

Chris De Back appointed Biloxi Police Chief

The City of Biloxi has announced the appointment of Christopher “Chris” De Back as the new Chief of Police, marking a significant milestone in a career defined by service, leadership, and dedication to the community.

Chief De Back’s commitment to public service began in January 1994 with the United States Army, where he earned numerous military honors, including the National Defense Service Ribbon, multiple Army Achievement Medals, and an Army Commendation Medal. That foundation of discipline and service carried forward when he joined the Biloxi Police Department in 1998.

Over the years, Chief De Back has served in a wide range of roles, gaining experience across nearly every aspect of law enforcement. His career includes assignments as a Patrol Officer, Explosive K-9 Handler, Investigator, and supervisor of criminal and violent crime investigations. He later led both the Patrol and Investigations Divisions as Major before being promoted to



Assistant Chief of Police in 2021.

Beyond his work in Biloxi, Chief De Back has contributed to public safety and service on a broader scale. He served as President of the Special Olympics Mississippi State Board and represents the state as a proxy board

member for the Regional Organized Crime Information Center. He is also committed to education, holding a bachelor’s degree in Business Management from the University of Southern Mississippi and a master’s degree in Administrative Justice from the University of Louisville. He also served for several years as an adjunct professor in USM’s Criminal Justice program.

Chief De Back’s career has been recognized with numerous honors, including the City of Biloxi Hurricane Katrina Service Medal, three Medals of Merit, and recognition as a Law Enforcement Victim’s Advocate.

He succeeds Chief John Miller, who retired in mid-January after 35 years of dedicated service to the Biloxi Police Department. With decades of experience and deep ties to the community, Chief De Back now steps into the role of Police Chief, poised to lead the department forward with integrity, professionalism, and a continued commitment to serving the people of Biloxi.

Halfway houses vs social service centers

Many people may use the terms halfway house and social services center interchangeably, but they serve very different purposes within a community.

According to the city’s Land Development Ordinance, a halfway house is a licensed home for juveniles or adults who are transitioning from more restrictive custodial confinement or who are initially placed in a more restrictive custodial setting, where supervision, rehabilitation, and counseling are provided to assist residents back into society, enabling them to live independently. A halfway house provides services to residents who live at the house/facility. No services are offered to the general public.

A social service center, by contrast, is a facility operated by a nonprofit organization that provides services such as training, counseling, health, or the distribution of food or clothing to the general public. These centers may include, but are not limited to, facilities offering life-skills training, substance abuse counseling, housing services, food banks, crisis centers,



community health centers, welfare agencies, job centers, or a neighborhood recovery center. This term does not include an emergency residential shelter or soup kitchens. Individuals do not live at these facilities. They visit the center to access the services.

Why are these important in a community? Each provides a vital role in providing support and resources to individuals in need, fostering long-term stability and improving public safety.

Recently, the Biloxi Planning Commission approved a conditional use for a halfway house at the Open Doors Homeless Coalition facility on Fernwood Drive. Open Doors works alongside community partners to prevent homelessness by offering housing solutions and supportive services that strengthen stability, health, and long-term success. The approval request for the halfway house was presented to Biloxi City Council on Jan. 20 and was tabled. Second Liners Mardi Gras Club Parade Saturday, Feb. 14, Noon


The Second Liners Mardi Gras Club will host its annual parade along Howard Avenue and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd.

The parade will begin and end on Bellman Street.

Krewe of Neptune Saturday, Feb. 14, 5:30 p.m.

Dozens of decorated and illuminated floats, along with marching bands, and others will wind through downtown streets for the annual nighttime parade.

This year's Krewe of Neptune theme is "Neptune Conquers Love."



Both the Krewe of Neptune and GCCA follow the same parade route.



Mardi Gras tips to keep in mind:

- No street parking in parade routes.
- Do not block traffic. If an officer is directing traffic, follow instructions.
- Obey posted speed limits and traffic signs.
- Park only in marked areas, no parking in the median or on sidewalks. Respect private property.
- No riding on tailgates, bumpers, roofs or hoods of vehicles.
- No glass containers; no underage drinking allowed.
- No animals allowed in any event area.
- No littering.
- Amplified sound is allowed only by permit.
- For safety, only cross roadways at designated locations such as a corner or crosswalk.
- Do not obstruct boardwalks or sidewalks; pedestrians only.
- Do not move or go around officially placed barricades.
- All service drives on U.S. 90 close at 10 p.m. unless posted otherwise. Vehicles not removed are subject to being towed.
- A helmet must be worn by all operators and passengers on a motorcycle.
- ATVs, UTVs, or any other unlicensed vehicle are not allowed on the roadway, on the beach, or on sidewalks or boardwalks unless being operated as an emergency vehicle.
- Licensed low-speed vehicles (such as golf carts) allowed only on designated roadways unless registered as a parade participant.

Gulf Coast Carnival Association Mardi Gras Parade Tuesday, Feb. 17, 1 p.m.

The annual Fat Tuesday parade, often including 100 or more floats, marching bands, police units, fire trucks, and more, will parade downtown Biloxi.

The Gulf Coast Carnival Association begins with dance performances on Lamuese Street in front of Biloxi City Hall, and includes the toasting of the King and Queen with Mayor Andrew "FoFo" Gilich.

This year's GCCA theme is "Pop" for Pop Art.



The traffic plan

- The area of Howard Avenue at Bellman Street will be closed on Saturday, February 14 beginning at 9 a.m. for the staging of the Second Liners Mardi Gras Club Parade. The remaining parade route will close at 11:30 a.m. until the parade ends.
- Traffic cones will be placed on eastbound Beach Boulevard from Porter Avenue to Caillavet Street beginning Saturday, Feb. 14 at 9 a.m.
- The Neptune Parade route will close Saturday, February 14 at 4:30 p.m. eastbound Beach Boulevard will be reduced to one lane at 6:30 p.m. between Porter Avenue and Caillavet Street for float return.
- Southbound I-110 will be diverted to Division Street at 6:30 p.m. and reopen at approximately 8:30 p.m. to help clear Beach Boulevard.
- The Gulf Coast Carnival Association Parade route will close at noon on Tuesday, February 17. Southbound I-110 will be diverted to Division Street beginning at 2 p.m.
- Eastbound Beach Boulevard will be reduced to one lane at 2:30 p.m. between Porter Avenue and Lee Street for float return.

LET'S PLANT SOME TREES

Happy Mississippi Arbor Day! It is traditionally celebrated on the second Friday in February, unless that is also Mardi Gras weekend. This year, the celebration falls on February 20.

Biloxi has proudly participated in this celebration for decades. In fact, Biloxi has been a "Tree City USA" for the past 42 years – the second-longest tenure in the state. Not only is the celebration important to the City of Biloxi, but it is also important to many citizens and the Tree Committee. Together, we must work to continue building on this legacy by protecting and building on the city's tree canopy.

Arbor Day was originally initiated in 1872 by the Morton family in Nebraska. Their goal was to encourage citizens of the Nebraska and Kansas barren plains to plant trees. They kicked off the celebration in 1874 by leading a state-wide effort to plant over a million trees that first year. I have been to their hometown just south of Omaha, and what was once a grass-covered prairie is now a lush homestead, covered in trees.

Over the past year, I've shared many stories about our city's Majestic Trees, covering specimens like the Old Brick House Oak, the Danny Guice Oak behind City Hall, the Querens Magnolia just north of our Fire Station Museum, the Osage Orange on the old Tullis Manor property, and the Edgewater Park Oak. Perhaps the most informative article covered the Trees of Keesler and their tree management over the past seventy years. Of the 8,000-plus registered trees on Keesler, thousands have been planted since the base first opened in the 1940s. Today, you can only imagine how bare the property must have looked when it was

cleared to construct the runway and hundreds of WWII era buildings. Many of the live oak trees lining the major boulevards are now reaching their 75th birthday.

For this article, I will highlight the Wallace Oak on Hopkins Boulevard, just north of Beach Boulevard (look behind the house on Hopkins). The tree is named after Doctor George Walton Wallace, a physician who practiced in Biloxi for most of his career. He passed away in 1960. The tree, estimated to be over 500 years old, is still radiant, though it has faced challenges over its lifetime. A decade ago, developers decided to construct a hotel on the property. One of their first actions was to remove one of its major limbs to permit first responder access to the property. The hotel was never built. George Walton Lawrence, lifetime Biloxi advocate and long-time city councilman, even told me he had been named after Dr Wallace, who delivered him during a house call in 1941.

I bring up the Wallace Oak to remind us all that age, disease, and occasionally development will, over the years, continue to reduce the long-time and treasured tree canopy in our city.

Back to Arbor Day. This year, we have teamed with the State of Mississippi Forestry Commission. They have arranged to donate 250 native trees for the residents of Biloxi to plant on their properties. We very much want you to take them, plant them, and help them grow.

Late February/March through mid-April is the perfect tree planting time in south Mississippi. So, join me and the tree committee as we hand out these trees in late February/March. The specific time and location are still being settled as I pen this article. Look for details in an upcoming B-Mail, on the city's website, and social media pages. We need to keep our canopy strong and growing!

Heat smart this winter



Winter's cold and freezing temperatures lead many households to use heating equipment, making this a high-risk season for home fires. The National Fire Protection Association identifies heating equipment as the leading cause of home fires in December and January. Cooking is a year-round concern, while electrical equipment ranks third, with nearly one-third of electrical fires happening between November and February. Here are some tips to help reduce the risk of a home fire as winter sets in.

- Make sure all heating equipment is in good working order.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, or space heaters.
- Keep portable generators outside, away

from windows, and as far away from your home as possible.

- Make sure space heaters are in good working order and used by the manufacturer's instructions.
- Avoid using electrical space heaters in bathrooms or other areas where they may come in contact with water.
- Make sure every bedroom and common area outside the bedrooms has a working smoke alarm. Be sure to check the smoke detectors monthly.
- Plug only one heat-producing appliance, like a space heater, into an electrical outlet at a time.
- Never use a range or an oven as a supplemental heating device. It is a safety hazard and can be a source of potentially

toxic fumes.

- Frozen water pipes? Never try to thaw them with a blowtorch or other open flame. The pipe could conduct the heat and ignite the inside of the wall. Use hot water or a UL-labeled device such as a hand-held dryer for thawing.
- If windows are used as emergency exits in your home, practice using them in the event of a fire. Be sure that all the windows open easily. Home escape ladders are recommended.
- If there is a fire hydrant near your home, you can assist the fire department by keeping the hydrant clear of obstacles so it can be easily located. Plan and practice a home escape plan with your family.



A Royal Valentine in Biloxi Mardi Gras History

The 1983 Mardi Gras season in Biloxi marked a special moment of love and legacy. That year, Melissa Schloegel was crowned Queen Ixolib, becoming the first daughter to inherit the title after her mother, Peggy Schloegel, then Peggy Harry, reigned in 1959.

Reigning alongside her was King d'Iberville, Harroll D. Castle. Their year was made even more memorable when Mardi Gras Day fell on Valentine's Day, inspiring the Gulf Coast Carnival Association's theme, "Legendary Lovers of the South." Costumes celebrated local love legends such as The Ring in the Oak, The Singing River, Winnie Davis and Her Yankee Lover, and The Legend of the Spanish Moss.

Today, Queen Melissa's gown from that historic season is on display at the Gulf Coast Mardi Gras Museum on Howard Avenue, preserving a royal chapter of Biloxi's Mardi Gras history for future generations.

Den of creativity

For decades, the Gulf Coast Carnival Association has brought Mardi Gras magic to life inside its float den in Downtown Biloxi. Known as the Walter "Skeet" Hunt Gulf Coast Carnival Association Den, the warehouse is filled with brightly colored floats that reflect the spirit and creativity of the season.



In the early days of Mardi Gras, carnival dens were more than storage spaces — they served as gathering places where krewes planned events, stored costumes, and prepared their throws, a tradition that gave the den its name. While the term remains, today's GCCA den functions primarily as a bustling workspace where volunteers decorate floats, make repairs, and load beads and other parade treasures. Located in East Biloxi on Esters Boulevard, the float den remains a vital behind-the-scenes hub of the Coast's vibrant Mardi Gras tradition, where months of hard work transform into moments of parade-day joy.



Amtrak reports record



When the Amtrak Mardi Gras Service rolled along the Coast in August 2025, it carried more than passengers; it brought the Gulf Coast's long-awaited return to rail. In the first month, the service carried more than 18,000 riders. By the end of the first two months, the route had become one of Amtrak's most successful launches, welcoming 46,000 riders and averaging 458 passengers a day.

Trains sold out for Saints home games and major events like *Cruisin' The Coast*, as travelers filled seats bound for Bay Saint Louis, Gulfport, Biloxi, Pascagoula, and Mobile. With a 96% customer satisfaction rate, the highest in the nation, the service quickly proved its value.

As it concludes its inaugural quarter, the Mardi Gras Service stands as a moving celebration of connection, community, and renewed Gulf Coast spirit.

Mardi Gras in Biloxi: A Century Ago

What day was Mardi Gras celebrated on in 1926? February 16.

Who were the King and Queen of Mardi Gras in Biloxi 100 years ago? Louis Braun and Evelyn Desporte.

What's the difference between Carnival and Mardi Gras? Carnival is a time of year, and Mardi Gras is the actual day.

Who was the mayor of Biloxi in 1926? Mayor John Kennedy, serving from 1919 to 1933.

Each Coastal city had a representative Duke reign at Biloxi's Mardi Gras celebrations. Who was Biloxi's Duke in 1926? John Becnel (who was portrayed in Biloxi's annual cemetery tour of 2021).

What was the parade theme in 1926? The title float was called "The Apotheosis of Biloxi."

How many floats were in the night parade 100 years ago? 10 floats. The 10th float was the Coast Guard's 75 miles-per-hour speedboat.

What was described as the most unique float that year? "Pearl Divers – Finding the First Oyster."

What was the forecast on Mardi Gras in 1926? The temperature for the evening parade was about 57 degrees, with a slight breeze and no rain.

Which group planned Biloxi's Mardi Gras festivities that year? Biloxi Progressive Businessmen's Association.

Was music included in the parade? Yes. There were three bands, including The Biloxi Boys Band.

When and where was Biloxi's night parade on that Mardi Gras? The parade began shortly after 8:00 p.m. and rolled through the downtown district.

Where were Biloxi's grand Mardi Gras balls held that year? The Avelez Hotel (located where the Memorial Hospital Biloxi is today) and the Elks Home (once at the southwest corner of Lameuse and Jackson Streets).

What were the official titles of Biloxi's Mardi Gras King and Queen in 1926? King d'Iberville and Queen Ixolib, [Biloxi spelled backwards].

Who designed the floats for the parades? Professor Norbert Salvador Navarro (featured in Biloxi's 2024 annual Cemetery Tour) is a famous artist who also taught at Sacred Heart Academy and the Gulf Coast Military Academy.



"Biloxi Cooks!" at Desporte Seafood

This month on "Biloxi Cooks!" we stop by Desporte Seafood in Downtown Biloxi, where tradition and flavor come together in a pot of gumbo. Nothing brings people together quite like this classic dish, simmered low and slow, filling homes with comfort and rich Cajun flavor. At Desporte's, gumbo isn't just a recipe; it's a shared experience.

This month's recipe:

Gumbo

Recipe by Desporte's Seafood



Ingredients:

- ½ cup oil
- ½ cup flour
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 bell pepper, diced
- 2 celery stalks, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 pound smoked sausage, sliced
- 1 pound chicken, cut into pieces
- 6 cups chicken stock
- 1 can diced tomatoes (optional)
- 2 teaspoons Cajun or Creole seasoning
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Cooked white rice
- Green onions or parsley for garnish

Instructions:

- Make the roux: In a large pot, heat oil over medium heat. Slowly whisk in flour and stir constantly until the roux turns a deep brown color (about 15–20 minutes).
- Add the vegetables: Stir in onion, bell pepper, celery, and garlic. Cook until softened.
- Build the gumbo: Add sausage and chicken, stirring to coat with the roux. Pour in stock and bring to a gentle boil.
- Season and simmer: Add tomatoes (if using), seasoning, thyme, and bay leaves. Reduce heat and simmer 45–60 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Serve: Remove bay leaves, adjust seasoning, and serve hot over rice. Top with green onions or parsley.

Riding the rails in Biloxi through the years Looking back – Moving forward

Way back in the early 1700s, Biloxi's modes of travel were quite simple. Our early settlers transported themselves, their food, supplies, and trading wares by foot, canoes, pirogues, and flatboats. Our first Biloxians weren't allowed to keep any of the huge wooden ocean-worthy ships. Monsieurs Bienville and D'Iberville needed them to continue their journeys.

When newcomers first arrived on Biloxi's shores, they had to make their own boats. Using tree trunks from nearby forests and the few tools they brought along with them from the Old Country, settlers carved and shaped their own boats.

Thus, Biloxians stayed close to the waters' edge, where traveling and the availability of attaining food, housing, and commerce could help them to survive.

Once horses became more plentiful, life began to change. Carts, carriages, and wagons became welcomed life-savers. Quality wheelwrights and blacksmiths could manipulate durable wood and strong metals to provide wagon wheels for the rolling transports. Wheelwrights generally built and repaired wooden wheels. Blacksmiths crafted the appropriate walking shoes (horseshoes) for the equine population. They also provided the technical skills to build the special cemetery fencing, which you can still find in our Old Biloxi Cemetery today. While perusing through old census records, one can notice the trades of "blacksmiths" and "wheelwrights" as listed occupations.

Around 1827, Biloxi's connections to the outside world expanded when steamboat service became available between New Orleans and Mobile. A few years later, in 1870, passenger rail service commenced between New Orleans and Mobile, as well. Trains not only carried travelers, but also mail, supplies, farm animals, and lumber, tying

Biloxi more closely to neighboring cities and markets.

As rail travel grew, Biloxi became home to several train stations. The main station was at Reynoir and was joined over time by stations at Oak Street, Gill, Beauvoir, and Edgewater. The early Reynoir station sat very near the spot where the Amtrak trains stop today.

Even Biloxi's seafood, particularly oysters, rode the rails. Seafood factories built their own on-site lines and carts to transport freshly caught seafood from the boats right into the factories, quickly and with little effort. Biloxi's Maritime & Seafood Industry Museum at Point Cadet has one of these original metal-wheeled seafood carts still on display! Stop by and take a look!

In 1894, Biloxi welcomed the Biloxi Electric Power Company, and by 1895, the Biloxi City Railroad Company was chartered. A new and exciting way to travel through town soon arrived. Trolley cars

then had the option to use animal power or electricity to roll through the downtown streets. Electric polls were hoisted along Beach Road (now Hwy. 90), providing a modern electrified means of transportation.

We can only imagine the musical sounds of Biloxi around 1900, when Biloxi became the Seafood Capital of the world. Listening to factory whistles, trains, steamboats, and occasional church bells would fill the air as "music of the night." What a magical melody that must have been!

Old pictures of Biloxi clearly show the abundance of rails right in the middle of the streets where trolley cars once rolled. These rails provided a direct path for those electrified vehicles as they once carried passengers throughout our community for work, school, shopping, visiting, and fun. Photos from the past also show trolleys traveling along Beach Road, on the south side of where Hwy. 90 is today. After Hurricane Katrina, during infrastructure replacement, unsuspecting workers discovered a plethora of old rails still embedded below the streets' surfaces on Howard Avenue.

As rail travel grew in popularity, Biloxi became part of a legendary route. In 1946, the famous Hummingbird Train made its

inaugural route through Biloxi. Owned by the L and N Railroad Company (Louisville and Nashville), the passenger train traveled between Cincinnati and New Orleans, carrying travelers through Biloxi well into the 1960s.

Biloxi's trains were not always limited to rails. In the 1960s, during the administration of Mayor Danny Guice, the popular Biloxi Shrimp Tour train could be spotted voyaging throughout downtown Biloxi and Beach Boulevard. Visitors still reminisce about those fun, breezy rides!

While full-sized trains carried Biloxi forward, a love for trains also found its way into smaller, more personal spaces. Model and toy trains have long captured the imagination, and in the 1990s, Biloxi even had its own beloved model train shop tucked along Rue Magnolia.

Owned and managed by Pat and Margaret Tremmel Peresich, the Emporium was always a fun place to shop, both for tiny trains as well as for unique gifts, each encased in Ms. Margaret's special bow and ribbon gift boxes. Today, that little building is now recognized as The Threaded Cork, a wonderful boutique shopping option, at the corner of Jackson and Rue Magnolia. This structure is also recognized in the Biloxi Historic Downtown Walking Tour as the Cousins House (c. 1910), still maintaining its turn-of-the century architecture.

Just steps away, another piece of Biloxi's rail history once stood. Years ago, before Hurricane Katrina, an original red caboose resided next door. With historic preservation efforts in mind, the City of Biloxi purchased an original full-size red caboose from Ruth McFalls of Ocean Springs for \$3,500. Utilizing heavy equipment, this original car from L and N Railroad was hoisted and securely placed on study metal train tracks, with the appropriate wooden ties and metal spikes then placed on a tiny piece of ground near the hospital parking lot. This historic structure was first utilized as an outlet for ceramics and handicrafts, servicing the local senior citizens groups. Later, it housed an office for Biloxi Main. Today, only a small plot of grass remains, where it once stood.

Today, the local CTA (Coast Transit Authority) provides travelers with the most modern means of public transit. With its hub situated just south of the Biloxi Amtrak stop, folks can ride through Biloxi, along Hwy. 90, and to distances as far away as Gulfport and Ocean Springs. There is even a neat green trolley route, the "Casino Hopper," which services casinos in Biloxi. This vehicle, with its unique design and wooden seats, is reminiscent of the older trolleys of yesteryear. CTA has steadily modernized its fleet, offering vehicles that run on cleaner fuels and feature environmentally friendly exhaust systems. In addition to everyday transportation, CTA plays a vital role in community safety, providing evacuation services during hurricanes and extreme cold weather events.

Biloxi's love for rail service isn't limited to trains and trolleys – it comes to life in the excitement of festivals and amusement parks. Roller coasters, with their travel at high speeds on elevated railroad tracks, twisting and turning in metal wheeled cars, offer the thrill of a lifetime. Paradise Pier in Biloxi on Hwy. 90 at Point Cadet is the place to go for the most modern roller coaster ride today.


All this history and excitement comes full circle as passenger rail returns to the Gulf Coast. Residents, tourists, and businesses alike are celebrating Amtrak's Mardi Gras Line, which now travels from Mobile to New Orleans, stopping near the CTA depot and tracing the same tracks where trains once ran decades ago. Biloxi's rail legacy continues – linking past, present, and future in a journey that keeps the city connected and moving forward.
