CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

During Program Year (PY) 2023, the City completed Phase II of the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road and initiated start-up activities for Phase III of this major, multi-year infrastructure project that improves transportation connectivity in historic neighborhoods and enhances public health and safety by improving emergency response times. Funded as the City's primary Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Entitlement Program project for the last several years, Phase I construction of a two-lane vehicular access road from Dorries to Crawford Streets north of the CSX Railroad tracks directly serves 4,285 residents of the project area, of which 2,685 or 62.66% qualify as low- to moderate-income.

Phase II roadway construction directly serves 2,450 residents of the Hopkins Boulevard to Porter Avenue project area, of which 1,325 or 54.08% qualify as low- to moderate-income. The combined total of 4,010 low- to moderate income residents are served by Phase I and II activities, which is 59.5% of the 6,735 combined total number of residents served.

Phase II activities included conducting project surveys, completing preliminary design work, environmental review and construction of a section of the 24' wide roadway. The pre-bid conference was held in October 2023, the construction contract was awarded in January 2024 and Phase II activities were completed in May 2024.

During PY2023, the City substantially amended its 2023 CDBG Action Plan to add a new project, "Public Safety Improvements - Fire Truck Acquisition," and budgeted available PY2023 CDBG resources of \$959,995 for the first of three payments for acquisition. This ladder truck serves a large East Biloxi project service area in which 7,315 people live, 4,190 or 51.49% of whom qualify as low- to moderate-income.

The City awarded CDBG public service subgrants to three qualified nonprofit agencies in PY2023, which supported delivery of public services to help address high priority community needs identified in the City of Biloxi's 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan. Operating under subrecipient agreements with the City, the following activities were supported:

- 1) Expanding access to an affordable, education-oriented early childhood program;
- 2) Continuing a therapeutic program for children impacted by domestic violence; and
- 3) Providing no-cost mental health assessment and treatment services for homeless residents.

A combined total of 212 residents, 100% of whom are low- to moderate-income, benefitted from PY2023 public service activities.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the

plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

The City of Biloxi's Program Year 2023 CDBG resources were budgeted to address high priority activities and achieve specific objectives to enhance public safety and transportation, especially in low- to moderate-income neighborhoods. By funding public safety and transportation improvements projects, the City accomplished its program year goals.

The City invested CDBG resources in PY2023 to continue implementing its multi-year transportation improvements project, completing Phase I activities and implementing Phase II activities of the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project. A combined total of 6,735 residents, 4,010 of whom qualify as low- to moderate-income, benefit from construction of the two-lane access roads that provide vehicular access through their neighborhoods to improve emergency vehicle response times.

With a +20 year old ladder truck being retired from service, the City substantially amended its 2023 CDBG Action Plan to budget available CDBG funds to acquire a new ladder truck, which is stationed at the same East Biloxi fire station as the one that was retired. The new ladder truck helps protect the same large project service area as the old ladder track, occupied by 7,315 residents, of which 4,190 or 51.49% are low- to moderate-income.

Three high priority public service activities were supported by non-profit agencies that received CDBG subgrant awards from the City in PY2023. Funded activities focused on: expanding access to affordable, education-oriented early childcare services; continuing a therapeutic education program for children who experienced domestic violence; and mental healthcare assessments and treatment services primarily for homeless residents of Biloxi. In response to the CDBG investment of funds, 212 low- to moderate-income residents were assisted.

No CDBG-CV funds were budgeted or expended by the City in PY2023 for "Public Services-Natural Disasters & Emergencies" or a "Nonprofit Agency Facility Improvements" Project, as identified in the accomplishments table, above. Since PY2021, the local rate of COVID has not justified the City's use of CDBG-CV funds for these activities or projects. The HUD Field Office advised it was unlikely the City would be able to meet the CDBG-CV expenditure deadline to complete its proposed project to redevelop an existing facility into a non-congregate homeless shelter to be administered by the Open Doors Homeless Coalition.

However, in response to encouragement from the HUD Field Office in late PY2023, the City initiated the process of substantially amending its 2019 Annual Plan and 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan to budget \$939,808.99 in unexpended CDBG-CV funds for a new

project to prepare for future disasters of all types. The proposed project will enhance the Gruich Community Center's ability to serve a dual role as a public community center and a local disaster response facility. Improvements include replacing existing heat pumps with new units and replacing the ductwork system with a new system that will reduce air borne contaminants to improve air quality, circulation and ventilation. Subject to timely approval of the substantial amendments, the City anticipates the project will be complete before the CDBG-CV expenditure deadline of June 16, 2026 and will benefit 7,314 residents in the East Biloxi project service area, of whom 4,190 or 51.49% qualify as low- to moderate-income, in addition to Biloxi homeless and at-risk of homelessness populations.

Narrative

In PY2023, the City invested 7.72% of the 15% allowed by HUD regulations for public service activities that supported nonprofit agencies' programs to: expand access to an affordable, education-oriented early childhood program for children six weeks to three years old; a therapeutic educational program for children under the age of eight who experienced domestic violence; and mental health assessment and treatment services primarily for homeless people in Biloxi.

While the three public service activities were anticipated to benefit a combined total of 241 people, actual beneficiaries totaled 212 residents as fewer homeless people participated in the no-cost mental health assessments and treatment services program than were projected. The racial and ethnic status of those assisted is identified in the above Table 2. Of the 212 total beneficiaries, 189 qualified as very low-income and 23 qualified as low-income; 151 beneficiaries resided in female-headed households.

The City did not continue its CDBG-CV funded rental assistance public service activity during PY2023 as COVID-19 rates remained low in both the City of Biloxi and Harrison County and no CDBG-CV funds were expended for other projects or activities. In PY2023, no public service applications were received by the City from area nonprofit agencies to support any type of housing assistance program.

Narrative

In Program Year 2023, the City of Biloxi had a total of \$1,632,381.74 available in CDBG resources from the following sources: unexpended funds at end of previous program year \$1,036,660.39; PY2023 CDBG allocation \$404,451.00; current year program income \$191,270.35.

The majority of PY2023 CDBG funds was budgeted to two projects: acquisition of a ladder fire truck to serve a primarily low- to moderate-income area in East Biloxi and Phase II of the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project. The transportation project will maintain and improve connectivity in several low- to moderate-income neighborhoods located north of the CSX Railroad tracks, to improve public health and safety through improved emergency response times.

Narrative

The City of Biloxi does not geographically distribute or assign use of its limited CDBG funds to targeted areas to meet high priority needs of its CDBG-eligible residents. Instead, it funds CDBG-eligible projects to help address high priority community needs identified in its Consolidated Plan. The City also considers the number of eligible residents who will benefit from implementation of each project, with the intent of providing suitable living environments for the highest number of low- to moderate-income households possible.

The CDBG Entitlement Program does not require matching funds, but City-owned rights-of-way were incorporated into the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project as needed.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City does not anticipate adding housing construction, rehabilitation or acquisition to its CDBG program goals. Typically, the City does not invest its limited CDBG resources to build, rehabilitate or acquire housing due to the high cost of housing construction and increasing costs for property insurance south of Interstate 10 (in PY2023, no census blocks north of Biloxi Back Bay qualified as low-to moderate-income). On-going changes to the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) have resulted in annual premium increases for residential property insurance, which most house owners with mortgages are required to carry. According to NFIP, residential

insurance premiums for housing units located south of Interstate-10 are anticipated to increase annually for the next several years, making many reconsider homeownership in Biloxi.

The City budgeted 100% of its first allocation of CDBG-CV funds to provide rental assistance on behalf of residents negatively impacted by the pandemic but it was limited in its ability to achieve the goal of expending 100% of those funds as detailed in CR-05.

Unless the costs of housing construction and rehabilitation, construction material, and federal flood insurance premiums decrease significantly, the City does not anticipate funding housing activities with its limited CDBG resources during the remainder of the period covered by its current ConPlan.

Narrative

Without a substantial increase in its annual allocation from HUD, the City of Biloxi has determined the most effective use of its limited CDBG resources is to benefit the highest number of eligible residents possible rather than providing housing assistance to benefit a few households. Accordingly, the City of Biloxi likely will continue designating CDBG funds for one or two high priority community projects and supporting public services provided by experienced nonprofit agencies to meet high priority needs.

Because of the aforementioned increasing costs of living, homeownership in Biloxi is no longer considered affordable for many, if not most, low- to moderate-income households. While individual household needs and community-wide needs have substantially increased since the COVID pandemic, CDBG allocation amounts awarded to the City have decreased. Recent CDBG allocations received by the City of Biloxi are as follows: PY2020 \$462,382; PY2021 \$452,491; PY2022 \$415,164; PY2023 \$404,451 and PY2024 \$403,868.

During PY2023, the City of Biloxi continued to work with the MS-503 Continuum of Care, with Open Doors Homeless Coalition as Lead, and the CoC's member agencies to reduce and end homelessness in all categories within the City. Open Doors shared information with the City from its homeless population assessments to maintain awareness of the lack of available affordable housing and related needs of homeless individuals and families in Biloxi.

In collaboration with the CoC and Open Doors, the City of Biloxi continued working with the Biloxi Housing Authority, Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence, Coastal Family Health Center, Back Bay Mission, the Biloxi Catholic Diocese and other agencies and stakeholders during PY2023 to share information about Biloxi's homeless and at-risk of homelessness populations and continued working with these partners to generate private donations to meet incidental needs of homeless populations.

The City is supporting efforts of the Biloxi Diocese to operate a camp for homeless populations on the former site of Mercy Cross Parochial School. Back Bay Mission, The Salvation Army-Biloxi, Gulf Coast Rescue Mission, Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence and Community Care Network offer limited emergency shelter and/or transitional housing and a range of supportive services to assist those experiencing homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Ongoing community effort to provide emergency shelter and transitional housing for the unsheltered in Biloxi continued during PY2023 on a case-by-case basis, led by the MS-503 CoC and its Lead agency, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition. Non-housing supportive service needs of homeless populations were met as funding and other resources allowed. Community efforts to educate the public about unmet needs of local homeless populations and to identify and secure resources for development of a homeless shelter and additional transitional housing units in Biloxi continued.

The City also continued to support efforts of the Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence (GCCFN), Back Bay Mission, The Salvation Army and the other organizations that provided housing and supportive services during PY2023.

GCCFN reported that its Biloxi emergency shelter served 166 adults and 106 children in 2023, fewer than the 261 adults and 175 children served during 2022. In terms of Nights of Service, 8,623 people were served in 2023, substantially fewer than the 14,410 served in 2022. However, the number of nonresidential clients served in Biloxi during 2023 increased to 476 for counseling and 111 for financial assistance compared to 342 for counseling and 100 for financial assistance in 2022.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

In PY2023, the City continued efforts to encourage local housing services agencies and religious institutions to expand services to provide assistance to help low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who were being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions.

During PY2023, the City of Biloxi continued to support public and private agencies that address housing, health, public services, employment, education and youth needs by endorsing their applications for funding assistance and providing technical assistance, as feasible, with the City's limited staff and resources. The City also continued to support Biloxi Housing Authority's ongoing Community and Supportive Services activities and programs.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

During PY2023, the City continued to encourage local religious organizations and MS-503 CoC member agencies to provide services to expand access of homeless persons, especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth, to existing affordable housing through rent, utility and security deposit assistance.

During the COVID pandemic, the City budgeted 100% of its first allocation of CDBG-CV funds for a rent assistance program administered by its subrecipient, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition, with the goal of addressing existing homelessness and preventing increased homelessness as a result of COVID-19. The program offered up to six consecutive months of rent assistance on behalf of qualified Biloxi residents. In PY2023, the City also supported efforts of MS-503 CoC and its member agencies to prevent repeat homelessness through ongoing case management assessments and services that included providing access to workforce training, educational advancement and life skills development.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City of Biloxi continued working with the Biloxi Housing Authority during PY2023 to maintain on-going communication regarding local efforts to meet residents' affordable housing needs, based on available resources. Examples of collaborative actions include development of the City of Biloxi-Biloxi Housing Authority 2019 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice and conducting the annual fair housing education workshop hosted by the City, BHA and the Mississippi Center for Justice.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Biloxi Housing Authority continued to support its Resident Councils and the FSS Program to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in home ownership. During PY2023, the City and BHA worked collaboratively to encourage public housing residents to attend CDBG-related public hearings as well as the annual fair housing education workshop.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

Biloxi's official zoning district map allows for a mixture of single- and multi-family residential units on varying lot sizes throughout the City as well as group homes in a variety of areas. Land use regulations support sustainability measures and provide for density bonuses when combined with natural resource preservation and/or other public benefits. Mixed use zoning is permitted in the central business area.

The City has adopted the latest version of the International Building Code, which requires compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act and Fair Housing Act provisions. There are no specific growth limitations or other public policies in place that would affect return on residential investment. Unlike construction costs and insurance premiums, property taxes in Biloxi have not increased during the last 25 years.

The City was successful in its effort to have three areas in East Biloxi federally-designated as opportunity zones, providing the private sector with financial incentives to invest in these primarily low- to moderate-income areas.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continued working with other local units of government, religious institutions and area nonprofits during PY2023 to share information regarding the needs of underserved populations as part of its overall effort to encourage increased private support to address those needs. The City continued to work with local nonprofit agencies to meet high priority needs, such as assisting Moore Community House identify and secure suitable facilities to support expansion of affordable daycare services. The City also continued to work with the Catholic Diocese of Biloxi, Back Bay Mission, the Salvation Army and other nonprofit agencies to identify a site or sites for development or redevelopment to support an emergency homeless shelter and homeless assessment center facility.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

In PY2023, the City of Biloxi shared information with residents, developers and others about lead-based paint (LBP) hazards through free information brochures available at City Hall and in the Building Division of the Community Development Department. The City

continued to support the educational outreach efforts of the Mississippi State Department of Health, which administers the Healthy Homes Program and re-enforces awareness of the serious health hazard LBP poses, particularly to children under the age of six and pregnant women. All of the Biloxi Housing Authority's housing units have been assessed and, where required, LBP hazards have been abated.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Biloxi continued on-going efforts to recruit new and expanding businesses to help it achieve the community goal identified in its 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan to expand employment opportunities and reduce the number of poverty-level families.

While no official programs or policies have been adopted, the current administration has an informal "open door" type policy that encourages potential developers and existing business and industry leaders to meet individually and as groups with the Mayor, CAO and employees responsible for various steps of the local development process. The City also enlists the assistance of the two Chambers of Commerce and the Gulf Coast Business Council to identify growth opportunities to improve residents' quality of life by enhancing their living environments and expanding the tax base rather than raising taxes.

During PY2023, the City continued to encourage residents, especially poverty-level families, to explore resources and services available through many local organizations, including The Salvation Army-Biloxi, Back Bay Mission, Loaves and Fishes, programs funded by the United Way of South Mississippi, and the Gulf Coast Community Action Agency (GCCAA). The GCCAA offers income-eligible residents assistance paying rent, utility and deposit fees and provides opportunities for improving workforce skills and finding employment. The GCCAA also helps low-income residents, including senior citizens and those with disabilities, apply for other non-profit resources and assistance programs to address specific needs.

As in previous years, the City continued in PY2023 to support participation of the Biloxi Housing Authority in the HUD/HCV/Family Self Sufficiency Program to help reduce the number of poverty-level families in Biloxi.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Through its participation as an active member of the MS-503 Continuum of Care, the City was informed about programs and services provided by area nonprofit agencies and organizations in PY2023. The City maintained ongoing communication with the Biloxi Housing Authority, public housing residents, the Biloxi Catholic Diocese, local nonprofit agencies and other local units of government

as part of the City's ongoing effort to encourage development and implementation of rental housing assistance programs to improve access of low- to moderate-income households to Biloxi's existing housing stock and to address homelessness.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

In PY2023, the City continued to lead by example to enhance coordination between local and regional public and private housing and social service agencies. As an active supporter of the Open Doors Homeless Coalition, Lead for the MS-503 CoC, the City of Biloxi participated in the annual January PIT Count. It also continued working with the Biloxi Catholic Diocese to operate its property at the former Mercy Cross School site as a homeless shelter for the unsheltered in Biloxi.

Staff also maintains ongoing communications with the Biloxi Housing Authority, Habitat for Humanity of the Gulf Coast and other public and private housing agencies to support development and redevelopment of affordable housing, for purchase and/or rent that is not located in floodprone areas and is adapted to support special needs populations. In addition to using General Funds for a Downtown Redevelopment Incentive Program that provides one-time direct grants of \$25,000 per housing unit to reuse/redevelop commercial properties or vacant lots into additional downtown housing. The City also financially supported Back Bay Mission's housing rehabilitation program for low-income residents and The Salvation Army-Biloxi's emergency and transitional housing services program with General Fund contributions in PY2023.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The City's efforts to address the need for ongoing fair housing education, identified as an impediment its 2019 A.I., includes cosponsoring an annual Fair Housing Workshop with the Mississippi Center for Justice (MCJ) and Biloxi Housing Authority that generally is well attended by residents, realtors and lending institution employees. The July 2023 workshop was marketed through a notice in the City's monthly newsletter, mailed to the approximately 25,000 households and businesses with a City water account and through a flier posted in several public locations throughout the City, and mailed to public and private housing and social services agencies.

In addition to posting Fair Housing Posters available through various federal sources, the City of Biloxi continued to provide no-cost Fair Housing brochures at City Hall, the permit desk in the Building Division and in the Engineering Department as a concise,

affordable tool for improving awareness of the rights of those identified in the Fair Housing Act as "protected classes" and providing information about how to file a fair housing complaint.

CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

Throughout PY2023, the City complied with existing policies and procedures that support self-monitoring of CDBG program administration and regulatory compliance. The City maintained on-going communication with the HUD Field Office and its CPD representative. To ensure comprehensive CDBG Entitlement Program compliance, the staff monitored specific areas as follows: program performance review; financial management practices; record keeping and reporting practices; general management practices; compliance with EEO, Fair Housing, ADA, anti-discrimination and others. Expenditures were monitored throughout implementation of each project/activity on an on-going effort to comply with HUD's timeliness of expenditures requirements and with project budgets, as well as to eliminate opportunity for mismanagement, fraud and waste.

Staff performed ongoing desk reviews supported by monthly reports, emails and telephone conversations, in compliance with Biloxi's SOPs for CDBG subrecipients. While no corrective actions were required in PY2023, the City complies on an on-going basis with its SOP to take corrective action as soon as an issue becomes apparent to minimize compliance issues and opportunities for misuse of funds.

Throughout PY2023, City staff participated in HUD-sponsored webinars and incorporated HUD guidance into its programs and operating procedures. The staff also regularly communicated with the HUD Field Office and reviewed the HUD Exchange website for new resources, guidance and program compliance updates.

As part of its formal annual performance assessment, the City conducted a public hearing to inform the public of progress made toward implementing and completing CDBG-funded projects and activities in Program Year 2023. City compliance with applicable federal regulations and policies also was discussed at each CDBG public hearing, including comprehensive planning and timeliness of

expenditures. Through implementation of the City's procedure requiring all HUD-funded Requests for Proposals and Requests for Qualifications be provided in a timely manner to the Mississippi Contract Procurement Center and mailed, return receipt requested, to known minority and female-owned firms, the City worked to comply with minority business outreach requirements.

The City's outreach to minorities and women also continued to include posting information in English, Spanish and Vietnamese on the City's website and in public buildings located throughout the City and also at Biloxi Housing Authority housing sites.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City complied with its Citizen Participation Plan requirements by making every effort to encourage broad public input into development of activities and programs assisted with CDBG Entitlement Program resources. The City of Biloxi published, posted and delivered notices in English, Spanish and Vietnamese to the Biloxi Housing Authority and all four branches of the Harrison County Library System located in Biloxi. All CDBG-related flyers and notices invited and encouraged the participation of all residents into the CDBG process through submission of oral and written comments.

The City of Biloxi also made its Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) draft available to the public for review and comment for a 15-day period and notified the public about the report's availability for review on its website, in a notice published both in the local newspaper and in the monthly B-mail newsletter, which is mailed by the first of each month to an estimated 25,000 households and businesses in Biloxi, in addition to posting notices in public buildings. Hard copies of the CAPER were distributed to the four branches of the Public Library, the Biloxi Housing Authority, the Mayor's Office, City Hall, the Community Development Department and the Public Works/Engineering Building. The CAPER notices identified where the public review copies were located.

On November 18, 2024, the City of Biloxi conducted its PY2023 CAPER public hearing, after having advertised it in the local newspaper and the City's monthly B-mail publication, and posted notices as described above. All notices included information about the availability of the Public Review Draft of the 2023 CAPER, identified the dates of the 15-day comment period and encouraged attendance at the public hearing. Published and posted notices also identified specific information about how to submit written comments by delivering, emailing or mailing them to the Biloxi Federal Programs Office.

No residents or other interested parties attended the November 18, 2024 hearing and no written comments were submitted to the City for consideration during the 15-day comment period. Compliance with the Biloxi Citizen Participation Plan is documented in the attachment at screen CR-00 Administration (in IDIS).

Specify the nature of, and reasons for, any changes in the jurisdiction's program objectives and indications of how the jurisdiction would change its programs as a result of its experiences.

The City has not identified any CDBG program changes as a result of its experiences during PY2023. As a result of successful implementation of past activities and projects, the City plans to continue developing its Annual Action Plan with considerable input from residents and funding projects and activities that address high-priority, unmet needs identified in its Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

Narrative

During PY2023, the City of Biloxi funded one CDBG project that was subject to Section 3 requirements, Phase II of the East Biloxi East-West Neighborhood Access Road Project. Section 3 compliance information was provided to and discussed with prospective contractors during the pre-bid conference. The same information was discussed during the pre-construction conference. The construction contract for this project was awarded to a local contracting company that indicated it had a sufficient number of trained employees to implement the project and had no need to hire additional workers. Regardless of the expectation of no new hires, the authorized company representatives submitted signed Section 3 forms to the City, verifying commitment to complying with Section 3 requirements should any positions become available or be created during the term of the contract.

As identified above, of the combined 1,436 labor hours worked by employees of the general contractor and his subcontractors on this project, 778 or 54% of the hours were worked by certified Section 3 workers. No new job positions were created or needed to be filled during project implementation.

In addition to HUD-required reports, documentation of public outreach efforts and citizen participation will be attached to the final version of the City of Biloxi's PY2023 CAPER submitted to HUD.

In spite of considerable effort working with HUD, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition and other local nonprofit organizations, the City was not successful in developing a Nonprofit Agency Facility Improvement Project, as identified as a Consolidated Plan goal, that involved acquiring and reconfiguring an existing building into a homeless shelter and assessment center to be supported with all or a portion of its unexpended CDBG-CV fund balance of \$939,808.99. No CDBG-CV funds were expended for the Nonprofit Agency Facility Improvements Goal identified in the CR-05 table, and the five residents expected to be assisted were not.

Social Services:

CDBG funds were invested to support activities provided by local nonprofit agencies to address high priority, unmet community needs identified during development of the 5-Year Consolidated Plan and PY2023 Action Plan. Funds were budgeted to support three public service agencies to: expand access to affordable, quality childcare and/or youth education services (Moore Community House, Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence children's education program); and Coastal Familly Health Center, Inc to provide mental health assessments and treatment services primarily to homeless residents. Program Believe indicated that beacause they were transitioning, that they declined their PY2023 funding. Therefore these funds will be reallocated in the PY2024 budget process.

Federal Capital Projects:

East BX E/W Neighborhood Access Road Project PH II - This Phase constructed a continuous roadway, approximately 24 feet wide, on the north side of CSX Railroad from Querens Avenue to Porter Avenue. It will provide a transportation connection between neighborhoods to improve emergency response times in a low/mod area. This is a multi-year project that includes an environmental assessment, engineering design, rights-of-way, acquisition/relocation, and construction. The construction of this Phase was completed in PY2023 and the next Phase will begin in PY2024. The engineering design services are under contract and the design phase was completed in this year along with the environmental assessment is complete. and acquisition and relocation and construction for this Phase was completed in PY2023.

Fire Truck - Substantial Amendment #1: This project improved public safety for residents in a primarily low- to moderate-income area of East Biloxi by replacing a +20 year old fire truck that has served its useful life with a new one, which will be assigned to the same station and serve the same project area. The city was able to purchased a 2023 Rosenbauer Viper Quint 109 foot ladder truck, with a 500 gallon water tank, and 1500 GPM pump.

Homeowner's Rehabilitation Program:

The City donated \$25,000.00 in **General Funds** to Back Bay Mission to support renovation of homes to primary senior citizens in Biloxi. The funds were used to purchase materials to bring homes into compliance with electrical and plumbing codes; labor was provided by volunteers.



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
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
