
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



Causeway Boat Launch





The City of Biloxi's Port Division continues to invest in the restoration and maintenance of the city's piers, boat ramps, and waterways, ensuring these vital public facilities remain safe, functional, and welcoming for residents and visitors alike. Through a combination of repair projects and infrastructure upgrades, the city is enhancing access to its waterfront while preserving the character of its coastal community.

In mid-August, work began on the Coliseum Pier Restoration Project, one of Biloxi's most notable recent improvements. Over the course of three weeks, J.E. Borries Marine Construction replaced the broken and rotten substructure, installed new decking and handrails along the entire 908-foot pier, fabricated and installed sixteen new light poles, and built new benches to replace deteriorated ones. The project was completed under the Port Maintenance and funded through the Port Division.

Lighting enhancements are also planned for the pier. The Biloxi City Council approved a lease agreement with Mississippi Power to provide and maintain sixteen solar-powered lights, each producing over 2,700 lumens, at a cost of \$434 per month. Mississippi Power will also handle repairs, replacements, and storm-related removals and reinstallations. Once the lights arrive, installation is expected within two to four weeks.

At Parkers Creek off East Oaklawn Road, boat ramp restoration and dredging projects have been completed. At the boat launch, contractors removed and replaced rotten pilings and damaged wooden components beneath the ramp structure, and upgraded the decking to fiberglass flow-through decking, a more durable and storm-resistant material. Contractors also completed dredging along the area

last month. This project improved area drainage and increased water depth to allow for better boat access.

Now underway over at the Causeway Park, is a significant improvement project that includes upgrades to three areas: the boat ramp, fishing pier, and overlook fishing pier. The work will include:

- · Boat ramp repairs: demolition and replacement of three existing 45foot finger piers with new wooden substructures and fiberglass flowthrough decking. Safety bumpers will also be installed on the courtesy pier near Yul's Place for safer docking.
- Fishing pier repairs: the 152-foot pier will be rebuilt with new timber components, decking, and handrails, including replacement of all broken and rotten materials with stronger, longer-lasting
- · Overlook fishing pier repairs: measuring 45 feet by 24 feet, this structure will be fully rebuilt with fiberglass flow-through decking and new timber framing.

The Causeway Pier project has a total cost of \$412,486, funded by a Tidelands Grant designated specifically for pier repairs at the Causeway, and carried out by the Port Maintenance contractor, J.E. Borries. The project is expected to be completed within 60 to 90 days.

"These restoration projects represent our ongoing commitment to maintaining Biloxi's waterfront for future generations," Port Manager Christina Johnson said. "By improving the safety, durability, and accessibility of our piers and waterways, we're ensuring that Biloxi continues to be a place where residents and visitors can enjoy the beauty of our local waters."

With these combined improvements, Biloxi is reinforcing its reputation as a vibrant coastal community that values its public spaces and maritime heritage.



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Where's the Action

Popp's Ferry Road Extension

In 2024, even before the City of Biloxi and Necaise Brothers Construction broke ground on the \$34.1



million road extension, the transformative results of the project started and now continue.

Most notably, the new Rouses Market at Popp's Ferry and Pass Road has already proven to be a great success. Nearby, a new Chick-fil-A is in the final planning stages, with

construction targeted to begin in 2026. Five Below is now open, and a number of other retail businesses are on the drawing boards. Across the street, the former Office Depot space has been transformed with a new Dollar Tree and Hair & Beauty Supply 4.

Construction in the area has cleared major obstacles like the CSX railroad, and the overall project completion date is anticipated ahead of schedule by the end of 2026. With momentum building, the future business growth along and near the new extension is limited only by imagination.

Lighthouse Pier

In 2020, Hurricane Zeta rendered the most iconic public pier on the coast unusable for the third time since I have been Mayor of Biloxi. Zeta, other hurricanes, and near misses also destroyed a great number of Biloxi's piers. The City of Biloxi bit the bullet and repaired them with little outside financial support. However, in Zeta's case, for the first time, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) indicated that additional financial support (cost mitigation) could be provided for the Lighthouse Pier to be rebuilt at a higher standard. As soon as that was confirmed, we got to work.

In order to determine the additional amount of mitigation, FEMA required the city to submit an estimate of the cost to replace the pier "as it was" before Zeta. A certified third-party engineering firm was engaged to determine the Opinion of Probable Cost (OPC).

The initial OPC (\$1.2M) was submitted to FEMA for approval in December 2021. We have come to realize



that navigating this process could be described as never-ending.

We proceeded with the design of the new pier immediately after submitting the OPC. With the goal of never having to replace this 780-foot pier again because of storm damage, it was to be constructed with concrete pilings, flow-through decking, 320-foot stone breakwater, stainless steel fasteners, and more. In 2022, the total estimated cost of the project was \$4.2 million, with an anticipated \$2.2 million to be covered in FEMA funding.

Literally, after years of FEMA questions, submitting responses and appeals, FEMA reduced the project to much less than our engineer's estimate, thus reducing the amount of anticipated mitigation of the project to approximately \$520,000. After numerous trips to Washington, meeting with FEMA, and with the support of our U.S. Senators and Congressmen, our second and final appeal resulted in increased project funding for mutually approved materials, bringing the anticipated mitigation amount to approximately \$849,000.

We are still short more than \$1 million of the expected FEMA funding, but the next step is to refine the completed design and submit it to FEMA for approval of the mitigated project. That process is now ongoing with submission to FEMA by the end of November.

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

Here are some key fire cooking safety tips:

1. Safe Cookware:

- Choose a safe location for your cooking activities, away from flammable materials and structures.
- Use appropriate cooking equipment such as grills and stoves that are in good working condition.

2. Pay attention:

• Never leave your cooking unattended, especially when using an open flame or hot equipment.

3. Fire Extinguishers:

 Have a fire extinguisher nearby and know how to use it. Different types of fires (grease, electrical, wood) require different extinguishing methods.

 Be cautious when using oil and grease; they can splatter and cause fires. Use a deep fryer for deep-frying and keep a lid nearby to smother grease fires.


10. Proper Storage:


 Store propane tanks and other flammable materials in a safe place, away from direct sunlight and heat sources.

Banana Ball Coming to Biloxi, **Ayrault Awarded Manager of** the Year





World-famous baseball entertainers set to come to the Coast in September 2026

With the Milwaukee Brewers making another playoff run, featuring a number of former Biloxi Shuckers stars, many future stars finished the season on a high note at Keesler Federal Park. The season saw the Shuckers reach the playoffs for the second consecutive season after their first South Division title since 2019. Multiple Shuckers earned awards following the season, including Joe Ayrault as the Southern League Manager of the Year, Luke Adams, and Brock Wilken as league All-Stars, Tyson Hardin and Jesús Made as the organization's Minor League Pitcher and Player of the Year.

BANANA BALL IS HEADED TO BILOXI!

As the Shuckers continue preparations for the 2026 season, set to begin in April, the team has announced that additional events are slated to come to the stadium next season, including Banana Ball in September!

Keesler Federal Park will host The Firefighters and the Loco Beach Coconuts for two games on Friday, September 25, and Saturday, September 26, 2026, as part of the 2026 Banana Ball Championship League. All ticket sales for the seating bowl will be conducted through the Savannah Bananas and Fan First Entertainment. "We're excited to partner with Coastal Mississippi and Visit Mississippi to bring Banana Ball to the Coast," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. "We've seen throughout Minor League Baseball how popular Banana Ball is in growing the game of baseball, and we're excited to showcase our ballpark to new and returning fans across the Coast."

Banana Ball has become the fastest and most entertaining game in sports. With its



fast-paced rules and emphasis on continuous play, Banana Ball strips away the oftencriticized lulls and lengthy pauses typical of traditional baseball, delivering a high-octane and entertainment-packed game that keeps both players and fans on their toes. Banana Ball has 11 unique rules. The most notorious rule is that if a fan catches a foul ball, it counts as an out.

ADAMS, AYRAULT, WILKEN EARN **SOUTHERN LEAGUE HONORS**

Minor League Baseball announced in late September that Shuckers manager Joe Ayrault, infielder Luke Adams, and third baseman Brock Wilken have earned Southern League honors. Ayrault was named the Southern League Manager of the Year, becoming the first Shuckers manager to earn the award since Mike Guerrero in 2018. Adams was named the league's All-Star at first base, and Wilken earned the honors as the designated hitter. It marks the third consecutive season that the Shuckers have had multiple Southern League All-Stars and the fifth time in franchise history.

Ayrault returned to the helm as Shuckers manager after a battle with cancer forced him to miss the second half of the 2024 season. Now cancer-free, Ayrault guided the Shuckers to the first-half title in the South Division, the franchise's first division title since 2019. Ayrault managed a team that led the Southern League in runs (639), doubles (197), home runs (111), walks (621), on-base percentage


(.337), slugging percentage (.362), and OPS (.699). The team also ranked among the franchise single-season leaderboard in stolen bases (2nd, 190), walks (2nd, 621), runs (3rd, 639), and home runs (5th, 111).

Adams, the Milwaukee Brewers' No. 7 prospect by Baseball America, earned All-Star honors for the second time in his career and first since 2023 in the Carolina League. Despite missing 66 games with an injury, Adams tied his career-high with 11 home runs, held a .232/.409/.450 slash line and recorded an .859 OPS. Adams finished the season among the Southern League leaders (min. 250 PA) in wRC+ (1st, 160), on-base percentage (1st, .409), OPS (2nd, .860), isolated power (3rd, .218), slugging percentage (5th, .450), and walk rate (6th, 15.5%). Adams led all Double-A players after being hit by a pitch 21 times in 64 games, the sixth-most by a Southern League player since 2005. The 21-year-old also set the Shuckers franchise record by reaching base in 39 consecutive games between April 29 and June 19.

Wilken, the Brewers' No. 13 prospect by Baseball America, earned All-Star honors for the first time in his career. Despite missing 50 games on the Injured List during the second half, Wilken set a career-high in home runs (18) and extra-base hits (35). Wilken finished the season among the Southern League leaders in home runs (3rd, 18) and extra-base hits (T-7th, 35). Among players with at least 300 plate appearances, Wilken was among the leaders in OPS (1st, .876), slugging percentage (1st, .489), wRC+ (1st, 159), walk rate (1st, 20.1%), isolated power (1st, .263), wOBA (1st, .413), and on-base percentage (4th, .387). His 159 wRC+ is tied for the 14th highest in a single Southern League season (min. 300 PA) since 2006 and the highest for any Brewers Double-A player over that span.

HE TREES OF KEESLER

On the eve of Veterans Day 2025, I thought we should look at the stewardship Keesler and the U.S. Air Force have maintained in protecting and promoting the native trees of our Gulf Coast home.

As many will recall, when the onset of World War II became imminent, the citizens of Biloxi recognized that the land just west of downtown, and north of the railroad tracks offered an ideal location for an Army Air Corps training field. In 1941, they transferred more

than 1,500 acres of valuable, high ground to the military. At the time, the area wasn't entirely empty, with the Naval Reserve Park located along the northern edge on Back Bay, and the Biloxi Country Club, along with a small golf course, at the end of Howard Avenue, now Judge Sekul Avenue.

To construct the airfield, much of the original forest had to be cleared, leaving behind a stark landscape on the Biloxi peninsula. Beginning in the 1950s, a major beautification effort was launched, leading to the planting of hundreds of live oak trees across the base. Today, their legacy is unmistakable with long rows of trees lining the main thoroughfares along Larcher Boulevard with more than 100 live oaks lining the main entrance to the base, extending north of White Avenue, and along Meadows Avenue where nearly 70 trees stand.

Tree planning continued along the perimeter road, and with each new facility built, young native trees - primarily live oaks - were added as part of the landscape. The dormitories that once stood at the site of the soon-to-be-built Cyber Center were surrounded by more than two dozen oaks. When the new center is constructed, only one of those

70-year-old trees will be removed. The Cyber Center is being built by Mississippi State University, who enlisted the aid of the State Arborist

> to design the building and preserve as many trees as possible.

> The original WWII barracks of the Triangle Area were replaced in the late 1990s with modern dormitories. Those dorms are surrounded by dozens and dozens of new trees planted at the time of construction. Landscaping, to include new trees is a key element of any new construction project on Keesler AFB.

Touring the base today, you can still find approximately 1,000, live oak trees, each over a century old. Among them, 309 trees are more than

150 years old, and 21 that are more than 240 years old. My favorite is the "Airman's Oak" estimated to be more than 300 years of age, which sits at the intersection of Meadows Drive and 1st Street.

Today, the efforts to preserve and protect the base's native environment remains ongoing. In fact, a manager from the civil engineering squadron is the wing's "Tree Czar." That person is responsible for the more than 8,000 mature trees on the installation and housing areas (2,800 are protected species). Every one of them is mapped, identified and tagged. If you have an opportunity, take a close look at any of the trees on base. A small metal numbered tag is located on the trunk at about eye level. The registry is continually updated, and is filed at the base, as well as with the Mississippi State Forestry Commission.

Keesler has been designated as a "Tree City USA" for more than 33 years. Just like every Biloxian, the Air Force loves its trees.

I experienced an alternator failure on a brand-new alternator. First stop was Ronnie's Automotive. Figured out a too small charging wire probably strained my alternator to death. Then he got me pointed towards a real gem, Hammett's Auto Electric in Biloxi, Hammett's rebuilt the impossible to find single wire alternator in less than an hour. Back to Ronnie's to install and we were back on the road. Small shops like these two are becoming harder and harder to find. Honest people who understand their craft and go above and beyond to help their customers."

It is increasingly difficult to find small, specialized auto electrical shops in the U.S. due to fundamental shifts in the automotive industry. The growing complexity of modern vehicle technology and the rise of electric vehicles have made it harder for small shops to stay competitive and profitable. 

TIME CAPSULE:



This postcard, dated 1909, shows
Beach Road, also known as the Shell
Road, located where Beach Boulevard
is today, with the Biloxi Lighthouse in
the background. The original roads
were made with oyster shells, which
gave substance and stability to the
sandy soil. The seafood factories
produced such enormous piles of shells
that they were a defining feature of the
Biloxi waterfront.



In early Biloxi, oyster shells were repurposed in numerous ways

beyond road construction, including as a building material, agricultural fertilizer, and a source for regenerating oyster reefs. In 1957, oyster factories were required to replant at least 50 percent of the shells in the Gulf for reef restoration. Oyster shell recycling keeps the shells out of landfills and provides new oysters with the old oyster shells as a foundation for growth.


So, the story of oysters doesn't end on the plate. To this day, local restaurants and volunteers are giving discarded oyster shells a new purpose by rebuilding the very reefs that once sustained them.



NOVEMBER TRIVIA Fall is finally here!

When is All Saints Day? November 1.

What's the connection between cemeteries and All Saints Day? Traditionally, locals prepare the gravesites of their loved ones in anticipation of All Saints Day. Families place flowers near family tombstones and clean and clear the area. On November 1, Biloxi families from generations past would visit their loved ones' burial sites and meet with other families there as well.

When does daylight savings time end this year? It officially ends at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, November 2.

When can we plan for Daylight Savings Time to begin again? It will officially begin at 2:00 a.m. on March 8, 2026.

Which two states do not adhere to Daylight Savings Time? Hawaii and most of Arizona.

How can we remember in which direction to change our clocks? The phrase: "Fall Back...Spring Forward" helps us to remember which direction our clocks should be adjusted.

Today's digital devices automatically adjust time for daylight saving time. How was this handled before the digital age? Wind-up table clocks and wristwatches were manually wound by hand, which occasionally required climbing step stools to reset wall clocks.

Can you find any round clocks in Downtown Biloxi?Yes. There are two noticeable clocks located along Howard Avenue. One is near Ellzey's hardware store on the corner

of Howard Avenue and Lameuse Street. The other is located high in the bell tower of the Nativity Cathedral, situated on the corner of Howard Avenue and Fayard Street.

These clocks in Downtown Biloxi display letters instead of numbers. What are they? The hours on these clocks are displayed in Roman numerals, instead of traditional numbers. V is represented as 5, and X means 10; this is a simple mathematical puzzle that is usually taught in elementary school.

At this time of year, local nurseries and retailers sell pots of mums. What's a "mum"? A mum is a nickname for a chrysanthemum. This flowering potted plant is frequently the foliage of choice in Biloxi when decorating for fall at our cemeteries and our homes and businesses.

What does the word chrysanthemum mean? Its name comes from a Greek word meaning "gold" and "flower."


Besides mum plants, what other interesting types of vegetation might we find when visiting Biloxi cemeteries in November? Looking up, we can usually spot gray Spanish moss hanging from older trees.

Spanish moss is actually a flowering plant. When can we see its tiny flowers? Spanish Moss has tiny blue, palegreen flowers with three petals. They bloom from spring to fall each year.

Why do weather enthusiasts get excited about November 30? Ideally, November 30 marks the end of hurricane season. However, there is no guarantee that Mother Nature won't surprise us with one of her torrential storms after that date.



- Sprinkle the crab boil, Cajun seasoning, and onion powder over crawfish
- Sauté over medium heat for 4-5 minutes.
- Remove from pan and keep warm.
- In the same pan as the crawfish, pour in the evaporated milk and heavy cream
- Bring to a low simmer. Do not boil.
- Sprinkle in the Cajun seasoning and onion powder
- Add the cheeses and stir constantly until cheese melts and sauce coats the spoon.
- Turn off the heat after 4 minutes of simmering
- 12. Sauce will thicken as it stands
- 13. Prepare the fries according to package instructions
- 14. Top the fries with the crawfish, cheese sauce, and parsley

Thanksgiving at Grandma's:


A Tradition of Love and Gatherings

With Thanksgiving around the corner, I find myself reminiscing about the times I spent with my Grandma during the holidays. The four-day school break gave us the perfect opportunity to not only spend time with

Grandma, but also gather at her beautiful home in Biloxi with the whole family.

Grandma's house was very interesting. It was a neat wooden house on Point Cadet. Everything was made of wood: the wooden floors squeaked when we walked; the sides were covered with horizontal wooden planks, perfectly overlapping, and called weatherboards; and the walls and ceilings were made of wood, not sheetrock or plaster like we have today. Those walls were called tongue and groove, with each piece



of wood perfectly interlocked with the next, just like a puzzle. In today's modern home designs, many have wooden flooring of this type.

The house stood elevated a few feet above the ground, with wooden steps at both the front and back entrances. This design prevented the house from flooding in bad weather and allowed the plumber to crawl underneath to fix broken pipes. Grandma even stored things under the house, like her clay flower pots and garden tools.

The front of the house was designed with a wonderful wooden porch. This breezy outdoor "room" was a busy place, indeed. She had a huge wooden rocker there.

Grandma spent much of her day rocking, singing, knitting, hulling her home-grown beans, and talking with neighbors as they walked along the sidewalk past her house. The overhang of the porch provided a shield from the glaring sun and pouring rain.

Every window of the house had wooden

shutters. Not only were they ornamental, but they were also functional and could be closed tightly during the threat of a hurricane. Each window and door had a screen covering, which was a great feature to ward off pesky gnats and mosquitoes.

Grandma's home at Thanksgiving was filled with glorious aromas. She cooked everything from scratch. The cast-iron cooking pots on her stove always made the best gumbo! Believe it or not, Grandma shopped at the old City Hall Market building for her Thanksgiving dinner. Both vegetables and meats could be purchased there. This is the previous City Hall that was once located at the northern intersection of Main and Howard.

Gaming back in the day

In anticipation of her young holiday guests, Grandma always kept her wooden toy chest well-stocked with fascinating old-fashioned toys. Her collection, far from today's electronic gadgets, offered plenty of options to keep us entertained for hours. Glass marble games, story books, rag dolls, chalk for sidewalk hopscotch, jump ropes, ball and jacks, checkers, Parcheesi, and Old Maid card games are just a few of the entertainment collectibles she had for the grandkids. She even had a set of wooden blocks and a jack-in-thebox for the little folks. Wedged among the toys were a few decks of tattered playing cards kept for Grandpa and his guests to play Boo-Ray and poker. Grandma liked these cards, too, but preferred her quiet games of solitaire.

Often, Grandma would add an extra toy surprise to her collection, one that she purchased from the Kress Department Store on Howard Avenue. Today, we recognize this building as Ground Zero Blues Club.

Grandma didn't always have a television set. Her first source for news, music, and storytelling was her electric radio, complete with turn knobs and the occasional static, especially on stormy days. Grandma loved to sing along with Hank Williams songs. Her special love of music came from her visits to Biloxi's Saenger Theatre with its magnificent organ. The Saenger is where she and grandpa had their first date!




Late nights at Grandma's were filled with games, laughter, and her irresistible snacks – but no matter how late we stayed up, we always woke early, gently roused by the unique sounds of her neighborhood. In the mornings, you could hear the loud and distinct tones of the seafood factory whistles summoning their worker crews. The whistle of the Hummingbird train traveling in its eastwest course was also often heard as it entered and exited the Biloxi peninsula. In those days, Biloxi's downtown train station was near the intersection of Reynoir Street.

Grandma had fresh milk delivered right to her front door, and the gentle clink of those glass bottles created a sound unlike any other. Each morning, a newspaper boy would pedal up on his bicycle to drop off the Daily Herald. The rhythmic thump of the paper hitting the wooden porch was a sign for Grandpa to begin brewing the morning coffee. In the distance, the trolley car's bell rang softly as it made its way along the tracks through town. And not to be missed were the clear, resonant chimes of St. Michael's bells, ringing each early morning, echoing all the way to Grandma's house.

Voices in the kitchen

Outdoor sounds weren't the only sounds our family could hear. Early in the morning, Grandma and her visiting family would start bustling in the kitchen, preparing the meals of the day. The unique voices of each aunt could be identified. Some conversed in the languages of their native countries, such as Croatia. The Louisiana relatives would speak in their distinct French Cajun tongue, and others, who spoke English, would have that special accent that you seldom hear today. None of the present-day generation learned those melodious languages... if only we could play back those voices.

Grandma's yard was like no other. We had so much fun playing baseball and kickball with our cousins. We also picked pecans from her trees in hopes she would make some of her special pecan pralines! She even had satsuma bushes that had the sweetest and juiciest fruit on the planet!

There were also clothes hung along a line in the yard. Grandma didn't have an electric or gas dryer. Instead, she hung her clothes outside to dry, clipped to wire ropes with worn wooden clothespins. Her Mississippi Sound airblown laundry is a wonderful memory of visits to grandma's house.

Sadly, Grandma's special home is no longer there. In spite of Grandpa's tireless efforts to build and secure their house, hurricanes took a toll, but our special Thanksgiving holiday family memories will always be with us.



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
