




Parking Plan:

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City Budget, Taxes, and **Financial Statement**

On September 9, the Biloxi City Council approved the budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2025, after careful review and discussion over the past two months. The administration, department directors, and City Council have worked together to ensure a responsible budget that meets the needs of our city while maintaining fiscal health.

A workshop was held to review Biloxi's nondepartmental budget before the regular City Council meeting. The non-departmental budget includes funding for libraries, museums, the Coast Transit Authority (public bus routes), and many other important programs and services across Biloxi. After reviewing each request for the coming year, the total non-departmental budget approached \$2 million.


Every year, the need to close the gap between revenues and expenses is acknowledged. A budget is an estimate — a projection of revenues, expenses, and balances nearly 15 months into the future. Over the past nine years, we've successfully met similar challenges.

During one of the workshops, it was pointed out that a 3-mill increase to the city's ad valorem tax rate (or property taxes) would generate more than \$2 million in additional revenue, which would help close some of the gaps between projected revenues and expenses. After careful consideration and with the feedback of the City Council and our residents, it was decided not to increase the tax rate this year.

I want to thank the City Council for their collaboration in making the final decision. We both appreciate the feedback from the residents of Biloxi, who always play a vital role in shaping the direction of our city. Your concerns and input are important to me, and I remain committed to transparency and keeping you informed about the decisions that impact our beloved Biloxi.

In past year's budgets, as many as 60 vacant positions were included in the budget across the departments. This year's budget maintains the current number of positions in each department ensuring no reduction of services you receive. Let me be clear, for the police and fire department's budget, there will be no reduction of positions. The new budget does not carry these unfilled positions on the books, but this does not mean that vacancies will not be filled if an officer or firefighter leaves unexpectedly or retires. We will continue to maintain the necessary staffing levels to ensure the safety of our community.

 Biloxi remains in strong financial shape. holding an S&P Global AA- credit rating - the only city in Mississippi to do so. We've successfully



- Our fire rating is the best insurance rating in the state, which translates into lower fire insurance premiums for our businesses and residents. Our firefighters are well-equipped and among the highest-paid along the Coast.
- Our police officers are near the top of the pay scale for Mississippi police forces, which is essential for recruiting and retaining the best personnel to keep Biloxi safe.
- Water and sewer rates remain lower than all neighboring communities. Additionally, you'll see a "HCUA Debt Reduction" credit on your monthly bill, reflecting savings we passed on from renegotiated bonds.

In conclusion, with the City Council's budget approval, we will once again move forward to carry on the business of the city all the while maintaining our strong financial position.

I'm grateful for the support of the City Council and the residents of Biloxi. As many of you already know, my door is always open if you have questions or if you need help. Thank you for your trust in me and for letting me set the record straight. Be assured that every decision I make is driven by what's best for Biloxi.

Road closures: The City of Biloxi Engineering Department updates the Traffic page on the City of Biloxi's website each weekday with information on road closures. Visit online at biloxi.ms.us/ traffic to stay in the know.

Be prepared: Even though hurricane season ends in November, residents still need to have a plan. Prepare emergency kits, review evacuation plans, plan for pets, and communicate with family. Visit the Storm & Flood page at biloxi.ms.us/ stormandflood for help with a plan.

Building a checklist

Builders in Biloxi can stop at one convenient location for their building needs and get expert guidance from friendly, knowledgeable staff. That place is the Biloxi Community Development Department, located at 676 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. Stop by the department weekdays or call 228-435-6280 from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to make sure all requirements are followed and nothing is missed.

To make sure you are on track with your future development, here is a step-by-step checklist. Note: Each project may have small differences depending on the circumstances, before making a huge purchase always call the Planning office at 228-435-6266.

Residential Building

- Review the city maps to check for the zoning, including flood zones, historic districts, and easements, biloxi.ms.us/maps.
- Visit online at biloxi.ms.us/resources/code-of-ordinances/, click Land Development Ordinance, and review Article 23-4 to determine if the proposed use is allowed within the current zoning district.
- If the property does not fall under a zoning standard, a zoning change may need to be requested through the Planning Commission and City Council, or if a variance is needed, it will need to be requested through the Board of Zoning Adjustments (BZA), and both must be approved before submitting construction plans. (Per Land Development Ordinance Article 23-3, biloxi.ms.us/resources/code-of-ordinances/). Once approved, continue with steps three through seven.
- If the property is historic, in a historic district, or in the context area of a landmark property, it needs to be first approved by the Architectural & Historical Review Committee (AHRC). Contact Biloxi Community Development at 228-435-6280 for AHRC procedures.
- If the property falls under the correct zoning, submit two full sets of 24'X36' construction drawings to the Planning Division in the Community Development, with a separate site plan showing all proposed structures, setbacks, and driveway on the lot, and a survey if available.
 - a. Check with the building department at 228-435-6270, for all current building codes. Details at ICCsafe.org.
 - b. Construction drawings need to include the following: floor plan with dimensions, foundation plan and details, elevation drawings, wall section, electrical, plumbing, and HVAC plans.
- **6**) The Planning Division reviews and signs off on the permit.
- The Building Division reviews and signs off on the permit. 7)
- Notification will be given of approval. Pick up the permit from the Biloxi Community Development Department and begin construction.

Notes:

- Site control documentation is required for all permits.
- A homeowner can pull their own permit to build or repair their own home, but all subcontractors need to be licensed by the state.
- Depending on the flood zone, more documentation may be needed.
- Short-Term Rentals are not allowed in Single-Family zoned properties.


Commercial Building (Including New Subdivisions)

- Look at the city maps to check for the zoning, including flood zones, historic districts, and easements, biloxi.ms.us/maps.
- **2**) Visit online at biloxi.ms.us/resources/code-of-ordinances/, click Land Development Ordinance, and review Article 23-4 to determine if the proposed use is allowed within the current zoning district.
- The project goes to the Development Review Committee (DRC). This process may include multiple sessions. (Agenda posted online, biloxi.ms.us/departments/community-development/)
- If Planning Commission, City Council, or AHRC approvals are needed, the project will get their approvals next.
- After DRC has released the project, it goes to the Planning Division for review (Two full sets of 24'X36' construction drawings and a site plan are required).
- Next, the request goes to the Building Division and Biloxi Fire Department for building plan review.
- After review and approval, the permit can be picked up from Biloxi Community Development by a licensed contractor, and construction can begin.


Notes:

- Every project is different! You will have more direction after each DRC meeting
- If projects are within the context area of a Historic Landmark or in a Historic District, AHRC approval is required
- If projects do not meet all of the development standards within the LDO, Planning Commission approval is required

The new city budget for Fiscal Year 2026 begins on Oct. 1.

City operations are funded by three primary revenue streams, gaming taxes, sales taxes, and property taxes. The chart above shows how the budget is broken down through percentages.

One thing to keep in mind: the city budget is it is a living document. It's a piece of paper that is amended dozens of times throughout the year, based on unanticipated changes in revenue and unanticipated changes in expenditures.

Property owners, if you are planning to allow a recreational vehicle, also known as an RV, to park on your property during Cruisin' The Coast, make sure you are following the city's Special Events Ordinance.

property owners who want to allow

RVs on their property for Tier 1 events such as

to allow visitors to park an RV on their property at no

charge during a Tier 1 event must obtain an affidavit for RV Parking from the Biloxi Community Development Department and return it to

the department. An affidavit is available at the department or online at biloxi.ms.us/specialevents.

Property owners who intend to rent or lease space for RVs during Tier 1 events are required to obtain a parking permit of \$50 from Biloxi Community Development and comply with certain standards.

The standards include, and not limited to, such

regulations as a maximum density of one recreational vehicle per 750 square

> feet; a parcel's setbacks clear of any recreational vehicle; a minimum of eight feet separation of vehicles from each other and from other structures, and \$10 per space per night. See the detailed list online at biloxi.ms.us/specialevents.

It seemed like just yesterday that the Biloxi Shuckers began their 2025 campaign after traveling almost two hours east to Pensacola. Florida, but after over 140 games, celebrations, thousands of fans, and a playoff appearance, the season has come to an end. As the Shuckers turn the calendar to the off-season and preparations for the 2026 season, it's time to look ahead at what's next for Mississippi's only Minor League Baseball team.

2026 SCHEDULE RELEASE

The Shuckers' home opener is scheduled for Tuesday, April 7, against the Pensacola Blue Wahoos (Miami Marlins). Game times, promotions, and single-game tickets will be announced at a later date.

Premier home games include July 3 and 4 against the Chattanooga Lookouts (Cincinnati Reds), Mother's Day on May 10 against the Columbus Clingstones (Atlanta Braves), Memorial Day Weekend on May 22-24 against the Birmingham Barons (Chicago White Sox), and Father's Day on June 21 against Columbus. The Shuckers will begin the season on the road on Friday, April 3, with Opening Day against the Rocket City Trash Pandas. The Shuckers' longest homestand is scheduled for 12 games in 13 days between August 25 and September 6 and includes matchups on Labor Day Weekend.

"Not only are we excited to finish our 10th anniversary season with a chance to win our first Southern League title, but we're already planning for a fun-filled 2026 season in Biloxi," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. "We're looking forward to 69 funfilled dates at Keesler Federal Park, including July 3 and 4 as we celebrate America's 250th birthday!"

The Shuckers will play 81 of their 138 games against divisional opponents. including 30 games against the Columbus Clingstones, 27 games against the Pensacola Blue Wahoos, and 24 games against the Montgomery Biscuits. The Shuckers will play 57 games against North Division opponents, including 18 against the Birmingham Barons, 15 against the Rocket City Trash Pandas, and 12 games against the Chattanooga Lookouts and the Knoxville Smokies (Chicago Cubs). The Shuckers' 81 divisional games are the most out of any team in the South Division and tied for the most in the Southern League.



It's illegal to sweep lawn clippings into the street

Chances are, you've seen it done or even done it yourself: You cut your lawn, rake up the trimmings and pile them near the curb in front of your home. Or, you'll sweep the trimmings into the street, where you hope they'll be carried away by the wind.


These two scenarios result in one of the biggest causes of flooding in the city – blocked storm drains.

These careless or unthinking actions negate the millions of dollars in improvements that the city is making citywide to drainage systems.

Piling leaves at the curb or sweeping trimmings into the street means that they will eventually find their way into the city's storm drains. Either bag the leaves for pickup or compost them. A stopped-up storm drain or ditch cannot carry run-off water as it is intended to do. When it rains, that water can flood streets, your property or your neighbor's property.

It's actually a violation of city ordinance to dump any material into storm drains, ditches, culverts, streams or waterways (Sec. 9-1-15, Code of Ordinances, 1992).

BILOXI'S OSAGE ORANGE TREES

What are those knobby, round, green, softball-sized pieces of fruit you find on the ground? Of course, they're from the Osage Orange trees you occasionally find along the coast. We believe the Osage Orange located on the old Tullis Manor property may be the oldest one in the state. I'll bet you haven't seen it.

Osage Orange trees aren't native to the Gulf Coast. Ours were originally imported about two hundred years ago by early settlers. The trees are found in the Missouri and Red River basins, and were used extensively by Native Americans. I'll tell you why in the following paragraphs.

For recent arrivals to our city, the "Tullis-Toledano Manor" property sits just adjacent and east of the Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art. The manor was a red brick mansion constructed in the 1850s and served as a summer home for a cotton and sugar cane broker from New Orleans. It passed through many owners and was finally acquired 50 years ago by the City of Biloxi as a museum and community center.

Damaged by Hurricane Camille in 1969, but later restored by the city, it was finally destroyed by Hurricane Katrina in 2005. A casino barge was pushed ashore by the storm and completely flattened the house. The site remains a beautiful property on our coastline, covered in many large live oak trees, and of course, the Osage Orange Tree.

The fruit of the Osage Orange tree isn't one you would find at the dinner table, but it has some amazing uses. Reportedly, Native



Americans (including the Osage and Comanche tribes) used the very strong wood to make bows and arrows. They also used the fruit, spread around their dwellings, as a bug and rodent repellent, and used the fruit juice mixed with water as a treatment to soothe sore eyes.

Imported to Mississippi by early settlers, it served important purposes as a very strong fencing material. It quickly grew to shoulder height, and its thorns kept sheep, goats, horses, and pigs well corralled perfect before barbed wire was available. The wood itself is stronger than oak and was used for wagon wheel hubs and rims. It is rot-resistant and ideal for uses such as mine timbers and posts.

What about Biloxi's tree? We aren't certain of our tree's age, but it is certainly over 100 years old. A cousin tree in Virginia is 350 years old. Ours is difficult to find and not easily visible from the beach highway. I found it by parking in the Ohr-O'Keefe parking lot and hiking through the grass, where it is overshadowed by several towering live oaks. Ours has also had a tough time of it. It's listing to the south, and supported by several steel guy wires

anchored to the surrounding oaks. The "list" was probably a result of Hurricane Katrina or Hurricane George, whose eye passed right over Biloxi in 1998. The City of Biloxi installed those guy wires following one of those hurricanes. You can immediately identify it as our Osage Orange due to the unique knobby green fruit spread all around it. See if you can find it the next time you are nearby.

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





Areawide map of infrastructure work



Biloxi's past residents

There are more than 15,800 interment records for the Biloxi Cemetery in the city's searchable database. The older section, closer to Beach Boulevard, has more than 1,000 headstones, leaving plenty of opportunities for haunting legends and stories. Several 19th-century aboveground monuments and barrel-vaulted crypts are located throughout the cemetery, reflecting the ties between Biloxi and New Orleans.

The southern section, between Beach Boulevard and Irish Hill Drive, is known as the Old Biloxi Cemetery, with the earliest marked burials dating back to the early 1800s.

This 1967 photograph was captured of the Old Biloxi Cemetery before the wrath of Hurricanes Camille and Katrina, Old oak trees with Spanish moss hanging from their branches provided a cooling canopy for visitors. Both above-ground and below-ground burials are seen, as well as remnants of old iron fencing.

Maintaining a creative memory

Dozens of once-beautiful live oaks lost in Hurricane Katrina along Beach Boulevard were transformed into sculpted works of art in the year following the hurricane's landfall and destruction.

Recently, these works of art received a new coat of stain and sealant to help preserve them for future generations to enjoy.

Biloxi Community Development contracted with T.J. McClain tree service for the work. The project took just a few days to complete and cost less than \$5000, paid by the city.

Award-winning wood sculptors, Dayton Scoggins of Mississippi, Marlin Miller of Florida, and Davle Lewis of Indiana, sculpted a variety of sea liferelated objects out of what was left of dead oak trees. These sculptures continue to stand as a monument to the Gulf Coast residents' resilience and rebuilding of what was left behind after Hurricane Katrina's massive devastation.





OCTOBER TRIVIA A scavenger hunt of some of Biloxi's famous mysteries

A gargoyle, a decorative architectural feature for redirecting water off rooftops, once set atop a downtown business. Do you know where? Atop Ellzev's Hardware Store on Howard Avenue.

Where is the Biloxi Gargoyle now? After its fall during Hurricane Katrina, it was repaired and is currently on display inside The People's Bank on Howard Avenue.

In which Biloxi downtown building was a mysterious tunnel discovered? During the renovation process of the old S & H Kress Store on Howard Avenue, a mysterious tunnel was discovered in the floor of what is now Ground Zero Blues Club. It was suggested that it was a remnant of the illegal days of gambling and liquor decades ago.

Where is Biloxi's famous witch weather vane perched? She is clearly visible atop Ellzey's Hardware store at the corner of Howard and Lameuse Streets, where it has stood since the building was built in 1897.

Did she fly away during Hurricanes Camille in 1969 and Katrina in 2005? She struggled to fly during those tumultuous hurricanes, but remains solid and is one of Biloxi's most curious and photographed icons.

In which Biloxi hospital were there sightings of two little ghostly girls appearing to patients who were very ill? Family stories passed down through the years tell of two young ghostly girls appearing at the old Howard Memorial Hospital on Lafayette Street. The building still stands and is occupied by the Department of Marine Resources.

In the 1970s, during the construction of a building, human skeletons from an unmarked cemetery were discovered. Which building is this, and what was the name of that unlisted cemetery? It was the Coast Coliseum, and the cemetery was locally known as the WAIF cemetery, a place that provided interments for orphans and neighbors who lived

What unexpected pieces of ironwork were unearthed during the repair of Biloxi's streets after Hurricane Katrina? Trolley tracks from 1905 were discovered by Biloxi crews, right below the surface of Howard Avenue.

Twelve miles south of the Biloxi shoreline, a thriving casino once stood, renowned for its gambling, picnicking, swimming contests, and music. It disappeared, like a thief in the night, never to resurface since. When did it sink, and what was its name? This was the famous Isle of Caprice, built on Dog Key Island in 1925. By the summer of 1932, the island was found to be completely underwater.

Sampling of Some of **Biloxi's Cemeteries**

Now that the autumn breezes begin to refreshen the air and cooler temperatures are on the way, Biloxians begin the anticipation of the customs of All Saints Day cemetery gatherings. It is much like the traditional "spring cleaning," except outside and focusing upon the cleanliness and decoration of loved ones' plots in our cemeteries. The placing of fresh floral bouquets, the cleaning of tombstones, and tidying of the surrounding ground are a part of this yearly family process.

This southern custom is not practiced in all our cemeteries. The VA National Cemetery, for example, has strict guidelines for uniform appearance throughout the year.

Biloxi City Cemetery

The history of our Old Biloxi Cemetery did not begin with the landing of Monsieurs

land grant,

Bienville and d'Iberville. It took time to get our cemetery organized. In 1844, the heirs of Louis Fayard deeded this cemetery property to what was

then the Town of Biloxi for the purpose of a burying ground in the village of Biloxi. The actual recordation of burials began about 1841. Old Biloxi Cemetery Books A-E register early burials beginning at that time. The Local History and Genealogy Department at the Downtown Biloxi Library is the repository for those older listings.

The City of Biloxi does, however, maintain a unique online database and map of burials searchable at biloxi.ms.us and by clicking on the cemetery tab. There are at least 16,000 burials on record.

The Biloxi Cemetery has unique features that should be mentioned. Note the aboveground tombs which feature multiple burials in levels, much like a two- and three-story house, sometimes with an added basement. The



above-ground concept is also found in New Orleans, as well. With the water table very close to the surface in our area, burying aboveground is a safer and more sanitary means of preserving our loved ones.

Years ago, Biloxians also adapted the unique architectural feature of constructing moss-laden tent-like structures above their family members' in-ground plots. This genius feature allows a simple (and organic) way to visit cemetery sites, alleviating the harsh sunshine and providing a little tunnel effect through which the cool breezes of the Mississippi Sound could provide a more refreshing visit. If

you look closely, you can still spot the idle poles extending over burial sites. They were originally constructed of thin water pipes and/or iron pieces.

Back in the day, and before our recent major storms, our cemetery's oak trees had abundant Spanish moss hanging from their branches. This plant was supposedly named after the beards of the previous Spanish

explorers who came to Biloxi before 1699. This type of moss does not harm the tree. It takes its nourishment from the air. Spanish moss is related to the pineapple family and also provides a safe harbor for insects and small animals in the area. Once a source for the stuffing of old car cushions, Spanish Moss is now a popular item for home decorations.

Our city cemetery also has remnants of little wrought iron fencing around

some tombs. This unusual, multipurpose feature delineated the property lines and prohibited roaming animals from disturbing the deceased lying within.

Upon visiting our cemetery, take note of the amazing architecture. Sadly, not all plots are identified with tombstones. However, some tombstones tell a little about the person's life,

but they can also add a little more information, such as a person's connection to military units, participation in civil groups, or even a talent such as sewing.

For a very long time, it was thought that the

oldest tombstone was that of Michel Batet. Because of his tombstone etchings, we have always concluded that this Frenchman died in Biloxi in May 1811. But a closer look at his very unique stone

and a little more genealogy sleuthing, it was discovered that Michel actually died in 1841 (an error on the stone caused by erosion) He likely was born in Spain, spoke French, and arrived in Biloxi via a river steamboat. In the 1840 Census, it appears that his Biloxi neighbors were Ladnier, Holley, Pradat, Elmer, Bellman, and Lameuse. A thorough search revealed that his youngest daughter was likely born in Biloxi. After his death, his wife and children moved to New Orleans, where she and two of their daughters are buried in Greenwood Cemetery. What an exciting, but unfinished, cemetery puzzle!

Biloxi Mausoleum Cemetery


Located on Robertson Street, the Biloxi Mausoleum Cemetery can be found just east of the Old Biloxi Cemetery on the north side of the tracks. The Biloxi Mausoleum is the newest cemetery in our area. It can accommodate about 250 caskets and 540 urns. The new burial option is constructed with Spanish granite and steel-reinforced concrete, a design to withstand weather and age.

Southern Memorial Cemetery

Southern Memorial Park Cemetery on Beach Boulevard

The Southern Memorial Park Cemetery is located on Hwy. 90 is just a short distance east

> of Beauvoir Road. This property was once known as "Holmhaven" and was owned and occupied by



Holmes and his family. Southern Memorial was formerly opened in April 1935 on a total of 13 acres. It currently features both a mausoleum and in-ground burials. There is estimated to be over 6,000 interments at this site.



Biloxi National Cemetery

The Veterans Administration National Cemetery is located at the intersection of Veterans Avenue and Pass Road on the grounds of the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center and within close proximity to Keesler Air Force Base. This cemetery was established in March 1934, and its first burial was held on March 24, 1934, with the interment of Private Edgar A. Ross. This national cemetery currently occupies about

Within its grounds, a general information kiosk, which is available during visitation hours, provides the names of interred individuals with a map to identify the location of the plots.

Beauvoir Cemetery

The Beauvoir Memorial Cemetery is located just north of the Beauvoir house and can be seen on Beauvoir Road on its westernmost boundary. There are over 780 men and women buried there. This cemetery opened in 1904. The last interment was held on April 7, 1958. Jefferson Davis is not buried here. He died in New Orleans in 1889 and is buried in Richmond, Virginia.

Jewish Cemetery

In the mid-1800s, several Jewish families

came to live in Biloxi. They thrived in the retail business in Downtown Biloxi. In 1853 a tract of land on the west

side of Reynoir by Elder Street was sold to the Congregation of the Hebrew Society of New Orleans to be utilized as a Jewish Cemetery. The first trustees for this cemetery included the surnames of Klopman, Marks, and Friedlander. In 1958, the local newspaper reported that only about ten or twelve bodies had been laid to rest there. One name identified was Michel Levy, who died at the age of 17 of yellow fever. In 1991, a historical marker was erected, inscribed with "Original Biloxi Jewish Cemetery. One of the oldest Jewish cemeteries in the south - Established in 1855. The City of Biloxi's "Essence of Biloxi: Driving and Bicycling Trail" features this Hebrew Rest/ Jewish Cemetery in its video and is available



Woolmarket Cemetery

The community of Woolmarket wasn't added to the corporation of the City of Biloxi until

One of the significant community cemeteries there is the Coalville United Methodist Church Cemetery, located at 12556 Lorraine Road. There are more than 2,000 burials recorded at this location. Those interred include soldiers, farmers, loggers, tradesmen, mariners, and schooner captains.

On May 9, 2024, the City of Biloxi's Preserve Biloxi team hosted an opportunity to visit, learn, and meet at its "Walking



in Woolmarket History" event, as a part of its yearly Preservation in May series.

The Moran Site

The French Colonial Memorial Garden

Moran Site cemetery is located next door to the Biloxi Visitors Center, at the corner of Hwy. 90 and Porter Avenue. It was accidentally discovered after Hurricanes Camille (1969) and Katrina (2005), when erosion from the storms' violent thrashing uncovered skeletal remains from the early 1700s It is deemed the oldest French Colonial cemetery in the south and the second oldest in the United States. Sadly, no one knows the names of these individuals. After Hurricane Katrina, a respected team of historians, scientists, and archaeologists gathered to study what lay beneath the

surface. Approximately 30 individual burials were identified. Most were young males, and many had endured injuries and serious health episodes during their lifetimes. A Catholic crucifix was discovered with one of the individuals. They likely died homeless, poor, and in ill health

In 2012, the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources acquired this burial site and in 2013, a formal funeral and burial were provided for those individuals. Today, visitors can learn more about Biloxi's French Colonial Garden by viewing its informational kiosks provided near its identifiable weeping angel statue and carefully landscaped garden.

The Historical Waif Cemetery

The mysterious Waif Cemetery was once located where the Coast Coliseum is today. (A "waif" is an archaic term for a neglected homeless, and abandoned person, usually a child.) The land was the location of an orphanage from 1900 to around 1910. There, children lived, worked, and played, and were well cared for by Dr. Alfred Clay. Children of all ages came from far and near; many had no known surnames.

When the Coast Coliseum was being constructed in the 1970s, burials were discovered, but left in place, never to be seen again.

There was once an undocumented and unmarked cemetery at that location, associated with residents and workers of the orphanage, but no records survived through time.

Family cemeteries

Long before the establishment of specific Biloxi cemeteries, families would inter their loved ones respectfully on an area of their properties. During the 1990s, when there was the initial boom of new development north of the Popp's Ferry Bridge, there was the discovery of a few small cemeteries, including the Sunkist-Holley-Blackwell Cemetery and the Hamilton Cemetery.
