yankee Stadium, where the KROC Center now stands. After Hurricane Katrina, the old stadium needed to be demolished to prepare for the present facility.

Contractors were terrified to find an old tombstone stored within the walls of the old sports structure. Could someone be buried underneath? The answer is simple. The Glass family were caretakers of Yankee Stadium.

Thomas Glass died unexpectedly in the early 1900s. The family kept the original stone with them for decades. Mr. Glass rests at peace in the Biloxi City Cemetery, with a newer tombstone marking his gravesite.



After Hurricane Katrina, a tombstone with the name Jules J. Bache was discovered in Hiller Park, not anywhere near a cemetery. City workers were instructed to deliver it to City Hall for safekeeping until a family member could claim the little monument.

Meanwhile, City Hall underwent a renovation to correct the storm

damage. After that job was completed, city workers were tasked with repositioning desks and other items in the building. One day, someone remembered that the mystery stone needed to be tucked away

again for safekeeping. But it could not be located! In a panic, employees searched every nook and corner but had no luck. After a casual conversation with the movers who had stored the desks and other furniture from the building, a thorough investigation revealed that indeed the tombstone was left as an orphan in one of the moving trucks and had traveled across the country far, far away. Luckily, the stone was relocated without damage and returned to City Hall intact

Tales of past Biloxi mysteries could not leave out the popular stories of the two little girls who visited severely ill patients in the old Biloxi Howard Memorial Hospital, now the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources. The stories are retold again and again, originating from hospital patients and medical care workers, with the details all the same.

Years ago, two little girls, always giggling and cheerful, would appear at the bedside of very sick patients. They were estimated to be about seven years old. They were said to be responsible for elevators acting up, thermostats bringing room temperatures to wintery conditions, and doors suddenly slamming shut. These unusual visitations were reported to hospital staff, who eventually realized the youngsters were unreal. No one knows who the girls might have been or where they went once the facility closed.

UFOs in Biloxi

A few years ago, the reports from Project Blue Book were released to the public. This included the description of unusual unexplained sightings in the United States sky from 1947–1969. The original documentation is housed in the National Archives.

During this period, there were several reports of unusual sightings by individuals in Biloxi. Even though these occurrences did not appear in the newspaper headlines, the facts are fascinating.

Project Blue Book documented sightings by observers, some of which included drawings of what they saw. However, none showed conclusive evidence of UFOs visiting Biloxi.

It is interesting to note that formal observational reports were collected and evaluated. They are merely eyewitness accounts accompanied by suggested explanations of sightings.

GHOST OF HOWARD AVERUE

Within the last few years, there have been reports of an unusual visitor strolling through downtown on Howard Avenue He is described by all as a tall, older man dressed in a gray coat. He appears and disappears at will, never speaking. Business owners have reported issues with lights going off and on and coffee cups relocated to other parts of their offices. No one is certain of who he might be, although there is a rumor that he is linked to a murder in the 1970s.
