




















Upgrades at the A.J. Holloway Sports Complex are nearing the finish line with a ribbon cutting set for next month.

The 68-acre site south of Popp's Ferry and Cedar Lake roads has been a vortex of activity since September 2023 when contractors J.E. Talley Construction first tackled the fields. Since then, fields have been turfed, painting has been spread, and paving has been completed, all part of the \$5.167 million project. The massive overhaul is finally nearing the finish line with a number of enhancements completed.

Improvements include:

- About 405,000 cubic feet of select backfill excavated and installed on the five baseball and four softball fields
- New parking lots added creating 120 new parking spaces
- Painting at each complex softball, baseball, and soccer
- New subsurface drainage installed at infields and outfields of the baseball fields.
- 70,000 square feet of synthetic turf on infields and 135,000 square feet of Bermuda sod on outfields installed on the five baseball fields

 100,000 square feet of synthetic turf, along with new subsurface drainage, installed on the infield of four softball fields

- 306,000 square feet stripped and new topsoil and Bermuda sod installed on the three soccer fields
- New black vinyl fencing installed around perimeter of the soccer complex

"Some minor repairs are in the process due to the availability of materials," said Jamie Lee, Biloxi Parks & Recreation Assistant Director. "But they should be completed by opening day."

A ribbon cutting for the reopening of the complex is set for Saturday, March 8. The ceremonial event will also feature opening ceremonies for Biloxi Youth Baseball and Softball leagues. It will be the first games played on the new fields.



Pets: No pets should be at a Mardi Gras parade unless they are in the parade. Also, no glass containers.





Nominate someone today!

Purpose:

To identify and honor individuals who have significantly contributed to the betterment of athletics in the City of Biloxi, either through exemplary performance as a player, coach, or in any supporting role of superior accomplishment.

Criteria: The following shall be considered:

- 1. The nominee must be retired at least three years if an athlete/competitor, or have completed at least 15 years of service as a coach or supporter of Biloxi athletics.
- 2. The nominee must have demonstrated good citizenship both in school and after leaving school.
- 3. The nominee must have contributed to the betterment of athletics in the City of Biloxi as a player, coach or any supporting role of superior accomplishment.

Procedures:

Nominees are accepted annually and reviewed by a volunteer selection committee which, by consensus of opinion, will objectively choose those to be inducted each year. Selection will be based on, but not limited to statistical performance, individual achievement, leadership, citizenship and community service. The number of inductees each year is solely the discretion of the selection committee.

Nominations made without using the proper form or lack of supporting documentation may not be considered. Nominations must include a head shot sufficient for publication. Those received without using the proper form or lack of supporting documentation may not be considered.



Artful greetings continue downtown



While visiting downtown, whether it be for shopping, dining, or exploring the area by foot or bicycle, artful greetings can be found throughout the area. Biloxi's Public Art Project began in 2019 by Biloxi Main Street and includes 28 murals, with four murals recently added.

The project is a series of murals downtown that highlight Biloxi's past in a colorful manner. The murals are displayed on the

exterior walls of the host building and depict an event in history, a project or business that once was, an artist, a prominent person, and more.

The mural project spans roughly five miles in the downtown area. When driving, walking, or cycling, the mural route takes the art-lover through the heart of Downtown Biloxi, passing shops, eateries, museums, and historic sites.

Bulldogs, Golden **Eagles Return** to Biloxi for the 2025 Hancock Whitney Classic



Tickets on sale now, games on March 11, 12, and 25 at Keesler Federal Park

We're officially under 100 days until the Biloxi Shuckers' 10th anniversary season begins on Friday, April 4 at the Pensacola Blue Wahoos! Before the Shuckers open their home slate on Tuesday, April 8 against the Columbus Clingstones, Keesler Federal Park will welcome in four different college teams for the 2025 Hancock Whitney Classic.

2025 HANCOCK WHITNEY CLASSIC

The Shuckers have announced that the Mississippi State Bulldogs will return to Biloxi for the 2025 Hancock Whitney Classic on Tuesday, March 11 at 6:00 p.m. and Wednesday, March 12 at 5:00 p.m. against the Old Dominion Monarchs and Nicholls Colonels. The Southern Miss Golden Eagles will also return to Biloxi for a second consecutive season, taking on Nicholls on Tuesday, March 25 at 6:05 p.m. as part of the Hancock Whitney Classic. Gates will open an hour before both Mississippi State games and at 5:00 p.m. on March 25. Tickets are now available through the Shuckers Box Office at Keesler Federal Park and Ticketmaster. Limited suites and group hospitality spaces are also available for the games through the Biloxi Shuckers Sales Department at Keesler Federal Park. Fans are encouraged to get their tickets in advance as prices will increase on the day of the game.

"Mississippi State fans are some of the most passionate in college baseball and partnering with Hancock Whitney to continue these games is an honor," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. "We're excited to welcome the Bulldogs and their fans back for another year and showcase our ballpark to fans of Old Dominion and Nicholls. It will truly be a special series at our ballpark."

In 2024, the Shuckers welcomed over

10,000 fans for the Bulldogs' two games in Biloxi, including a sellout of 6,098 on March 12, 2024, the largest crowd ever to see a college game at Keesler Federal Park.

"Hancock Whitney is honored to join with the Biloxi Shuckers in bringing the Hancock Whitney Classic to South Mississippi," Hancock Whitney Mississippi Gulf Coast President Brent Fairley said. "This exciting series spotlights some of college baseball's finest athletes at a marquee event that creates opportunities for fans to cheer their favorite teams and players while further strengthening Coastal Mississippi's vibrant economy and deep sense of community."

In 2024, Southern Miss advanced to the finals of the Knoxville Regional before falling to the eventual national champion, Tennessee. The Golden Eagles have been a pillar of excellence in college baseball, with at least 40 wins in each of their last eight full seasons. They have also reached the NCAA Tournament in eight consecutive seasons and have advanced to Super Regionals in two of the last three years. Southern Miss infielder, Ozzie Pratt, also has ties to the Shuckers, being the older brother of Shuckers infielder Cooper Pratt.

The Golden Eagles baseball program is one of the top programs with some of the best fans in the area," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. "We're thrilled to partner with Hancock Whitney for a game featuring two terrific teams, including a talented Nicholls team. We're excited to welcome both teams back for another year and continue our great partnership with Coach Ostrander and the Southern Miss program."

The Shuckers have also announced that single-game tickets are now on sale for all 69 home games at Keesler Federal Park for the 2025 season, the team's 10th-anniversary

campaign. The Shuckers will begin their home slate on Tuesday, April 8 at 6:05 p.m. against the Columbus Clingstones. Marquee matchups include Mother's Day on Sunday, May 11 against the Pensacola Blue Wahoos, Memorial Day Weekend on May 24-25 against the Knoxville Smokies, the Shuckers Independence Day Extravaganza on Friday, July 4 against Pensacola and the team's special Labor Day game on Monday, September 1 against Pensacola. Fans can save up to 16% on tickets by purchasing in advance through Ticketmaster (LINK) or the Shuckers Box Office at Keesler Federal Park. Tickets range from \$9-\$33 on the lower level with a more premium all-inclusive experience available on the suite level in the Kloud7 SkyBox. The Shuckers also offer special discounts to seniors, kids, military, and first responders. These discounts are available for the Home Plate Box, Dugout Box, and Reserved Sections. Kids two and under are admitted free of charge.

Biloxi Main Street PAVING the Way!

Biloxi Main Street, the non-profit organization dedicated to revitalizing Downtown Biloxi, is embarking on a whirlwind of exciting new projects, spurred by a surge of grants and sponsorships totaling around \$200,000. With these initiatives, the heart of Biloxi is set to become an even more dynamic and welcoming destination for both locals and visitors.

One of the most transformative projects is the improvement of HowHop, a previously underused area at the intersection of Howard Avenue and Hopkins Boulevard tucked beneath the I-110 overpass. Once hidden in plain sight, this space is rapidly transforming into a vibrant hub of activity. In addition to the existing public art. Biloxi Main Street has added a burst of color by painting the large columns that support the overpass, turning them into striking visual landmarks. More art and column painting will follow, and the real game-changer will be the installation of fabulous lighting. This lighting will make HowHop a desirable spot for events like First Fridays and it will complement the nearby pickleball courts, creating an inviting atmosphere for outdoor gatherings, day or night. The lighting is set to be the pivotal element that brings new energy to the space.

Just a few blocks away, Greenhouse Alley, a previously nealected corridor between buildings on G.E. Ohr Street, is also receiving a much-needed facelift. The alley, which was once a forgotten part of



downtown, is being transformed into an inviting, usable space. New additions, including whimsical murals and brick pavers, are already enhancing the area. Soon, additional transformative lighting will elevate the ambiance, making Greenhouse Alley a delightful space for pedestrians to explore and enjoy.

In addition to these exciting transformations, Biloxi Main Street is rolling out an array of communityfocused updates. After nearly two decades of waiting, wayfinding signage is returning to Downtown Biloxi. These new signs, designed with a historic flair, will help visitors navigate the area and discover hidden gems throughout the district. This much-needed addition will ensure that no one misses out on the unique spots that make Biloxi special.

For those looking to experience the seasonal charm of downtown, new colorful banners are also in the works. These vibrant displays will help welcome guests



during Biloxi's busy event seasons-whether it's the excitement of fall festivals, the patriotism of national holidays, or the warmth of the December-January holiday season.

Biloxi Main Street is also launching a new initiative to keep downtown clean and safe. Trash-bag dispenser stations will be placed in key locations, offering an incentive program to encourage participation. Those who help clean up the area will receive a \$10 gift card redeemable at downtown businesses—a true win-win for both the community and the local economy.









Honored traditions

Looking back to the Mardi Gras' 50th anniversary in 1958, King d'Iberville was Genial Dewey Lawrence, a native Biloxian and President of the Harrison County Board of Supervisors.

Mardi Gras has been celebrated in Biloxi for more than a hundred years with the first celebration taking place on March 3, 1908. The annual tradition has continued year after year bringing families and friends together to celebrate as a community with festive parties and parades winding through downtown Biloxi.

Over time, the parades grew larger and larger with the addition of more floats that also became more and more elaborate. And to this day, Biloxi Mardi Gras celebrations attract locals and visitors to line the streets for Carnival.

Members of the Mardi Gras court are draped in amazing costumes fit for royalty and are worn during the entire carnival celebration. Many of these costumes worn by past kings and queens of Mardi Gras can be seen at the Coastal Mississippi Mardi Gras Museum located at 792A Howard Ave. in Downtown Biloxi.

New firefighter recruits must be certified as Firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians within their first year, which consists of over 530 training hours. Staying prepared requires ongoing exercises while still responding to hundreds of calls per year. Every year firefighters complete over 250 hours of training through several different avenues, such as classroom, online, hands-on, and multi-company drills.

Congratulations to the latest Biloxi Police Department graduates of Citizen's Police Academy 2024-25. These citizens chose to volunteer their time to become active members of the community by completing this academy.

The Biloxi Police Department Citizen's Police Academy is designed to give citizens insight into the different divisions of the Biloxi Police Department and how the department serves the community. The program is limited to twenty-five participants and includes classroom-based teaching, a patrol ride-along, a department tour, canine demonstrations, and hands-on investigation demonstrations.

Who was the Mayor of Biloxi 100 years ago? John Joseph Kennedy (1875-1949) was the Mayor of Biloxi in February 1925. He presided as Mayor from 1919-1933 and was the first full-time mayor of Biloxi. He was also the proprietor of the Kennedy Hotel on Reynoir Street opposite the L & N Train depot. Ads for his establishment included that the Kennedy Hotel provided hot and cold running water in every room!

Which month of the calendar year always has the least number of days? February with 28 days in a common year and 29 days in a leap year.

Is February named after a famous Roman god of ancient times like most months? No. February was named after the ancient Roman Februalia of Atonement and Purification Festival.

What is a leap year and a leap day? A leap day is added to February every four years to keep calendars and seasons in sync. Without leap days, calendars would fall out of sync by 24 days in 100 years. The odds of being born on February 29 are about 1 in 1,461. Our next leap year will be 2028.

What is the birthstone for February? February's birthstone is amethyst, which is said to symbolize love.

Has Mardi Gras ever landed on Valentine's Day? Yes. Mardi Gras Day occurred on Valentine's Day in 1956 and 1961. Our next Mardi Gras occurring on Valentine's Day will be in 2040.

When is Groundhog Day and what is the legend of the Groundhog? According to this old 1887 Pennsylvania Dutch folklore, if Mr. Groundhog comes out of hibernation at dawn on February 2 and sees his shadow, there will be six more weeks of winter weather. If he doesn't see his shadow, spring will come early. Records indicate that he has been a reliable weather forecaster more than 100 times through the years.

What type of animal is a groundhog? A groundhog is a woodchuck and related to the squirrel family. This stout little mammal grows to about 13 pounds and has the nickname "whistle pig" because when alarmed, they use a high-pitched whistle to warn the rest of the groundhog colony.

What was the coldest day recorded in Biloxi? Biloxi's coldest recorded temperature is listed as 1 degree on Sunday, February 12, 1899. Newspapers reported that this winter blizzard caused orange crops to freeze, birds' feet to freeze to tree limbs, and canned jars of food to burst. The nearby fish population suffered a tragic loss, as well, with mini-icebergs reported floating along rivers. Biloxi's next coldest temperature was 9 degrees reported on December 13, 1962.



Birria Tacos

The Daiguiri Shop, Beau Rivage (Serves 6)

Birria Ingredients:

- 4# Boneless Chuck Roast
- 1/2 Tbsp Kosher Salt
- 1/2 Tbsp Black pepper
- 2 Tbsp Olive Oil
- 12 Guajillo Chiles rinsed, steamed and seeded 5 Ancho Chiles rinsed, steamed • 1 tsp ground Cumin and seeded
- 5 Arbol Chiles rinsed, steamed
- 2 Large Roma Tomatoes
- 1/2 Medium Yellow Onion

- 1 Mexican Cinnamon Stick
- 3 Bay Leaves
- 1/2 tsp whole Black Peppercorn
- 2 cups of Beef Broth 5 Cloves Garlic

Biloxi

- 1/4 cup Distilled White Vinegar
- 1 tsp Dried Mexican Oregano
- 1/2 tsp Ground Cloves
- Water as needed

Taco Ingredients:

- · Corn Tortillas
- 2 cups of Oaxacan Cheese shredded
- 1/2 cup white onion, diced
- 1/2 cup chopped cilantro
- · Lime wedges

Instructions:

- 1. Season meat with salt and pepper on all sides and heat olive oil in large pot over medium-high heat.
- 2. Sear meat on all sides until browned. Remove pot from heat.
- 3. Add guajillo chiles ancho chiles, arbol chiles, tomatoes, onion, cinnamon stick, bay leaves, beef broth, white vinegar, garlic, cumin, oregano, and cloves to meat. Cover with water.
- 4. Bring to boil over high heat. Reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer for 3 to 3 ½ hours until meat falls apart.
- 5. Transfer meat to large bowl and shred with 2 forks. Strain the leftover juice (Consomme) and separate the fat from the juice.
- 6. Lightly dip both sides of corn tortilla in layer of fat that you have separated, then place it in hot skillet to begin the taco.
- 7. Fill top half of tortilla with a generous amount of shredded cheese and shredded meat.
- 8. Fold tortilla in half and cook for about a minute on each side until cheese has melted. You want sides crispy and browned.
- 9. Pour the leftover Consomme in a bowl for dipping
- 10. Finish off taco with diced onion and cilantro

Biloxi's Connection with Valentine's Day

Biloxians of all ages and throughout the decades have enjoyed the celebration of Valentine's Day which is officially recognized each year as February 14. Even though February is the shortest month of the year, Biloxi's history is jam-packed with celebrations and remembrances.





Monsieur D'Iberville

The most outstanding historical event of Biloxi's February history begins with the landing of Canadian-born Monsieur Pierre Lemoyne d'Iberville and 14 of his men on our shoreline. Historical references relate that on Friday, February 13, 1699, Monsieur and his men debarked from their seaworthy, wooden sailing ship Le Marin on Ship Island and rowed northward in two smaller boats eventually arriving on our Biloxi peninsula. Where exactly might he have landed, we wonder. Through his French journals and other related documentation, many historians agree that it is likely that his first Biloxi mainland encounter was around the area of Edgewater Mall or Beauvoir. Since Monsieur writes about "some rather good oysters" at his Biloxi landing, we might assume that he and his sailing crew might have placed their first "bootprints" around Oyster Bayou which runs through the Beauvoir property.

Valentines

Valentine's Day has definitely become a celebratory tradition in Biloxi. The legend of St. Valentine became famous around the year 270 A.D. in ancient Rome in an area called Porta Valentini. There, Valentinus and Julia became close friends. His last note to Julia was signed "from your valentine." Since that time, messages of affection, love, and devotion have been exchanged around the world.

Mail delivery

Mail delivery of paper valentines throughout Biloxi has changed drastically through the years. In the early 1900s, Biloxi's streets were coated with mud, sand, and oyster shells causing quite a challenge for love notes to be delivered. Both Pass Christian Road (now Pass Road) and Beach Road (now Hwy. 90 or Beach Boulevard) were the main east-west thoroughfares for mail

carriers to voyage via horse and buggies to deliver mail.

During that time Mr. John Popp offered the services of his little ferry boat to aid in mail delivery of north-south mail transportation, in what is now considered West Biloxi and Sunkist. This route was very near the current Popp's Ferry Bridge. By that time, the mighty locomotive could also transport passengers, cargo, and mail along rail lines providing an even faster delivery service.

Post Office long ago and today

Years ago, our City Hall was once the place to go to connect with the community and to send correspondence to far-away places. Built in the early 1900s, Biloxians first mailed valentines at the building that we know today as the Biloxi City Hall. This sturdy structure located on Lameuse Street, was originally constructed as a U.S. Post Office, a federal building, and a customs house. It also accommodated a

In 1959, the post office moved to the present Main Street location. There, about 700 post office box users were introduced to new combination locks as a secure mail-receiving feature. In 2023, this post office/federal building was dedicated to Biloxi fallen Police Officer Robert McKeithen.

Frederick W. Elmer (1847-1926) was elected mayor of Biloxi in 1891. His father Jacob Elmer was born in Switzerland and was a merchant. Their family home was located on Hwy. 90 and Magnolia Street, back in the day. Frederick grew up in Biloxi in a large family. Mayor Elmer lived in Biloxi until his death in 1926.

His younger brother Augustus (1849-1906), however, ventured off and became the cofounder of Elmer's Candy Company. Today Elmer's is still a primary go-to for Valentine treats as well as Easter chocolates. This thriving chocolate company, inspired by a Biloxi native, is now located in Ponchatoula. Louisiana.

Keesler Field Telegrams

In the 1940s, before the era of cell phones and the internet, Keesler Field (Keesler Air Force Base) utilized telegrams as a popular and quick messaging system for the option of conveying love notes. Telegrams were transmitted through wires utilizing the Morse Code method of dots and dashes. This communication mode was invented in the 1830s by Samuel Morse and became a significant means of messaging for both civilian as well as in wartime efforts. In 2006, Western Union officially ended its telegram service after 150 years.

Biloxi's Romantic Interludes

Biloxi's shoreline has always provided the optimal
