Progressing on city projects

Recently, Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich gave a Biloxi Chamber audience a brief overview of city projects during a Breakfast with the Mayor event. Here are the details about the various projects mentioned, as well as an update on the A.J. Holloway Sports Complex.

Popp's Ferry Extension

- · Contractors are currently working on cutting the roadbed down to grade.
- The underpass on the south side of the railroad is complete.
- Utility work is taking place along the area.
- As of mid-July, the work is about 17 percent complete.

Saenger Theatre

- Stage surround work has been completed.
- Wood flooring has been repaired and replaced where needed.
- The City of Biloxi has gone out to bid on new carpet. Those bids closed July 23.

Miramar Park

- The old playground, which was installed after Hurricane Katrina, was removed
- As of mid-July, Biloxi Parks & Recreation is waiting on the new, colorful play structure to be delivered. The installation will follow.
- The \$45,000 project was funded by the city and installed by Magnolia Recreation.

Popp's Ferry Dog Park

- Hoops, steppers, a dog walk ramp, two dog fire hydrants, two dog resting tables, a jump over, a water fountain, and waste stations were installed in mid-July at the park.
- The \$22,257 project funded by the city and installed by Magnolia Recreation.

Pennzoil McManus Park

- Five pieces of new workout equipment: vertical press, chest press, back extension, sit-up bench, and lat pull-down, were installed in mid-July.
- The \$29,000 project was funded by the city and installed by Magnolia Recreation.

Woolmarket Sidewalks

- Contractors with Landmark Contracting, Inc. are installing just under two miles of sidewalks on Woolmarket Road from Lorraine Road to Jim Byrd Road, and Lorraine Road from Woolmarket Road to Nature's Trail.
- · Less than 500 feet left to be completed on Lorriane Road from north to Woolmarket Road, as of mid-July.
- The nearly \$1 million MDOT-funded project began in late October.

Old Brick House

- The house, used as a rental facility by the City of Biloxi, closed in October for renovations.
- The city is currently working with the National Archives and History on renovations.
- · As of mid-July, the city was obtaining two quotes to replace the roof, gutter, and downspouts. At the time of this writing, no date has been set for repairs to
- The project is funded by the Department of Marine Resources Mississippi Gulf Coast National Heritage Area's Community Heritage Grant with matching funds.
- Once complete, the city will begin addressing the moisture issue on the building.

A.J. Holloway Sports Complex

- The \$5.167 million project was completed in March. The facility reopened on
- The synthetic turf and sod create better-maintained and more appealing fields.
- The fields have been booked every weekend during spring and early summer.

- · City leagues will continue to use the complex with football to begin late August, early September.

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Pick up Biloxi together

Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich, Biloxi City Council, and Biloxi Police are asking residents and visitors to keep Biloxi beautiful with litter prevention.

Litter along the roadways and throughout the

city impacts the environment and the well-being of our community. It is also against the law.

According to the City of Biloxi Code of Ordinance, it is "unlawful for any person to throw, discard, place, or deposit any garbage or litter in any manner or amount on any public or private property within the corporate limits of the city, except in containers or areas lawfully provided."

Working together to stop littering, pick up litter, and report it allows the community to continue to keep Biloxi a clean, safe city.

"Litter prevention is a communitywide responsibility," said Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich. "It takes all of us working together to stop littering."

Last year, Biloxi Public Works conducted more than 2,000 pick-ups, collecting 1,795 tons of waste with 340 trips to the landfill. Crews also collected more than 1,000 bags of litter.

Thousands more bags of litter were collected through community-wide cleanups such as the Biloxi Main Street Earth Day Clean-up, the Mississippi State Star-Spangled Cleanup, Clean Up at the Point, and Resilient East Biloxi Community Cleanup Day.

"By working together to prevent littering, we not only preserve our beautiful city but also create a safer, more welcoming environment for everyone," said Kenny Glavan, Biloxi City Council President. "When we unite in this

effort, Biloxi shines brighter, and residents and visitors alike can enjoy our city with pride and confidence."

Every little bit hurts the community, and as a tourist destination with nearly 50,000 residents

> and thousands of visitors annually, litter can negatively impact the aesthetic appeal and economic health of the city. It can also decrease visitor numbers and the length of time tourists stay. These are even more reasons to keep Biloxi, a destination city, clean and free from cluttered garbage and waste.

> "It is very important to prevent litter throughout our city," said Biloxi Police Chief John Miller. "No one likes to see that, and it gives people a perception that is not accurate of how we take care of our city."

Besides participating in community cleanups, residents can help with litter prevention by doing things such as picking up litter along the streets, in parks, and on their property; ensuring personal trash and yard trimmings are properly disposed of; and reporting any violations. If you see litter, report it.

Call the Biloxi Police Department at 228-392-0641 to report a litter violation in action. If tires are dumped along the roadway, call Biloxi Public Works at 228-435-6271 or email cross@ biloxi.ms.us, and if you see trash collecting on private property, call Biloxi Code Enforcement at 228-435-0841 or email codeenforcement@ biloxi.ms.us.

It is a community effort to prevent littering, and ultimately, it takes everyone to stop it!

The Shuckers will welcome the Columbus Clingstones (Atlanta Braves) and Chattanooga Lookouts (Cincinnati Reds) as part of a two-week, 12-game homestand from August 12-24, including Grateful Dead Night on August 23. After every game, kids can run the bases presented by Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi. The homestand begins on Tuesday, August 12, with a No. 1 Sal Frelick Shuckers nameand-number shirsev in celebration of the Shuckers' 10th anniversary season and a 2024 National League Rawlings Gold Glove Award® winner for the first 250 fans.

The Shuckers will celebrate and honor our first responders with First Responders Night on Thursday, August 14.

On Friday, August 15, the Shuckers will host their annual Fight Like A Shucker Night at the ballpark with specialty jerseys designed by local artist, Julia Reyes. The jerseys will be available for auction after the game.

The Shuckers will transform into the Malmö Oat Milkers for a nutty night of baseball on Saturday, August 16, before Fun Day Sunday and Faint and Family Night rounds out the series on Sunday.

The Shuckers return on Tuesday, August 19, with a No. 11 Jackson Chourio Shuckers name-and-number shirsey presented by Coca-Cola for the first 250 fans. Chourio, who was named a 2023 Southern League All-Star, finished third in the National League Rookie of the Year voting in 2024.

On Wednesday, August 20, it's Bark in the Park! Fans and their four-legged friends can purchase tickets for \$16 in advance and sit in dog-friendly Sections 117 and 119.

Fans can join the Shuckers on Friday, August 22, for Sparklight Night, where prizes

will be awarded to fans throughout the night after every inning, and Hope Night, where the Shuckers will join forces with local organizations.

Wallace "Chip" Barnes

Wallace "Chip" Barnes's passion for football began at a young age. Chip carried his passion to high school, playing with the Biloxi High School Indians from 1961-1963. He quickly became an integral part

of the team. In 1962, Chip played running back and defensive back for the Indians. It was during this time that Chip was awarded the "Best Back" trophy in the Big 8 State Championship game, an honor bestowed by then-Biloxi Mayor Danny Guice.

Chip's love for the game continued into his adulthood years, where he coached Pee Wee Football in Biloxi. As a coach, Chip's team won many championships and led the East Biloxi All-Stars in the Kiwanis Mullet Bowl in 1978 against the West Biloxi All-Stars.

His love for Biloxi has never wavered. Currently, Chip still serves the community as an active member of the Architectural Historical Review Committee.



Stephen Baronich

Stephen Baronich's athletic resume is second to none, especially while at Notre Dame High School in the mid-1970s. Stephen was a four-year letterman in football, a three-year letterman in track and field, and a

two-time letterman in basketball.

After high school, Stephen took his talents to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in Perkinston. While playing for the Bulldogs Football team in 1976, Stephen was named All-State and second-team All-American linebacker by the Los Angeles Times. He also received the Joe Williams "Guts Award."

Following Perk, Stephen enrolled in Delta State University, and in 1979, he was named Defensive Back of the Year.

Stephen's athletic abilities continued with a career as a sports coach for 41 years (1980-2021), coaching football, track and field, and powerlifting. During his coaching career, Stephen compiled more than eight State titles and 10 runner-up titles. He was also instrumental in bringing powerlifting into high school sports.

Stephen is also a member of the Louisiana High School Powerlifting Association Hall of Fame.



John Brauchle Jr.

John Brauchle Jr., a 1975 graduate of Notre Dame High School, acquired an outstanding stat sheet as a football player. During the 1974 season, John rushed for more than 1,500 yards and averaged over eight

yards per carry. He also added 800 yards receiving and return yards, giving him the titles of Prep All-American, Burger King All-Coast team, and MVP of the 1974 Turkey Bowl that was played in Ocean Springs.

John continued in sports while at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Perkinston. He was a two-time letterman for the Bulldogs and in 1977 was awarded the Dr. George M. Guild Scholastic Award for the highest grade point average. John was also a discus player with MGCCC Track and Field.

John's love for sports led him into the coaching world of youth

sports in Biloxi from 1994-1998.

Sun Herald Sports Writer Mike Bialas wrote, "John was one of the most prolific running backs in Notre Dame's history." This adds to the list of mentions regarding "The Freight Train" or "Bone Crusher," better known as John Brauchle Jr.



Cody Charles Brown

While donning the red and white with the Biloxi Indians, Cody Charles Brown was a four-year starter playing outfield and shortstop, a three-time All-District honoree, and during his senior season was elected to

the Clarion Ledger Dandy Dozen, which honors the top 12 players in the state.

Cody has received the ESPN High School All-State Team, two-time Louisville Slugger All-American, two-time MVP, and in 2009, was the only freshman to start and play in all 26 games that the season.

After graduating from Biloxi High School, Cody signed a baseball scholarship for the Mississippi State Bulldogs. There, he was a four-year letterman. In 2013, Cody and the Bulldogs team were runners-up to UCLA at the College World Series in Omaha.

In 2017, at the NCAA Regionals, Cody was named tournament MVP after batting .526 with 7 RBI and two home runs. That same year, he signed as a free agent with the New York Yankees. First at bat as a professional, Cody hit a home run.



Tony Burns

From 1982-1985, Tony Burns was the complete package in Biloxi football and track and field.

Tony began athletic play at Nichols Junior High, where he excelled in football, basketball, and track.

In his three years at Nichols, Tony was named starting quarterback and MVP for football, starting guard and MVP for basketball, and high jump extraordinaire for the track team.

Tony carried his talents to Biloxi High School. There, he added baseball to his resume. Tony became a varsity pitcher in his sophomore season. With BHS, he played football as a starting quarterback for the Indians in 1984. The Indians, with Tony under center, led his team to victory over the #1 ranked Picayune Maroon Tide in the 45th Annual Shrimp Bowl. During this upset, Tony also kicked a 37-yard field goal to put the Indians on top 17-14 and secured the upset.

Tony was offered a number of scholarships before accepting to attend the University of Southern Mississippi.

Tony will be honored posthumously.



Adrian Dodson

Adrian Dodson is known to many as Coach. He began his coaching career in 1979, guiding players in the City of Biloxi basketball league. He then moved to coaching football, something he had a true passion for.

From 1985-1996, Coach Dodson dedicated himself to coaching youth football in Biloxi, earning a reputation as a master motivator, a

strategic mind, and a mentor to countless young men. Throughout his years in football, Coach Dodson guided an outstanding list of players, including Seber Windham, Doug Thompson, and Kevin Felsher, all of whom are Biloxi Hall of Fame members.

Coach Dodson's training and guidance allowed four of his teams to go undefeated for five years. And his 1987 team excelled at defense, not allowing a point to be scored the entire season.

Coach Dodson founded FANS Camp, which provides a summerlong experience for youth, stressing Fitness, Athletics, Nutrition, and Sports, all in one camp. Coach Dodson never sought the spotlight. He just wanted to provide the tools to make good ballplayers and even better young men.



Damion Fletcher

Shortly after signing up to play football at Biloxi High School, Damion Fletcher showed he was something special. Easily defined by two quotes, "You can't catch the Fletch," and "You can't tackle Damion Fletcher in a

phone booth."

Damion compiled more than 2,700 yards and 39 touchdowns in his first two seasons at BHS. He was named MVP during his junior and senior years, received All-District, All-Coast, All-State, and State Champion Triple Jump for 5A.

Damion received a scholarship to the University of Southern Mississippi, where he continued to play football. During his freshman season, Damion was named Freshman All-American. During his sophomore year, he was named MVP of the GMAC Bowl. During his junior season, Damion took home the Conerly Award and was named Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year. And during his senior season, Damion again reached the 1,000-yard season rushing mark, making him only the 9th player in NCAA history to do so all four years.

Damion's 5,301 total yards moved him past Hershel Walker and LaDaimian Tomlinson for 8th on his career NCAA rushing list.



Joseph "Joe" Gazzo II

Joseph "Joe" Gazzo II excelled in the uniform at high school and college football as well as serving the state as a Mississippi Highway Patrol officer.

Joe played football at Biloxi High School from 1963-

1965. As a defensive lineman for the Indians, Joe was awarded Defensive Lineman of the Year during his senior season.

After high school, Joe's toughness and hard-working abilities took him to the University of Southern Mississippi. He then transferred to the Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Perkinston. There, Joe played defensive line for the Bulldogs as well as throwing shot put for the track team, lettering in both sports.

Joe also attended Mississippi College, where he played defensive lineman for the Choctaws football team.

Joe's passion for service to the community was shown through various hours overseeing youth leagues, coaching football and baseball, serving as the president of the Touchdown Club, organizing bus transportation for away games, purchasing letterman jackets for students at BHS, or just mentoring the youth of Biloxi.

Joe's betterment of others earned him the Certificate for Outstanding Contributions to the Quality of Life on Jan. 11, 1994.

Joe will be honored posthumously.



Larry Sablich

The 1972 Mississippi Little League State Championship game vaulted Larry Sablich into Biloxi baseball legendary fame. Larry was the winning pitcher for the Biloxi American All-Star team that claimed the

prestigious title of State Champions.

In 1976, while playing baseball at Biloxi High School, Larry dominated on the mound through 1978. He showcased his talent on the mound as the starter and closer roles throughout his years wearing the red and white.

The three-time letterman then took his talented arm to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Perkinston, where in 1979, Larry was the winning pitcher for the Bulldogs in the 1979 State Championship game. He finished his play at MGCCC-Perk in 1980 after an incredible lifetime on the mound.

Larry's teammates were known to live by the motto, "If Larry is pitching, we're winning."

Larry will be honored posthumously.



Michael Skrmetti

Michael Skrmetti played football and ran track at Notre Dame High in the late 1960s, lettering and receiving the George Sekul Award.

Michael continued his passion for running by participating in numerous 5K runs throughout the city for nearly twenty years. Michael's passion for competition led him to Powerlifting, a sport he excelled at.

Michael is a three-time state champion in Powerlifting as well as a three-time record-setting Powerlifter.

This resume would be good enough for most, but for Michael, his passion pushed him to continue in competing, running, and lifting.

THE BALD GYPRESS AND BILOXI


You might ask why the Bald Cypress is a "protected" tree in the City of Biloxi. Yes, it's plentiful, especially in our low-lying areas and along our brackish and freshwater ways. It is also rot and stain resistant. They are slow-growing and have a very broad root base. You have seen the cypress "knees" spreading out from just about every mature bald cypress you encounter. These attributes make them stormresistant and a valuable resource for local inhabitants.

These are the things that make the bald cypress extremely valuable for building boats - all sorts of boats, from pirogues to skiffs and luggers. Boats built by the craftsmen in the Biloxi boat-building industry created fishing vessels that served for 100 years or longer. Plus, they were beautiful. Their use in boat construction is one reason they are a protected species.

That is not the only reason. You have heard of "blackwater" rivers. We certainly have them here in South Mississippi. Why are they black? They turn brown and milky after a heavy rain. That's from the sediment being washed downstream, but they remain "black" even in the driest of times. The black stain comes from tannin. Tannin is a chemical contained in the bark of cypress and oak trees. We have plenty of both. So, you can thank the bald cypress for our blackwater rivers - a trademark of Biloxi and the Gulf Coast.

Finally, they are plentiful. You don't commonly see them along our main roads, but get out in our wooded wetlands, and they are everywhere. Beautifully green in the summer, and over the winter, their leaves turn a rich rust color before falling off. Late spring, and they are gorgeous again.

So, next time you see a Bald Cypress tree in Biloxi, you will know why it is protected!



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Part Two: The Stories Behind the Downtown Murals

Let's continue our journey into the importance of cultural identity and heritage highlighting the backstories of some of the murals of Biloxi Main Street's Downtown Public Art Project. When the mural project was in the planning stages, Corey Christy, Design Chair for Biloxi Main Street, always envisioned murals that would serve multiple purposes. He also insisted that they must tell the stories that make Biloxi unique, unlike any other place in the world.

Mural Name: The Piano Player

Location: 110 Rue Magnolia, near Grants For Her and Boudreauxs Men's Shop

Mahoney's. The mural is adjacent to Grant's For Her, a women's boutique. Prior to Hurricane Katrina in 2005, many remember this area as Mary Mahoney's Café which served po'boys, beignets, and breakfast 24/7. What's it all about: The mural depicts a piano player from days gone by, seated at an upright. There is a glass of wine on one end of the piano top, and a cup of

café au lait, and a plate of beignets on the other end.

This subject matter was specifically chosen to harken back to the days when the café was THE late-night place to go. Couples ended a date-night there with breakfast or a nightcap or both. During football season, groups would head to the café for beignets and hot chocolate. In the early morning, it was nothing for those seeking an early breakfast to run into those seeking a po'boy before crawling into bed after a long night club-hopping. Yes, there was a piano on the patio for years. And yes, there was live music from time to time, whether it be an impromptu guitarist or the Mississippi Coast Jazz Society. The Café, a victim of the ravages of Katrina, is a beloved part of downtown's past.

Why this may matter to you: Time marches forward, but as such, it permanently changes so many things and places. The Café earned a spot in the memories and hearts of those who spent many late nights or early mornings there. Biloxians still recall with fondness the special occasions and moments framed in this unique setting. The mural preserves that moment in time and for a second, you can smell the beignets. This is the power of art!

Mural Name: The Hermit of Deer Island

Artist: Rick Dobbs What's it all about: Jean Guilhot, aka "The Hermit of Deer

Island" adorns the north-facing wall of Errol Bradley's State Farm Insurance office building. The mural also

features the beautiful, storied Deer Island with its history of natives and pirates. Did you notice the oyster knife when you went by? Keep reading and you find out why its there. Guilhot was dubbed "the Hermit" by Captain Louis Gorenflo in the 1950s primarily because of his grizzled appearance and his isolation. A native of France, "The Hermit" arrived in Biloxi in the 1920s, married a local woman who owned a business on the island and made his home with her. He'd previously worked as a barber (ironic when you consider his shaggy appearance), in factories, and had an oyster business on Deer Island. He lost his wife in 1933 and in 1947, the infamous hurricane took his home and nearly took his life. He built back a simple hut and became a recluse on the island. About the only person who could draw him off the island was the Captain. Captain Gorenflo ran a tourist boat, "The Sailfish" in the 50s. He and the Hermit had a deal, Guilhot would row out to the Sailfish, jump on board and tell stories and sing songs for the visitors; Captain Gorenflo would in turn bring Guilhot his mail, newspapers and groceries. The partnership worked for a long while until Capt. Gorenflo passed away and Guilhot became ill and went to live with relatives on the mainland. The mystique of the hermit and the island was a unique tourism draw for many years.

Why this may matter to you: Deer Island is still a part of most Biloxians' growing up years. Many have spent summers boating with family and exploring the island. With all the pirate stories about buried treasure, it's the stuff of many summer themed movies.






Areawide map of infrastructure work

Living the island life

Many generations of the Baker family made Deer Island their home beginning in the early 1850s. Hurricane Camille ended that trend, but the stories of an island life have been shared by Alvin Baker.

Alvin was born in 1941 on Deer Island and lived there for nearly three decades. Being the son of a third-generation fisherman, Alvin's desire to fish the bountiful Gulf waters came naturally.

Life on Deer Island wasn't much different than living on a rural mainland farm, except for being surrounded by water, which created limitations, but the Baker family managed. They grew vegetables in the rich island soil, raised cattle and hogs, and fished the local waters for fresh seafood. Alvin's parents, Arthur and Eva Walther Baker, maintained their island home that Arthur purchased in New Orleans in 1935. The house was disassembled piece by piece in Louisiana and brought to Deer Island on the family boat, the Doris Mae. There it was reassembled and used as the Baker family home until being destroyed by Hurricane Camille in 1969.

Alvin and his four brothers attended Biloxi Public Schools, which required them to row across the channel to the Biloxi mainland. Only during adverse weather, their father would bring them across the channel in the family fishing boat, so they rarely missed a day.





Remembering Hurricanes Camille and Katrina

August marks the month when two monster storms hit Biloxi: Hurricane Camille on August 17, 1969, and Hurricane Katrina on August 29, 2005. It has been 56 years since Hurricane Camille struck Coastal Mississippi, officially making landfall in Waveland, and 20 years since Hurricane Katrina delivered devastation on the coast.

This month, we remember the storms, the preparations, the destruction, and the resilience that the two storms brought to Biloxi with a series of videos including "A Lady Called Camille," "Katrina: The Complete Experience" preview, the 15th Anniversary Hurricane Katrina Memorial Ceremony, and "I Wanna Come Home," by Ronny Broussard.

The videos will run throughout the month on BTV during the 8 a.m., 2 p.m., and 8 p.m. blocks. They may also air various times throughout the month on BTV.

Get energized at High Tide

This month on "Biloxi Cooks!", videographer Renny Sherman takes the show to High Tide Nutrition Biloxi Beach on Howard Avenue.

The new "tea shop" is located across from Nativity BVM Church on Howard Avenue. Ingredients:


- 2 cups ice cubes

Storm Proof(s)

Remembering Biloxi's **August Unwelcomed Visitors**

Before every hurricane, families and businesses plan for the predicted event. They prepare for the worst and hope for the best. Biloxians have learned from past weather chapters that we all need to make preparations and "storm proof" ourselves and our properties for the upcoming days ahead.

Throughout Biloxi's history, we learned that, sometimes, nature has the upper hand, even though we try our very best.

After the storms pass, we look back and search for evidence of what happened. Thus, the term "storm proofs" reminds us how bad hurricanes can affect everything.

Long ago

In 1699, when Monsieurs d'Iberville and Bienville came to Biloxi, they had little warning of approaching storms. There was no technology then. They depended on the careful observing eyes of weather-watchers and the reaction of animals seeking shelter ahead of time. Instinct, in those days, was truly a gift.

Old journals and history books relate that horrible hurricanes always visited our Coast. In the early days of Biloxi, there is mention of the great hurricane of September 1722, which wreaked havoc from Mobile to New Orleans. It is the first great Mississippi storm for which we have written proof. Jean-Baptiste Bernard de la Harpe, a French soldier, kept a journal while he served in the Louisiana Colony from 1718 until 1723. He talked about the winds changing direction (i.e., the eye of the hurricane) and the destruction of beans, corn, and more than 8,000 quarts of rice, as well as the loss of animals, boats, meat, lead, supplies, and artillery, not to mention structures.

Popular Biloxi hurricanes in August

Even though Biloxi has been visited by multiple hurricanes through the years, Hurricanes Camille (1969) and Katrina (2005) have been the most memorable and documented storms in recent history, both bringing their destructive winds and water surges in the month of August.

Hurricane Camille

This August marks the 56th anniversary of Hurricane Camille's unwelcome visit to the Mississippi Gulf Coast. With TV and radio warnings in place, Camille made land on August 17, 1969, with its relentless force of winds recorded at almost 200 miles per hour. Iconic Biloxi structures, such as seafood factories, Victorian homes along Hwy. 90, and popular tourist attractions crumbled with Camille's mighty force. Proof of the height of Hurricane Camille's storm surge can be found today in several marked locations: inside the Biloxi Lighthouse, on a pole

to the west of the Biloxi Visitors Center, and in Mary Mahoney's Restaurant.

On August 17, 2001, the official dedication ceremony for Biloxi's Camille Memorial was held. This outdoor Memorial was originally located on the northwest corner of Hwy. 90 and Bellman Street, where the Church of the Redeemer once stood. The memorial includes stone tablets inscribed with the 172 casualties who perished during the storm.

After the land was recently

sold, the memorial was relocated to the lawn of the Biloxi Maritime & Seafood Industry Museum at the foot of the Ocean Springs bridge. In August 2024, a rededication ceremony was held, and the memorial remains a reminder and proof of the resilience of our Biloxi community.

Online Hurricane Camille proof

In 1971, the Department of Agriculture released a short documentary, "A Lady Called Camille," starring Wade and Julia Guice. This 27-minute video documents the devastation as well as the emergency plans that were implemented as a result of Hurricane Camille (1969).

Building Stronger and Better

Although hurricanes have been known for the devastation of structures, there is one hotel on Hwy. 90 in Biloxi is noted for its structural stability against hurricanes. The Treasure Bay Casino and Hotel was originally built as the Sheraton Motor Inn, with its original groundbreaking on March 6, 1969. Its construction began before Hurricane Camille attacked the Coast. Once things got back to normal after the storm, builders decided to upgrade the hotel to a much sturdier quality.

The hotel was opened in 1971 as the Sheraton-Biloxi Motor Inn. Its initial payroll included 140 full-time employees. Mr. Joseph Chesisi was named the hotel chef. Its first large meeting was hosted in March 1971 for the Mississippi Historical Society convention.

Later, the hotel was rebranded as the Royal D'Iberville Hotel. Today, we recognize it as the Treasure Bay Casino and Hotel. Still standing strong!







Hurricane Katrina - Twenty years ago

Even though it's been twenty years since Hurricane Katrina clobbered our Coast, the City of Biloxi is still challenged with costly, ongoing, multiple repair and replacement projects to upgrade our City's infrastructure. Information on project locations and corresponding maps has been included each month in the City's BNews Monthly magazine, which is delivered to Biloxi mailboxes. Visiting Katrina's past

Located on Biloxi's Town Green at the northwest corner of Hwy. 90 and Main Street, one can visit our Katrina

Memorial. Biloxi's Katrina Memorial is dedicated to those residents who lost their lives in the storm. The height of the memorial equals the depth of the storm surge during the hurricane. Names of deceased Katrina casualties are etched onto a stone monument there.

The glass display that was once attached to the granite memorial was relocated earlier this year to the Biloxi Visitors Center, 1050 Beach Blvd. The display is a glass-encased collection of Katrina "souvenirs" donated by residents. In March 2006, ABC TV's popular program "Extreme Makeover Edition" highlighted post-Katrina effects in Biloxi in an hour-long special, which was aired nationwide. The display migrated to its new location inside the Biloxi Visitors Center, where the contents are encased and preserved in a higher and safer environment.

The Biloxi Visitors Center currently offers a free movie (shown twice daily) in its movie theater about Hurricane Katrina. Check with the Center for further details by calling 228-374-3105.

Lagniappe: Singing about storms

We can even find hurricanes and storm weather in popular songs:

In October 1968, the mellow, melancholy song "Stormy" was released by the group Classics IV with lyrics: All of a sudden that old rain's fallin' down...

Oh, stormy, oh, stormy, bring back that sunny day!

In 1974, and probably reflecting upon Hurricane Camille, Jimmy Buffett (1946-2023), the popular Coast musician, released his treasured "Trying to Reason with Hurricane Season." He begins his song reminiscing about "Squalls out on the Gulf Stream; Big storms coming soon."
