Biloxi wants residents to B connected

The City of Biloxi is making it easier than ever for citizens and visitors to connect with city services. Formerly known as Citizens Services, the program has been rebranded as B-Connect, reflecting the city's commitment to streamlined communication and more efficient service.

For years, citizens have called the Citizens Services Representative to report various issues from potholes and litter to traffic signal outages and water service issues. Now, B-Connect centralizes these requests through a modern call center, allowing the city to track concerns more efficiently and respond faster.

Citizens can continue using the same phone number, 228-435-6271, to report an issue, but now, they have more options for reporting issues and even an opportunity for follow-up updates on their requests. For added convenience, the city has added an online form available accessible at biloxi.ms.us/bconnect, and an email, bconnect@biloxi.ms.us, allowing citizens to submit requests quickly and easily from any device. Through both routes, citizens can also request updates about their requests.

Whether it's a routine maintenance request or an urgent issue, B-Connect ensures that connecting with city services is simple, reliable, and effective — helping Biloxi continue to serve its community.

Greater Biloxi Economic Development Foundation launches Community Façade Grant Program



New initiative supports business investment and corridor beautification

The Greater Biloxi Economic Development Foundation (GBEDF), in partnership with the City of Biloxi and Mississippi Power, has launched a new Community Façade Grant Program to help local businesses and property owners enhance the appearance of their buildings and strengthen Biloxi's key commercial corridors.

The program offers reimbursement grants covering up to 50% of eligible façade improvements, up to \$5,000 per project. Eligible improvements include, but are not limited to, painting, signage, lighting, awnings, and other exterior

upgrades that improve curb appeal and contribute to a more vibrant streetscape.

For example, an applicant with a \$10,000 façade renovation plan could receive up to \$5,000 in reimbursement for eligible, approved expenses, after the project is completed and approved.

"This program is about

partnership and pride," said Bobby Gillon, President of the Greater Biloxi Economic Development Foundation. "When our businesses look good, our community looks good — and that draws more people to shop, dine, and invest in Biloxi."

Gillon added, "This is a great example of how publicprivate partnerships can deliver visible impact. By helping property owners reinvest in their buildings, we're supporting local businesses, encouraging new development, and enhancing the look and feel of our commercial districts."

Eligible properties must be located in the Pass Road or Division Street corridors and be Mississippi Power customers. Both property owners and tenants may apply,

with tenants required to provide written permission from the property owner.

Funding is limited and awarded on a first-come, first-served basis.





'Tis the Season of Safety: Police offer holiday tips

As the holiday season gets underway, the Biloxi Police Department is reminding residents to stay alert and take precautions to help prevent crime. From shopping safety to protecting your home and vehicle, officers say a few simple steps can help ensure everyone enjoys a safe and happy holiday season.



Safety in your vehicle

- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area.
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your vehicle unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your vehicle. This creates temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the vehicle, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys before going to your vehicle. Do not activate remote access until you are close enough to enter.
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag, and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the vehicle to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not approach your vehicle alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- If necessary, ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

Automated Teller Machines (ATMs) 😘 😘

 If you must use an ATM, choose one that is located inside a well-lighted, occupied area like a mall, convenience store, or police station. Withdraw only the amount of cash you need.

- Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.
- When using a drive-through ATM, leave your vehicle in drive with your foot on the brake while completing your transaction.
- Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.

- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Dress casually and comfortably.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Do not carry a purse or wallet, if possible.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card and avoid carrying large amounts of cash when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen, or misused.
- Membership in a credit card monitoring service is strongly recommended, especially during the holiday season.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion.
- Do not make multiple trips to load your vehicle with multiple packages. This could draw the attention of criminals.
- During the holiday season, "con artists" are working overtime and may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings. Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason.

While at home how to the contract of the contr

- Lock doors and windows when you leave home, even if you plan on being gone for a short time.
- Have a neighbor or family member watch your home and collect your newspapers and mail if you're going to be away overnight.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- Do not place boxes or shipping containers from recent purchases by the roadway for trash collection. Place evidence of new
 purchases in trash cans or plastic bags, thus making it difficult for would-be thieves to shop from your neighborhood street.
- Be sure your Christmas tree is mounted on a sturdy base so children, elderly persons, or family pets cannot pull it over on themselves.
- If you use lights on your Christmas tree, ensure the wiring is not damaged or frayed. Frayed or damaged wiring can cause a fire.
- Place your live Christmas tree in water or wet sand to keep it green.
- Never place wrapping paper in your fireplace.

The following recommendations may deter property-related crime and assist the Biloxi Police Department in its efforts to find and return stolen or lost property to its rightful owner.

Shine bright, stay safe this holiday season

Christmas trees and festive decorations are a cherished part of the holiday season, but they can also pose fire risks if not handled properly. The Biloxi Fire Department is reminding residents to take a few simple precautions when selecting, setting up, and decorating their trees, as well as their home, to help reduce the risk of fire while keeping things bright!

• Choose a tree that is fresh with limbs that are still flexible so that it still has moisture.

 Set up the tree at least three feet from the fireplace or any other heat source.

 Make sure to use indoor tree lights, preferably LED lights, which produce no heat.

 When decorating your tree with holiday lights, make sure there are no cuts or tears in the strands of lights.

 Replace strings of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections

 Make sure you use only the number of strands recommended by the manufacturer when connecting the lights. • Turn the tree lights off before going to bed or before leaving the house.

• Be sure to water the tree daily.

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry.
 Dried-out trees are a fire danger.

"Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious," said Biloxi Fire Chief Nick Geiser. "This can become more of an issue as time goes by and trees are not properly watered."

According to research, a watered Christmas tree is less of a fire hazard than a dry one. One study showed that when a dry tree was placed in a room and exposed to a flame, the tree became fully engulfed within 25 seconds, and the entire room filled with smoke and flames within 63 seconds.

Added Geiser: "As always, make sure that you have a working smoke detector and fire extinguishers to help stay 'fire smart' during the holidays."

The Shuckers' season is set to begin on Friday, April 3, against the Rocket City Trash Pandas, followed by the team's home opener on Tuesday, April 7, against the Pensacola Blue Wahoos. Tickets are available now for both games of the Hancock Whitney Classic, including Mississippi State on March 10 and Southern Miss on March 17. MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS SET TO RETURN TO BILOXI

The Biloxi Shuckers have announced that the Mississippi State Bulldogs will return to Biloxi for the 2026 Hancock Whitney Classic on Tuesday, March 10, against the Tulane Green Wave. It marks the fifth consecutive season and eighth season total that the Bulldogs have visited Keesler Federal Park. Tulane previously visited Keesler Federal Park during the 2016 season with a game against Southern Miss.

"Mississippi State fans are some of the most passionate in college baseball, and partnering with Hancock Whitney to continue these games is an honor," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. "We're excited to welcome the Bulldogs and their fans back for another year and showcase our ballpark to Green Wave fans. It will truly be a special night at our ballpark."

The matchup marks the 114th all-time meeting between the two programs, and the first since 2022. Mississippi State holds the advantage in the series, with a record of 79-32-2. The programs have not met in a



neutral-site game since the 1998 Winn-Dixie Showdown at the Caesars Superdome in New Orleans.

"We're excited to partner with Coastal Mississippi and Visit Mississippi to bring Banana Ball to the Coast," Shuckers General Manager Hunter Reed said. Banana Ball has become the fastest and most entertaining game in sports. EDIGATING A TREE

As I survey the Biloxi tree canopy, I continually find trees of all shapes and sizes that have been dedicated to one of our citizens. It's a reminder of what a meaningful gift a tree can be - a loving remembrance, a lasting tribute, or a heartfelt way to honor the service of a Biloxi hero, friend, or relative. In Biloxi, you can arrange to have a tree planted on city property or a private lot, and have it dedicated to a special individual in your life.

There is a large number of trees across the city that are identified by a small plaque at the base honoring beloved family members or cherished residents and associated organizations whose long-standing service has earned our deepest respect.

Some of my favorites include the Hurricane Camille Magnolia at the Dr. Frank Gruich Community Center, dedicated to Ben Evans, the former Assistant Director of our local Red Cross. His tireless work played a vital role in helping the Coast and our City recover from the storm. The tree was planted in 1969, making it approximately 60 years old – just in the right spot, overlooking the Gruich parking lot.

The live oak standing at the entrance of the Donal Snyder Community Center was planted in honor of Audrey Mercedes Lund Snyder, Donal's wife. She had as much to do with making the center an important part of our community as Donal did.

On the northwest corner of Our Lady of Fatima Church stands a healthy young live oak, planted in 2002. Claude and Diane Sicuro purchased and planted the tree, which was later dedicated to Bobby Ray Weldon — a longtime parishioner, a decorated Vietnam Marine veteran, and a man deeply devoted to his family and church.

Even the Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art has a mature live oak dedicated to Mark and Ane Hornibrook. Although he and his family called many locations home, he is honored at the museum due to his expertise in funeral services - his work resulted in a nationwide standard for preneed insurance and funeral planning.

Of course, there are more. At Sunkist Country Golf Course, a live oak more than a century old stands in tribute to Lt. Col. Robert Weinard — a longtime member, fighter pilot, golfer, and loyal supporter of the course. His ashes rest beneath the plaque that bears his name. Even the Airmen's Oak at Keesler AFB is part of this tradition (as noted in last month's article).

I mentioned in an earlier article that I even arranged for two trees to be planted at Todd Migues Park in East Biloxi. They are dedicated to my father, Noel Obert, and to a close family friend Jackie Wilson. It was easy. And with planting season just around the corner, late February through March is the ideal time to put a young 2-caliber tree in the ground and set it on its path to adulthood. "My Trees" are approaching 15 years of age, and the growth has been amazing. (A two-caliber tree is two inches in diameter and is between three and five years of age).

My short notes describing each of the above honored individuals do not do justice to the roles they played in developing and growing our Gulf Coast community. Many of you have memories and experiences that better tell their stories. Please take a minute, write them down, and share on social media so that we all know their stories and achievements. I know there are many more to be recognized. Keep looking, and please take a minute to share their stories. They all deserve that recognition.

Dedicated trees may be planted on both public and private properties. Planting them on private property is very easy. Adding them to a public site requires a bit more work, but it is very doable.

Here is the process.

The Land Trust for the Mississippi Coastal Plain is a great place to start for honoring an individual by planting a tree in their memory. The Land Trust, in partnership with Hancock Whitney Bank, will take on the task for a donation beginning at \$100. Look them up online. Of course, you can arrange to plant one or more on your own property with help from a local nursery. You can arrange to plant a tree on city property by contacting the City of Biloxi Planning Office and working with the City of Biloxi Tree Committee. The city also uses its tree mitigation fund to plant protected trees in city parks and along rights-of-way. Please feel free to contact your Ward Tree Committee Representative or me for more information. I'd love to hear from our citizens about your dedicated, protected tree stories. You may also attend a tree committee meeting to share. The meetings are held on the first Wednesday of the month at 3:30 p.m. at the Planning Office. See page 19 for meeting details.



Biloxi History Receives Federal Recognition

The words "new" and "historic" might sound contradictory, but that's just how Biloxi's most recent National Register Historic District can be described. The federally recognized Greater Biloxi Subdivision Historic District, located in West Biloxi, represents the city's post-World War II westward growth. Situated just northeast of the Treasure Bay Casino, the district contains nearly two hundred properties and is roughly bounded by Greater Avenue to the north, Althea Street to the east, Southern Avenue to the south, and Orchid Street to the west.

What is the National Register?

The National Register of Historic Places was created by the federal government in 1966 to recognize sites that represent noteworthy moments in American History. These may be associated with important individuals or events, but more commonly places listed to the National Register represent a particular architectural style or a broad movement in American History.

The National Register differs from a Local Historic District, which requires proposed work to landmarked properties to receive a permit from Biloxi's Architectural & Historical Review Commission. There are currently no plans by the city to designate the area as a Local Historic District.

A Brief History of the Greater Biloxi Subdivision's Construction

Construction on the subdivision's first homes began in 1949. Following the lean years of the Great Depression and World War II rationing, the nation, and Biloxi in particular, faced a pent-up demand for new housing. The goal of the subdivision was to provide modest, affordable homes for veterans and their families, as well as to replace houses destroyed by the Hurricane of 1947.

For the homes built in the neighborhood to qualify for Federal Housing Administration (FHA)-insured loans, the subdivision had to meet basic requirements, such as paved roads, enclosed storm sewers, and uniform lot sizes.

In the car-centric culture of the mid-century, owning a vehicle was essential for suburban living, especially in neighborhoods located far from schools and businesses. As the subdivision was about a mile beyond Biloxi's then city limits, access to public utilities was limited. To address this, residents formed a cooperative to operate a water and sewer system.

Church and Temple Beth Israel were both placed prominently at the subdivision's entrance.

One veteran involved with the development was Carroll Benton Ishee (1921-1982). Best known for his later work in the 1960s and 1970s, Ishee would begin his career as a developer selling homes in the Greater Biloxi Subdivision. While housing demand was high and sales brisk. Ishee became disenchanted with the finished homes. This dissatisfaction ultimately inspired him to strike out on his own, creating his nature-inspired residences that remain highly sought after







along the Mississippi Gulf Coast today.

Servings of Style: Minimal Traditional, **Maximum Results**

Generally, Minimal Traditional Style homes are small, one-story dwellings with lowpitched roofs and little to no eave overhang. Windows are often paired and strategically placed to make the homes feel larger. When architectural ornamentation does appear, it is simplified, reduced to the barest essence of the architectural styles that inspired it.

With more than two hundred homes planned, an assembly line method of construction was employed to complete the task in less than two years. To streamline this process, uniform plans were developed, resulting in seven different configurations among the original homes. The variations included the orientation of the house on the lot, the placement of porches, and the type of roof shape of the home.

What similarities or differences do you see in the neighborhood's homes?

The Minimal Traditional Style dominates the subdivision's architecture. This style emerged during the mid-1930s, born out of the need

for small, efficient, and affordable homes for the average American following the Great Depression. It continued to be built into the early 1950s due to high demand for housing and post-war material rationing. Its popularity would soon be overtaken by the Ranch Style house.

The establishment of FHA-insured loans in the 1930s encouraged the construction of modest homes that would meet basic housing needs for middle-class families, without the decorative flourishes of earlier architectural styles. By providing low-cost, long-term, government-backed mortgages to borrowers, homeownership increased across the nation.

Adapting for the Future

Historic places are not frozen in time, and the Greater Biloxi Subdivision Historic District celebrates the evolution of these homes for more than two decades, from 1949 through 1970. Shortly after the first owners moved in, they began personalizing their homes by enclosing porches, adding carports, and building additions.

Because the National Register designation is honorific, it does not restrict use or provide protection of a property in the same way that a Biloxi Landmark designation does. However, National Register listing offers incentives, such as the Federal and State Historic Tax Credits, which can be applied to pre-approved rehabilitation work. (More information on these credits can be found at https://www.mdah. ms.gov/historic-preservation/preservation-planning-development).

While this designation will not alter daily life in the neighborhood, it does bring well-deserved recognition to the history the district represents. The nomination was created in partnership between the Mississippi Gulf Coast National Heritage Area program of the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources and the Community Planning and Development Department of the City of Biloxi.

Old Biloxi Library turns 100

Standing gracefully on Lameuse Street since 1925, the Old Biloxi Library remains one of the city's most treasured architectural gems. Widely regarded as the finest example of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture in Biloxi, this building features intricate details that highlight the craftsmanship and stylistic richness that define the style.

From the moment you approach the building, its artistry is unmistakable. The grand twin-flight stairway leads to a striking main entrance, where twisted columns and a sculpted cartouche create a dramatic and dignified focal point.

For decades, this building served as the heart of learning and community connection, operating as Biloxi's public library until 1978. After it retired from library service, its historical and architectural significance was formally recognized when it was added to the National Register of Historic Places.

Now a century later, the Old Biloxi Library stands not only as a beautiful work of architecture but also as a lasting symbol of Biloxi's cultural heritage and an enduring reminder of the city's commitment to preserving its unique and storied past.

Where could gifts be purchased downtown in 1929? Combel Hardware Co. and W. F. Gorenflo Hardware Company, both on Howard Avenue, sold croquet sets, scooters, bicycles, footballs, wagons, kiddie planes, and toy automobiles.

What traditional tree contest was held in 1929? Promoted by local garden clubs, the Living Tree contest encouraged residents to decorate and light live trees, both the potted type and those in residential yards. In 1929, Biloxi Mayor John Kennedy was one of the coastwide judges.

Who supplied prizes for the finalists in this unique tree contest? Garden clubs and the Mississippi Power Company.

Are Christmas trees grown in this state? Yes, there are about 30 Christmas tree farms across Mississippi.

What types of Christmas trees can we buy from Mississippi tree farms? The Leyland Cypress, Eastern Redcedar, and Virginia Pine are among the tree species grown in our State.



Ingredients:

- Mix 1 cup warm water with ½ tsp yeast; let sit 5 minutes.
- In a mixer, combine 1 cup + 1 tbsp bread flour, 1 tbsp sugar, ½ tsp salt, and 2 tsp olive oil. Add yeast mixture and knead for about 10 minutes until smooth.
- Rest 15 minutes, shape into a tight ball, and place in an oiled bowl.
 Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Instructions:

- Bring the dough to room temperature for 2 hours.
- Preheat oven to 500°F for at least 20 minutes before baking.
- Stretch the dough by hand to 14" and place it on a pizza pan.
- Add toppings in this order: grated mozzarella, several dollops of pizza sauce, pepperoni or your favorite toppings.
- Bake for about 6 minutes, until the crust is golden and the cheese melts. Slice and enjoy.

Notes::

- Hand-stretch for proper NY-style texture.
- Cheese first, then sauce to prevent sogginess.
- A fully preheated oven gives the best browning.

Biloxi's Christmas Time Machine

Qooking back of the state of th

Somehow, it's hard to comprehend how much has changed in the past 50 years. Still, Christmas holidays continue to embody the "Spirit of Biloxi," and reflecting on our past can help us to appreciate Biloxi's progress through the years. Let's take a look back at 1975.

Shopping

Throughout the years, both Downtown Biloxi as well as Edgewater Plaza (our mall) offered countless options for year-round shopping. Austin's Style Center, which opened in 1949 on Howard Avenue, was a popular choice for women's clothing. It was operated by Austin Moritz and John Moritz. In fact, Mr. Austin Moritz was honored as the Biloxi Lions Club Outstanding Citizen of the Year in December 1975. Today, both the mall and downtown offer a variety of great places to shop.

Trees

In 1975, Biloxi families could purchase both real and artificial Christmas trees for their homes. Gibson's Department Store, once located on Pass Road near Keesler Gate 7, sold 6-foot, flame-proof, "realistic Christmas trees" (with a stand) for \$8.88. Shoppers could also purchase holiday trimmings like silver icicles for 9 cents and tinsel garland for 22 cents.

News

In 1975, the Sunday newspaper published on December 21 sold for just 35 cents and contained six sections and 82 pages. Biloxi readers had their pick of local papers, including The Biloxi Press, The Daily Herald, and the South Mississippi Sun (morning paper). For quick stops, newsstands like Biloxi News Stand, Marion's Newsstand, and the Searight News and Record shop on Main Street were popular, while local radio broadcasting stations like WLOX radio, WVMI, and WQID kept residents tuned in throughout the day.

Much of the news still traveled by wordof-mouth, via the landline telephone. South Central Bell was the sole proprietor of home phone communications, offering both dial and push-button features. Back in the day, Biloxi still used the 601-area code - 228 wouldn't arrive until 1997. Each year, huge telephone books with white and yellow pages were delivered to each door. There was no internet then to search for phone numbers. Individuals had hand-written address books near their home phones, and businesses relied on the twirling Rolodexes to keep track of friends, family, and business contacts.

Libraries

In 1975, Biloxi was home to several public libraries. The historic downtown library, at the corner of Lameuse and Water Streets, served

as a hub of knowledge. alongside the Division Street branch and the West



Biloxi Branch, Decades later, the city would mourn the loss of the Division Street library, which was destroyed by Hurricane Katrina, leaving behind memories of the many stories and programs it once hosted.

Affordable date night opportunities

Going out on a date in 1975 offered several affordable and popular dining options. McDonald's and Burger King each had two



near Bellman was another favorite. For a sweet treat, KarmelKorn in the Edgewater Plaza mall sold a wonderful assortment of popcorn flavors as well as candy.

There were also seven movie theaters in Biloxi, including three drive-ins: the Do Drive In, the Don Drive In, and the Beach Drive In. These were unique outdoor venues where moviegoers would watch movies on a huge screen from the comfort of their cars, with audio piped in through the radio or little speakers mounted next to their parking spot. Unfortunately, cold weather closed them down for a few months each vear.

Other Biloxi movie theaters included Surfside (on Hwy. 90), Edgewater Plaza, and Avenue Theater (downtown). Son of Blob, One of Our Dinosaurs is Missing, Love Story, and Paper Moon are just a few of the films shown in December 1975.

Christmas cards

Back in the day, the custom of writing Christmas cards was very popular, often including special handwritten notes, in cursive, that updated friends and relatives of the past year's happenings. In 1975, folks did not have digital technology yet, so mailing cards was the norm. Residents would travel to the post office located on Main Street. The facility officially opened in 1959 and continues to serve the community today. Before that time, the Biloxi Post Office was located at the current City Hall building on Lameuse Street.

Fifty years ago, mailing a one-ounce Christmas card in the U.S. cost only 10 cents - much less than today's 78-cent stamp. Back then, a box of Christmas cards could be purchased at Newberry's at Edgewater Plaza for only \$1.44. Newberry's was a nationwide popular five-and-dime store.

Entertainment

The traditional radio was very popular in 1975. Music was also accessible at eateries on the Coast via the jukebox. This interesting electronic, mechanical machine held stacks of popular records. By inserting a few coins, the room came to life with the choice of a favorite was always fun. A record would appear from turntable, treating the crowd to the best audio qualities ever. Some restaurants even had tabletop jukeboxes in individual booths.

Popular songs in those days included Jive Talkin' (Bee Gees), One of These Nights (Eagles), Lady Marmalade (Labelle), Listen to What the Man Said (Wings), and Some Kind of Wonderful (Grand Funk Railroad). Today, these and all other songs from 1975 can be revisited by stopping at Marley's Music Store on G.E. Ohr Street in Downtown Biloxi.

Food for the holidays

Biloxi's traditional culinary holiday treats have certainly remained the same over the years. We still look forward to all the seasonal specialties.

The Slavonian ladies have been continuing to prepare their pusharatas, which they have done each holiday

season since they arrived in the late 1800s. Upon leaving their homeland of Yugoslavia, they were unable to take much with them. But the treasure of their special Christmas treat will remain in the Biloxi Christmas culture forever. Multiple ingredients mixed with happy chefs make this recipe for one of the most sought-after Christmas treats on the Coast.

In 1975, cooking the traditional Christmas dinner had taken a new turn. By that year, the sale of microwave ovens had nearly surpassed that of traditional ovens. In the fall of that year, Sears in the Edgewater Plaza was advertising Kenmore microwave ovens for \$218. This new modern kitchen appliance was guaranteed to dramatically reduce holiday meal cooking time.

Christmas parades

Parading has long been a cherished Biloxi tradition, and it carries on each Christmas season. In 1975, the Christmas parade was held on Monday, December 2, took place in Downtown Biloxi, and was sponsored by the

Biloxi Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce. It began at 7:30 a.m. at the Biloxi Community Center and traveled west along Howard Avenue to Porter Avenue. Local art, food, music, and small businesses will come together to bring the Avenue to life for three days of festive fun, laughter, and community spirit.
